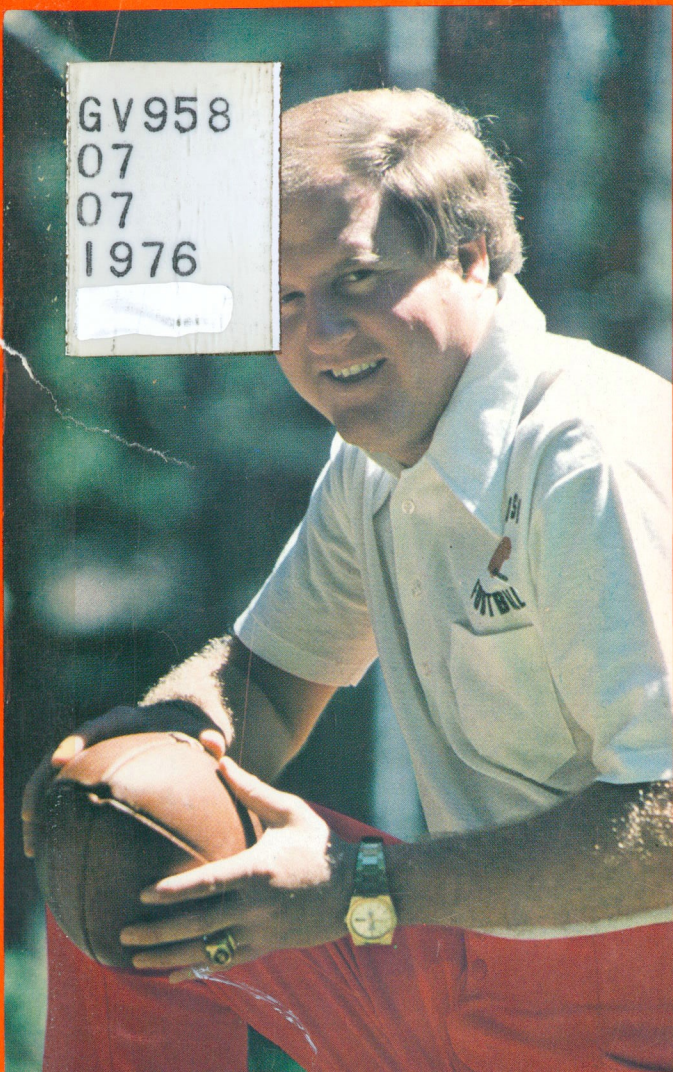

## LEE OVERTON

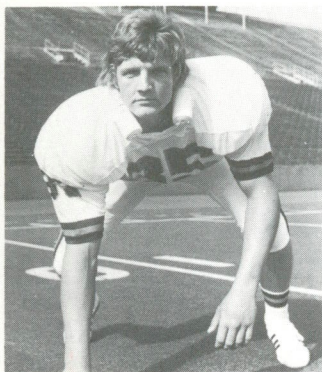
5-11, 180, Sr.

Lee has been a regular for the past three years at Oregon State, playing as a flanker. FERTIG ON OVERTON: "Having coached against Lee for the last couple of years (as assistant coach at USC), we think he is one of the most outstanding athletes on the coast . . . he is very versatile, in the fact he had tremendous speed, but he also has quickness to go along with that speed and a great pair of

hands . . . once he catches the football in the open field he knows what to do with it . . . he adds a dimension to our offense, instead of just catching the football and taking 10 or 12 yards, if you don't tackle him he is liable to go the distance".

Dennis has been a regular defensive starter for the past three years as a tackle and end. FERTIG ON BOYD: "We think he is one of the great all-around football players to ever play in the Pacific-8 . . . this will be his fourth year as a regular and I don't know that many other players that have ever started four years in a row in the Pacific-8 . . . I can remember his first game against USC

when he had to go against Booker Brown who weighed 300 pounds and Dennis, as a 17-year-old freshman, gave Booker all he wanted that day and he has come along way, not only physically strong and physically big, but he is a very mentally tough person and a very hard worker . . . he is also a very intelligent young man who carries a high grade point average in Mechanical Engineering".

# Press Information

## PRESS BOX TICKETS, ACCOMMODATIONS

Press box tickets for games at Parker Stadium may be obtained by working press and radio & TV personnel by writing the Sports Information Department, Oregon State University, Gill Coliseum, Corvallis, Oregon 97331. There is a limit of six people per radio booth. Tickets should be ordered in advance to permit mailing. Press parking is available at Parker Stadium. When requests are received after the Wednesday prior to the game, tickets will be left at Parker Stadium "WILL CALL" window. **NON-WORKING INDIVIDUALS WILL NOT BE PERMITTED ON THE PRESS LEVEL.** Those who plan to drive to Parker Stadium should apply for parking passes at the same time press box tickets are requested.

## PHOTOGRAPHY

Sideline tags will be issued to photographers representing daily newspapers, TV, wire and photo services. Sideline tags **WILL NOT ADMIT** bearer to press box. The NATIONAL rule limits the shooting of pictures to an area outside a five-foot restraining line enclosing the playing field. Pictures may be taken between the 35-yard lines during the **FIRST QUARTER ONLY**. Sideline photo tags or press box photo passes may be obtained from the OSU Sports Information Department.

## SERVICES

The Sports Information Department will furnish a play-by-play after each quarter. Statistics will be available at halftime and the conclusion of the game. Lineups, substitutions, scoring summary, quotes and other pertinent information will be available after the game. A press box PA is also available. The buffet will be open at the rear of the press box prior to the game for a light lunch. The Parker Stadium press box is wired to handle Telecopiers and other copying devices. Media **MUST** provide their own phones, however.

