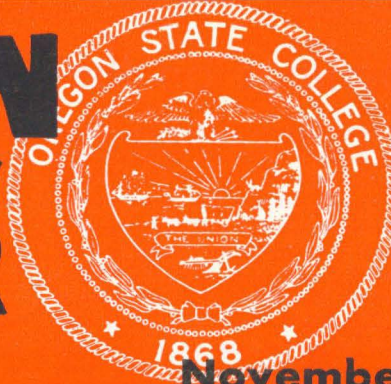

# Happenings on the Hill

THE two really big stories to come out of Oregon State as the fall term got underway would seem, on the surface, to be miles apart in significance. But more than a passing examination would indicate that perhaps they were in reality very closely related.

The two stories, of course, were the smashing of Oregon State's all-time enrollment record by a blonde coed from Cascade Locks and the first programming of educational television from OSC in cooperation with other state system of higher education schools.

The previous high in registration was reported in 1947-48 when 7489 students thronged the campus. This year the administration had enthusiastically predicted 7300 students. By the time registration had closed on October 12 there were 7664 attending school.

But October 4, 1957 was the date a pert miss named Nette A. Nelson, 19 year old freshman from Cascade Locks high school, stepped up to register and officially broke the all-time campus enrollment record.

Officials couldn't have picked a better subject to break the record than Miss Nelson if they had tried. Oregon State's 7490th student was pretty and had an outstanding high school record. She was valedictorian and student body president at her high school and is attending OSC on a \$500 scholarship sponsored by the Hood River county Elks.

The other outstanding story was the starting of educational television in the state of Oregon. At 9 a.m. Monday, October 7, the station went on the air with a history lecture telecast from the University of Oregon. At 11 a.m. a chemistry lecture by OSC's Dr. Wendell Slabaugh was beamed into 22 classrooms at OSC, the University of Oregon, Oregon College of Education, and Willamette university. The two stories do have a common bond. On one hand is a student breaking over into the "sound barrier" of increased enrollments. It is something like running the four minute mile or high-jumping seven feet. Once it has been done there is no going back. Only records of increased enrollment will be broken year after year from now on at

Oregon State as well as in other universities throughout the U.S.

On the other hand there is television offering educators and administrators a tool for mass education and also a means of coping with the great hordes of students who will be clamoring for an education.

So the two events on the Beaver campus seemed to mark the start of a new era. An era full of exciting growth and undreamed possibilities.

**Rare Disease:** An Oregon State coed, Joan Marie Hellmann, was hospitalized October 4 with encephalitis, a relatively rare disease in this country that involves inflammation of brain tissues. Her condition was first termed critical but later was described as greatly improved. Miss Hellmann, a sophomore in lower division of liberal arts, had attended OSC's summer school and had returned to her home on Okinawa during the vacation period before fall term. Her father is an engineer with the air force in Okinawa.

**Pledged:** A record 422 women students were pledged by OSC's 16 sororities this fall. Last year's total was 354. Sorority rushing was held before opening of classes this year for the first time in decades.

During the first rush of the fraternities 535 men were pledged. This is compared to the 501 total of last year. An additional 56 men were pledged to 24 of OSC's 30 fraternities.

**Operation:** President A. L. Strand underwent an operation for acute inguinal hernia in late September. Dr. Strand, in Portland to attend the Oregon State-Southern California game, complained of an abdominal pain prior to the gridiron game. The president missed the game, received a physical check-up the next day and underwent the operation at the medical school. Dr. Strand missed the events on campus during New Student Week but was able to return to the office after a week of recuperation.

**Record:** The 36,885 fans that attended the OSC-USC game in Portland September 21 made a new attendance record for the state of Oregon. It was standing room only as the Beavers clobbered the Men of Troy 20-0.

**New Names:** What looked like a mass of typographical errors turned out to be new club names for men's residence halls. Examples: Tyr Feoh Kaun, Yar Yar Logar, and Ilix Ilix, Ilix. The Inter-dorm council approved the use of the Runic alphabet, a unique Germanic form of letters. Assisted by the modern languages department, the Inter-dorm council undertook the new naming system in order to avoid alphabetical and numerical designations. Advantages of the new naming system seemed to be that it would offer a wide variety of letter combinations for future clubs in OSC dormitories. Also the absence of curves makes the names easier to duplicate. The names of the 14 Runic named clubs are Tyr Feoh Kaun, Othil Gar, Yar Yar Logar, Kaun Raad, Gar Wyn, Kaun Staun Ilix, Yar Ilix Yar, Hagall Staun, Wyn Thorn, Wyn Tyr, Quorth Staun, Kaun Ilix, Ilix Ilix Ilix, and Naud Ilix.

