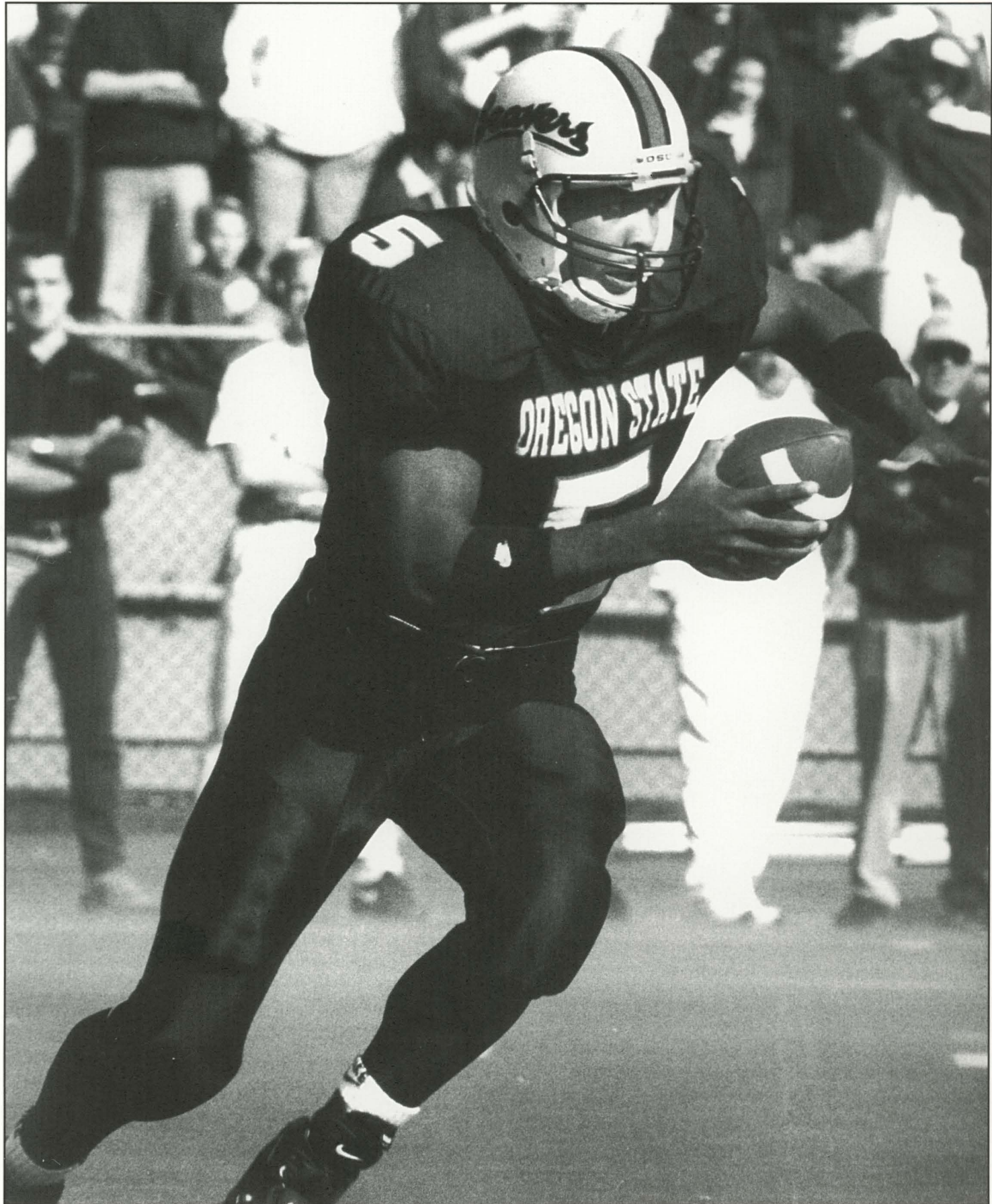

"I think Reggie is one of the premier defensive backs in the Pac-10 and deserves national recognition."--Coach Jerry Pettibone.

Reggie Tongue has already had an outstanding career at Oregon State as a free safety...heading into his senior season, Reggie is one of the premier defensive backs in the nation...he was named honorable mention All-American by The Football News and second team All-Pacific-10 following the 1994 season...he enters the 1995 season having started 28 straight games and having participated in 2,278 plays in three years...he has accounted for 685 defensive points, which ranks 15th already on OSU's career defensive point list...he posted 291 defensive points as a junior, the third best mark on the Beaver squad...he ranked sixth in the Pac-10 in tackles in 1994 with 54 solo tackles and 46 assisted tackles for 100 total...he participated in 805 plays as a junior, the third highest on the team...the 1994 season was a banner year for Reggie...he added his name to the Pac-10 and NCAA record books...Reggie intercepted 5 passes during the 1994 season and returned 3 for touchdowns...he returned 2 passes for touchdowns in OSU's victory over Wyoming and 1 against Washington State when the Beavers upset the nationally ranked Cougars 21-3...the 3 interceptions returned for touchdowns tied the Pac-10 and NCAA season record...Reggie has also tied the Pac-10 career record for pass interceptions returned for touchdowns with 4...the NCAA record is 5...Reggie also returned an interception for a TD at Wyoming in 1993...all told, Reggie has accounted for 5 touchdowns as a defensive back...he also ran a fumble back 75 yards against Washington State in 1993...in the Wyoming game this past season (1994), Reggie intercepted 3 passes and set an OSU record with 103 yards in interception returns...he intercepted 5 passes in 1994 and returned them for 150 yards...for his efforts in the Wyoming game, Reggie was named the Pacific-10 Conference Defensive Player of the Week, Sports Illustrated Defensive Player of the Week, The Sporting News Defensive Player of the Week and Athlon Magazine Defensive Player of the Week...Reggie finished the 1994 season in second place among Pac-10 players in interceptions and ranked 22nd in the nation...Reggie enters his senior year with 9 career interceptions, which ranks 10th on OSU's career list...he also has 130 career solo tackles, 108 assisted tackles, 4 tackles for loss, 14 passes broken up and 3 fumble recoveries...he is an outstanding leader and will likely be voted as one of OSU's team captains this year...Reggie is a very strong tackler and plays with great intelligence...as he has gotten stronger, he has increased his 40 time...he ran 4.6 as a sophomore and he ran the 40 in 4.5 last spring...as a junior last spring, Reggie posted weightlifting bests of 300 in the bench press and 375 in the back squat, plus he tested for only 4.5 percent body fat...Reggie was an iron man for the Beavers as a sophomore in 1993...he started the first four games at left corner and then switched to his present free safety position for the final seven games...he participated in 820 plays, second only to Michael Hale's 860 plays...he was second on the team in defensive points with 259...in OSU's opening game in 1993 against Wyoming, Reggie ignited the Beavers by returning an interception 29 yards for a TD to give OSU a 20-10 lead in the fourth quarter and iced the game...as a freshman in 1992, Reggie played in all 11 games and started the final six at left corner and he has not been out of the starting lineup since...he participated in 653 plays and was 12th on the defensive point list with 135.

"Kane Rogers is a young man who is the heart and soul of our defense. He is an athlete that plays hard, and with a great deal of intensity and emotion. Kane definitely has the aggressive defensive mentality that is so important for a linebacker on our level,"--Coach Jerry Pettibone.

Kane Rogers enters his senior year ranked ninth on OSU's career defensive point list with 743, and needing only 255 to become the Beavers' all-time leader...he has started 19 straight games and 24 of 33 games in three years...he has participated in 1,528 plays in three years...Kane has been named honorable mention All-Pacific-10 the past two years...for an ex-quarterback, Kane Rogers is one tough linebacker...Kane was recruited to Oregon State as an option quarterback after he ran the option at Washington High School in Tacoma, Washington, his senior year and earned first-team all-state honors as he led the state in rushing with 1,718 yards...however, Kane will tell you it wasn't much of an option as he nearly always elected to keep the football because he just liked to run over people...in addition, Kane also played defensive back where he was an all-county pick...while playing quarterback on the scout team as a freshman redshirt, it became very obvious Kane had the ingredients defensive coaches look for--physical and mental toughness, great football instincts and desire...Kane was switched to defense during winter conditioning of his freshman year and he has played outstanding football ever since...Kane started five games as a redshirt freshman at middle linebacker and finished with 189 defensive points, seventh highest on the team...he led OSU in defensive points as a freshman against California when he posted 34 points on 10 solo tackles and 4 assisted tackles...Kane was impressive in the off-season leading up to spring drills before his sophomore year by posting weightlifting bests of 321 pounds in the power clean, 330 in the bench press and 530 in the back squat...Kane possess all of the qualities you look for in a linebacker, he is hard-nosed, has speed (4.6), strength, quickness, outstanding leadership, great instincts and a nose for the football...Kane was ready for a banner sophomore season only to suffer a low back injury in fall camp which limited his participation...most people would have been out of action all together, but Kane fought through the back problems and played a limited role in OSU's first three games of the season in 1993 before starting the final eight games of the season...Kane participated in 419 plays in 1993, about 200 less than the other starting Beaver linebackers, and he was third on the team in overall defensive points with 249...he had 44 solo tackles, 30 assisted tackles, 3 quarterback sacks, 8 tackles for loss, 1 recovered fumble, 1 pass break up, 1 pass interception and 3 quarterback hurry plays...Kane led OSU in defensive points in three games last year--Arizona (32), Arizona State (40) and Washington with 30...Kane was a first-team Pac-10 All-Academic team pick and honorable mention All-Pacific-10 as a sophomore...Kane enjoyed an outstanding season in 1994...Kane wound up with 305 defensive points, second highest on the club, while playing 690 plays...he had 51 solo tackles, 38 assisted tackles, 7 quarterback sacks, 10 tackles for loss, 2 fumble recoveries, 2 passes broken up and 1 quarterback hurry in 1994...he was OSU's high point defensive performer in four games, Arizona, UCLA, Stanford and Pacific...Kane was once again named honorable mention All-Pacific-10, plus he was named to the Pac-10 All-Academic squad...Kane will enter his senior year with 743 defensive points, which ranks ninth on the Beavers' career list and with a very good chance of catching No. 1 ranked Jeff Schneider's 997.5 points as he needs only 255 to surpass Schneider...Kane Rogers is the "heart and soul" of the Beaver defense, according to Coach Pettibone...having been a former quarterback has also been a help for Kane playing defense as he has a better understanding of the offense than most defensive players and thus a better feel for anticipating what is coming...in addition to his outstanding athletic ability, ...Kane's three-year defensive totals follow:

Named Pacific-10 Conference Defensive Player of the Week vs. Washington State

"Tom has all of the ingredients to be the dominating defensive lineman for us in the Pacific-10 Conference,"--Coach Jerry Pettibone.

Tom Holmes enjoyed an outstanding junior season in 1994...as a nose tackle, Tom finished fourth overall on the Beavers defensive point list...he recorded 234 points, on 38 solo tackles, 26 assisted tackles, 3 sacks, 9 tackles for loss, 8 quarterback huries and 1 big fumble recovery...Tom realized a defensive lineman's dream in OSU's 21-3 upset victory over the Washington State Cougars...in the opening series of the second half, the Beavers' Rico Petrini hit Cougar quarterback Chad Davis as he was passing to casue a fumble, Holmes picked up the football and raced 26 yards for a touchdown to put OSU up 7-3...Tom is ideally suited for his nose tackle position...he is extremely quick and also runs the 40 in 4.8, and he is the strongest player on the Beaver roster...as a junior, Tom posted bests of 480 pounds in the bench press, 655 in the back squat and 319 pounds in the 319 pounds in the power clean...Tom has the strength to overpower offensive linemen, plus the quickness to get around them...Tom has started 22 straight games for OSU and 25 all told...he participated in 738 plays as a junior and a total of 1,660 in his Beaver career...he has registered a total of 520 career defensive points...he enters his senior year with 20 quarterback hurry plays, just six away from the OSU career record, and 16 1/2 tackles for loss...it is very difficult to get leverage on Tom and he should be one of the premier defensive linemen in the Pac-10 Conference in 1994.

"Don has overcome a lot of adversity in his career to get to the point where he has gained valuable experience as our starting quarterback last year. I am confident it will pay off for him in the future,"--Coach Jerry Pettibone.

After a long wait, Oregon State fans finally got a chance to see Don Shanklin quarterback an entire season of football in 1994 and the Amarillo, Texas, native did not disappoint...Don started 10 games for the Beavers in 1994...he missed the Wyoming game as a result of a strained shoulder against Arizona State in the season opener...in 10 games, Don rushed for 630 yards on 132 carries, for an average of 4.8 per carry, and he scored 6 touchdowns rushing...he completed 29 of 73 passes for 560 yards and 1 touchdowns and had 2 passes intercepted...in the '94 season opener against ASU, Don rushed for 113 yards on 11 carries, an average of 10.3 yards per carry, plus he scored on an electrifying 83-yard run with 23 seconds left in the half...that run was the third longest run in OSU history...Don's best game of the year was against UCLA when he led OSU to a 23-14 victory over the Bruins...Don rushed for 159 yards on 17 carries, an average of 9.4 yards per carry, and he scored 1 touchdown...he also had a 72-yard run in that game, a run that matched the 12th longest run in OSU history...the 159 yards equals the 17th single-game rushing best in Beaver history...Don was named the Pacific-10 Conference Offensive Player of the Week following the UCLA contest...all told in his career to date, Don has played in 15 games and started 12...he has rushed for 744 yards on 178 carries (4.2 avg.), completed 42 of 92 passes for 650 yards...he has participated in 269 plays and has produced 1,394 yards in total offense, an average of 5.2 yards per play...he has rushed for 8 touchdowns and passed for 1...he has had three career games where he has rushed for over 100 yards...he rushed for 117 yards against ASU in 1993 to lead OSU to a 30-14 victory...unfortunately, he injured a foot in that game and missed the rest of the season...he was able to get the entire year back as a result of a medical hardship...Don has all of the qualities necessary to be an outstanding option quarterback, and now he has added the final ingredient, experience...he has excellent speed, 4.5 in the 40, a strong arm, makes good decisions and he is strong...as a sophomore he posted weightlifting bests of 275 pounds in the bench press, 405 in the back squat and 246 in the power clean, plus he tested for only 7.7 percent body fat...in 1994, he finished sixth in the Pac-10 in rushing with a 63.0 yards per game average, 10th in total offense (119.0 average) and ninth in passing efficiency at 103.2...now that he has experience to go along with his athletic ability, Don should prove to be one of the top quarterbacks in the country...Don's 15-game career stats follow:

"John-David Stewart is an excellent fullback who plays hard on every play, runs tough, and has developed himself into an excellent blocker,"--Coach Jerry Pettibone.

J.D. enters his senior year as OSU's encumbant fullback, having started all 11 games in 1994 and participating in 459 plays...J.D. was the Beavers' third leading rusher in 1994, gaining 499 yards on the ground for an average of 4.2 yards per carry...in three years, J.D. has rushed for 1,042 yards on 237 carries, an average of 4.4 yards per carry...J.D. became a very consistent blocker in the wishbone last year and even bigger things are expected from J.D. in 1995...in OSU's option offense, the fullback takes a beating as he is either blocking or carrying the football on every play...as a result, two or three Beavers usually share the load at fullback, but Stewart got the bulk of the work in 1994 and will again this year...J.D. has good speed (4.6 in the forty) and he posted outstanding weightlifting bests last year of 310 in the bench press, 485 in the back squat and 277 in the power clean...he was tested for only 8.7 percent body fat last spring...his best career rushing game to date was against Washington in Seattle last year when he rushed for 90 yards on 20 carries (4.5 average)...he has double-figure rushing games in 25 of 33 career games to date...J.D.'s career stats follow:

OSU SPRING PRACTICE OUTLOOK

(JERRY PETTIBONE, OREGON STATE'S HEAD FOOTBALL COACH, MADE THE FOLLOWING COMMENTS ON BEAVER FOOTBALL PRIOR TO THE START OF THIS YEAR'S (1995) SPRING PRACTICE.)

QUESTION: WHAT ARE YOUR GOALS GOING INTO SPRING DRILLS?

"I think the most important thing we need to do this spring is to improve our level of play in the kicking game. We also need to work hard to develop our passing attack. We also need to develop some good backup players so we can have better depth on our team."

QUESTION: WHAT QUESTIONS DO YOU FEEL NEED TO BE ANSWERED ON OFFENSE THIS SPRING?