## TELECOPIERS

The Parker Stadium press box is wired to handle Telecopiers. Media planning to use such devices must make their own arrangements with Pacific Northwest Bell (757-1551) in Corvallis for a telephone as phones will not be available for Telecopier use in the press box. Phones are available in the Sports Information Office in Gill Coliseum, however. The Sports Information Department does have one Xerox Telecopier which can be used upon request.

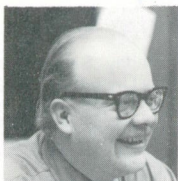

# Oregon State Radio Network



Every Oregon State University football game, both home and away, will be carried live throughout the state of Oregon and much of Washington over a 26-station Oregon State University sports network. Veteran sportscaster Darrell Aune will once again call the play-by-play action for Beaver football. Aune, KEX Sports Director and "Voice of the Beavers", is a graduate of Washington State University and will be starting his seventh year as play-by-play broadcaster for the Oregon State Sports Network. While he was at Washington State he did play-by-play for the Cougars. He also did play-by-play for Southern Colorado College in Pueblo, Colorado, before joining KEX. He was named Oregon "Sportscaster of the Year" for two consecutive years and is past president of the Oregon Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association.

Jim Howe, KEX News Director, provides color for all Oregon State football games and has been with the KEX news department for 14 years, the last 11 as News Director. This will be his fourth year as a color-man for the Oregon State broadcasts. Previously, he was play-by-play announcer for the KEX Metro League game of the week. Howe is past president of the UPI Broadcast News for Oregon.

Oregon State University is Oregon's oldest state-supported institution of higher learning. It uses Oct. 27, 1868 as its Charter Day.

Like many of the leading public universities in the U.S., Oregon State was established as a Land Grant or "people's college" under the historic Morrill Act signed by President Abraham Lincoln. The act provided grants of lands to the various states to start public colleges that would extend educational opportunities to all who had the will and ability to learn.

In its early years, the school was located in "downtown Corvallis." A 35-acre farm was purchased in 1870 for a new college campus west of town. The first building, Benton Hall, was completed in 1888.

In the beginning, the curriculum was typical of the colleges of the period. There was a classical course leading to the Bachelor of Arts degree and a scientific course leading to the Bachelor of Science.

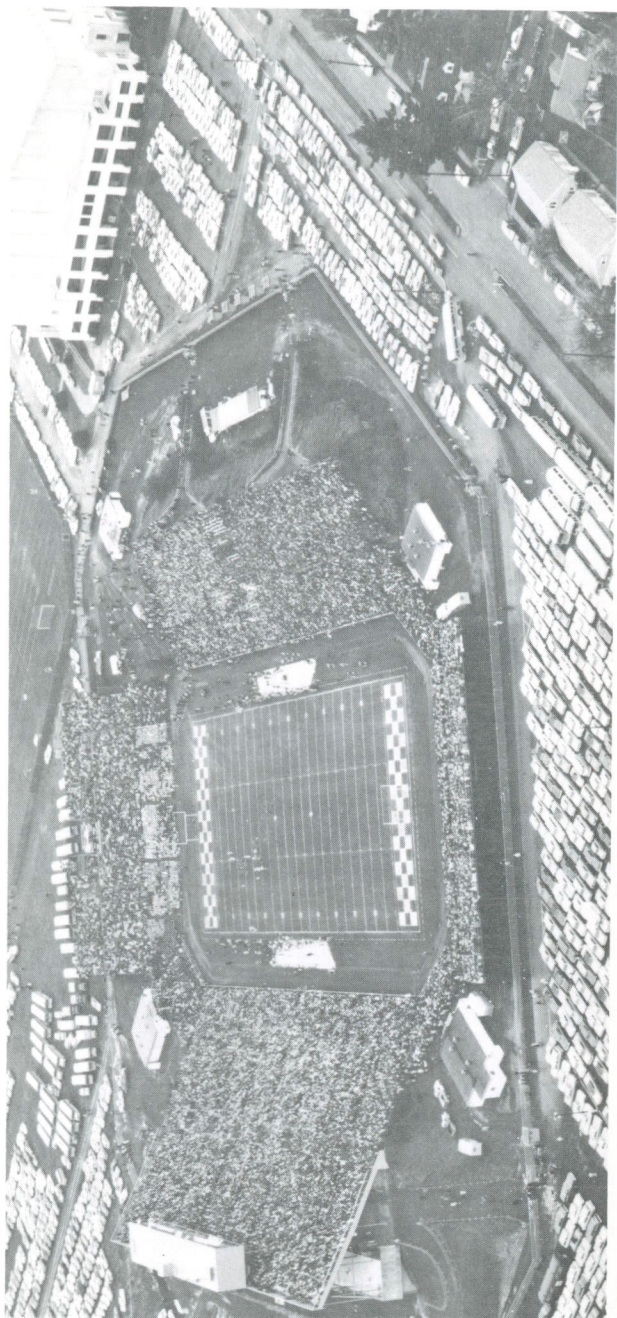
Agriculture was added in 1869 under the impetus of the Land Grant Act. Commerce, household economy and engineering courses came soon too and in 1908, four professional schools were established: Agriculture, Commerce, Engineering, and Home Economics.

With 15,500 students now, Oregon State offers a complete university curriculum. The College of Science and the College of Liberal Arts are the largest academic units. Schools include Agriculture, Business and Technology, Education, Engineering, Forestry, Home Economics, Oceanography, Pharmacy, and a Division of Health and Physical Education.

OSU's 400-acre, tree-lined campus now has about 100 buildings and research laboratories. Classroom buildings, the library, and student activity areas are located in the center. Residence halls and research areas are on the edges.

In September 1971, Oregon State was designated by the U.S. Commerce Department as one of the nation's first four Sea Grant colleges as well. As such, it is charged with leadership in the wise development of marine resources.