**Student Insurance:** Two student insurance policies are being offered this year. One is an accident policy for \$2.20 a term and the other is health and accident for \$5 a term. The \$15 yearly plan will pay up to \$500 on an accident, and an accidental death benefit of \$500. Sickness benefits of this policy include \$10 a day for hospital room and board up to 30 days; miscellaneous hospital expenses up to \$100; surgical treatment by a detailed schedule up to \$300; \$3 a call on physician's fees while in hospital on non-surgical cases up to \$100; consultant's fee up to \$25, ambulance fee up to \$20; nurse's fee up to \$10 a day. The accident policy provides medical reimbursement for the expenses arising from an accident. Reimbursement will be made up to \$500 for each accident.

**Tops:** A Bend high school graduate, Donald C. Fuhr, had the top score in the English placement examination taken by 2216 new freshmen students. Fuhr scored 202 of a possible 225 points on the test.

**Charges:** A thorough investigation of the validity of the charges that it is easier for out-of-state students to gain entrance to Oregon State than to the University of Oregon was requested October 8 by President A. L. Strand. The request was made in a letter to Chancellor John R. Richards of the state system of higher education. It followed printed reports of sports writers and columnists that higher scholastic requirements at the university handicap their athletic recruitment program. The study would involve both athletes and non-athletes.

*"This is a serious proposition as far as we're concerned, and I hereby request that your office make a thorough investigation of the validity of these charges,"* President Strand wrote, explaining that the charges were particularly directed at admittance of athletes.

*"Both institutions are under the same rules so far as out-of-state admission go and therefore, certainly it is of interest to your office about how the rules are being applied,"* the president continued.

*"In the investigation, I think whoever does it must examine the original records and certainly not be satisfied with general statements issued by anybody within the two institutions,"* President Strand added.

## Educational Television Starts at OSC

OREGON'S educational television station formally began operating on October 7 at 9 a.m. It ended long years of hopeful planning by educators and the state of Oregon.

The project is backed by state money and a Ford Foundation grant. Ford Foundation was primarily interested in the Oregon project as a test attempting to link several campuses for simultaneous reception of courses. The outstanding professors at the individual campuses of Oregon State, Oregon, and Oregon College of Education at Monmouth are now available for instruction.

The new station, KOAC-TV, made history with a history course telecast from the University of Oregon. Later a chemistry lecture by Dr. Wendell H. Slabaugh of OSC was beamed into 22 classrooms throughout the Willamette Valley. Besides the three

state institutions, Willamette university at Salem requested permission to look in on the lecture.

At first the education telecasts included history lectures three days a week, a chemistry lecture two days a week and an education class lecture twice a week.

Later KOAC-TV went on a more extensive four day a week morning coverage. In January the station plans evening educational programs Monday through Friday.

Oregon State's TV studio is located on the second floor of the coliseum. Main reason for location of the studio was the proximity to campus events which are held in the coliseum. Sometime this school year there will undoubtedly be a telecast of a convocation or similar event right from the Oregon State campus.



Dr. Strand said he thought it would be possible to examine records of all the athletes but when it came to students in general, there would have to be a sampling because of the great number involved.

*"I trust you will charge someone within the system or without, with the duty of making a thorough investigation of admission practices at Oregon State and the University of Oregon to find out if there are different interpretations of the rules and if the charges referred to are true,"* President Strand concluded.

He pointed out that the investigation would involve only out-of-state students since all Oregon high school graduates at present are admitted to all state schools. It was also pointed out that OSC was the first institution in the state system to put restrictions on all out-of-state students and that minimum current requirements for out-of-state freshmen are that they have a performance record or a college aptitude test score which would place them in the upper half of their class.

**Student Pulse:** The following is a compilation of student opinion as expressed in editorials, letters to editor, and Barometer columns.

OSC students are impressed with the football team. A Barometer editorial came out with *"keep up the good work Beavers! An entire season of the caliber of football in your first three clashes would make everyone in the nation realize what a grid power Oregon State really is. . . . best of luck to Coach Tommy and team!"*

Tailflappers, men's rally organization, was urged to bring out the best spirit for the football games and in general reorganize the section. The Barometer pointed out that the Tailflappers last year were disorganized and hoped that the potential of the spirit-building group would be realized.

Culprits from somewhere were busy during October painting green and yellow signs on most of the campus walks. Several student letter reflected student opinion. One said: *"In any event, it is a shame to see college students so starved for entertainment that they have no recourse but to cleverly approach a deserted campus and paint such witty statements as 'The University of Oregon Forever' (heaven help us) and many*

*other cliches that find great following in the south."*

*"Another letter stated: 'It is impossible to ignore the childish pranks that some Oregon students have left on our campus. . . . I'm afraid these over-zealous adolescents will feel like licking this paint off after we trounce them in football.'"*

Another letter to the editor of the Barometer protested the changing of green Rook lids to orange Rook lids. In part the letter read *"Since way back when, someone who was new on a job was considered a novice or green at that particular job. We think this also applies to the Rooks at OSC. They are new and green . . . we do not believe that just because the green color of the lids coincides with one of the school colors of our rival to the south, that it should be done away with."* The letter referred to a movement on campus of changing Rook lids to school colors of Orange and Black. The Coop book store had stocked the new lids for the freshmen and it was creating a stir among the students.