"We need to replace our top two centers with the graduation of Johnny Feinga and Adam Thomas. We also need to replace Starling Lata at left guard and John Garrett at right tackle. There will be a lot of competition this spring among the players who are competing to win those spots on the offensive line."

QUESTION: WHAT QUESTIONS DO YOU FEEL NEED TO BE ANSWERED ON DEFENSE THIS SPRING?

"The biggest concern I have is at linebacker. We only have one starting linebacker coming back, and that is Kane Rogers. We have some good, young, quality athletes at linebacker, and now they need to step up and mature a great deal this spring. We also have to find a replacement for Packy Ena at one defensive end, and replace a pair of four-year starters in the secondary, William Ephraim and Michael Hale."

QUESTION: TALK ABOUT YOUR QUARTERBACK POSITION AND WHAT YOU EXPECT TO HAPPEN THIS SPRING?

"We will have a real healthy situation at quarterback this spring. We have **Don Shanklin** returning as a starter, and last year was Don's first year to start and gain any significant amount of experience. Last year was actually Don's first year to letter. So all of the experience he gained last year will be a real benefit to him in the future. There is going to be some good competition behind him with **Rahim Muhammad**, who has done a lot of good things when he has had an opportunity to start or come into the game in a back up role. The third player in the mix is freshman **Tim Alexander**. Obviously with the talent of Alexander, who gave us a glimpse of the possibilities of what he could do at quarterback in the USC game, I think it is going to be real intense with healthy competition at quarterback this spring."

QUESTION: WHERE DO YOU EXPECT THE BIGGEST POSITION BATTLES TO BE THIS SPRING?

"There will be real good competition among all the positions on our team. We are starting to develop some good depth, and we have got some good quality players returning. There will be excellent competition at all positions this spring."

QUESTION: HOW WILL YOU REPLACE YOUR LEADING RUSHER FOR THE PAST TWO YEARS, J.J. YOUNG?

"That is difficult to say without going into spring practice, but I would think that what he (J.J. Young) was able to do as a rusher will be spread out more among other players on our offense. We have got some good depth coming back at halfback. There will be good competition to see who is going to win the left halfback position. The production that J.J. gave us the past two seasons will be spread out more among several players at the halfback position."

QUESTION: IN THE PAST YOU HAVE HAD SOME POSITION CHANGES GOING INTO SPRING PRACTICE. DO YOU HAVE ANY POSITION CHANGES THIS SPRING?

"Yes, we made a decision to move **Adrian Woodson** from quarterback to strong safety, a move which will help us. He is an excellent athlete and a good football player, and hopefully this is a position where Woodson will be able to see the field faster. We took a couple of defensive linemen, **Charles Hatcher** and **Larry Ramirez**, and moved them to offense. Hatcher was a freshman defensive tackle in 1993, but had to attend junior college (he played offensive tackle for Mt. San Antonio College) this past year to be readmitted to OSU. We redshirted Ramirez, a true freshman, last year while he was playing defensive end. Both of these players will help us on offense. We also moved **Sean Williams**, who was a freshman wide receiver last year, to cornerback on defense. This move should give us some more depth at cornerback."

QUESTION: OSU HAS BEEN RANKED IN THE TOP FIVE NATIONALLY IN RUSHING THE PAST TWO SEASONS, WOULD YOU EXPECT THE SAME OR BETTER THIS YEAR?

"That is a normal goal for us to be one of the top five rushing team in the nation with a number of good players we have back on offense. With the experience we have, especially at quarterback, fullback and halfback, that should be a normal goal for us to finish in the top five nationally in rushing."

QUESTION: HOW DO YOU FEEL ABOUT THE OVERALL DEPTH ON YOUR FOOTBALL TEAM?

"I am concerned about the depth on our team. That will be a normal concern as long as we stay at 85 scholarships and a limited number of walk-on players who can report to fall camp each year. An injury or two at a position is going to cause a lot of concern with our depth. Regardless of how well we recruit and build depth, injuries to our team will always create a depth problem for us."

QUESTION: WHAT DO YOU SEE AS OSU'S OFFENSIVE STRENGTHS?

"The experience we have coming back on offense. We have players on our offensive team who have lettered and played a great deal. The experience they have will be a big reason for us to improve offensively."

QUESTION: WHAT DO YOU SEE AS OSU'S DEFENSIVE STRENGTHS?

"We really began to evolve during the last part of the season last year to be a defensive unit that understood the philosophy that we play with a lot of intensity and emotion. I am hopeful the level of play we displayed at the end of last year will be carried over into spring practice with the returning players we have on the defensive side of the ball."

QUESTION: DO YOU PLAN ANY CHANGES OF PHILOSOPHY OR ANY CHANGES WITH SCHEMES THIS SPRING?

"Not dramatically. We will always try to evolve to things with the personnel we have who we feel are the best schemes to give us our best opportunity to be successful. There won't be any drastic changes in our overall philosophy, offensively, defensively, or in our kicking game."

QUESTION: FROM A TEAM STANDPOINT, WHAT DO YOU SEE AS OSU'S OVERALL STRENGTH?

"The number of experienced players we have coming back on both sides of the football is our strength. We return 34 of our top 44 players who were on the two deep for the Civil War game. The players we redshirted last year, plus the five junior college players that we recruited will all be able to go through spring drills and that is a plus. The redshirts and JC players will add to our overall depth and experience."

QUESTION: EACH YEAR THAT YOU HAVE BEEN HEAD COACH AT OSU THERE HAS BEEN OBVIOUS IMPROVEMENT ON THE FIELD. DO YOU EXPECT THE SAME IN 1995?

"Yes I would. That is a normal challenge for us to be able to meet each year as long as we don't have unforeseen injuries to key people who would hurt our overall improvement. With the continuity and stability we have on our coaching staff, and the number of experienced players we have returning, we should improve again this year."

QUESTION: WHAT DO YOU FEEL HAS TO HAPPEN FOR THIS TEAM TO HAVE A WINNING RECORD IN 1995?

"We have to have a real good spring to stabilize the question marks in different positions on our team that have to be answered. We have to have a real good summer, where the majority of our players stay on campus, of their own volition to work hard and condition themselves to get ready for a great fall camp. And, I think we have to really get off to a good start this fall. We have the opportunity to have some success at the beginning of our season and it is important we get off to a good start."

QUESTION: PART OF YOUR KICKING WAS A PROBLEM IN 1994. HOW DO YOU PLAN TO IMPROVE THE KICKING GAME IN 1995?

"We are going to work extremely hard this spring to practice and scrimmage all phases of our kicking game. We are going to work very hard to develop more consistency, number one with our punter, whoever wins the job to kick off and Randy Lund needs to develop more consistency kicking extra points. That is going to be the main focus this spring. We are going to work extremely hard this spring to hopefully bring our team along a lot more in this phase of our team than any other phase."

QUESTION: YOU RECRUITED FIVE JC TRANSFERS WHO WILL ALL BE AVAILABLE THIS SPRING. WHAT DO YOU EXPECT FROM THIS GROUP?

"I expect all five of them to make a contribution to the team. Three of them (**Troy Antee, Jamie Critchlow and Garon McGuin**) have been here since the winter quarter began in January and the other two (**Darron Kirkman and John Mikucki**) will be here for the start of spring quarter. We recruited those junior college players to meet specific needs on our team and I expect them to make contributions in their positions this spring so they can help us this fall."

QUESTION: WOULD YOU ANTICIPATE ANY OF YOUR FRESHMAN CLASS PLAYING IN THEIR FIRT YEAR?

"Yes, because with the 85 scholarship limit and the potential for injury, there is always an opportunity for a true freshman to come in and make a contribution. Although our general philosophy is to redshirt freshman players, there is always an opportunity created when a freshman adjusts a little more quickly than others. Or an opportunity is available because of an injury to older players. Some times there is a specific position that creates an opportunity for a true freshman. We have played three or four freshmen ever since I have been here and I expect the same this year."

QUESTION: WHAT IS YOUR GENERAL FEELING ABOUT THE RECRUITING CLASS OF 1995?

"I think it was a good solid class. I really want to compliment Dan Marlow for the job he did in his first year of assuming the added responsibility of recruiting coordinator. He did a very good job of organizing all phases of our recruiting effort. Our coaches responded and worked very hard and did an excellent job of evaluating and influencing this class to sign with OSU. I feel very good that this is a solid class from top to bottom and it is just going to help us move towards our goals in the future."

PERSONNEL ANALYSIS

QUARTERBACK: ****Rahim Muhammad, JR;** ***Don Shanklin, JR;** **Tim Alexander, FR-RS;** **Todd Harris, FR;** **Kenderick Bernard, FR.**

Oregon State is in solid shape at quarterback and the Beavers have the most ability and experience available at quarterback since Jerry Pettibone arrived in 1991. The position has talent and depth. Oregon State will return last year's starting quarterback, junior **Don Shanklin**, plus junior **Rahim Muhammad**, who started five games in 1993 and one game in 1994, and redshirt freshman, **Tim Alexander**, who had a sensational performance against USC last year before suffering a broken collarbone. Alexander got a medical hardship redshirt as a result of the injury. Shanklin, Muhammad and Alexander will be fighting it out this spring for the starting quarterback position. Shanklin, in 10 games, rushed for 630 yards and 6 touchdowns last year and completed 29 of 73 passes for 560 yards and 1 touchdown. Shanklin was named the Pacific-10 offensive Player of the Week after rushing for 159 yards against UCLA in OSU's 23-14 victory over the Bruins. Muhammad directed the Beavers to a 44-31 victory over Wyoming last year and Shanklin missed the game due to a shoulder injury. Muhammad rushed for 86 yards in the Wyoming game. Alexander played in only two games as a true freshman last year, three plays vs. Wyoming and he played in two quarters against the USC Trojans before suffering the season-ending broken collarbone in the third quarter. However, in those two quarters, Alexander proved he is an athlete with outstanding ability. Tim rushed for 117 yards on 17 carries and scored 1 touchdown against USC. He completed 2 of 4 passes for another 27 yards. It was on his longest run, 31 yards, that he suffered his broken collarbone. The competition among the trio will be very intense this spring. OSU will also have two freshman quarterbacks available when fall camp opens. However, **Kendrick Bernard** and **Todd Harris**, both freshmen, will most likely be redshirted in 1995.

LEFT HALFBACK: *****Mark Olford, SR;** ****Clemente Sainten, JR;** **DeShawn Williams, FR-RS;** **Robert Howard, FR-RS;** **Bryan Inman, SR;** **Mat Davis, FR.**

Oregon State must replace its leading rusher for the past two years, J.J. Young, at left halfback. Going into spring drills, three-year letterman **Mark Olford**, who started at quarterback and wide receiver for the Beavers in 1992 and '93, respectively, will be No. 1. Olford injured a knee last fall and received a medical hardship redshirt to come back this fall. Mark is very talented and has a lot of playing experience, although very limited at halfback, carrying the football only 3 times for 23 yards in 1994. **Clemente Sainten** has earned two letters, however, he has been primarily a special teams player at this point and has carried the football only 3 times in two years. Two freshman redshirts, **DeShawn Williams** and **Robert Howard**, figure to be in the thick of the battle this spring. Both Williams and Howard are strong runners with great speed and bring a lot of raw talent to the position. Senior non-letterman **Bryan Inman** is also available in the spring. Freshman **Mat Davis** will report in the fall. To sum up the left halfback position, experience is limited, other than Olford, but the talent pool looks good.

RIGHT HALFBACK: *****Cameron Reynolds, SR;** ***Shayzar Hawkins, SR;** **Fahili Campbell, SO;** **Derrick Brame, FR-RS;** **Brandon Reynolds, FR.**

Cameron Reynolds, a three-year letterman, returns as a last year's starter at right halfback. Senior letterman **Shayzar Hawkins** returns after playing in a backup role last year and as a kick returner. Non-letterman sophomore **Fahali Campbell** and redshirt freshman **Derrick Brame** complete the cast available for spring practice. Freshman **Brandon Reynolds**, younger brother of Cameron, will report to fall camp. Cam Reynolds is a complete back, running, blocking and receiving. Cam rushed for 364 yards last year, 240 as a sophomore and 140 yards as a freshman. Cam rushed for 364 yards on 65 carries for an average of 5.6 yards per carry and 2 touchdowns, with a long of 74 yards. He also caught 10 passes for 231 yards, including a 64-yard TD pass. Hawkins rushed for 60 yards on 14 carries and returned 17 kickoffs for 298 yards (17.5 avg.). OSU will have experience and depth available at this position.

FULLBACK: *****J.D. Stewart, SR;** *****Sedrick Thomas, SR;** **Darron Kirkman, JR-JC;** **Ardell Bailey, FR-RS;** **Kevin Balestrieri, FR-RS;** **Derrick Poole, FR;** **Micah Moore, FR.**

Fullback is one of OSU's deepest positions on the team. It is also a position with a lot of talent, both experienced and inexperienced. Last year's starter, **J.D. Stewart**, returns and he is a three-year letterman. Another three-year letterman, **Sedrick Thomas**, returns and he has ample playing experience. OSU will also have junior college transfer **Darron Kirkman** available this spring, along with non-scholarship frosh redshirts **Ardell Bailey** and **Kevin Balestrieri**. In the fall, the Beavers will have a pair of talented freshmen joining the program in **Derrick Poole**, the Player of the Year in the state of Nevada, and **Micah Moore**. Stewart rushed for 499 yards on 119 carries (4.2 avg.) last year and was the Beavers' third-leading rusher. Thomas was the fifth leading rusher with 295 yards on 74 carries. As juniors, Thomas rushed for 338 yards and Stewart for 234. Kirkman rushed for 1,378 yards on 265 carries last year in junior college. OSU should be very strong at fullback in 1995.

WIDE RECEIVER: ***Chris Cross, SR; **Sylvester Green, JR; *Terrance Blackwell, SO; Kurt Van Meter, SO; Cobbe Davis, FR; Derrick Timmons, FR.

OSU will have the services of three lettermen, plus three players who have played a lot of football, available at wide receiver this spring. Senior **Chris Cross**, a three-year letterman returns. Cross started two games as a junior. **Sylvester Green**, a junior, returns and Sylvester started three games last year. **Terrance Blackwell** lettered as a freshman last year and he also returned kicks, as did Green. Walk-on sophomore Kurt Van Meter is also available for spring drills. OSU will have two frosh speedsters reporting this fall in Cobbe Davis and Derrick Timmons. Davis, who has a 10.3 100 meters to his credit, could also be a candidate to return kicks. The competition should be intense this spring at wide receiver.

TIGHT END: ***Brad Barcroft, SR; *Justin Moore, SR; *Josh Carley, SO; John Mikucki, JR-JC; Damon Hendrick, SO; Joe Kuykendall, FR; Jared Lee, FR.

Oregon State returns two players who started all 11 games at tight end last year. Senior **Justin Moore** started six games and senior **Brad Barcroft** started five games. The Beavers also return another letterman in sophomore **Josh Carley**. However, Carley has been experiencing more back problems and his status is questionable as OSU enters spring drills. Carley missed the early part of the 1994 season while recovering from disk surgery. As a result of the uncertainty of Carley, OSU recruited junior **John Mikucki** out of the junior college ranks and he will be available for spring practice. Non-letterman sophomore **Damon Hendrick** is also available at tight end after moving from the defensive side of the ball midway through the 1994 season. The Beavers will have two freshmen joining the ranks for the start of fall practice in **Joe Kuyendall** and **Jared Lee**. With two veteran tight ends returning, OSU is hopeful that will translate into improved production in 1995 from the tight end position.

OFFENSIVE LINE: ***Tim Camp, SR; **Darin Borter, SR; **Brad Thompson, JR; *Phil Lafler, SR; Grant Forman, JR; Jamie Critchlow, JR-JC; Ian West, JR; Jarrod Owens, JR; Tom Huthoefer, JR; Trey Hyde, SO; Yul Everline, SO; Charles Hatcher, SO; Jon Melde, FR-RS; Mike Barger, FR-RS; Larry Ramirez, FR-RS; Ben Caputo, SO; Aaron Koch, FR.