Oregon State's ocean research vessels (four) are docked at Newport on the Oregon Coast, just 55 miles from the campus. The university's Marine Science Center there has become one of the top tourist attractions in the Northwest.

# PARKER STADIUM

Parker Stadium, right in the heart of the beautiful Oregon State University campus, ranks as one of the finest and most up-to-date football plants in America.

Seven years ago, they added 9000 west sideline seats, bringing the total capacity to 40,750 seats. An overflow crowd of 41,494, largest then ever to witness an athletic event in the state of Oregon, was on hand to watch Oregon State hand national champion Southern California its only defeat (3-0).

About 27,500 seats at Parker Stadium are of the sideline variety. There are 82 rows on the west sidelines and 40 rows on the east sidelines, and the entire east sideline of 9000 seats has been turned over to OSU students.

Parker Stadium is named for Charles T. Parker, a Portland businessman and OSU graduate who played a major and financial role in its opening in 1953. The stadium was built at no cost to taxpayers, through donations from OSU alums and friends. Original seating was 28,000, which at that time appeared adequate.

Some years ago, additional seats in the end zone and corners raised the total capacity to 33,000. Then, in time for the 1968 season, the new west sideline addition raised it to 40,750, and contributions again helped make this possible. Mr. Parker made a sizeable contribution, just as he had in 1953, and his gift was matched. The late Jack Brandis, Portland and Corvallis forestry executive, headed up a small committee that secured the matching funds. OSU athletic department funds were also used.

Now, the Beavers have another brand new Astro Turf installation, just completed last August. The new "rug," worth over \$273,000, cost the University about \$81,000 and was funded 49 percent from physical education, 31 percent from intercollegiate athletics and 20 percent from student fees.

Chief architect for the new addition was Dan Zarosinki, Portland engineer. Zarosinki received his B.A. and M.A. degree in Engineering at OSU and played three years of varsity football for the Beavers (1949-51).

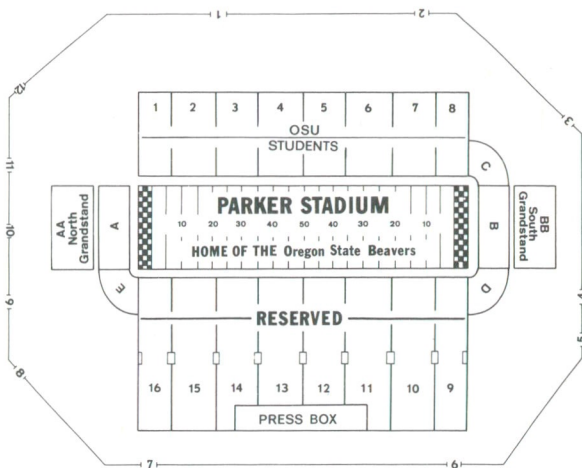
Parker Stadium is picturesque, as well as practical. There's a lot of parking space, within close walking distance of the stadium. Every seat is a good seat, with no posts. From some of the higher rows, one has a beautiful view of the McDonald National Forest, Mary's Peak and the Coast Range of mountains. Dressing rooms for players are located in close-by Gill Coliseum, less than 100 yards from the playing field.

The press box, high atop the west sideline stands, is one of the most workable to be found anywhere.

First floor is strictly for members of the working press. There are 56 seats in the front row, and 52 seats in the elevated back row, with lots of walking room in between. Nobody is crowded. Another big working area is located back of the two press rows, where machines and operators are situated. Also, there is a lunch bar, with tables, chairs, etc., plus attractive hostesses anxious to serve the media.

The second floor is reserved for radio and TV media, plus home and visiting coaches (phones to field). Two huge TV and photography booths are 22 feet 6 inches across each, and 27 feet deep. Ten smaller booths, each 11 feet 3 inches across and 27 feet deep, are used by radio, coaches, statisticians, etc. Under good weather conditions, the press box roof also could be used for TV or photography purposes.

One of the best additions is the press box elevator, which was made possible by a donor who prefers to remain anonymous. The elevator runs from the lower level to all floor levels.

## DEE ANDROS

Director of Athletics



"The Great Pumpkin" started a new "Era" at Oregon State University when he announced he was resigning as the Beavers' head football coach following the 1975 season. Shortly after his resignation as football coach, Dee was named as Director of Athletics, succeeding Jim Barratt to become the eighth Athletic Director in OSU history.

Dee's decision to give up the OSU football reigns ended a happy and successful 25 years as a grid coach, the final 14 as a head coach.

Dee's athletic career began back in Oklahoma City, Okla., where he was born October 17, 1924. Dee played four years of prep football at Central High School in Oklahoma City, plus he also earned an additional two letters in wrestling. After graduating from Oklahoma City High School in 1942, Dee entered the Marine Corps and served in the Marines from 1942-46 through the duration of World War II and was decorated with a Bronze Star in the battle of Iwo Jima for heroic achievement. Dee was a sergeant in the Marines at the time of his discharge.

Following his discharge in the Marines, Dee entered University of Oklahoma where he played football for four years, the first year under the late Jim Tatum and the Sooners went to the Gator Bowl that year. The next three years were under Bub Wilkinson and twice the Sooners reached the Sugar Bowl. Dee graduated from Oklahoma in 1950. It was at Oklahoma that he met and married his lovely wife Luella. Demosthenes Konstandies Andreopoulos (Dee's full name) was married to the former Luella Thomas on January, 1949.

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Following his graduation from Oklahoma, Dee immediately launched his very successful coaching career. He started out as an assistant under Wilkinson on the Oklahoma staff for three years (1950-52). In 1953, Dee served as line coach at Kansas and then moved on to Texas Tech in 1954-55. He joined Pete Elliott as an assistant at Nebraska in 1956 and followed Elliott to California for three more years (1957-59). He also followed Elliott to Illinois for two more years (1960-61) before gaining his first head job, University of Idaho in 1962.