**Campus Events:** The Rivalry presented by the Corvallis and OSC Civic Music association. Starring in the production were Raymond Massey, Agnes Moorehead, and Martin Gabel.

The U.S. Navy band appeared at OSC October 15. Oregon Stater Gordon Finlay, '35, is one of the top cornet players in the band.

**The Faculty:** Dr. B. H. Arnold, associate professor of mathematics, has been awarded a Fulbright grant to lecture at the Higher Teachers College in Baghdad, Iraq.

Twenty new staff members have been

added to the liberal arts faculty at Oregon State. Ernest W. Warrington has returned to the staff from retirement on a part-time basis. He is professor of philosophy and religion and headed that department for many years.

Three new staff appointments in the School of Forestry were made this year. Charles W. Dane has the new position of assistant to the dean and Alex Jaenicke and John F. Bell have been named special lecturers. Dane is a 1952 OSC graduate in forest engineering and he will give special attention to work with alumni, forestry employers and graduate placement. John Bell is a graduate of OSC class of 1949.

Dr. C. V. Plath, associate professor of agricultural economics is now in Thailand at Kasetsart university on a two year assignment. He will serve as a farm management specialist under a program financed through the college by the Council on Economic and Cultural Affairs, New York. Other OSC staff members now in Thailand include Godfrey Hoerner, plant pathologist and chief of party; Agnes Kilshorn, extension nutrition specialist; Ray A. Yoder, forestry; H. Darwin Reese, chemistry; and E. E. Easton, business administration. D. D. Bolinger, physics, recently returned to the U.S. after completing his assignment.

Three new staff members have joined the School of Pharmacy this year. They are Dr. Benjamin F. Cooper, associate professor of pharmacy, and Dr. David M. Stuart and Glenn R. Svoboda, assistant professors of pharmaceutical chemistry. Dr. Cooper's duties will be in the fields of prescription compounding and industrial manufacturing.

**Out of the moth balls and back onto the campus scene are these racoon coats, the craze of another era. Here OSC's dancing rally girls model their coats and prepare for another year of intricate and colorful dance routines.**

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# INSIDE OSC

ONE OF THE UNFORTUNATE by-products of Oregon's lack of industry and business is the waste of publicly-educated graduates of the state's universities and colleges.

Several thousand graduates of the state system of higher education each year are on the look-out for new jobs. The tragic thing about this is that a great percentage of these graduates must take their brains and talents to other states before finding suitable positions of employment.

Just think of the many Oregon Staters who have been educated and trained on the Beaver campus and who are now solid citizens of our neighboring states of California and Washington. The number runs into the many thousands and is particularly heavy in the industrialized section of Southern California.

Oregon recently created the Oregon Development and Planning Commission. This Commission is charged with developing a sound program for industrial development.

In recent years Oregon has been accused of being backward and disinterested in industry. Attention has been focused on the fluctuating agrarian and lumbering economy of the state. It is hoped that the Oregon Development and Planning Commission will help stabilize the state's economy with industry and business. Whether it is high taxes, lack of adequate power, or something else which has discouraged industrial growth is certainly the concern of this new commission.

Oregon State and the community of Corvallis has a vital interest in this problem. It has been pointed out that the college is a natural adjunct to research-minded firms. The facilities of Oregon State could be made available to industry and business in Oregon and cooperation among students, faculty, and business and industry could have a desirable effect on everyone concerned.

The alumni association of Oregon State also has a vital interest in this problem, if for no other reason than halting the steady flow of this university's finest men and women to other states. Our alumni, educated in Oregon by Oregon money, should become valuable citizens of this wonderful state.

Our contact with OSC alumni in California, Washington, and other states reveals that a great many of these former students and former citizens of the Beaver state would gladly return if only adequate jobs were available.

Good luck to the Oregon Development and Planning Commission. We hope to see more Oregonians living in Oregon.

PRESIDENT STRAND has asked the chancellor of the state system of higher education for an investigation of charges that Oregon State's entrance requirements for out-of-state students are lower than the University of Oregon's entrance requirements.

The Ducks and their supporters seem to be getting worried that Oregon State came up with better freshman football material and thus the reason was advanced that OSC can get the good football players primarily because it has lower out-of-state entrance requirements.