OSU will return three offensive linemen who started games in 1994, senior tackle Tim Camp (11); senior guard Darin Borter (11) and junior guard Brad Thompson (3). The only other letter winner returning is senior tackle Phil Lafler. The biggest concern going into spring drills for the Beavers will be the center position where OSU lost starter Johnny Feinga and backup center Adam Thomas. As a result, OSU recruited junior JC transfer Jamie Critchlow to bridge the gap. While the Beavers only return four letter winners on the offensive line, OSU does have several linemen who have been in the program for two or three years and are ready to blossom. Three juniors, Grant Forman, Jarrod Owens, Jeff Miller and Tom Huthoefer, are players the Beaver coaching staff feel are ready to make significant contributions in 1995, along with sophomores Trey Hyde, Charles Hatcher and Yul Everline. Redshirt freshman Larry Ramirez will be making his first appearance on the offensive line this spring after playing defensive end last fall. Ramirez could have a bright future on the offensive line, but whether he is ready to contribute in 1995 will be determined in spring practice. Two other redshirt freshman, Mike Barger, and Jon Melde, are coming off injuries and are questionable this spring. In fact, Barger has been ruled out of this year's spring drills after having shoulder surgery and Melde is coming off knee surgery. Ben Caputo, a sophomore walk-on is also available this spring. OSU has one recruited freshman joining the mix in the fall, and that is Aaron Koch who will play center. The offensive line probably holds a big key as to how successful the Beavers' offense will be in 1995. However, Jerry Pettibone believes he has the athletes available to form a solid offensive line.

DEFENSIVE LINE: ***Tom Holmes, SR; ***David Kiepke, SR; **Clint Rust, SR; *Tony Huot, JR; *Ahmani Johnson, SR; Datanyen Myers, SR; Troy Antee, JR-JC; Brian Rogers, FR-RS; Adrian Eggleston, SO; Hans Staffelbach, SR; Eric Cummings, JR; Matt Wells, FR; Darrol Camp, FR; Jarrod Ogden, FR; Marlon Lewis, FR; Inoke Breckterfield, FR; David Brims, FR.

OSU returns three starters from the defensive line of 1994 and a fourth who started two games. Senior Tom Holmes has been a two-year starter at nose tackle and he is one of the premier defensive lineman in the Pacific-10 Conference. Senior David Kiepke started 10 games at defensive end last year, while junior Tony Huot, who came on like gangbusters at the end of the 1994 season, started the final six games of the year at defensive end. Senior Clint Rust also started two games at defensive end. Holmes was an honorable mention All-Pac-10 selection last year and was named the Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Week in OSU's 21-3 upset victory over Washington State last year, after running a fumble back for a touchdown. Holmes was fourth on the squad in defensive points with 234, while Huot was 10th with 108 and Kiepke was 12th with 46. Senior Ahmani Johnson earned a letter last year after transferring from Idaho and he proved to be an outstanding pass rusher. Johnson should be improved in 1995. OSU signed junior Troy Antee, a junior college transfer from Foothill College, who was rated the fifth top JC player in the state of California, and he is expected to make a strong contribution at defensive end. Senior Datanyen Myers returns, as does sophomore Adrian Eggleston and redshirt freshman Brian Rogers among the recruited players. Walk-ons Eric Cummings, a junior, and Matt Wells, a redshirt freshman, will also be available for spring drills. In the fall, OSU will have several freshmen joining the ranks--Darrol Camp, Jarrod Ogden, Marlon Lewis, Inoke Breckterfield and David Brim. All in all, the Beavers figure to field the strongest defensive line in Pettibone's tenure at OSU.

OUTSIDE LINEBACKER: **Bryan Ludwick, JR; *Kelron Sykes, SO, *Toalei Talataina, SO; Garon McGuin, JR-JC; Bryan Jones, FR-RS; Garrick Hart, JR; Emeka Nwadiogbu, FR; Jonathan Jackson, FR.

Outside linebacker is probably the most inexperienced area on the Beaver football team going into spring drills. OSU will return three lettermen at outside linebacker, but no starters. The three letter winners returning are **Bryan Ludwick**, who played mainly on special teams last year, **Kelron Sykes** and **Toalei Talataina**. Ludwick participated in 29 plays, Sykes 137 and Talataina 33. OSU recruited one junior college player, **Garon McGuin**, who will be available for spring drills. The Beavers are counting on McGuin to make an immediate contribution. The only other two players available for spring drills are redshirt freshman **Bryan Jones** and walk-on junior **Garrick Hart**. Two very talented freshman recruits will be joining the program for fall camp, **Emeka Nwadiogbu** and **Jonathan Jackson**. The progress of the outside linebacker positions will be very important to OSU this spring.

OSU appears to be very solid at inside linebacker heading into spring drills. The Beavers will have four letter winners and one starter returning. Senior **Kane Rogers**, who has been called by Jerry Pettibone, the heart and soul of the OSU defense, returns at middle linebacker. Rogers, a two-year starter, was second in team defensive points last year with 305, plus he enters the 1995 season ranked ninth on the Beavers' all-time career defensive point list with 743. Rogers participated in 690 plays as a junior. Senior **John Fairbank** returns at rover and John has been a backup player for the past three seasons, playing behind Rico Petrini, and John is very capable. Starting out the spring behind Rogers and Fairbank will be a pair of sophomore lettermen, **Nathan McAtee** and **Anthony Murray**. McAtee started two games at outside linebacker last year and he has outstanding athletic ability. McAtee participated in 261 plays last year. Murray saw virtually all of his action on special teams last year. Two other players who will participate in spring drills are freshmen redshirt walk-ons, **Mike Douglass** and **Russ White**. OSU will have one recruited freshman, Aaron Wells, join the ranks of inside linebackers in the fall.

OSU returns four letter winners, three players who have started in games and two players who were starters in 1994, plus a host of redshirts. The Beavers return Reggie Tongue at free safety and he may be the best at his position in the country. Reggie has been a three-year starter for OSU and currently ranks 15th on the Beavers' all-time career defensive point list. Reggie tied an NCAA and Pac-10 record by returning three pass interceptions for touchdowns last year. Reggie also has tied the Pac-10 career mark with four pass interceptions returned for touchdowns. The NCAA mark is five. Reggie will be the backbone of what should be a very talented secondary for the Beavers, despite losing two players who were four-year starters, cornerback William Ephraim and strong safety Michael Hale. Buster Elahee, a freshman All-American, returns for his junior year at left corner. Marc Williams, a two-year letterman who started four games in 1994, will inherit the right corner spot. Sophomore Larry Bumpus was sensational in the final half of the season for the Beavers and he appears ready to take over at strong safety. OSU has a total of six scholarship redshirts available for spring drills who are untested under fire, but have shown outstanding athletic ability during their redshirt tenure. Sophomore Adrian Woodson redshirted as a quarterback last year and is being moved to strong safety to take advantage of his athletic talent. The feeling is Adrian is too good to be backing up at quarterback when he could be on the field as a defensive back. Five other players are redshirt freshmen with solid credentials--Byron Lane, Sean Williams, Dana Davis, Armon Hatcher and Andrae Holland. Out of this group, defensive coordinator Rocky Long hopes to field a solid backup secondary and have quality depth at the four secondary spots. The Beavers will also have four walk-on players available in the spring in Brandon Michael, a junior; Stuart Morigeau, a sophomore; Ryan Person, a junior; and redshirt freshman Ben Tanuvasa. OSU recruited one freshman player for the secondary in Jason Dandridge, who will report in the fall. All in all, the Beavers appear to have more quality talent going into spring drills than they have had in many years, although not as experienced as last year's secondary.

KICKERS/PUNTERS: *Doug Stuckey, JR; *Randy Lund, SO; Bret Hopkins, FR-RS; Mike Smith, SO.

Oregon State returns its starting place kicker in sophomore letterman Randy Lund, and last year's starting punter, junior Doug Stuckey. Lund scored a total of 39 points as a freshman last year, kicking 21 of 27 PATs and 6 of 7 field goals, with a long of 45 yards. Randy was very accurate on field goals in 1994, but he had some consistency problems on PATs last year. Randy should be one of the Pac-10's top place kickers as a sophomore this season. Stuckey handled the punting chores last year for OSU, averaging only 33.7 yards per kick. The Beavers redshirted prep All-American punter, freshman Bret Hopkins, last year. Hopkins, Stuckey and walk-on Mike Smith, a sophomore, will battle for the punting job this spring. Either Lund or Hopkins will handle OSU's kick off duties this spring. OSU is looking for major improvement in all phases of the kicking game this spring. Pettibone indicates that improvement in the kicking game will be a top priority this spring.

San Antonio College...He played tight end on goal line situations...he was named honorable mention all-league (Mission Conference Northern Division) as a freshman and sophomore...as a sophomore inside linebacker, he had 28 solo tackles, 28 assisted tackles, 2 fumble recoveries, 1 pass interception and 2 pass deflections...the Mt. Kendrick, who has 4.4 speed in the 40, was West Brook's starting quarterback as a junior and senior and earned three letters all told...he led West Brook to a 10-1 mark his junior year and 11-2 and to the quarterfinals of the Texas state 5A playoffs...as a senior, he rushed for over 700 yards and 8 touchdowns and passed for over 2,400 yards and 15 touchdowns while completing 63 percent of his passes...in his two-year career as a starting quarterback, Kendrick passed for 3,456 yards, rushed for 1,300 yards and had a .61.2 percent passing percentage...he threw a total of 39 touchdown passes and rushed for 20 touchdowns...he is also a two-year starter in basketball, where he averaged 10.2 points a game and 8 assists per game...as a junior, he set a season steal record of 70...as a junior and senior, Kendrick earned first-team all-district (District 22, 5A) honors...he also was a first-team All-Beaumont and first-team All-Port Arthur News Gold Team selection as a senior...in addition, he was named Player of the Week honors three times during his senior year...he was recruited by Texas, Texas A&M, McNeese State and Oregon State..."He has resources as an athlete that have not been tapped yet," said Coach Hentschel. "What I like about him is his attitude and the fact he is very coachable. I think he will be an outstanding player for Oregon State."

2-INOKE BRECKTERFIELD, DL, 5-11, 260, Damien Memorial HS, Honolulu, Hawaii

Inoke was a four-year starter and letterman on the defensive line for the Damien Memorial High School Monarchs under Coach Wally Aina...he also played running back some during each of his final three seasons...he also earned two letters in basketball as a forward and four in track and field as a shot put and discus competitor...he earned all-league (Interscholastic League of Honolulu) honors as a sophomore, junior and senior...as a senior, he was first team all-league and first-team all-state...he was first-team all-league as a junior and second-team all-state...as a sophomore, Inoke was second-team all-league and honorable mention all-state...he was named the defensive Player of the Game as a junior and senior in the preseason Shawn Akina Classic...he also played in the BTC All-Star Game as a senior and he served as team captain...he has received an invitation to play in the Down-Under Bowl, an all-star team pitting Hawaii and Nevada prep all-stars...In addition to his football exploits, he placed second in the state shot put competition as a junior and sixth as a sophomore...he posted some outstanding numbers as a defensive lineman...In seven games his sophomore season, he had 34 solo tackles, 24 assisted tackles, 14 sacks, 23 tackles for loss, 4 fumble recoveries and 3 blocked kicks...in 10 games as a junior, he had 43 solo tackles, 36 assisted tackles, 11 sacks, 20 tackles for loss, 3 fumble recoveries and 4 blocked kicks...in five games as a senior (he missed five due to a knee injury that did not require surgery) he recorded 29 solo tackles, 17 assisted tackles, 9 sacks, 17 tackles for loss, recovered 4 fumbles and blocked 2 kicks...in four years as a running back, Inoke carried the ball 35 times for 190 yards (5.4 avg.) and scored 3 touchdowns...his best game as a prep athlete was against Kamehameha when he posted 15 tackles, 3 sacks, 7 tackles for loss, blocked a kick, knocked down 2 passes and carried the ball 4 times for 18 yards. "He is very agile and quick," said Coach Wally Aina. "He is tremendously strong and is an outstanding athlete." Inoke was recruited by Hawaii, Oregon, Colorado, Brigham Young, Utah, Penn State and Oregon State, according to Aina.

3-DAVID BRIM, DL, 6-4, 280, Ganesha HS, Pomona, CA

David earned three letters and was a two-year starter for Coach Gary Norvell and the Ganesha High School Giants...he played offensive tackle and defensive tackle for Ganesha...He earned first-team all-league (Valle Vista League) honors as a junior and senior on offense and second-team all-league honors as a senior on defense...David earned three letters as a three-year starter at center on the Ganesha basketball team...he also throws the shot put in track...Ganesha was 8-4 his junior year and 7-6, reaching the semifinals of CIF 3A his senior year...he was recruited by Wyoming, Utah and OSU. "He has not come close to reaching his potential yet," says Coach Norvell. "He could be awfully good before he leaves the college ranks."

4-DARROL CAMP, DL, 6-1, 271, Archbishop Shaw HS, Marrero, LA

Recruited by Arizona, Maryland, Texas, Oklahoma and OSU...Darrol runs the 40 in 5.0, can bench press 325 pounds and back squat 485 pounds and has a 3.3 GPA...hed plans to major in mechanical engineering at OSU...Camp played in only one game as a senior as a result of dislocating a shoulder in the season opener which later required surgery to repair. "He dislocated his shoulder in the first game, tried to come back and got hurt again," said Coach Hank Tierney. "So by not playing, instead of 10,000 people recruiting him, it was just Arizona, Maryland and Oregon State at the end. People backed off, which is really crazy because he's a great player. He was all-Metro and all-district (District 7, 5A) as a junior and going into his senior year he was one of the top-rated prospects in the area. He's very strong and very quick. (OSU) absolutely got a steal. If he would not have been hurt his senior year he would have been the No. 1 recruit in the area and could have picked his school. He is definitely a blue chipper. Darrol will play early, he's a great football player," said Tierney...as a junior, Darrol registered 43 solo tackles, 26 assisted tackles for 69 total tackles, plus he had 4 sacks and 2 fumble recoveries...He earned three letters in total and was a two-year starter, and would have been a three-year starter if he had not have been injured his senior year...he also served as team captain his senior year...he also earned three letters in track and field as a discus and javelin competitor...he had a best of 140-8 in the discus and 172-0 in the javelin his junior year...Archbishop Shaw has been a very successful team, posting a 9-3 record and winning the District title in 1994...Archbishop Shaw was 12-1 in 1993 and 8-4 in 1992...Tierney indicated that seven players off the Archbishop Shaw team this year signed letter of intents and he has had a total of 53 players in the past 11 years sign Division I-A letter of intents...Darrol's brother, Charlie Camp, was a starting inside linebacker at Arizona last year and he will be a senior at Arizona this fall.

5-JASON DANDRIDGE, DB, 6-2, 190, Valley View HS, Moreno Valley, CA

Recruited by UCLA, Temple, OSU and selected OSU...Jason was a three-year letterman and a two-year starter for the Valley View HS Eagles...he runs the 40 in 4.4...as a junior, Jason started at cornerback and as a senior he was a starting free safety and starting running back on offense...he earned first-team all-league (Sun Belt League) honors following his junior year...after his senior year he was named all-county (Riverside)...he recorded 41 tackles and 5 pass interceptions as a senior and he rushed for 771 yards, with an 8.2 average and 7 touchdowns, as well...he had a long run of 80 yards...according to his high school coach, Leo Brouhard, "Jason is one of the players to ever play both ways for us. We are a large school (over 3,000 students) and we have sent several players to Division I-A schools, including seven this year. Jason is one of the very best I have coached. He can jump out of the building and he has no fear. He is only 17 years old (turned 17 in November) and I think he will wind up around 6-3, 225. He is a great catch for Oregon State." Valley View High School has played for the league championship for the past five years in a row.

6-COBBE DAVIS, WR, 5-10, 178, Humble HS, Humble, Texas

Cobbe played for Coach Neal Quillin and the Humble High School Wildcats...Cobbe runs 4.3 in the 40 and 10.3 in 100 meters and 21.4 in the 200 meters as a junior...he was listed No. 68 on SuperPrep Magazine's list of top 100 prep players in state of Texas...he was also named honorable mention All-American by Bluechip Illustrated...he was named as one of the top 100 prep players in Texas by the Houston Chronicle...he had a fine senior year and was named MVP of his team, although he only played in seven games as a result of an ankle injury, for Greater Houston's top-ranked team through the end of the regular season...he had 631 yards on 109 carries, 5.6 average, and 4 TDs, including an 86-yarder...he also accounted for 189 yards in pass receptions and scored 1 touchdown on a 40-yard reception...his best individual game was against Kingwood High School when he accounted for 289 yards...as a junior, Cobbe rushed for 993 yards, scored 16 rushing touchdowns, plus 2 more in pass receiving...he had a long run of 81 yards, and a long pass reception of 46 yards, plus 386 yards total in receptions...as a sophomore, Cobbe rushed for 346 yards, scored 4 rushing TDs and had a long gain of 86 yards...he also had 241 yards in pass receptions and a long gain of 32 yards...all told, as a sophomore and junior, he caught 32 passes and averaged 11.3 yards per reception...as a freshman, Cobbe rushed for 532 yards, scored 8 touchdowns and had a long run of 82 yards...he posted a four-year high school total of 2,502 yards rushing and 33 rushing touchdowns, plus he had another 816 yards in pass receptions and 3 touchdowns...Coach Neal Quillen, who coached Thurman Thomas in high school, praises Cobbe's quickness and deceptive strength. "He has great speed and great explosiveness," said Quillen. "He made some big runs and catches for us. He's got that great burst of speed, vision, the ability to stop and start and accelerate into the hole," said Quillin...he earned four letters in football, three as a starter, while playing halfback and wide receiver...he will also earn four letters in track as a sprinter, 100, 200 and 400, and in the long jump...one of his top games as a senior was against Houston's MacArthur Aldine High School...he caught a 50-yard pass to set up the touchdown to tie MacArthur Aldine 14-14 when the Generals were ranked #2 in the nation on the USA Today prep poll...During Cobbe's four years at Humble HS, the Wildcats produced records of 8-3, 5-5, 4-6 and 9-1-1...picked OSU over Arkansas, Rice, Texas A&M, TCU, Oklahoma, Michigan, Miami (Fla.) and Colorado State.