While Dee was serving as an assistant, Texas Tech went to the Sun Bowl and California to the Rose Bowl in 1959.

Dee spent three years at Idaho where he compiled a 11-16-1 record.

Dee was named head coach at OSU, following the departure of Tommy Prothro to UCLA, in 1965. Since Dee arrived at Oregon State, few coaches have ever enjoyed the national attention that has been bestowed on the "Great Pumpkin". Under Dee's leadership, the Beavers were runner-up in the tough Pacific-8 Conference four times.

Perhaps Dee's most famous season was in 1967, a team that was called the "Giant Killers". That year, OSU defeated then No. 2 ranked Purdue on the road and two weeks later tied No. 2 ranked UCLA in Los Angeles, which prompted Dee to say, "I'm tired of playing these No. 2 teams, bring on No. 1". His Beavers then proceeded to defeat the No. 1 ranked USC Trojans, led by O. J. Simpson, the next week in Corvallis, 3-0.

Dee's brilliant coaching career has brought him many honors and much acclaim. He has served as a coach in three different post-season all-star games, the Hula Bowl, the Coaches All-America Bowl and the East-West Shrine Game.

Some of Dee's teammates at Oklahoma included Jim Owens, ex-Washington coach; Darrell Royal, Texas; Bert Clark, ex-Washington State coach; and Jack Mitchell, ex-Kansas coach.

Dee got his famous "Great Pumpkin" nickname from a veteran Northwest sports writer, Harry Missildine, Sports Editor of the Spokesman-Review in Spokane, Wash. Harry noticed that Dee was always dressed in orange while near the gridiron, and for that matter most everywhere else he travels, thus the "Great Pumpkin" nickname.

Dee as a football coach, and even more now as an athletic director, is in constant demand as a speaker and tries to fill as many speaking engagements as possible.

Dee and Luella have one daughter, Jeanna, 19, now a sophomore at OSU.



## DR. ROBERT W. MACVICAR

### President

Dr. Robert MacVicar, a national educational and scientific leader, has been president since July 1, 1970, of Oregon State University, Oregon's oldest public institution of higher learning.

He came to Oregon State from Southern Illinois University where he had served first as vice president for academic affairs and then as chancellor.

Earlier, MacVicar had been on the faculty of Oklahoma State University as professor of chemistry, dean of the graduate school, and vice president of academic affairs.

Born September 28, 1918, MacVicar received his bachelor's degree from the University of Wyoming; his master's degree in chemistry from Oklahoma State; and his doctor's degree in biochemistry from the University of Wisconsin.

When MacVicar was graduated with highest honors from the University of Wyoming in 1939, he was chosen to be a Rhodes Scholar. He was unable to go to England for the special advanced work, however, because of the start of World War II in Europe and his own military service as an officer in the Food and Nutrition Division, U.S. Army Sanitary Corps.

President MacVicar is currently serving as a member of the American Council on Education's new Commission on Leadership Development in Higher Education. He has been on the Council of the Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges; consultant to the U.S. Office of Education, 1956-70; consultant to the Atomic Energy Commission, 1958-69; and was a member of the Educational Advisory Committee of the National Science Foundation, 1957-69.

He also was a founding member of the board of the Central Educational Midwest Research Laboratory, St. Louis, Mo., and chairman of the Laboratory executive committee for three years.

In April 1972, he was one of seven representatives of government and higher education named to a policy-level steering committee to guide a nationwide program for higher education information exchange. The program is directed by the National Center for Higher Education Management Systems.

In 1971, MacVicar was named to the Oregon committee for selection of Rhodes Scholars. He is a member of the nation's two major academic honor societies — Phi Kappa Phi and Phi Beta Kappa — and the national research honorary, Sigma Xi. He is author of some 135 papers, reports and articles.

MacVicar's professional memberships include the American Society of Biological Chemists, American Chemical Society, American Institute of Nutrition, Nutrition Society of Great Britain, and the Society for Experimental Biology and Medicine.

## MacVicar Active President

Since he became Oregon State University's 14th president in 1970, Dr. Robert MacVicar has become noted in the Northwest for his tremendous energy, long work days, and his ability to communicate with people — students, parents, legislators, business men, senior citizens.

Breakfasts for him are times for meetings. Evenings are for speaking engagements, meetings and conferences, teaching a class at the university on trends in higher education, and for inviting students into his home for informal talks and for listening to their points of view.

In 1972, the university president moved into a resident hall for part of a week to better appreciate student needs and wishes concerning their college programs. On a continuing basis, he and the student body president hold regular question-and-answer sessions on campus for anyone who has something to say or ask.

During the first year in Oregon, MacVicar traveled more than 30,000 miles to become acquainted with the people, resources and needs of the state. His pace hasn't slackened since then. He has visited every part of the state and spoken in almost every community.

His voice has become one of the best known and most heeded in the Northwest on educational, scientific, and research programs and problems.

Mrs. MacVicar is an educator too as well as a homemaker. She holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Oklahoma State University and met her husband while both were professors there. They were married in 1948. Mrs. MacVicar also taught for two years in Boston at a day care center and did a year's advanced work at Child Education Foundation in New York City.

The MacVicar's have two children.



## PAUL VALENTI

### Associate Director of Athletics



Paul Valenti graduated from Tamalpais High School in Mill Valley, Calif., in 1938 and that fall enrolled at Oregon State University. Except for time out for World War II and service in the Navy (1942-45), Paul has been a member of the OSU family ever since, first as a player, then as a coach and administrator.