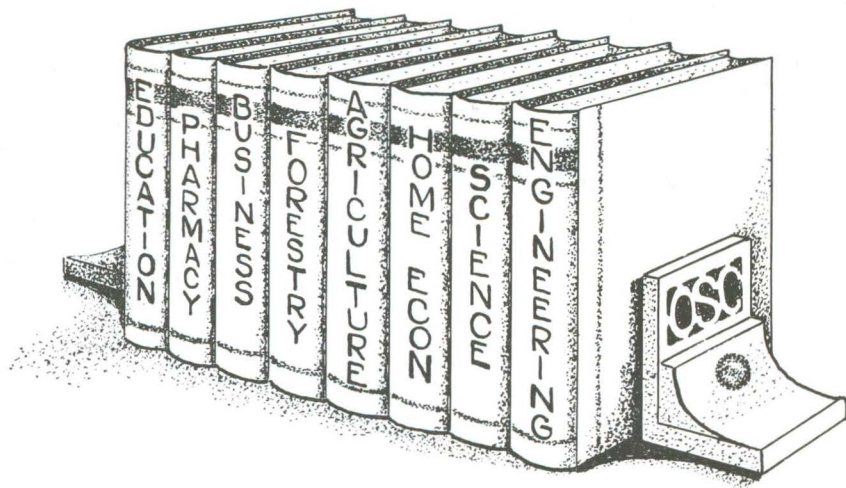
A study will be made of out-of-state student grades by an impartial committee set up by the chancellor. We'll wait until this report comes out before we say too much. We do believe though, that any difference must come through institutional interpretation. Alumni of Oregon State need not be worried about any "lowering" of standards for athletes.

AS THIS WAS WRITTEN the student body was undergoing inner turmoil and a large dose of soul searching. Reason was the apparent lack of student spirit. Oregon State has always prided itself on great student spirit but with a winning football team playing most of the early season games away from home there has been a noticeable lack of the rah-rah element.

Then came the 26-7 whipping of a good Beaver team by a fired-up UCLA team. The OSC football players seemed to reflect the lackadaisical student spirit and the coaches and student leaders were wondering just what the remedy could be.

You can be sure that a concentrated effort will be made by Oregon State's students to get some pep for the rest of the season. Everyone on the Beaver campus is hoping the high-flying Oregon Ducks will be needing that final "Civil War" victory on November 23 for a chance at the Rose Bowl.





## The School of Forestry Has an Outstanding Program. What the Foresters Are Doing and Where They Are Going Is Explained Here by

**T**HIS YEAR is a year of statistics. The national debt may top its limit, the cost of living inches higher, and in tune with the times, college enrollment is booming. The School of Forestry this year has 370 students—more than 10 percent above last year. However, Oregon State and the School of Forestry are not known for their statistics, but for their services and their graduates.

The School of Forestry as an integral part of Oregon State College has three purposes. One is to support the college and the State System of Higher Education. What's good for the system and the college is good for the School of Forestry. The second purpose is to educate all students to the value of our land. History has shown that the treatment of land measures the success of a civilization.

In 1868, Oregon State College was entrusted with the task of serving the state by developing the agricultural and mechanical arts. The School of Forestry supports that task. Finally, it is specifically responsible for developing capable and conscientious resource managers. What foresters do today will determine what Oregon does one hundred years hence. Recent industrial developments portend great future growth in our forest industries. Each year the forest provides forage for large numbers of livestock and game animals; each year there is greater use of the forest for recreation; each year there is greater demand upon forested watersheds. To keep forest lands in production, serving these diverse uses and Oregon's best interests, requires the management of all forest resources.

The aim of the School of Forestry is the development of individuals, citizens and technicians—in that order. We are as concerned with personal development as technical development. Completion of 204 credit hours does not make a youngster a man nor does

it make him a forester. Education develops from within and only by creating a professional climate can the School attain its aim.

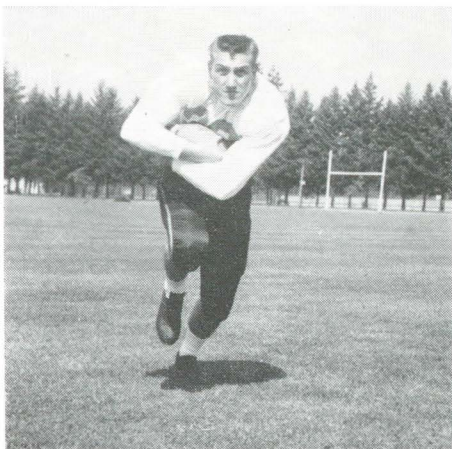
Since 1906 the School of Forestry has been graduating responsible men to develop our forest resources. During that time the organization of the school has changed, but its purpose has not. Today we have three departments: forest engineering, forest management and forest products. The forest products department aims graduates toward forest utilization work in manufacturing, sales, research and development. The forest management department develops forest resource managers and the forest engineering department prepares men to deal with woods problems peculiar to the Pacific Northwest.