7-MAT DAVIS, HB, 5-11, 190, North Medford HS, Medford, OR

Mat played for Coach Rod Rumrey and the North Medford Black Tornado...he was recruited by Arizona State, Arizona, Oregon and OSU...he picked OSU over Oregon and turned down visits to other schools...Mat has been selected to play in the North-South Shrine Game to be played in Corvallis on July 22 for the South squad...Mat was listed as the No. 1 player in Oregon and Washington by SuperPrep Magazine in its preseason issue and #12 in its All-America issue...Mat was named honorable mention All-America by Bluechip Illustrated and to its Western all-region team...he runs the 40 in 4.44...Coach Rod Rumrey says that Davis is the first player he has coached in 27 years who runs a sub 4.5 forty (10.8 in 100 meters as a junior)...he earned three letters in football and started as a junior and senior at running back...he has already earned three letters in track and has been in the state 4A finals in either the 100 or 200 meters the last three years...Mat also earned two letters in wrestling...Mat broke free for five TDs of over 50 yards and gained 622 yards in five playoff games as a junior, averaging 10 yards per carry in those five games, which is a state record...his best playoff game was against Willamette when he rushed for 225 yards on 11 carries and 3 touchdowns, including TD runs of 69 and 68 yards...in 14 games as a junior, Mat carried the ball 124 times for 1,124 yards, an average of 8.9 yards per carry, and a long run of 89 yards...he rushed for 27 touchdowns as a junior...he also caught 11 passes for 293 yards (26.6 avg.) and 4 touchdowns, including a long catch of 76 yards...Mat also returned 2 kickoffs for a touchdowns and returned 19 kickoffs for 517 yards, an average of 27.2 yards...one of his TD returns was for 89 yards...as a senior, Mat played in only four games as a result of a severe hamstring pull that kept him out of action...playing hurt, Mat still gained 523 yards on 31 carries, an average of 16.8 yards per carry...he also caught 3 passes for 96 yards and returned 2 kickoffs for 46 yards. "In the playoff games in his junior year he proved he was one of the top players in the state of Oregon. He rushed for over 160 yards vs. Ashland, plus running a kickoff back for a TD, and from that point on he was an outstanding football player. He is a very dedicated athlete and an extremely hard worker. I think he has a brilliant future ahead of him," said Rumrey. "He attacks the defense and is a very physical runner," said Rumrey. Since the conclusion of football season, Mat has been a dedicated participant in the weight room and has posted bests of 405 pounds in the back squat, 275 in the power clean and 280 in the bench press. He was named honorable mention on the Tacoma News Tribune's Northwest Nuggets team.

8-KOLUMANE FAINUULELIE, TE, 6-4, 230, Farrington HS, Honolulu, Hawaii

Kolumane played at Farrington High School (Governors) for former Oregon State linebacker Skip Diaz...he was a two-year starter at tight end for Diaz...he also played on the offensive line in certain situations as well...he was a second-team all-league (OIA, Oahu Interscholastic Association) pick as a senior and honorable mention as a junior...he also competes in the discus and shot put in track and was a starter on the basketball team as a junior. "He is an outstanding blocker," says Diaz. "We were a dominant running team and we put him where ever we needed a key block." Farrington was 5-3 his junior year and 8-3 his senior year.

9-TODD HARRIS, QB, 5-10, 186, Boling HS, Boling, Texas

Todd Harris was a three-year starter and four-year letterman in football for Coach Allen Smith and the Boling High School Bulldogs...he also earned three letters in basketball as a guard, and he will earn four letters each in baseball and track...Todd is a sprinter in track and a right-handed pitcher in baseball...in track, Todd was a regional qualifier in the 100 and 200 meters as well as the 400-meter relay as a freshman, sophomore and junior...Todd earned first-team all-state honors as a pitcher his sophomore year and all-district his junior year...Todd was a two-year all-district selection in football...as a junior, Todd was a first-team all-district (District 28, 2A) pick at running back and cornerback...as a senior, he was first-team all-district pick at quarterback and free safety...he was recruited by Rice and Sam Houston State in addition to OSU...he played running back and quarterback in 1992 and '93 and quarterback in 1994...as a senior, he rushed for 531 yards on 96 carries in 10 games, averaging 5.5 yards per carry and 6 touchdowns...he had a long run of 46 yards...he completed 22 of 59 passes for 492 yards and 6 touchdowns with a long pass of 45 yards...as a junior, he rushed for 771 yards on 121 carries in 10 games for an average of 6.4 yards per carry and he scored 8 touchdowns, with a long run of 67 yards...he also completed 13 of 26 passes for 177 yards and 2 touchdowns with a long TD pass of 65 yards...in 10 games as a sophomore, Todd rushed for 525 yards on 96 carries, an average of 5.5, and he scored 7 touchdowns with a long run of 40 yards...he also completed 37 of 80 passes for 598 yards and 6 touchdowns with a long of 47 yards...for his career, Todd rushed for 1,827 yards on 313 carries for an average of 5.8 yards per carry, and 21 touchdowns in 30 games...he passed for 1,267 yards, completing 76 of 165 passes for 14 touchdowns, with only 5 interceptions...Boling ran option football as its base offense during his career...as a defensive back, Todd intercepted 23 passes during his career at Boling HS, including 7 his senior year and 8 his junior year...he also returned punts (5 for 83 yards) and kickoffs (6 for 158 yards) as a senior...Boling reached the state playoffs all four years that Todd played...Boling was 12-1 his sophomore year, 9-2 his junior year and 6-5 his senior year. "He is a good athlete," said Coach Allen Smith. "As you can see by the fact he played offense and defense and returned kicks, I never wanted him off the field. He is an athlete and a solid student and a good person. I think he can play offense or defense in college. I told the OSU coaches, 'if he doesn't pan out on one side of the ball, put him on the other.'"

10-JONATHAN JACKSON, OLB, 6-3, 220, Bonanza HS, Las Vegas, Nevada

Jonathan was a two-year starter for Bonanza High School and Coach Rick Traasdahl as an outside linebacker and he doubled as a tight end his senior year...Jonathan runs 4.65 in the 40...he ran the 100 meters as a freshman and sophomore...in nine games as a junior OLB, he had 74 tackles, including 6 tackles for losses and 4 passes broken up...as a senior, he recorded 64 tackles with 6 tackles for loss and 5 passes broken up and 1 interception...he also caught 7 passes for 2 touchdowns...he missed three games his senior year due to a pinched nerve in his neck...he was honorable mention all-league (Sunset Division, 3A) and first-team all-league as a senior. He is also a starter on the Bonanza basketball team as a forward...as a junior, he was the city's leading rebounder...he was recruited by Utah State, Wyoming, Nevada-Reno, Washington State and OSU. "Jonathan hasn't played a lot of football in his career, but he is a real student of the game and is going to get better and better," said Coach Rick Traasdahl. "He made plays sideline to sideline for us. He hasn't even reached the tip of the iceberg as far as tapping his talent yet. He is a good student and a conscientious young man who sets goals for himself and achieves them."

11-AARON KOCH, OL, 6-4, 265, McNary HS, Keizer, OR

Aaron is a three-year letterman in football and wrestling...he is a two-time all-Valley League player for the McNary Celtics and Coach Garry Swanson...Aaron was a first-team all-league pick on offense and defense his junior year and a first-team pick on defense his senior and second-team on offense...Aaron chose OSU over Oregon and Washington...Aaron has been selected to play in the North-South Shrine Game to be played in Corvallis on July 22...he is a member of the South squad...Aaron also has a 3.92 GPA and plans to study science at Oregon State...Aaron is also defending district champion in wrestling at 275 pounds and is undefeated so far this year at 25-0...he was named honorable mention on Tacoma News Tribune's Northwest Nuggets team...he moved ahead one year in school and he will not turn 17 years old until this spring. "He has excellent speed and size," says Coach Garry Swanson. "He is a definite blue chipper. He has not turned 17 years old yet and when he grows into his body he will be an outstanding college football player."

12-JOE KUYKENDALL, TE, 6-6, 250, Bend HS, Bend, OR

Selected first-team prep All-America by Bluechip Illustrated and named the No. 4 tight end in the Western region (7 state region)...Joe played for Coach Craig Walker and the Bend Lava Bears...he turned down trips to Oregon, Arizona State, Arizona, Washington, Washington State, Utah and California after committing to Oregon State...Joe runs 4.7 in the 40...selected to play in the North-South Shrine Game to be played in Corvallis on July 22...Hh is a member of South squad...he was named honorable mention on the Tacoma News Tribune's Northwest Nuggets team...he received four votes on the Long Beach Press Telegram's "Best In The West Poll"...he was listed in Stock Exchange as an "athlete whose stock is one the rise"...he played baseball as a first baseman his junior year and was named honorable mention all-league...he played a total of six positions his senior year in football...he played tight end, offensive tackle, long snapper for punts, short snapper for PATs, middle guard and defensive end...against Mountain View High School in Bend, he had 2 quarterback hurries, 3 sacks, 5 tackles for loss and blocked a punt which he recovered on the 1-yard line...Kuykendall is a great blocker with quick feet, said Coach Walker. "He was only honorable mention in our (Intermountain) league. Maybe we didn't get him the ball enough."

13-JARED LEE, TE, 6-3, 235, Jeff Davis HS, Houston, Texas

Jared played tight end and outside linebacker for the Jeff Davis High School Panthers and Coach Chuck Arnold...he was a two-year starter for Jeff Davis after transferring to Jeff Davis his sophomore year from Yates High School, another school in the Houston area...he also is a two-year starter in basketball and a shot put and discus competitor in track...at Yates, he participated in soccer and baseball...he earned first-team all-district (District 20, 4A) honors on defense and second-team on offense...as a junior, he was a second-team all-district pick on defense...in addition, he was selected to the Houston School District (23 schools) all-academic team as a senior. In 10 games his senior year, Jared had 28 solo tackles, 17 assisted tackles, 2 sacks, 7 tackles for loss and 4 quarterback hurry plays. "He is a very good athlete," said Coach Arnold. "He did everything for us, including punting and kicking off. He is an outstanding blocker and should fit into Oregon State's system very well."

14-MARLON LEWIS, DL, 6-2, 265, Centennial HS, Circle Pines, Minnesota

Marlon started two years for Coach Michael Watson and Centennial High School at inside linebacker and center on offense...he earned honorable mention all-conference (North Suburban Conference) honors his senior year...Centennial was 2-6 his junior year and 8-2 his senior year...he had 30 solo tackles, 32 assisted tackles, 1 sack, 4 quarterback hurry plays and 2 fumble recoveries his senior year...he played in Arizona his sophomore year and is the nephew of current OSU assistant coach Osia Lewis. "He was the key part of our defense," said Coach Watson. "He is very fast (4.8 for a big man) and made tackles for us sideline to sideline. When he turns it on, he is one heck of a football player."

15-MICAH MOORE, FB, 5-11, 202, South Mountain HS, Phoenix, Arizona

(Pronounced Mike-ah). Micah runs 4.55 in the 40...he played one year at South Mountain High School (Jaguars) and for Coach Cleveland Dansby after transferring from North High School in Phoenix...South Mountain was 12-1 in 1994 and lost in the state semifinals to eventual state 5A champion Horizon High School...Micah earned first-team All-Metro honors his senior year as a fullback and honorable mention all-state...he rushed for 827 yards on 85 carries, an average of 9.7 yards per carry, and 13 touchdowns his senior year...he also caught 9 passes for 168 yards...Micah also played strong safety on defense...before transferring to South Mountain, Micah rushed for 850 yards his junior year and 650 yards his sophomore year and 700 his freshman year, all at North High School...he earned four letters all told in football. "He is a diamond in the rough," said Coach Cleveland Dansby. "He is one of those power-type runners with speed. He is an outstanding blocker. He blocked for our tailback this past year who gained over 2,000 yards. Micah is a big strong, powerful kid. He runs 4.5 in the 40 and is not just fast, but quick. He had 10 knockouts (decleaters) this season and when he played (strong safety) there were players who saw him coming and went to the ground. Oregon State got a steal. He's the nicest person you ever want to meet off the field, but on the field he's a seek-and-destroy person. he's a pit bull."

16-EMEKA NWADIOGBU, OLB, 6-2, 206, Saguaro HS, Scottsdale, Arizona

(Pronounced A-meck-ah Wang-ah-boo). Emeka played for Coach Tim Beck and the Saguaro High School Cars...Emeka, who is 17 years old, runs the 40 in 4.5...he played only one year of high school football after transferring to Saguaro from Brophy High School in Phoenix...he played outside linebacker on defense and tight end and running back on offense his senior year...he had 67 tackles, recovered 3 fumbles, had 5 sacks and scored 1 touchdown on defense on a 30-yard fumble return for Saguaro...on offense, he played in spots but averaged over 30 yards per catch on 8 receptions, including a 66-yarder...he also carried the football 3 times for 20 yards and 1 TD, plus he returned punts and kickoffs. "He is definitely a diamond in the rough," says Coach Beck. "He is an exceptional athlete. He is very bright and has a good feel for the game. He doesn't get blocked and he makes people miss him. He can run and is very strong. He also has great leadership ability and his future is unlimited." He was also recruited by Arizona State, Wyoming, Kansas State and UNLV.

17-JARROD OGDEN, DL, 6-5, 228, Willits HS, Willits, CA

Jarrold was selected honorable mention prep All-American by Bluechip Magazine and to its Western (7 states) all-region team...Jarrod played for Coach Dan McBride and the Willits High School Wolverines...Ogden, only 17 years old, was a four-year letterman at Willits in football, playing TE on offense and DE on defense...he visited Fresno State and cancelled visits to Washington State, Northwestern and UCLA after committing to OSU...he was a three-year starter at Willits High in football, a three-year starter in basketball at center, a two-year starter in baseball at first base and he earned one letter in golf...he was the North Coast League's Defensive Player of the Year as a junior and senior in football...in 1993, he won the award over Marty Murphy, a scholarship redshirt at Oregon this past season, who was defensive MVP as a junior in 1992. "That was pretty special for him to beat out somebody who was going to the Pac-10," said Coach McBride...he was a two-way tackle as a sophomore before moving to end. "His biggest attribute is his pursuit," McBride said. "He gets to the ball no matter where it's at. We played him on the strong side and everybody always ran to the other side of the field. He can play either way. He has good hands and pretty good speed on him. You won't find many better tight ends."