Paul played four years of basketball at OSU, earning three letters under legendary Slats Gill and playing on two Northern Division championship teams, 1940 and 1942. Following his stint in the Navy for World War II, Paul returned to Corvallis and joined his old coach, Slats, as an assistant, a capacity he served until 1958 when Slats retired as an active coach to become athletic director.

Paul was the logical man to take over the OSU basketball post when Slats retired and he did an outstanding job for six seasons as the Beavers' head coach. His six-year record found Valenti's teams winning 85 and losing 74 and his 1966 team captured the Pacific-8 championship, the last team to wrestle the title away from UCLA.

Jim Jarvis, Loy Petersen, Charlie White, Freddie Boyd and Ed Fredenburg were some of the outstanding players to perform under Valenti during his tenure as Beaver basketball coach.

After relinquishing his head basketball position, Paul was named Assistant Athletic Director and tennis coach. He was OSU's tennis coach for six years before the sport was discontinued at OSU following the 1975 season.

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When Dee Andros was appointed Director of Athletics, Paul was immediately promoted to Associate Director of Athletics by Andros and given much more responsibility. Among many duties, Paul is responsible for the grounds and maintenance of OSU athletic facilities.

Paul was an outstanding athlete as a prep, earning four letters in basketball and tennis and earning all-league honors three times in each sport. After earning his B.A. Degree in 1942, Paul also added his Master's from OSU in 1949.

**COMM HENNESSY, Business Manager** — Comm has been a member of the OSU Athletic Department staff since 1961. Comm served as Ticket Manager from 1961-66 and was promoted to Business Manager in 1966 and has been in the position ever since. Prior to joining the athletic department staff, Comm was an accountant in the OSU Physical Plant. He was named the Pacific-8 Business Manager of the Year in 1969. Comm, 44, is a 1950 graduate of Corvallis High School and attended OSU from 1952-58. In addition to his Business Manager duties, Comm also is the athletic department office manager. Born 4/23/32 in Fontana, Kansas, Comm and his wife Joanne have two children, Connie, 13; and Curtis, 8.



**BILL ROBERTSON, Trainer** — Bill has been OSU's trainer since 1946. The very popular Robertson goes by the nickname "Ropes". Bill was born March 6, 1915 in Vancouver, B.C., Canada and moved to the United States at an early age and became a U.S. citizen. He graduated from Portland's Benson Tech in 1934. After working at the Multnomah Athletic Club for three years, he enrolled at OSU in 1937 and joined the Army in 1941. After being discharged as an infantry staff sergeant in 1945, Bill returned to OSU and was named the Beavers' trainer July 1, 1946. Bill later got his B.S. Degree in Science in 1948. His illustrious career has found him being inducted into the Helms Hall of Fame for athletic trainers, serving as Olympic trainer for the 1964 Olympic Games in Tokyo. Bill also went to the Far East in 1967 (summer) to put on clinics for trainers for the Department of Defense. Bill is very much in demand at banquets as a speaker and is very famous for his vocal rendition of "Casey at the Bat" and dozens of other recitations. Bill and his wife Mary have three children, Billy, 29; Nancy, 28; and Penny, 27.



**JIM RUDD, Executive Director Beaver Club** — Jim joined the Oregon State staff in 1974 as Director of Sales & Promotion. In January, 1976, Jim switched positions in the department to become the first ever Executive Director of the Beaver Club, OSU's athletic fund raising organization. Jim is a 1970 graduate of University of Northern Iowa where he received his B.A. in Education. Jim received his M.A. in Education from the same school in 1972. Jim enjoyed an outstanding athletic career at Northern Iowa, winning three letters in football, and earning all-conference honors as a lineman. As a prep at Salt Community High School in Salt City, Iowa, Jim earned four football letters, three basketball and four in track. He was the Class AA shot put champion and 1966 state record holder at 58-0, plus he earned all-state honors in football. Born 3/1/48 in Salt City, Iowa. Jim is single.



**DON SHELLEY, Equipment Manager** — Don has been the OSU Equipment Manager since 1961. Don attended Oregon State in 1932 and 1933 after graduating from North Bend High School in 1932. He attended Behnke-Walker Business College from 1934-36, where he received his Business degree. He worked for Evans Products in Coos Bay from 1936-42 and then spent four years in the Navy. From 1946-54 he was part owner of a sawmill and from 1955-59 he worked for Holmes Eureka Lumber Company before taking his OSU position. Born 4/14/14, Don and his wife Elva have two children, Kristin, 25 and Jon, 27.



**HAL COWAN, Director of Public Relations & Promotions** — Joined the OSU staff in January, 1976, as Director of Sales & Promotions and was promoted in April to Director of Public Relations & Promotions, Cowan is in charge of the Sports Information Department, ticket sales and promotions. Prior to joining the OSU staff, Cowan served as Director of Public Relations with the Portland Storm of the World Football League; Sports Information Director at the University of Oregon (1967-74); Assistant Sports Information Director at the University of California in Berkeley (1966-67); Sports Information Director at Central Michigan University (1965-66). Cowan is a 1964 graduate of Linfield College with a B.A. in Journalism. Cowan also was a sports writer for the Oregonian and Oregon Statesman and served in the U.S. Army as a 1st Lieutenant in the Medical Service Corps before taking the SID position at Central Michigan. Cowan is a 1958 graduate of North Salem High School. He participated in football, basketball, cross country and baseball at North Salem and baseball at Linfield. Several of Cowan's press books, football, basketball, and track/baseball, have won national awards and he also served on the NCAA Public Relations Committee. Born 3/26/40 in McCook, Neb. Hal has two boys, Chris, 9; and Greg, 4.