The school program in all three departments is concentrated on integrating academic and personal development. Besides serving as an instructor in academic matters, each staff man is advisor to 20-30 students, achieving a unique student-faculty camaraderie. A personnel director and a curriculum committee match personal and academic growth of the forestry student-body. Student rating by both summer employers and staff spotlight weaknesses in technical and personal development which are used as guides by the advisor. Graduate work reports are obtained for each alumnus yearly for five years, enabling the staff to spot weaknesses in the program.

Staff development is a basic part of the program. An in-service program for improving teaching includes seminars and the appearance of recognized teaching authorities as guest speakers. Staff men are encouraged to seek summer work in their specialties to keep the school abreast of the latest forestry developments. Last summer our instructors worked in industrial research laboratories as consultants in personnel and technical fields

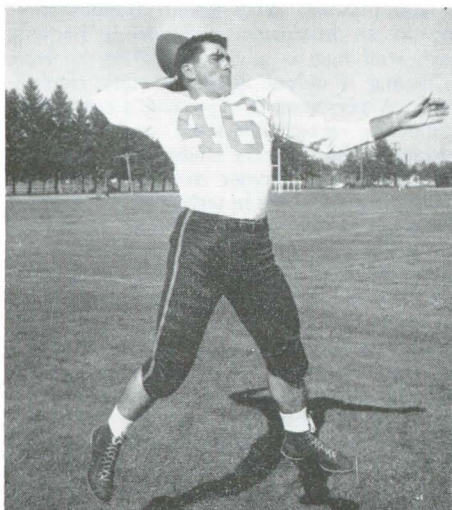


**Jim Stinnette, 6-1, 198 fullback from Corvallis. Was All-American high school selection. Fast, powerful but hindered by early season injury.**

ONE MINUTE Oregon State was riding along on an unbeaten string of four wins and no losses and the next minute the roof caved in and two teams who weren't supposed to be in the same class had trampled over the Orange and Black. Scores: UCLA 26, OSC 7, and Washington 19, OSC 6.

That was a real comedown for a team ranked as high as fifth in the nation during the early part of the season. The reason behind the sudden collapse was obvious. The reserve strength had faltered. The first string, hobbled by injuries, couldn't keep up the winning pace and the reserves, thrown into the breach, failed to stem the onrushing tide of teams primed to knock off the Pacific Coast Conference champions.

In the last issue of *The Oregon Stater* it was pointed out that the question mark of the Oregon State football team this season was the reserve strength, composed mostly of sophomores. The situation hasn't changed, although Beaver Head Coach Tommy Prothro was able to gain valuable experience for his second and third strings against Southern California and Kansas, where the reserves played over half of each ball game. Prothro still doesn't feel his younger players have gained enough experience to be completely dependable when the pressure of the conference games begins to mount.

To the layman, however, there has not been too much cause for concern. The Beavers looked like true champions in whitewashing Southern California, 20 to 0, in the opening game of the season in Portland before 36,885 happy fans—the largest football crowd ever assembled in the state of Oregon.

## First Big 10 Win

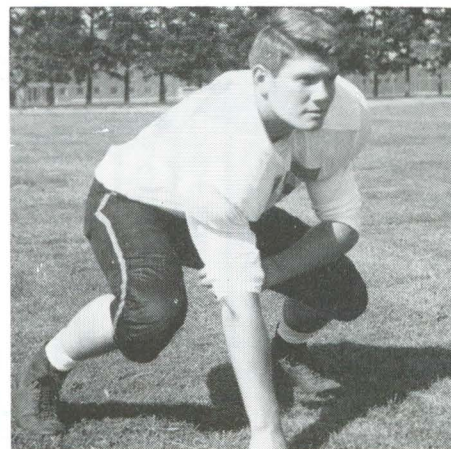
The following week at Lawrence, Kansas, the Orangemen continued on their winning way, with a 34-6 victory over Kansas. Then came a real tough one against Northwestern at Evanston, but the Beavers prevailed, 22 to 13, for OSC's first decision over a Big Ten school since 1949, when the Beavers upset the Michigan State Spartans, 25-20, in Portland, and the first ever over a Big Ten team while in the conference. MSU was not a member, you will recall, when the Beavers knocked them off.

Idaho put up a stubborn defense against the home team at Corvallis, but three second-half touchdowns proved enough as Oregon State won again, 20 to 0.

This should be enough to delight the fans of Beaverdom, but an analysis of the four games will show that the first team has scored all 96 points, the second and third teams none. Fullback Nub Beamer, tailback Joe Francis and wingback Earnel Durden have each scored four touchdowns, left end Dwayne Fournier one, and wingback Sterling Hammack one. Hammack is a second-stringer, but was playing with the first unit in place of Durden when he scored from 11 yards out against Kansas. Blocking Back Ted Searle, captain of the Beavers, has kicked nine extra points and a field goal against Northwestern.

The OSC-UCLA game was considered a real test of Oregon State's abilities. The Beavers will have played a team rated by assistant coach John Thomas as "better than last year." Also UCLA had not lost to a visiting conference team in the Los Angeles Coliseum since 1949, or to any visiting team since 1951.