18-DERRICK POOLE, FB/OLB, 6-0, 200, Western HS, Las Vegas, Nevada

Derrick was Player of the Year in the state of Nevada...he is a SuperPrep Magazine first-team All-American...named first-team All-America by Bluechip Magazine...he was selected as the 12th best running back in the Big 8 Region by Bluechip Illustrated...he was a three-year starter on defense at inside and outside linebacker and a two-year starter at running back for Coach Joe Blockovich and Western High School...Derrick rushed for 1,060 yards and 16 touchdowns on 130 carries for an average of 8.2 yards per carry as a junior...he also caught 12 passes for 205 yards and 2 touchdowns...he runs 4.5 in 40...he rushed for 1,269 yards as senior on 124 carries for an average of 10.2 yards...he ran for 16 touchdowns...he caught 5 passes for 148 yards and 1 TD as a senior...all told in three years, Derrick rushed for a total of 2,529 yards on 274 catches for an average of 9.2 yards per carry...he scored 35 touchdowns on the ground and 3 via receiving...defensively, Derrick had 74 solo tackles and 43 assisted tackles for 117 total tackles as a junior, plus 6 sacks, 9 tackles for loss, 4 fumble recoveries and 3 interceptions...as a senior, he had 77 solo tacklese and 49 assisted tackles for a total of 126 tackles, plus 9 sacks, 12 tackles for loss, 3 fumble recoveries and 2 pass interceptions...he was named MVP of 3A Southern Division on offense as a senior...he was first-team all-league on offense and defense as a junior and senior and a first-team all-state pick on offense as a senior and first-team all-state on defense as a junior...Coach Blockovich said, "He has not even scratched the surface of what he can do. 19-BRANDON REYNOLDS, HB, 6-0, 190, Lakeridge HS, Lake Oswego, OR

Brandon was selected first-team prep All-America by Bluechip Illustrated and the 13th best back in the Western (7 states) region...he played for the Lakeridge Pacers and Coach Mike Coulson...Brandon is the brother of OSU starting halfback Cameron Reynolds...he was a first-team all-state (Oregonian) pick on defense and a second-team all-state pick on offense (Oregonian) as a senior...SuperPrep Magazine listed Reynolds as the third best player in Oregon and Washington in its preseason issue and No. 16 on its list of the top 17 players in the Northwest in its All-America issue...named honorable mention on the Tacoma News Tribune's Northwest Nuggets team...Brandon has been selected to play in the North-South Shrine Game to be played in Corvallis on July 22...he will be a member of the North squad...he earned three letters in football and was a two-year starter on offense and defense...he will also earn three letters in track and field, competing in the 200 meters, high and low hurdles...as a junior, Brandon was named first-team all-league (Three Rivers) on defense...he did not start playing on offense until midway through his junior season...in last five games of his junior year, he rushed for 485 yards and 6 touchdowns and caught 13 passes for 260 yards and 4 more TDs...all told, he rushed for 560 yards on 93 carries in six games, an average of 6.0 per carry...as a senior, Brandon rushed for 1,020 yards in 10 games on 172 carries, an average of 7.2 yards per carry, and he rushed for 15 touchdowns, including a long run of 85 yards...he also caught 10 passes for 187 yards and 2 touchdowns, including a long run of 70 yards...he also scored 2 TDs on kickoff returns...he has been selected to play in the Shrine Football All-Star game to be played in Corvallis in August...in addition to being named all-state, Brandon was team captain his senior year and he was the Offensive Player of the Year in the Three Rivers League and he was co-Defensive Player of the Year in the Three Rivers League...he was also recruited by Washington, California, ASU, San Diego State and Iowa...he runs the 40 in 4.5...he did not play in the final two Pacer games his senior year in the state 4A playoffs after suffering a knee injury...he had surgery on the knee in January. 20-DERRICK TIMMONS, WR, 6-2, 179, Riverview HS, Sarasota, Florida

Derrick was selected honorable mention prep All-America by Bluechip Magazine and to its Southeast region team...Derrick runs the 40 in 4.52 and played for Coach John Sprague and the Riverview High School Rams...he was a teammate of Tim Alexander, current Beaver quarterback, in high school...SuperPrep Magazine listed Timmons No. 32 on its list of top 75 players in Florida...recruited by Colorado, Florida, Auburn, Arizona, Houston and OSU...in SuperPrep's preseason issue he was listed as the 14th top recruit in Florida...he caught 37 passes for 550 yards (14.9 avg.) and 12 touchdowns his junior year with Alexander passing...as a senior, Derrick caught 34 passes for 534 yards (15.7 avg.) and scored 5 touchdowns...he had over 287 yards in all-purpose yards in one game his senior year, catching passes, returning kickoffs and punts...as a senior, Derrick returned 30 punts for 540 yards and 1 touchdown and 40 kickoffs for 600 yards...Derrick was a second-team all-state selection as both a junior and senior...he was also an all-area choice as a junior and senior...he was named the MVP of the PAL Bowl (Police Athletic League) pitting players between Sarasota County and Manatee County following the regular season. "He will be an outstanding football player for OSU," said Coach Sprague. "He can block and he can catch the football. He has soft hands and a tremendous work ethic. Like Tim (Alexander), he will be a great player for OSU." He earned three letters in football and was a two-year starter for Riverview HS...he also earned two letters in basketball as a guard.

21-AARON WELLS, LB, 6-1, 235, Ganesha HS, Pomona, CA

Aaron was a three-year letterman and two-year starter for Coach Gary Norvell and Ganesha High School at inside linebacker and center...he started on offense as a junior and on defense as a senior...he was was a two-time all-league (Valle Vista League) pick, as a center his junior year and at ILB his senior year...he also was named first-team All-San Gabriel Valley by the Los Angeles Times and he was a first-team All-CIF selection for section 7...he is also a standout heavyweight wrestler and is currently 25-2 this year...he will earn three letters in wrestling...he will participate in track this spring...his older brother, Lynwood, is a wrestler at the Air Force Academy...he was recruited by Wyoming, Utah and OSU. "He plays hard on ever play and is a tremendous competitor," said Coach Norvell.

Jerry graduated from Jesuit High School, Dallas, Texas, in May, 1958. He graduated from University of Oklahoma With a B.A. in marketing/finance in May, 1963. Jerry later completed one year of law school at Oklahoma (1965-66).

MILITARY EXPERIENCE

Jerry joined the United States Army in 1963 and graduated from U.S. Artillery School at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. He then spent one year in Korea in the 7th Infantry Division and his final year (1964-65) was spent as a special services officer, 2nd Armored Division at Ft. Hood, Texas. Jerry was discharged in 1971 as a Captain from the U.S. Army 95th Infantry Reserve unit. While in the Army, Jerry was a player and coach of the U.S. Army, 7th Infantry Division championship football team that compiled a perfect 13-0 record.

COACHING EXPERIENCE

1962--Graduate assistant coach under Bud Wilkinson at University of Oklahoma on 8-3 team that appeared in the Orange Bowl.

1963-64--Player-coach of the U.S. Army, 7th Infantry Division championship football team that produced a perfect 13-0 record.

1965-70--Graduate assistant coach at Oklahoma under Gomer Jones (1965). Assistant freshman coach under Jim McKenzie (1966) and under Chuck Fairbanks four years (1967-70). Over six seasons, Oklahoma compiled a 41-23-2 record and made three bowl appearances.

1971--Recruiting coordinator and head freshman coach at Southern Methodist University under Coach Hayden Fry. Jerry's freshman team finished 2-2-1 and the Mustang varsity 4-7-0.

1971-78--Assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Oklahoma under Chuck Fairbanks one year (1971) and Barry Switzer six years (1972-78). During those seven seasons, Sooners compiled a 72-6-2 record, including two national championships, six Big Eight championships, and made four bowl appearances.

1979-81--Assistant coach (split ends) and recruiting coordinator at University of Nebraska under Tom Osborne. Over three seasons, the Cornhuskers compiled a 29-7 record and made three bowl appearances.

1982-84--Assistant head coach, wide receiver coach and recruiting coordinator at Texas A&M University under Jackie Sherrill. Texas A&M compiled a 16-16-1 record during his three seasons.

1984-90--Head football coach at Northern Illinois University. NIU, under Pettibone, compiled a 33-32-1 record in six seasons, but was 22-11 over the last three seasons, including a 16-1 record at home and a streak of 13 straight home victories when he left Northern Illinois.

1990-present--Named head football coach at Oregon State University, December 5, 1990. OSU recorded a 1-10-0 record during the 1991 season, Pettibone's first at Oregon State, a 1-9-1 mark in 1992, and a 4-7-0 record in 1993 and 1994.

PETTIBONE AT OKLAHOMA

* During his 14-year span at Oklahoma, Jerry became involved in the recruitment of 11 student-athletes who earned consensus All-America honors, including a Heisman Trophy winner, two Outland Trophy recipients and a Lombardi Award winner.

* Heisman Trophy winner at Oklahoma was Billy Sims, running back, in 1978 after rushing for 1,762 yards. The Outland Trophy winners were Lee Roy Selmon, defensive tackle, in 1975 and offensive guard Greg Roberts (1979). Lee Roy Selmon also won the Lombardi Award in 1975.

* One of Pettibone's early Oklahoma classes graduated 17 of 25 players into the National Football League.

* At Oklahoma, he was part of eight bowl games and was with two national championship teams in 1974 and 1975.

* He was part of seven Big Eight championship teams at Oklahoma.

PETTIBONE AT NEBRASKA

* Coached in three bowl games at Nebraska--Cotton Bowl in 1979, Sun Bowl in 1980 and Orange Bowl in 1981. Nebraska was Big Eight champs in 1981.

* As recruiting coordinator, he helped to recruit consensus All-Americans Irving Fryer (1983), running back Mike Rozier (1982-83), and center Mark Traynowicz (1984). Rozier won the Heisman Trophy in 1983 after rushing for 2,148 yards.

PETTIBONE AT TEXAS A&M

* Named as "**No. 1 Recruiter in America**" by Sports Illustrated in 1984.

* Pettibone's initial recruiting class at Texas A&M ranked first in the Southwest Conference and No. 5 in the nation. That class produced six Aggie starters the first year.

HISTORY AS AN ASSISTANT COACH

* In his career as an assistant coach, Jerry was with programs that participated in 11 major bowls and with teams that won eight Big Eight championships. As an assistant coach, teams he was with collectively produced a record of 168-64-3 (.721). He was with two national championship teams. Jerry helped to recruit 20 consensus All-Americans, two Heisman Trophy winners, two Outland Trophy winners and a Lombardi Award winner.

PETTIBONE AT NORTHERN ILLINOIS

* Northern Illinois defeated first Big Ten team (Wisconsin) in the history of the school in 1988.

* Northern Illinois recorded a 9-2 record to tie best-ever record in history of the school in 1989.

* Pettibone was named Coach of the Year for major Northern Independent schools by the Sporting News in 1989.

* NIU established four school records--(most points, 344; most touchdowns, 46; most rushing touchdowns, 40; and most possession time, 33:08)--and the Huskies were ranked among the top 25 in five different categories--6th in rushing (330.7 yards per game); 24th in total offense (409.2 yards per game); 17th in scoring 931.3 points per game; 5th in turnover margin (+1.36); and 1st in fewest turnovers in a year (12).

* NIU recorded its first-ever victory over a top 25 rated team when it downed Fresno State 73-18 in 1990. The Bulldogs were ranked 24th at the time.

* NIU set three school records--(most rushing yards, 3,791; most total offense, 4,661; and most rushing first downs, 180)--and was ranked in the top 25 in three NCAA categories--1st in rushing (344.6 yards per game); 16th in total offense (423.7 yards per game); and 22nd in scoring (30.3 points per game).

* NIU established 51 school records and 7 NCAA records during Jerry's final three years.

* NIU set four school records in 1990--team total offense, 4,661 yards; team rushing, 3,791 yards; team rushing first downs, 183; and home field winning streak, 13 (1988-90).

* Quarterback Stacey Robinson set 7 NCAA records during 1989 and '90 seasons. Robinson set NCAA marks for most single-game yards rushing, 308 (22 rushes) vs. Fresno State (1990); most yards rushing in one half, 287 vs. Fresno State (1990); most single-season rushing yardage by a QB, 1,443 (223 rushes, 1989); best single-season rushing average per game (11) by a QB, 131.2 (1989); most single-season rushing touchdowns by a QB, 19 (1989 & '90); most quarterback touchdowns over two consecutive seasons, 38 (19 & 19, 1989-90); and best career rushing average by a QB, 109.1 (2,727 yards in 15 games, 1988-90).

PETTIBONE AT OREGON STATE

* In his first season at Oregon State, Pettibone's Beavers closed the 1991 season with a 14-3 victory over arch-rival Oregon in the Civil War game at Eugene.

* Pettibone became only the fourth Oregon State coach in history to defeat Oregon in his first season as head coach. The other three were Dee Andros (1965), Kip Taylor (1949), and Guy Kennedy (1894).

* OSU established a single-game time possession record, controlling the football for 40:58 against California in 1991.

* Pettibone was appointed to the American Football Coaches Association's Ethics Committee in February 1992 by Executive Director Charles McClendon.

* Pettibone's Beavers defeated Oregon at Autzen Stadium for the second straight time in 1993. OSU set nine school records in 1993, including breaking the Beavers' season rushing record with 3,254 yards, an average of 295.8 yards per game. Other records included single-game rushing, 667 yards (vs. Pacific); most yards rushing in back-to-back games, 1,086 yards (Arizona State and Pacific); most times rushing season, 675; most first downs in game, 32 (Pacific); most first downs rushing in game, 31 (Pacific); most first downs in one half, 19 (Pacific); and most first downs rushing in season, 158.

* OSU finished second in the nation in rushing in 1993, just 30 yards in back of national champion Army. OSU averaged 295.8 yards per game on the ground.

* Pettibone was named co-runner-up for Division 1-A Coach of the Year honors by Sports Illustrated in 1993.

* OSU won its first Pacific-10 road game out of the state of Oregon under Pettibone when it defeated UCLA 23-14 at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena on October 15, 1994. It was also the Beavers' first ever victory in the Rose Bowl.

* OSU recorded its first victory over a ranked team under Pettibone when it defeated Washington State (ranked 22nd) by 21-3 at Parker Stadium on November 12, 1994.

JERRY PETTIBONE HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

Jerry Pettibone, 55, is the 25th head coach in the 100-year history of Oregon State football. He was named the 25th head football coach on December 5, 1990, after a successful six-year stint as the head coach at Northern Illinois University.

Pettibone inherited an OSU program that was down in every aspect. However, in four short years he has made dramatic progress and has transformed the Beavers into a very competitive Pacific-10 Conference football team.

If you just look at the won-loss record (1-10-0), Pettibone's initial year with OSU was a tough season. However, Pettibone established the ground work for the making of a solid program and the Beavers finished the 1991 season on a very positive note, defeating arch-rival Oregon 14-3. Pettibone became only the fourth OSU coach in history to defeat Oregon in his first season as head coach.

Pettibone's Beavers produced a 1-9-1 record in 1992, but OSU was much more competitive than the previous year and was close to pulling off victories in four other games--Arizona State, Stanford, UCLA and Oregon.

In 1993, the Beavers finished 4-7-0 and were just 14 points away from being 7-4. In addition, OSU established nine school records and finished second in the nation in rushing, just 30 yards behind Army, the national rushing champion.

The Beavers finished 4-7-0 again in 1994 and seemed to be just an eyelash away from producing a winning season. OSU had a chance to pull off victories in the fourth quarter against USC, Stanford, Washington and Oregon and came up short. The Beavers did, however, record their first victory over a ranked team under Pettibone when OSU downed Washington State 21-3. The Beavers also recorded their first ever victory in the Rose Bowl when it downed UCLA 23-14.

Prior to taking his first major college head coaching job at Northern Illinois, Pettibone was an assistant coach on highly-successful programs at Oklahoma, where he was a member of two national championship teams. In addition, he was an assistant coach at SMU, Nebraska and Texas A&M.

Pettibone spent six seasons as head football coach at Northern Illinois, a Division 1-A independent located in DeKalb, Illinois.

Pettibone built an impressive program at NIU after taking over as the Huskie's head coach in 1985. Pettibone's teams produced a record of 33-32-1 over six years, including a mark of 22-11 over his final three years (1988-89-90) at the NIU helm.

During that three-year span the Huskie's produced 13 straight wins at home and a 16-1 overall home mark. In 1989, NIU finished 9-2, which tied the record for the best season in school history, and Pettibone was named by the Sporting News as Coach of the Year for major Northern Independent schools.

Pettibone's 1990 Huskie team finished the season ranked number one in the nation for rushing offense, averaging 344.6 yards per contest. Jerry left NIU as the third-winningest coach in that school's history.

NIU collected the first victory over a Big Ten team in the school's history in 1988. As mentioned, the Huskie's 9-2 record in 1989 tied the best mark in Northern Illinois history and the 6-5 mark in 1990 included the school's first-ever victory over a team ranked in the top 25, and that was a 73-18 thumping of Fresno State, and the Bulldogs were undefeated (5-0) at the time and ranked 24th in the nation by AP.

Pettibone has a rich football background, starting with earning Catholic All-State honors as a running back on the state championship football team at Jesuit High School in Dallas, Texas, in 1956 and 1957.

After graduating from Jesuit High School, Pettibone went on to earn one letter as a running back at Oklahoma under Bud Wilkinson and the Sooners were Big Eight champions in 1959, his sophomore season.