**JOHN EGGERS, Sports Information Director** — John is starting his 26th year on the OSU staff. John joined the OSU staff on July 1, 1950, as an assistant to director Irwin Harris, and was moved up to the SID position on July 1, 1952. Eggers was born and raised in Pendleton, the "Round-Up City" of eastern Oregon. He was an all-state basketball player at Pendleton High, a prep teammate of Lew Beck who later went on to win All-America fame at OSU and play in the Olympic Games. Eggers played one varsity basketball season at Willamette while only a freshman before enlisting in the Navy for World War II. After discharge, he attended OSU from the fall of 1946 through 1949. Before returning to the OSU staff, he worked for one year as a sports writer on the Oregonian in Portland. John and his wife Jean have three sons, Kerry 22; Brent, 19; and Tom, 14.





**LOREN SOLUM, Assistant Trainer** — Joined the OSU staff in 1969 and has served as an assistant trainer to Bill Robertson ever since. Loren also runs the OSU weight training program. ## CRAIG FERTIG

Head Football Coach

**COLLEGE:** USC, 1964

Craig Fertig, 34, a dynamic young coach with a rich football heritage already behind him, will debut as Oregon State's new head coach, and at the same time, launch his own career as a collegiate grid boss when the Beavers host Kansas at Parker Stadium on September 4.

Since being named OSU's head coach in December, Fertig has been a whirling dervish. First, getting his staff together and then completing a very successful recruiting year, and finally, spending countless hours around the Northwest promoting Beaver football.

Fertig, of course, replaces a fabled name among the nation's grid mentors in Dee Andros. In announcing Fertig as his replacement, Andros said, "We looked the entire country over for the best man available for our coaching job and I don't think under any circumstances could we have found a better man than Craig Fertig".

Fertig has a rich foundation already behind him as he awaited realization of his biggest dream — a head coaching job at a Pacific-8 school.

Fertig's football career got its beginning as an all-city quarterback at Huntington Park, Ca., High School. Then, it was on to University of Southern California where he enjoyed an outstanding collegiate career playing under John McKay. While quarterbacking the Trojans, Craig established eight USC records in passing, including most yards passing on one game, 371. Craig was a member of USC's 1962 Rose Bowl and national championship team and was co-captain of the 1964 club. He was named winner of the Davis-Teschke Award his senior year at USC which is given to the most inspirational player on the USC squad.

Following his senior year, Fertig was drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers of the NFL but elected to accept an assistant coaching job at USC under McKay rather than play professional football. That decision Craig has never regretted. "I regard John McKay as the master, one of the great men of collegiate football history and it was an honor for me to have been on his staff", Fertig asserts. "And naturally, I will carry much of his philosophy into my teaching of the game at OSU".

Fertig spent nine years with McKay before he left to join the World Football League ranks in 1974 as offensive coordinator of the Portland Storm under Dick Coury. Following the demise of the WFL, Fertig returned to USC as offensive coordinator in 1975 in charge of the quarterbacks and receivers once again.

All told, USC recorded a fantastic record of 84-20-6 in 10 years Fertig served as a McKay assistant, including six Rose Bowl and one Liberty Bowl appearance. USC won seven Pacific-8 championships and three national titles during that 10-year span.

His former boss, John McKay had this to say about Craig: "To me, Craig Fertig has always been more than an assistant coach. He did an excellent job at the University of Southern California and I know he and his staff will win at Oregon State. He is a well rounded person and has a solid knowledge in every coaching area".

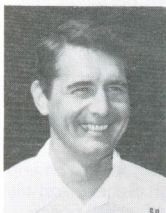
Another well known name in the football coaching ranks, Paul "Bear" Bryant, also offered the following comment when Fertig was named OSU's head coach: "Ever since Craig beat Notre Dame I've followed his career very closely. USC's win over Notre Dame made us the national champions and we made Craig an honorary 'Bama letterman and sent him a letter jacket. Ever since that I've taken a personal interest in his career and I know that Oregon State made a very wise decision".

Two very famous athletes that Fertig associated with at USC were O. J. Simpson and Lynn Swann. Simpson had this to say about his former coach: "Craig and I have been friends for a number of years. He helped me a lot as a running back at USC and I owe a lot to him because he had a definite impact on the type of person I am today. I am gratified he would consider me to help endorse his program". Swann added: "Even though Coach Fertig did not personally coach at USC, the impact he had on our total offense was tremendous. I know a number of his assistants at Oregon State and there is no doubt in my mind OSU is on the way back to the top".

While a prep star at Huntington Park, Craig earned three letters in football and three in baseball.

Craig is a member of the American Football Coaches Association and the Screen Actors Guild. While an athlete at USC, Craig appeared in several movies.

Craig was married in 1964 to the former Nancy Jane Hooper and the couple has two children, Marc, 7; and Jennifer, 5. One of Craig's most ardent boosters is his father, Henry Fertig, who is the Chief of Police in Huntington Park, Ca.

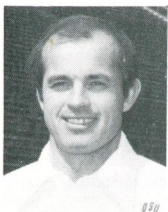

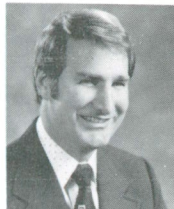

Cromwell was the offensive player-of-the-year in the Big Eight last season after leading the league in rushing with 1,124 yards. 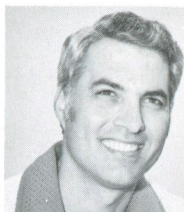