For individuals, as well as for the team, there has been much to cheer about this season. Joe Francis has begun to make his move toward an all-American selection. Big Joe, a senior from Hawaii, picked up 172 yards running and passing against Northwestern and repeated the following week against Idaho with another 172 yard output. In fact, after four games this season, he was only 167 yards behind the three-year career record for total offense set by Don Samuel from 1946 through 1948. Samuel, who has since switched from a left-handed passer to a southpaw insurance salesman, racked up 2222 yards rushing and passing in his three years with the OSC varsity. Francis has totaled 2055 thus far, with his total almost equally divided between his running and his throwing. He's galloped 1026 yards and tossed for

1029 more. This is an outstanding record for a player who had a tough time making the Rook squad as a freshman.

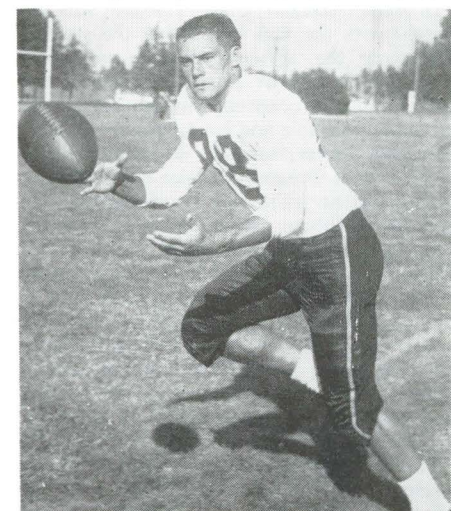
## Roseburg Rambler

Beamer, called, among other things, the greatest thing to come out of Roseburg since plywood, has been a powerhouse at fullback. Rated by the coaches as the second fastest man on the team, Beamer out-ran the USC team for one touchdown, and has been generally devastating up the middle. Durden and Searle have been showing well at their back-field posts, along with reserves Hammack, John Horrillo (now shifted to wingback from fullback) and Jim Stinnette.

In the line junior Ted Bates and senior Dave Jesmer have been twin towers of strength at tackle in the first three games. Jesmer missed the Idaho game with a rib injury, and Bates got racked up against Idaho. But both were expected to be ready to go to the post against the Bruins. Center Buzz Randall and ends Bob DeGrant and Dwayne Fournier have been playing steady ball.

## The Rooks

Freshman-wise the football coaches greeted an outstanding crop of first-year players, including 26 Prothro labeled as good prospects for varsity competition. Of the 26 he con-

siders nine in the outstanding to excellent group. The biggest in-state plum was Roger Johnson, the great high school back from Coos Bay. Others of note included Neil Plumley and Dick McLoughlin from Medford, Alan Trotter of Tillamook, Mike Kline of Beaverton, and Jay Bashor from Portland. Mike Dolby of Hoquiam, Wash., entered as a freshman, and is considered by First Assistant Coach Clay Stapleton as the "best prospect in the state of Washington."

From California several top boys enrolled at OSC this fall. Over half of them were all-league in their respective localities, and all should help keep the Beavers at the top of the heap for a few years to come. Here is a list of the top prospects from the south:

Tony Ankerson, Santa Ana; Pete Geanakos, South Gate; Frank Greminger, Gardena; John Hadraba, North Hollywood; Dick Hill, Pomona; Jack Knight, Santa Cruz; Mike Crason and Chuck Marshall, San Francisco; John Masterson, Long Beach; Ron Miller, Los Angeles; Charles Nickerson, Ukiah; Tal Niko, San Francisco; Dennis Osti, Santa Monica; Aaron Thomas, Weed; Bob Williams, Los Angeles; and Earl Woodward, Riverside. There are probably others, but it is still too early to tell how well each candidate will do. The Rooks, by conference rule, are limited to six weeks practice and three games, which, this year, will be against Washington State and two with Oregon.

John Thomas is in charge of the Rook footballers, and is getting assistance from some of last year's seniors—Tom Berry, Ernie Zwahlen and Norm Thiel.

#### Basketball Starting

On October 15 basketball opened practice and the first workouts indicate Oregon State may field a pretty good club this winter. Back at the helm for his 30th season is Slat Gill, who will pin his hopes on a possible first team of Dave Gambee, Ken Nanson, Gary Goble, Lee Harman and Jim Anderson, all lettermen. However, any of the starting berths is far from secure with three other lettermen reporting out. Gambee, 6-7 and never looking better, is the defending conference scoring champion and should rewrite most of the OSC scoring records before he completes this, his last season. Nanson, always a tough and determined player, has another year's experience, as does Goble, who at 6-8 and 220 pounds has the size and strength to become a good big man if he gains some scoring punch.