Pettibone got his coaching start in 1962 at his alma mater, serving as a graduate assistant under Wilkinson as Oklahoma went 8-3 and appeared in the Orange Bowl.

Following his one-year stint as a graduate assistant at Oklahoma, Pettibone entered the United States Army (1963-64). During his tour of duty he was a player and coach of the U.S. Army, 7th Infantry Division championship football team that produced a perfect 13-0 record. He was discharged as a Captain.

After his military stint, Pettibone once again returned to Oklahoma where he spent the next six years (1965-70). The first year he was a graduate assistant under Gomer Jones. In 1966, Jerry was assistant freshman coach under Jim McKenzie, and for the next four years (1967-70) he was assistant freshman coach under Chuck Fairbanks. The Sooners compiled a 41-23-2 record and made three bowl appearances during his second stint on the Oklahoma staff.

In 1971, Pettibone moved to Southern Methodist University as the recruiting coordinator and head freshman coach under Hayden Fry. Pettibone's freshman squad was 2-2-1, while the Mustangs' varsity was 4-7-0.

Following one season at SMU, Pettibone once again returned to his alma mater, Oklahoma. Jerry returned as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator under Chuck Fairbanks for one year and Barry Switzer for six years. During those seven seasons the Sooners compiled a 72-6-2 record, including two national championships, six Big Eight championships, and made four bowl appearances.

Pettibone left Oklahoma in 1979 to join the program at arch-rival Nebraska under Tom Osborne. At Nebraska, Jerry was the split end coach and recruiting coordinator for three seasons. During that span (1979-81) the Cornhuskers compiled a 29-7 record and made three bowl appearances.

Pettibone moved to Texas A&M University in 1982 to work under Jackie Sherrill for the next three years (1982-84). Jerry served as assistant head coach, wide receiver coach and recruiting coordinator. During Pettibone's three seasons at Texas A&M the Aggies were 16-16-1. In 1984, Pettibone was named as "**No. 1 Recruiter in America**" by Sports Illustrated.

During his outstanding career as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator, Pettibone was involved in the recruitment of 20 student-athletes who earned All-America honors, including two Heisman Trophy winners, two Outland Trophy recipients and a Lombardi Award winner. While at Oklahoma, he helped recruit 11 consensus All-Americans, including middle guard Dewey Selmon (1975), defensive tackle Lee Roy Selmon (1975), offensive guard Greg Roberts (1978) and halfback Billy Sims (1978-79). Sims won the Heisman in 1978, while Lee Roy Selmon won the Outland and Lombardi Award in 1975, and Roberts took the Outland in 1979.

At Nebraska, Pettibone was involved with the recruitment of such All-Americans as wide receiver Irving Fryar (1983), running back Mike Rozier (1982-83) and center Mark Traynowicz (1984). Rozier won the Heisman in 1983.

Jerry was hired as head coach at Northern Illinois following the 1984 season at Texas A&M, the position he held for six years prior to taking over as the 25th head coach in Oregon State history, which dates back to 1893.

Pettibone's Northern Illinois team produced some outstanding marks during the 1990 season. The Huskie's were ranked No. 1 in the nation in rushing (344.6 yards per game); 16th in the nation in total offense (423.7 yards per game) and 22nd in scoring (30.3 points a game).

NIU also established several school records in 1990, most rushing yards in a season (3,791); most total offense in a season (4,661); and most first downs in a season (180).

Pettibone's 1989 Huskie team also established four school records and high NCAA ranking in several departments. NIU was sixth in the nation in rushing (330.7 yards per game); 24th in total offense (409.2 yards per game); 17th in scoring (31.3 points per game); fifth in turnover margin (+1.36) and first in fewest turnovers in a season (12). School records in 1989 included most points (344); most touchdowns 946; most rushing touchdowns (40) and most possession time (33.08 minutes per game).

During Pettibone's tenure at NIU the Huskies established 51 school records and seven NCAA marks, including seven by NIU's senior quarterback, Stacey Robinson.

Robinson averaged 112.5 yards rushing per game, 10th best in the nation, and was the Division 1-A scoring leader with 19 touchdowns and 120 total points.

The Huskie's rushed for 733 yards and Robinson ran for five touchdowns when NIU thrashed Fresno State 73-18 on October 6. In February 1992, Pettibone was appointed to the Ethics Committee of the American Football Coaches Association by Executive Director Charles McClendon.

Following the 1993 season, Pettibone was named co-runner-up for Division 1-A Coach of the Year honors by Sports Illustrated. Pettibone is married to the former Susy Haskin and the couple has one daughter, Shanda, 17.

Close, but not close enough

CORVALLIS — This year's Oregon State football team was just good enough to drive coach Jerry Pettibone crazy.

"I've never been through a season like this as a head coach, where we were in every football game, and we were so close to winning so many games that we didn't win," he said.

"It caused a high level of frustration and anxiety on our coaching staff and on our football team. That's the first time I've been through that."

The Beavers wrapped up a 4-7 season with a 17-13 Civil War loss to 12th-ranked Oregon last Saturday, putting their fans through another

unpleasant experience with déjà vu when Don Shanklin's fourth-down pass from the Ducks' 21-yard line sailed incomplete.

In four of its last seven games, OSU was driving late in the fourth quarter for the tying or go-ahead touchdown. The Beavers lost all four.

In their season opener at Arizona State, the Beavers took a 16-15 lead with 9:43 left and couldn't hold it, losing 22-16.

"It was a new experience for me to deal with the continual frustration throughout the year," Pettibone said. "It made me appreciate the quality of our coaching staff and how hard they worked at keeping the team focused, working hard and continuing to get better."

If the Beavers could have turned two of those five narrow losses into victories, they would have had their first winning season since 1970.

"I hope you will see a more consistent football team," Pettibone said, looking ahead to 1995. "One that will not make as many errors as we did in critical times — the penalties and things that hurt us, especially in the last part of the season."

When Pettibone came to OSU from Northern Illinois after the 1990 season, he asked for fans to give him five seasons to turn the team around. Next season will be the determining No. 5.

"The next step obviously is that we not only are competitive, but we win more games," Pettibone said. "That is a natural thing for us to evolve to next year."

To do it, the Beavers must plug some huge holes in their spread-option offense, starting with left halfback J.J. Young.

Young leaves as OSU's fourth-leading career rusher. He ran for 2,083 yards in what amounted to two healthy seasons. He finished 72 yards behind No. 3 Bill Enyart and had 131 fewer carries.

1995 will mark fifth season of Pettibone's five-year plan

Also gone will be three key members of the offensive line — center Johnny Feinga, tackle John Garrett and guard Starling Latu — that cleared the way for a rushing game that probably will finish the season No. 5 in the country.

On defense, OSU will say goodbye to five starters — defensive end Packy Ena, linebackers Cory Huot and Rico Pettrini, and defensive backs William Ephraim and Michael Hale. Pettrini led the Beavers in tackles.

"We need to fill those spots with quality players who can get the job done," Pettibone said.

The Beavers probably will fill the vacancies with players already within the program, although OSU's coaches will look for immediate junior college help at center, cornerback and the defensive line.

Expect the competition at quarterback to heat up in spring practice. Shanklin started 10 games and was the Beavers' second-leading rusher, but he might have his hands full holding off freshman Tim Alexander, a high school All-American from Sarasota, Fla.

Alexander made a dazzling college debut against USC, running for 117 yards and completing two passes before leaving with a broken collarbone.

The NCAA will grant Alexander a hardship eligibility waiver, giving him his freshman year back. He might be too good to keep off the field.

Rahim Muhammad, who started five games as a freshman and started and won the Wyoming game this season, will get a look. So will sophomore Adrian Woodson, a redshirt this year.

Woodson has a lot of tools. If he can't beat out Alexander or Shanklin, look for him to turn up somewhere else, say, the secondary.

Pettibone said his best quarterback coming out of spring will start, no matter who that is.

"That's competition," he said. "That's what spring practice is all about. You go out in the spring and you compete to see who the best football player is. We're going to have a lot of competition at quarterback, and that's good."

The competition for Young's spot should get interesting, too. Seniors Shayzar Hawkins and Mark Olford are obvious candidates. But keep an eye out for redshirt freshman DeShawn Williams. He has big-time potential.

"There will be competition on the offensive line," Pettibone said, "and, really, on just about every position on the team, there will be a lot of competition."

OSU has some good players returning on offense, including fullbacks J.D. Stewart and Sedrick Thomas, halfback Cameron Reynolds and offensive linemen Darin Borter and Tim Camp.

Defensive tackle Tom Holmes became almost impossible to block

one-on-one in the second half of the

season. Linebacker Kane Rogers led OSU with seven sacks. Reggie Tongue intercepted five passes, returning three for touchdowns.

Among the Beavers' four wins this season was a 21-3 victory over Washington State, then No. 24 in the country. It was the Beavers' first win over a ranked team in Pettibone's tenure.

"That was a big hurdle," Pettibone said.

So was the Beavers' 23-14 win over UCLA in the Rose Bowl, the first time they had beaten the Bruins on the road since 1971.

"We were competitive, week in, week out," Pettibone said. "We got down to Stanford 21-0, came back to

tie the game and had a chance to win it. We could play the way we did, week after week, after disappointing losses and still be able to go out and play at level where we had a chance to win. That was a good thing."

This year, as frustrating as it sometimes was, that was enough. Next year, it won't be.

OSU progressed in 'frustrating' fall

The final drive in the final quarter of the final game neatly epitomized the 1994 Oregon State football season.

The Beavers came up 21 yards short of the winning touchdown in the Civil War game against Oregon. They lost 17-13, completing a cycle of frustration that began on opening night at Arizona State three months before.

Every Saturday the Beavers were competitive, as coach Jerry Pettibone promised they would be before the year began. They took the next step.

But most Saturdays, errors on three or four plays derailed them and doomed OSU to its 24th consecutive losing season.

OSU was better. In 1993 the Beavers needed to play near-perfect games to be competitive; this year they stayed close despite a plethora of errors.

But the bottom line — 4-7 overall, 2-6 in the Pac-10 — remained unchanged from 1993.

Pettibone had hoped OSU could skip a step in the rebuilding process and win seven or eight games in 1994. In retrospect, though, he sees that was too much to ask for.

"Even though it was a painful and frustrating experience, I think it was a necessary step to go through," he explained.

"Hopefully as a result of being (close) the number of times we were this year, we can understand how much harder we need to work, how much more we need to improve to gain the confidence to deal with that successfully next year."

In five of their seven losses, the Beavers were driving for the go-ahead or tying TD late in the fourth quarter. Each

our quality of play or how much more competitive we have become.

■ It was in every game except two until the final minutes. It played hard week after week, despite the potentially dispiriting losses that plagued them throughout.

"I feel like we've gotten better," Pettibone said.

"We've been able to show (improvement) each year, either with our record,

Now the Beavers must take another step forward, in off-season recruiting and spring football, and continue to build in preparation for the Sept. 2, 1995 opener with Idaho at Parker Stadium.

To succeed on that day and beyond, the Beavers must eliminate the numerous screwups that frequently sidetracked their offense in 1994.

They must diversify that offense somewhat by improving a passing game that remained last in the NCAA even though it nearly doubled its yardage from the previous season.

They must continue the steady defensive improvement that has seen them chop their points-allowed from 365 to 363 to 294 to 239 over the past four seasons.

And they must locate replacements for their leading rusher, three solid offensive linemen and standouts from the linebacking and secondary corps.

Most of the departing seniors were three-or four-year starters.

Gone will be:

■ **Halfback** J.J. Young, who gained almost 2,000 yards the past two seasons.

Look for seniors Mark Olford and Shayzar Hawkins, or red-shirted freshman DeShawn Williams to step in there. ■ **Center** Johnny Feinga, guard Starling Latu and tackle John Garrett, and backup center Adam Thomas.

Brad Thompson moves up at guard, possibly Phil Lafler or Tom Huthoefer at tackle and perhaps a junior-college transfer at

center. The Beavers believe they've recruited well and built some quality depth at offensive line the past several years. Next season will determine if that's true or not.

■ **Linebackers** Rico Petrini and Cory Huot, two experienced players who doubled as emotional leaders over their careers.

Look for Nathan McAtee, John Fairback, Bryan Ludwig, Ron Jones and Anthony Murray to fill in there.

■ **Four-year starters** Michael Hale and William Ephraim, and backup John Weisner, leave the secondary.

OSU will be decidedly younger there in 1995 but potentially better.

The search to determine who goes where will begin in spring practice. It should be highlighted by a spirited battle at quarterback.

Holdover starter Don Shanklin returns, as do reliable backup Rahim Muhammad, freshman phenom Tim Alexander and Adrian Woodson, who showed promise at a freshman in 1993 and did an excellent job on the scout team as a redshirt this past fall.

Shanklin has the early edge, but Alexander may prove too talented to sit for long. Woodson is an outstanding athlete as well; it's not unlikely he could join fellow ex-QB Larry Bumpus in the secondary come next August.

There will be battles at fullback, the offensive line and on defense as well.

"Competition is what spring practice is all about," Pettibone said. "You go out and compete and see who the best player is."

How happy was Oregon State coach Jerry Pettibone with the haul he made on Wednesday, college football letter-of-intent day?

Happy enough that Pettibone decided not to offer a scholarship to Albert Wright, the highly recruited running back from Haines City, Fla., who wants to come to OSU.

Haines has a 4.4-second, 40-yard time and enough tools that SuperPrep mag-

azine ranked him the No. 40 prospect in Florida. Haines, also recruited by Miami, Florida, Florida State, Syracuse and Tennessee, orally committed to OSU.

But Pettibone doesn't like his transcript.

"He still wants to come to Oregon State," Pettibone said. "But he's not in the kind of shape we want him to be academically, and we're going to use it as a motivation for him to improve his academic status further."

Which means, the Beavers might come back to Wright, if he bears down

That says something about the kind of confidence Pettibone has in the 26 players the Beavers signed Wednesday in a recruiting sweep that ranged from Minnesota to Louisiana, from Florida to Hawaii.

OSU has only 22 scholarships to offer. But not all of Wednesday's signees have met the minimum freshman eligibility stan-

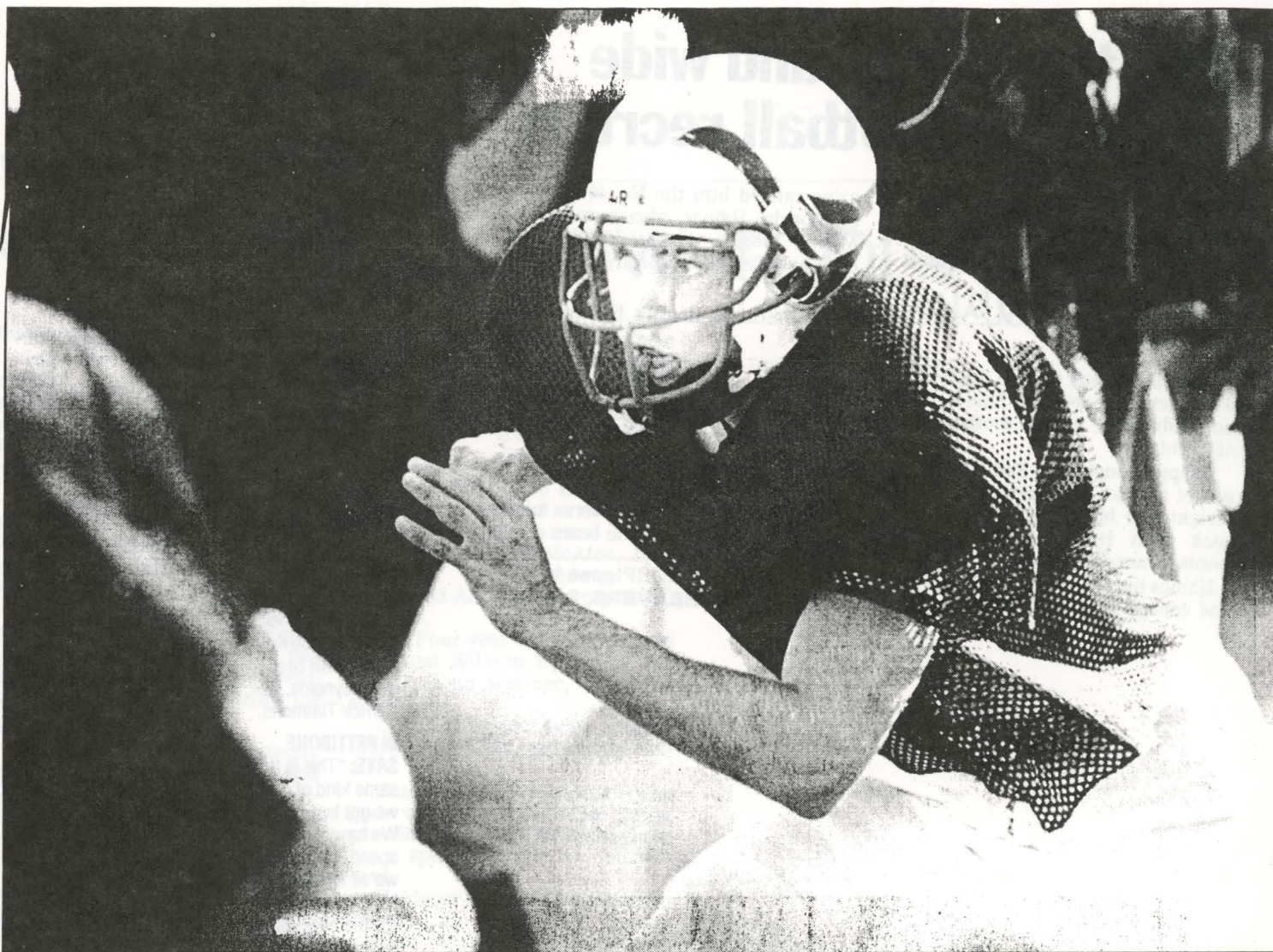
dards, and some players might wait until January to enroll. Those players would count against next year's limit.