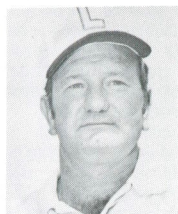

**OUTLOOK:** Frank Maloney starts his third season at Syracuse with far more to smile about than in either of his first two years. SU posted its first winning season since 1970 last year and, had it won the season finale, would have finished as the most improved team in the country. SU scored the most points (174) and allowed the fewest (182) since 1971. With the exception of a few key seniors, most of the accomplishments were made by freshman-sophomores as Maloney really went to youth in '75. With another good recruiting year (probably the best of his three classes), Syracuse is clearly heading back towards the top of Eastern football. Offensively, the Orange has a veteran interior line and if it jumps a notch or two because of experience, watch SU move the ball this fall. Bob Avery, out half the season with a nagging muscle pull, averaged 4.6 yards per carry and things happen when he is at tailback. Three fullbacks return in Earl Vaughn, leading rusher in '75, Tom Voyda and Jim Sessler. Help is needed at the ends and quarterback. Pete Prather, a transfer from Ohio State, appears to rank as the top AB prospect with the backup help coming from the freshman class. The defensive interior is strong with Ken Clarke, Bernie Winters and Bill Zanovitch and the secondary is the best Maloney has had with All-America candidate Larry King, vet Tim Moresco and Nate Wright. The linebacking needs instant help. The schedule is tougher, but the 5-7 win range looks quite certain at this stage.

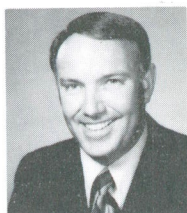

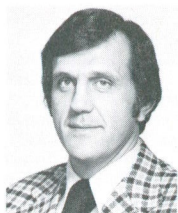

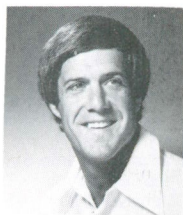

# The Outlook.

It will be the "new look" for Beaver football this fall.

Everything about Oregon State football is new in 1976. A new coaching staff, headed by dynamic Craig Fertig, new uniforms (OSU will have orange jerseys and orange helmets this year), a new offense (I), a lot of new faces, several returning lettermen, and most of all, a new spirit.

Fertig did not inherit an easy task when he took over as OSU's head football coach, replacing Dee Andros, now the Beavers' athletic director. OSU will play a very demanding 12-game schedule this year, including what amounts to the strongest and best home schedule the Beavers have had in many years.

In addition to the strong Pacific-8, OSU ventures out of conference play to collide with Kansas, Kentucky, LSU, Syracuse and Hawaii.

Any time you inherit a club that produced a 1-10 record the year before you have a lot of work to do. However, Fertig believes his staff accomplished a lot during spring practice and have made some big strides toward returning OSU as one of the nation's football powers once again.

OSU brought a lot of new faces in the form of junior college transfers, 20 to be exact, in order to beef up the Beavers for the 1976 season.

The JC players join 43 returning letter winners to form the nucleus of the 1976 Beaver roster.

At the conclusion of spring drills, Fertig felt his club accomplished a lot and made solid improvement. "We established just what we wanted in spring practice", Fertig explained. "Our primary goal was to find who the players were that were already here at OSU and second to find out about the junior college players. We established that goal and then we went on to teach our offense and defense and I was very pleased with the way we finished up against the Alumni (45-13 victory)".

Fertig indicated his starting lineups are still not set as a result of spring. "We have to wait on a couple of areas until we return in August (Beavers start drills August 16)", Fertig indicated. "We are not set at quarterback and running back, strong side tackle and quite a few places on defense. I would say the only people that have a position set are Dennis Boyd (defensive end) and Lee Overton (split end)".

One thing is obvious with the 1976 Beavers. OSU can not afford to have many injuries as depth is lacking in some areas.

While Fertig is not predicting Rose Bowl in his first year at Corvallis, the new OSU mentor feels very strongly that his Beaver squad will be a representative football team and definitely not a 1-10 club as a year ago.

## OFFENSE

**QUARTERBACK:** Off spring practice, red-shirt sophomore Jeff Kynaston has the inside track. Kynaston directed the varsity to a convincing 45-13 victory over the Alumni as he hit on 7 of 13 passes for 176 yards and one touchdown and carried the ball five times for 23 yards. Kynaston got better and better as the spring went on and he returns as No. 1 on August 16. However, before Fertig is ready to turn the job over to Kynaston, he wants to see last year's starting signal caller, Kyle Grossart, in action. Grossart missed all of spring drills with a broken ankle. Fertig very definitely looks at his quarterback position as an area of strength on the Beaver roster as OSU is blessed with several quarterbacks who have given an indication they can get the job done. John Norman and Dave White, two junior college transfers, also had their moments in the spring. Norman, 6-1, 193, is currently second. He ran the ball exceptionally well during the spring and also

passed better than anticipated. White is a strong thrower with less running ability than Kynaston or Norman. Jeff Hammermeister, 6-3, 200, has quarterbacked the JV squad the past two years, but he has a strong arm and played well during the spring and had a hot hand during the second half of the Alumni game. Hammermeister has certainly given an indication that he can play. Also, prep All-America quarterback Scott Richardson will be reporting on August 16. Fertig is very happy with his quarterback situation.

**RUNNING BACKS:** This is an area where a lot of questions still remain to be answered as not all of the Beaver running backs were available during the spring. Rich Dodge, last year's leading ground gainer at tailback, played baseball during the spring. Also, Jarvis Redwine, a very touted freshmen running back from Inglewood, CA, was not on the scene during the spring. Fertig wants to look at both of those backs before making a decision on the tailback spot. Junior Larry Dozier, 6-1, 190, was converted from fullback to tailback early in spring drills, and returns as No. 1. Johnny Taylor, a 5-9, 185-pound speedster, also played well during the spring. Dozier is a steady solid running and not as apt to break a long run as Taylor might. There appears to be plenty of depth available at tailback, the question is how much quality is available. The fullback situation appears to be in solid hands. Steve Bozan and Byron Kellar both enjoyed an outstanding spring and moved ahead of veteran Charles Smith and junior college transfer Mel Johnson. This position would appear to be in good hands, both in terms of quality and quantity.