Harman has both speed and quickness and has developed a pretty accurate set shot to give some needed outside strength. Anderson is another "little man," who is quick and speedy. Behind this five comes Wayne Moss, the biggest man at 6-9, Ted Miller, a junior guard, and Gary Haynes, the red-headed speed merchant who is now in his senior year.

Last year's Rook squad yielded slim pickings for the varsity, with the top prospect, Joe Mann, running into grade obstacles. Four or five others from the Rooks are out for the team, but cannot be counted on to give much aid this season. Three junior college transfers are on hand—Arnold Schroeder with one year at Long Beach, J. C. and three years with the Parks air force base team; Roy Critser from Olympic junior college in

Washington; and Bill Patchen, a 6-8 pivotman from Pasadena J.C.

Slat lost Bob Allord, Jerry Crimins and Ralph Carroll through graduation, and sophomore Don Pino from Los Angeles did not return to school this fall.

This leaves Gill with a nucleus of eight veterans and the remainder of the squad as yet untested in Pacific Coast Conference competition. And the competition will be rough this year. Under the new round-robin rules each team in the PCC plays every other team on a home-and-home basis. Thus the Beavers will play eight games away from home and will entertain the other eight members once in the coliseum.

As far as freshmen are concerned Slat and assistant Paul Valenti appeared to come out of the recruiting wars in fair shape. Of the five top-rated prep players in the state, Oregon State landed two, with Oregon getting two and Portland U. one. The Beavers added Ernie Johnson, a 6-7 forward from Valsetz. Slat also attracted Karl Anderson, a 6-9 all-city center from Oakland, Cal., and Steve Flynn, a top-flight guard from Nevada.

The other sports on the OSC calendar also received their share of top athletes to participate in perhaps the finest freshman class, athletically, ever to enroll at Oregon State.

The Oregon State athletic star seems to be on the rise and there appears to be no reason why last year's achievement of two conference championships and one division title should not be repeated, if not enhanced in the 1957-58 seasons.

# High Enrollment Brings Special Problems

DEAR OREGON STATER:

**D**ID YOU EVER STOP and consider the importance of numbers in our civilization? We have numbers for everything. The quotations on the stock exchange, the number of new cars produced each week, the percentage of capacity at which the steel industry works, the population of the country at any given moment, and the number of our children enrolled in school. We take great pride in reaching either the peaks or the depths. "Nothing could be as bad as '29", "Our national debt is the greatest", or "the market is at an all-time high". We take some things for granted, we predict some things with accuracy, or, we go "out on a limb" and fall flat on some other prediction.

We like to be "first" in everything and suffer untold agonies and recriminations when we are not. The Soviets have thrown us into a tizzy because they slipped Sputnik into outer space when we were getting ready to try it ourselves. The fact that this is the International Geophysical Year and that such events might be not only possible but probable does not relieve our distaste at being beaten. With characteristic American remedy we will get busy and attempt to make up for lost time.

President Strand has often remarked that one of the factors which makes Oregon State a great institution is our eternal fight to stay alive and to maintain ourselves and our standards. The college authorities have been constantly declaring that we are on the upturn of a growing enrollment which is going to be a severe challenge to us. This challenge has not received the complete attention of all of those who should be concerned with it, probably because we have not had a dramatic achievement to announce, something on the order of Sputnik.

Since we are prone to deal in numbers and prognostication, in fact are forced to do so in making plans for the immediate future, we here at the college have estimated that the enrollment this year for fall term would be 7300. However, once all of the students who can enroll for this term have enrolled, we find that we now have 7664 student, 5618 men and 2046 women.

Many factors enter into the process of prognostication. For any given factor there are usually two sides from which to make a choice. One of these, of course, is the economic factor. When times are good, do more students return to college or do they lay out a year and work for expense money? When times are not so good, do they stay out of school to maintain themselves or do they come back to college where it is about as cheap to maintain themselves as at home? Previous experience, of course, enters into these calculations and as for all such estimates they are subject to some error. This is apparently the case this year. But, all things considered, the margin of error is remarkably small.

As small as it is, though, the error points up very convincingly that we are in the upward swing of enrollment and that we must not only accustom ourselves to this onrush of students but we must get ready for them. I recently talked with an Oregon Stater who has two children in high school, one a junior, one a freshman.

The freshman is a member of a group known as the "bumper crop" of children born in 1943. In the community in which they live the school system has been just about able to keep abreast of their progress through the grades and into high school. However, at each change of school, the carpenters and plumbers and electricians have been working in the school buildings at the time of the opening of classes in the fall. It is somewhat like the person who is always late but never absent. The schools were "just about ready" for the students. This Oregon Stater parent, contending with this situation, was a little irked about it when I was admonished to "tell President Strand that this bumper crop of '43 will hit the college in four years and he better get ready for them." Poor Dr. Strand, he catches it coming and going. If it is not being the target for the Southern California sports writers fraternity, it is being the target for irate parents who believe we do not foresee the numbers of students who will come to us.