The Beavers' top recruit probably is running back Derrick Poole, a 6-foot, 200-pound slasher from Las Vegas who was a first-team All-America selection by SuperPrep and Bluechip Illustrated.

Poole, who waved off an offer from UCLA, has been clocked at 4.5 in the 40 and has the kind of frame that could carry 220 to 230 pounds. The Beavers have him penciled in at fullback, but he might be an impact player at linebacker if they decide to use him on defense.

Poole hails from Western High School, the alma mater of OSU kicker Randy Lund.

"Randy gave us a real tie with him," Pettibone said. "Randy's father is the school principal. I think the youngster was real comfortable knowing there was a friend of his here at Oregon State."

OSU pulled six players out of Texas, including two option quarterbacks and Cobbe Davis, a blisteringly fast halfback/wide receiver from Humble, who has been timed at 10.4 seconds in the 100 meters in track.

SuperPrep ranked Davis No. 68 in Texas. At 5-10, 178, he's little, but that didn't stop schools such as Arkansas, Texas A&M, Oklahoma, Michigan and Miami from courting him.

OSU plucked wide receiver Derrick Timmons out of Riverview High School in Sarasota, Fla. Timmons is a high school teammate of OSU quarterback Tim Alexander. SuperPrep had him ranked No. 32 in Florida, and Timmons spurned Auburn, Arizona and Colorado for Corvallis.

For as far and wide as the Beavers

cast their net, Pettibone was happiest with what they did in their own backyard.

OSU signed four Oregon players, including the state's two best running back prospects, Mat Davis of North Medford and Brandon Reynolds of Lakeridge, and all-everything, 245-pound lineman Joe Kuykendall of Bend.

"We offered five scholarships in-state, and we got four of the five we offered on," said Pettibone, who lost Lebanon running back Ned Stearns. Stearns said he will sign with Brigham Young.

Davis ran a 10.8 100 meters in track last year. SuperPrep's preseason issue named him the No. 1 prospect in the Northwest, before a pulled hamstring limited him to four games. He had five touchdown runs of 50 yards or longer as a junior.

Reynolds, younger brother of OSU halfback Cameron Reynolds, was named first-team All-America by Bluechip Illustrated. He averaged 7.2 yards per carry last fall.

The rangy Kuykendall was another first-team, All-America selection by Bluechip Illustrated. He had offers to visit Arizona, Arizona State, California, Oregon and Washington State.

Aaron Koch, a ready-made 6-4, 265-pound offensive lineman from McNary High of Keizer, also signed with the Beavers.

"We offered three of those kids — Aaron Koch, Mat Davis and Brandon Reynolds — scholarships at the spring game last spring," Pettibone said. "We had worked real hard, looked at a lot of juniors on film and

felt strongly that those three kids were the top three in the state.

"Brandon accepted our offer right before the season. Mat Davis committed to me three or four weeks before the season ended. Aaron Koch committed to me in the locker room after the Civil War. We offered on Kuykendall early, right before the season, and he committed on the first recruiting weekend in December."

OSU will bring in five junior college players, including highly regarded, 6-6, 265-pound defensive end Troy Antee from Cerritos College in Norwalk, Calif.

"They all fill immediate needs," Pettibone said, "and they'll all be here for spring practice."

OSU's Tongue hopes to beat odds 1 more time

As a kid in Maryland, he pretended to be Tony Dorsett or Marcus Allen. Reggie Tongue's favorite team was the Cowboys, an unpopular choice in an area that lives and dies with the Washington Redskins.

"That's why I started cheering for individual players, not teams," he recalled, laughing.

His allegiances didn't change as a teenager when his family moved to Fort Wainwright, Alaska, just outside of Fairbanks.

Tongue starred for the Lathrop High Malamutes on Saturdays, and then spent Sundays and Monday nights watching NFL games on TV with his dad, Gregory Dominique.

He still pulled for the Cowboys and cheered for Allen.

As an Oregon State redshirt fresh-

man, he broke into the starting lineup at left cornerback and started seven games. He was second on the team in defensive points as season-long starter in 1993, and is a candidate for post-season honors as a junior this fall.

And as a 23-year-old in 1996, the personable Tongue might get the chance to play with the Cowboys. Maybe he'll even tackle Allen, the ageless wonder now with the Kansas City Chiefs.

Sound far-fetched?

Perhaps.

But Tongue's life is proof that

strange things can happen, and that sometimes dreams can come true.

After all, how many other NCAA Division I-A college football players got their big break and turned their lives in the right direction by moving from Maryland to Fairbanks?

How many Alaskans get the chance to play college football in the Pac-10, one of the finest conferences in the nation?

And how many college players from anywhere get a shot at the pros, period?

Not many.

Tongue candidly describes his chances as "slim." So he takes his schoolwork seriously, and is on track to graduate two years from now with a communications degree.

But if the pros call in 1996, he'll certainly answer.

"I'd love to play," he said after a recent practice, speaking between bites of a vanilla ice-cream cone. "But I have a long

way to go right now.

"And with me, if I try to think that far ahead of myself I tend to forget about what I have to do to get there.

"I'm trying not to think about it at all, and do my job now. If I do that well, things will fall into place."

Yet the 1990 Alaska Gatorade Player of the Year/Alaska Interior Player of the Year can't help but believe it's possible.

If his life wasn't proof enough, the saga of former teammate Herschel Currie stands as dramatic evidence that anything can happen.

If Currie — a 28-year-old who never played high school football — can sign as a free agent and get his shot in the National Football League, so might Tongue.

Currie's NFL dream ended this past Monday, when he was waived by the San Diego Chargers. He's no longer a pro but he remains an inspiration to Tongue, an example to emulate.

"Definitely. Herschel always

told us we were going to go somewhere," Tongue said. "When he signed we could see how much more possible it was.

"We all saw how hard he worked and we know we have to work even harder because (a pro opportunity) wasn't going to come without it.

"It made it all seem more realistic."

Tongue odds of sticking with the pros are better than Currie's, who didn't begin organized football until he was 24 years of age.

"Reggie played running back and defensive back in high school, and will have played four years of defensive back in high school," said OSU defensive coordinator/pro scout liaison Rocky Long.

"His understanding of football, and his experience, will give him

an added advantage Herschel didn't have.

"He meets their criteria. He's got the necessary size and speed they're looking for. I think Reggie could be a (pro) cornerback."

Long isn't merely playing lip service to one of his players; he knows what he's talking about.

He was an all-star defensive back for the British Columbia Lions of the Canadian Football League for five seasons, sandwiched around a stint with the USFL's Detroit Wheels, and subsequently was named to the Lions' all-time team in 1977. Long also coached in the CFL for 2½ years before returning stateside to the college game in 1988.

"Reggie should get a chance. I know he can play in Canada," Long said.

once the ball was safely in his arms, "I wasn't breathing — I just ran," Tongue said. He ran it in all the way for a touchdown.

His three-interception, two-touchdown performance equaled an effort by Paul Snider in a 1926 game against Gonzaga, and Tongue's 103 return yards broke a record held by the same man from the same game. But he wasn't about to start comparing himself to Deion Sanders or Paul Snider.

"It wasn't my excellent one-on-one coverage or anything," Tongue said. "The coaches just happened to put me in the right place at the right time. Anyone could have done it."

Well, of course. While Tongue was clearly positioning himself for the 1994 All-Modesty Team, he did have a point. The Beavers' defense was not as sterling as they would have hoped — both teams scored early and often.

CORVALLIS — It was almost pure accident that Reggie Tongue intercepted three passes, ran two back for touchdowns, and broke a school record set 68 years ago. He certainly wasn't about to take credit.

"I don't think I played that well," he said.

That was almost the first thing he said after the Beavers' 44-31 win over Wyoming. A win that was sealed when free safety Tongue intercepted a Cowboys pass and ran it back for a touchdown. Oregon State coach Jerry Pet-

bone called it "the play of the game."

It wasn't anything of which Tongue was all that proud, because he was had been beaten — outrun by the receiver he was supposed to be covering, he said. But the Cowboys quarterback threw too short and "I just reached out and happened to catch it," he said. And then just happened to run it in. And so the Beavers just happened to win their home opener and first game of the season.

It was something like that second interception, the one Tongue had in the first quarter.

"I was too shallow in my zone," he said. But somehow, some way the ball came near him and, "Luckily, it stuck on my hand."

The only interception he didn't get because he was not playing defense properly was the first one. And he got that one only because they'd practiced that same play over and over. The scouts did their job and his coaches knew exactly what would happen. Initially, Tongue, you see, kept going too long, kept messing up. But OSU defensive coordinator Rocky Long set him straight.

"He'd smack me on the helmet and say, 'Stay where you're at — don't move!'" Tongue said. In the heat of play, he remembered those instructions, and that's why he was in the right place when that pass came floating toward him.

He was thinking only one thing: "Catch it, just catch it. Don't worry about scoring." He'd dropped a ball in last week's game, and didn't want to make that mistake again, no sir. But

During halftime, when the teams were tied at 21, Tongue admitted Long and defensive captain William Ephraim did have a word or two to say about the defense's mistakes. There weren't any verbatim quotes that could be printed here, but it's safe to say simple, direct language was employed.

"It was pretty bad," Tongue said. "The players didn't argue. 'They were right,' Tongue said. 'They were right.'"

There's apparently no swagger in the man. After the game he spoke softly and quietly to reporters, answering the same questions over and over, politely, smiling here and there at times when it wouldn't seem too, you know, audacious.

Talking to so many reporters was something new, but scoring touchdowns is not a novel experience for Tongue. He was a running back in high school, and even last season, in a game against Wyoming, he intercepted a pass in the fourth quarter and ran it back for a game-clinching touchdown. Not that Tongue would admit he had the Cowboys figured out or anything. It was just another happy accident.

"They were different quarters," Tongue said. In the Beavers' media guide, Tongue says his favorite book is "White Fang," which is probably appropriate for someone who grew up in Alaska. But that's not its main attraction.

"It's probably the only book I've actually read all the way through," he said, laughing. "But it's a good story. I kind of related to the dog — growing up, getting beat up and standing up for yourself at the end."

White Fang's writer, Jack London, referred to the book as "The Call of the Tame" because the plot was a flip-flop of his earlier work, Call of the Wild. White Fang is a wolf who is captured and learns to work with other arctic dogs on a team, pulling a sled.

As you can imagine, White Fang is a very capable, proud character. But there was no swagger in him.

Pac-10 honors Tongue

Some people just can't be satisfied. He'd been Pacific-10 Conference defensive player of the week for less than a day, and already Oregon State football boosters wanted more from Reggie Tongue.

"How many passes are you going to intercept Saturday?" at Fresno State, a fan asked Tongue at Monday's Beaver Huddle, seemingly not satisfied with the three interceptions and two TD runbacks Tongue had in this past Saturday's 44-31 win over Wyoming at Parker Stadium.

The question was definitely tongue-in-cheek, if you'll pardon the pun. And when the laughter subsided, OSU's modest junior free safety had the right answer for anyone wondering if his helmet size had expanded in the past two days.

"I really have no idea," Tongue replied. "I hope to have a good day, but the reason I did have the interceptions is like coach (Jerry) Pettibone said: Everybody else was doing their job and I just made plays off of them."

"Hopefully I can have another big day on Saturday, if I do my job and everybody else does theirs, too."

Tongue received the honor — and lengthy exposure during the college football highlights portion of ESPN's SportsCenter on Sunday night — for his record-setting effort against the Cowboys.

He had a personal-best 52 defensive points, set a school record for interception return yardage (103) and tied the school and Pac-10 marks by running two of his three thefts back for TDs on plays covering 46 and 36 yards.

He's OSU first conference defensive player of the week since Rico Petrini was picked for the 1991 Civil War game.

Also, on Sunday he was named Athlon Publications' Inside Saturday Magazine defensive player of the week.

Pettibone said Tongue was absolutely correct in saying that the steals resulted from a team effort.

"But what Reggie didn't say is, once he got ahold of the ball, he made something happen," he added.

Tongue was clearly embarrassed by the loud ovations he received when his honor was announced, first to the overflow crowd at the Valley Football Center and then to boosters at a Portland Beaver Huddle listening in through a speakerphone conference call.

"I didn't feel real comfortable up here today," he admitted afterwards, smiling.

He wasn't as uneasy about receiving the award, which he called the best of the many citations he's earned in organized football.

"This is something to be proud of," he said. "I'm happy I got it, because it's good for the school, good for the players and good for everybody, not just for me."

The hard part now is letting go.

"It was the most exhilarating game I've ever played in. Now I have to put it behind me, and concentrate on Fresno State this week."

"I made some huge plays but could have played better. Everybody else played so well, and made me look so much better. I might not make as many big plays this Saturday, but I definitely can play better."

The Pac-10 also honored Washington tailback Napoleon Kaufman as its offensive player of the week and Husky place-kicker John Wales as its special teams player of the week for their performances in a 25-16 win over Ohio State.



The Wait of the World

Now that Don Shanklin is finally ready to play, it seems like years ago that he was Oregon State's quarterback of the future. It was

CORVALLIS — Don Shanklin isn't Oregon State's quarterback of the future anymore.

For Shanklin, the future has arrived. Finally.

The 5-foot-11, 194-pound sophomore will be at the controls of the Beavers' spread-option offense Saturday when OSU squares off with Arizona State in Sun Devils Stadium.

The OSU coaches have been waiting for this since the winter of 1991. If it's been a long, hard 3½ years for them, imagine how Shanklin feels.

"I felt this day would happen if I could ever stay healthy," Shanklin said. "I feel I've worked really hard. I think I deserve it."

If nothing else, Shanklin deserves a medal for perseverance. Misfortune keeps blindsiding him like a blitzing linebacker.

Someone with a little less fortitude might be back in Amarillo, Texas, commiserating about his bad luck with his high school buddies. But Shanklin hasn't yet met the hit he can't get up from.

"He's had a lot of adversity in his life," OSU coach Jerry Pettibone said. "From what I've seen, if a guy with character has adversity, he'll respond to it. Don has character."

That and plenty of talent. Shanklin was Pettibone's first marquee recruit, a big-time Texas high school football star with the speed and the passing arm to make the spread-option go.

In fact, Shanklin had everything Pettibone could want, everything but a college board test score that met the NCAA eligibility minimum.

He took the test, retook it and finally chose to sit out a year rather than pick up his football career on the junior college level.

"I don't think those tests should be

the definitive factor about whether somebody gets to go to school," Shanklin said. "Tests don't indicate whether you can do college-level learning."

Shanklin moved from Amarillo to Corvallis, paid the rent by working at a plant that manufactures security alarms and kept prepping for his college boards. It wasn't easy.

"That was the most difficult time," he said. "It was hard going to work while everybody else was practicing. I would say to myself, 'I should be out there.'"

Instead, he kept punching the time clock and hitting the books. In the spring of 1992, Shanklin finally passed the ACT test. In the fall, he entered school as a first-year freshman, pulled on football pads and began to scrape away nearly two years of accumulated rust.