**OFFENSIVE LINE:** This was the No. 1 problem area on the OSU squad last year. Injuries really crippled the Beavers a year ago in this area. Center Jim Walker missed last year with a neck injury and he is back to anchor the offensive line at center and Fertig says, "Jim Walker is one of the toughest football players I have ever been around". Walker is one of the keys to OSU's success. When Walker plays center, the Beavers move the football. He is a leader and a talented player. There is no question that the talent drops considerably when Walker is out of the lineup. Veterans Wally Remmers and Larry Winkler are back to hold down the guard spots and both appear to be vastly improved this spring. Junior letterman Craig Spiegelberg, much bigger and stronger after off season work on the weights, will be the starting strong tackle and JC transfer Vern Ward the other tackle. Letterman Mike Jackson at 6-5, 225, is the tight end. Fertig feels this unit is solid, but injuries would be very detrimental to OSU in this area. Ed Wood, another JC transfer, was playing extremely well in the spring and might have been a starting guard but had knee surgery as a result of being hurt in the spring game. His status for this fall is very doubtful at present, which means only Jim Rodway at this point, another JC transfer, has given an indication he can be a Pacific-8 guard. Dave Hurd and Gordy Neumann, two more JC transfers, will be the backup tackles and both have shown they can play. The obvious hope here is that the Beavers can remain free of injuries and some other players develop. Regardless, OSU is much improved in the offensive line over a year ago.

**WIDE RECEIVERS:** This should be another area of strength for OSU. The Beavers can count on five solid receivers, three with better than average ability, and four other letter winners in reserve and a talented freshman who will probably make the club. Veteran Lee Overton will be at split end and he is one of the best wide receivers on the West Coast. Veteran Matt Hammack, a gutty little receiver, backs him up. The surprise in this area will likely be Dwayne Hall, a swift 9.6 sprinter from Hartnell Junior College, who will make his first appearance on August 16. Hall had over 1,800 yards last year at

Hartnell on 47 pass receptions and on punt and kickoff returns. Duane James, another JC transfer, was impressive at flanker during the spring and former quarterback Karl Halberg made the switch to flanker and proved he is a threat at that position. Lettermen Jerome Shelton, Larry Clark, Chuck Gardner and Phil Dubose have been virtually beaten out by new people which gives an indication right there that the quality has improved. Prep whiz Steve Coury could also make his presence felt before it is over.

**KICKING:** Still a lot of unknowns in this area. OSU has recruited a prep field goal kicker named Kieron Walford who booted a 59-yard field goal last year as a prep and he has a tremendous reputation. Keith Nelson kicked a 41-yarder in the Alumni game with plenty of room to spare. The job is his at this point until someone takes it away. Letterman Kevin Callan also returns but he was far from impressive in the spring. The punting duties are still up in the air. Letterman Wendel Smith returns and Byron Zahler, a non-recruited player, are the two punters at this point, which leaves the punting chores a question mark. Just how good the OSU kicking game will be remains a big question at this point.

## DEFENSE

**LINE:** OSU can start three players on its defensive front three that will rank with any team in the Pacific-8 with three-year starter Dennis Boyd, 6-6, 245, at one end and 6-9, 250 Jerry Wilkinson at the other end and 6-3, 245 Greg Marshall at middle guard. But it is after those three the trouble begins. OSU's depth on the front line is definitely a problem. Joel Malone, a JC transfer from Mt. Hood, has shown he is a player and he is backing up Marshall. Behind Boyd and Wilkinson are lettermen Troy Gusick and Craig Oliver and non-lettermen Andy Dahl and Russ Harris, but the dropoff in talent is quite apparent. Both Boyd and Wilkinson have all-star ability. They have tremendous speed and strength. For the Beavers to be successful, both Boyd and Wilkinson must remain healthy.

**LINEBACKERS:** OSU plans to use four linebackers this year and off spring drills it would appear the Beavers have four solid starters in Clarence Smithey at outside strong linebacker, Cory Osenga at middle linebacker, Rob Nairne at weak linebacker and Kent Howe at outside weak. Once again depth is a problem in this area. Lettermen Bill Ford and Mark Warren are available, but the real depth is expected to come from a pair of newcomers, sophomore transfer Kent Peyton, 6-4, 230, and freshman Kevin Donaghue, 6-3, 247. Both of these players have great credentials, and could end up as starters. Brian Newcomer, Ron Allison and Steve Edwards are all sophomores and have not played varsity football, and are all reserves. If Peyton and Donaghue live up to expectations, the linebacking corps will get a big shot in the arm. Osenga and Nairne played extremely well during the spring.

**DEEP BACKS:** OSU's secondary played extremely well all spring and would appear to be a strong unit. It has needed experience with Jay Locey, Johnny Ray Jones and Oscar Williams returning as starters, plus lettermen Lenny Holmes, Ken Burke, Wayne King and Dave Horton also available. But, it would appear to JC transfers, Andy Bardosi and Kerry Justin, have earned starting berths which should make for a stronger unit. Jay Locey is an all-star candidate at free safety and intercepted five passes last year. Johnny Ray Jones had a good year last year. On the surface, it would appear the Beavers have depth in the secondary.

#### 17 DAVE ALAN WHITE, 6-1, 190, Jr., Costa Mesa, CA (Edison-Orange Coast JC)

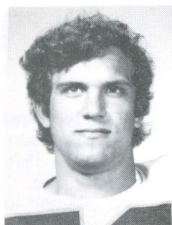

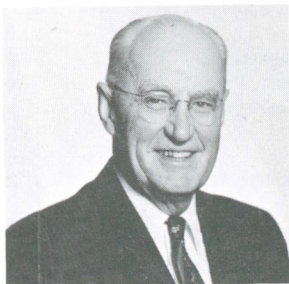