I believe that the administration of the college and the state system is very well aware of the immediate future of our institutions as reflected in increased enrollments. Whether we shall be ready for them is a matter which is largely out of the control of the state system. It is true that the chancellor can recommend and advise and suggest,

but the funds to provide the kind of institution which you and I would like to have for our children must come from state funds. The situation is somewhat akin to that of the person whose home is on fire. At that moment he wants the best fire department in existence. Once the fire is out, it is different story. The fact that the fire chief repeatedly asks the city council for funds to improve the department does not put out fires unless he gets the funds and uses them wisely.

How good a "fire department" Oregon State has when the bumper crop of '43 arrives remains to be seen.

At this point in the calendar year, the Foundation has received from loyal friends and alumni almost exactly twice the money for the Oregon State Fund than was contributed for the same purpose last year. The Oregon State Fund is primarily a fund to be used for the payment of tuition scholarships for Oregon State students, either upper classmen or entering freshmen. I will give you a full report on this at the end of the year of 1957. In the meantime, if there are those among you who have laid aside your envelope for further consideration at some time during the last part of the year, please dig them out, consider them, and if possible send along your contribution to help us with this worthy activity. You will have the satisfaction of knowing that you are assisting some worthy student obtain an education, an education which, in this day of Sputniks, is so essential to each of us and to our national survival. May I hear from you?

# Alumni 'Round the World

## DEATHS



**D**R. FRED VINCENT, class of 1878, died October 18 in St. Anthony's hospital in Pendleton. He was 98 years old and for many years was Oregon State's oldest living alumnus. Dr. Vincent was also the oldest living alumnus of the University of Michigan where he had received his doctor of medicine degree. He was born in Rosedale, Wisc. and came to Corvallis at the age of 14 with his parents. His father, Henry Vincent, was once mayor of Corvallis and his mother, Judith, ran the Corvallis hotel at one time. Dr. Vincent settled in Pendleton to practice medicine in 1882 and he had an outstanding 60 year career as a country doctor and as a Union Pacific surgeon.

Dr. Vincent had a fine record of public service in Pendleton. He was founder of St. Anthony's hospital in 1902, founder of the first electric system and water system of Pendleton, was instrumental in building of that city's levee, and served as mayor and other civic capacities.

He was the oldest living past exalted ruler of the Elks lodge. Surviving Dr. Vincent are two sons, Fred W. Vincent Jr. of Portland and Jack Vincent, Edmonds, Wash., and

daughter, Mrs. T. V. Arnreiter, Seattle. Also surviving are four grandchildren and 15 great grandchildren.

Present oldest living Oregon State graduate now on the alumni records is Minnie McFarland Arthur of Los Angeles. She was born in 1860 and is a member of the class of 1886.

Reported deceased as of September 19 was **Zina Alexander Wise, '21**, of Portland. No other information was available.

**Mrs. Laura Heath McLaughlin, '15**, died of a heart attack in Portland on September 20. She was graduated from the School of Home Economics and was a long-time resident of Corvallis before moving to Salem and Portland.

The alumni office was informed of the death of **Nettie Gellatly Trumbull, '98**, on July 5, 1957.

**Edgar Raymond Shepard, '01**, died recently in Washington, D.C. He was born at Salt Lake City March 3, 1880. He was the first of seven brothers and sisters to attend Oregon State. He later was graduated from the University of California and Harvard university. Besides his wife he leaves one son and daughter, a sister, and two brothers.

In the library she hurriedly wrote them on the paper she had expected to use for the theme for Professor Berchtold, folded it carefully, dropped it unsigned into the Barometer box, then joined the excited throng outside.

Re-echo now exultantly,  
We are the Champions!

Appreciation came quickly. Her poem was published in a folder for distribution to OAC's jubilant student body.

to federal agencies, and as technicians and research leaders in the woods.

Besides developing responsible resource managers the School of Forestry works in close liaison with several research agencies to provide new knowledge on management techniques. The Forest Research Division of the OSC Agricultural Experiment Station is working on numerous fundamental forestry research problems. The program for the Division is developed jointly by the Dean of Agriculture and the Dean of Forestry. Staff members in forestry and allied sciences carry on projects supported by donations and by timber sales from the McDonald and Adair Forest. These are forest properties managed by the School of Forestry.

One of the strong points of our program is the great interest which the alumni take in the School. Just last spring six task force committees of alumni peered into every nook and cranny of the School's operations to suggest possible improvements and to insure continuing progress. These task forces were the result of five state-wide meetings between alums and department heads earlier in the year. Alumni interest is evident by the attendance at the annual school reunion, aptly termed Fernhopper Day. Last February over 500 came from as far as southern California, Alaska and Idaho for the event.

The forestry staff feels that with this support behind a positive program, the school will attain its purposes.