"Coming out of high school, I was in a groove," he said. "Football was ingrained then. It took a while to get it back, to get used to being out there running in practice."

"I think that's why my learning was so slow. I had to pull things out from deep down."

It took half a season. The Beavers played Shanklin briefly against Washington State and Arizona State and were preparing to widen his role when a knee injury in practice shelved him for the rest of the season.

"That made me sick," Pettibone said, "because I knew that was going to keep him from getting the game action that he really needed to make progress."

Shanklin underwent arthroscopic surgery bore down in the weight room and entered last season No. 2 on the depth chart. He showed flashes of brilliance against Washington State and Arizona, then started against Arizona State in the fifth week of the season.

He was as good advertised, maybe better. He rushed for 117 yards, completed all five pass attempts and scored twice while leading OSU to a 30-14 rout of the Sun Devils.

It also was too good to be true. He sprained his left foot in the fourth quarter, and the injury stubbornly refused to heal. Shanklin never played another minute.

"I kept hoping I could just go out play with the pain," Shanklin said. "But I couldn't, and the pain stayed there for a long while. I could run straight, but I couldn't cut from side to side."

"That was really a difficult time. I would see a lot of things happening in games and I would wonder what would happen if I was in there. You can say, 'What if?' forever. And you never know."

"Something like that happening would tear anybody apart."

Somehow, Shanklin held together. He rehabilitated ferociously. He kept coming to practice. And he kept pulling for his friend, Rahim Muhammad, who inherited the No. 1 quarterback job.

"Don has always had a sense of hope and expectation," offensive coordinator Mike Summers said. "One of the most poignant images of last year was after Rahim scored the two-point play at Oregon, (and) the first guy to greet him with a giant bear hug on the sideline was Don Shanklin."

"I think that tells you where his character is and his heart is."

OSU successfully petitioned the NCAA to get Shanklin a hardship waiver for last season. So now he has three full seasons of disappointment, injury and unrealized potential behind him. But he still has three to play.

At long last, Shanklin's time has come. Now the quarterback of the future is first-year freshman Tim Alexander. Shanklin is, simply, the quarterback.

Summers says something magical could happen Saturday in Sun Devils Stadium when his first-string quarterback sets out to show conclusively that what happened to ASU last year was no fluke.

"He has something to prove," OSU's offensive coordinator said.

"He came in here with an awful lot of expectations. He is the kind of guy with a lot of pride. I think he wants to prove that the things that were said positively about him are true, that he is the type of quarterback who can come in here and direct a winning football team."

There are some nagging doubts. For a guy who graduated from high school in 1991, he has taken precious few live snaps.

"He hasn't had to take a football team down the field under fire at the end of a game in a two-minute drill," quarterbacks coach Jay Schaake said. "He does do a great job in practice."

"He hasn't had the opportunity to bring a football team back in the second half to a win. He's had the opportunity to jump out ahead of somebody and stay in front."

"He just hasn't seen enough of those situations that can happen in a game. My concerns are more game-management things than execution."

About his execution of the offense, from his ability to read and run the triple option to his ability to hit an open receiver, there are no doubts on the coaching staff.

"He has a much better handle on the offense today than he did when he played against Arizona State last year," Schaake said. "He has a much better and broader understanding of what we're trying to do. That can only help you, because confidence comes from knowing."

There is a certain swagger to a quarterback who masters this offense, at its heart the wishbone triple-option.

Because he knows that if the talent levels on offense and defense are

evenly matched and the play is run correctly, it can't be stopped. Anything the defense takes away leaves something else wide open.

It's taken nearly four years to assemble the pieces, step by step, play by play, player by player.

Now, with Shanklin under center, the most important piece is in place.

"In a lot of ways, what's happened to Don Shanklin has happened to Oregon State football," Summers said. "There are have been a lot of times when this program has gotten close to being good, then taken a hit and fallen right back down to the bottom."

"The lesson is to just keep overcoming the things that get in your way."

Shanklin is back on his feet. Maybe after this season, the Beavers will be, too.

Quarterback Don Shanklin received the Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Week award on Monday.

Some of the guys who helped the Oregon State sophomore merit that honor earned a complimentary lunch and sustained ovation from an overflow crowd of boosters at Beaver Huddle.

Such is the pecking order in college football.

Shanklin gained a career-best 159 yards on 17 carries and scored once in the Beavers' 23-14 victory at UCLA this past Saturday. He had a 72-yard run, the 12th longest in school history, and averaged 9.4 yards per carry.

He is the second Beaver to be so honored by the conference this fall. Free safety Reggie Tongue was the defensive pick after the Wyoming game.

Three members of Shanklin's secret service — center Johnnie Feinga, guard Starling Latu and tackle John Garrett, all seniors — were the special guests at the weekly booster luncheon.

Afterwards Feinga said the linemen can take satisfaction in Shanklin's citation because they helped make it possible.

"We know that when we get team awards and when players get recognition" that the anonymous linemen behind the cage facemasks — Feinga, Garrett, Latu, guards Brad Thompson and Darin Border, tackle Tim Camp, tight ends Brad Barcroft and Justin Moore and the wideouts who cut- and stalk-block on every play — had a lot to do with it.

"We take pride in all the hard work we've done. There are no (weekly conference) awards for offensive linemen," Feinga said. "But an award like that is a plus for us."

"When our backs get an award like that, we know we must have done something right and helped them out somehow."

"We never set out as a specific goal to be No. 1. But I expect us to do well in that category because we are a running team, just as if we passed most of the time we should be near the top in that category."

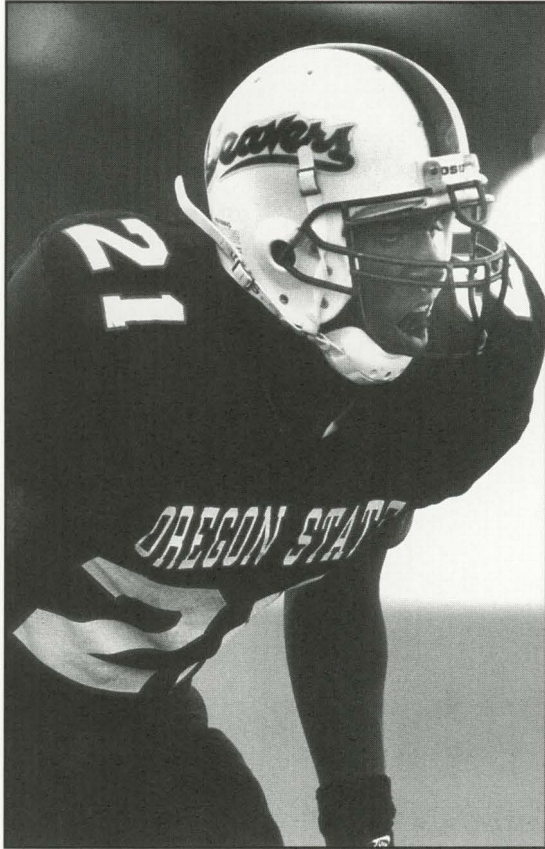

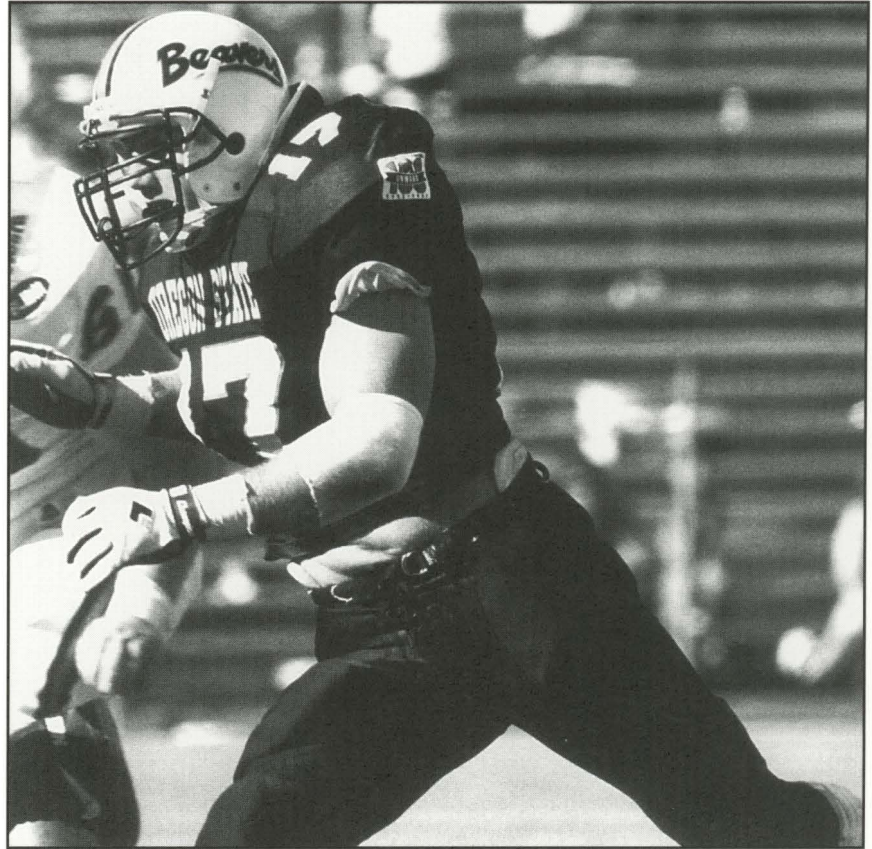

Senior outside linebacker Cory Huot is still questionable with a sprained left knee; he'll be re-evaluated after today's practice. He missed the UCLA game.

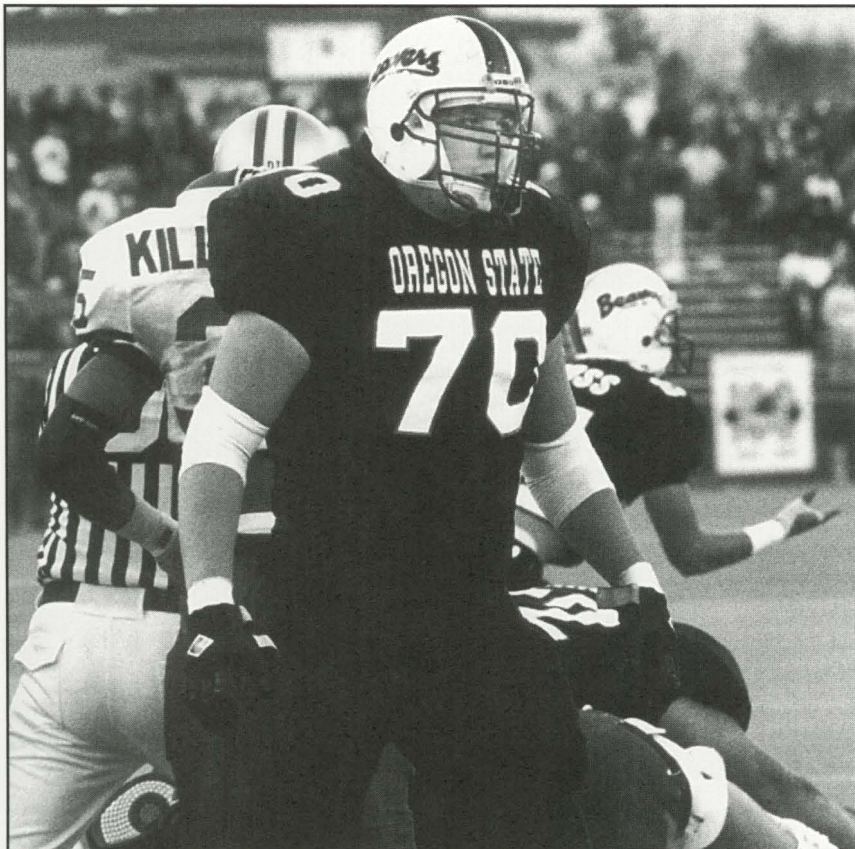

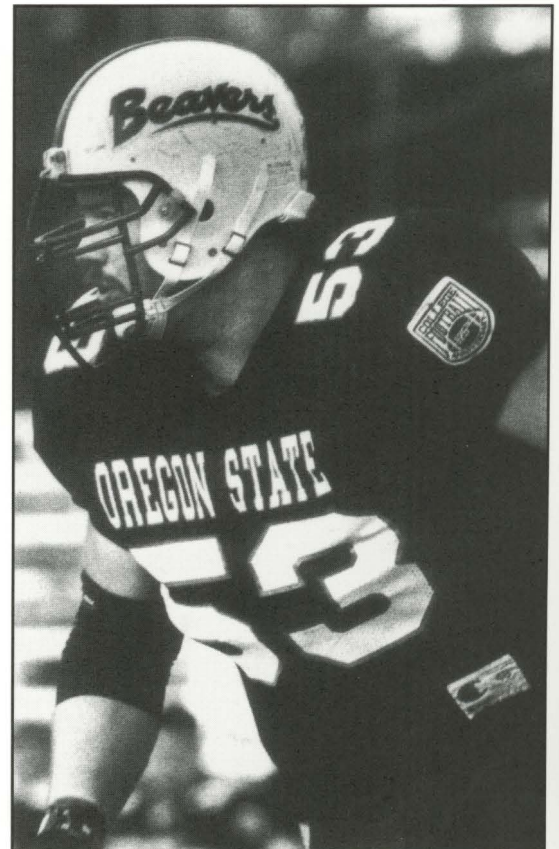

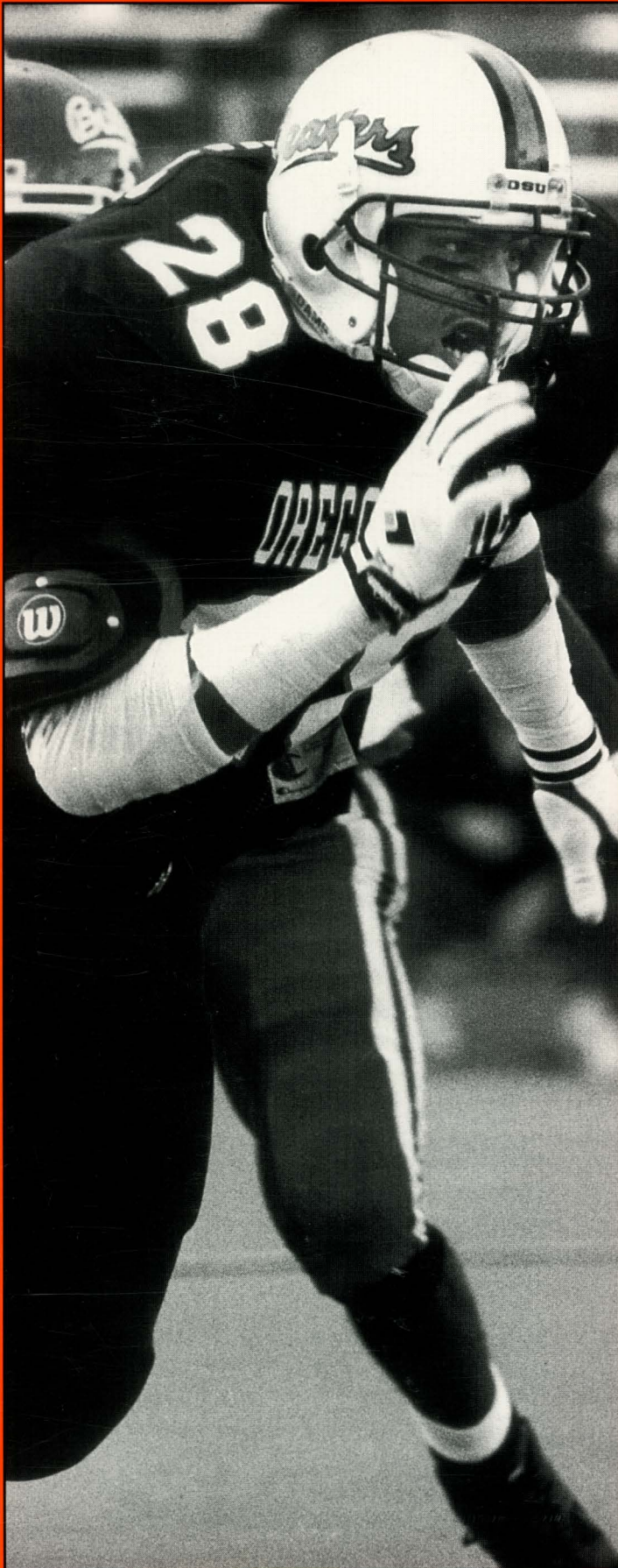
