Radio station KEX (1190), Portland, originates the broadcast for the nine-station network, which includes the following stations:

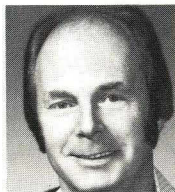

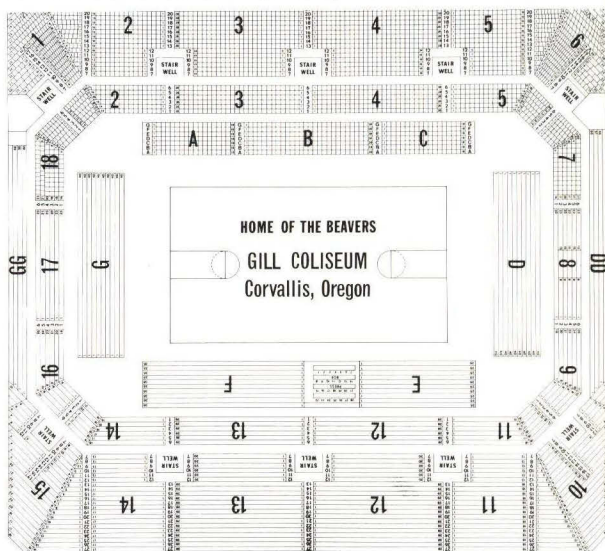

GILL COLISEUM

“A Basketball Showplace”

Gill Coliseum, home of Oregon State basketball, first opened its doors in the winter of 1949-50, and for many years has been one of the premier hoop plants in America.

Named after the late Slat Gill, who was head basketball coach at OSU for 36 years and later the school's athletic director, the building is perfect for basketball. It is not a fieldhouse. There are no posts.

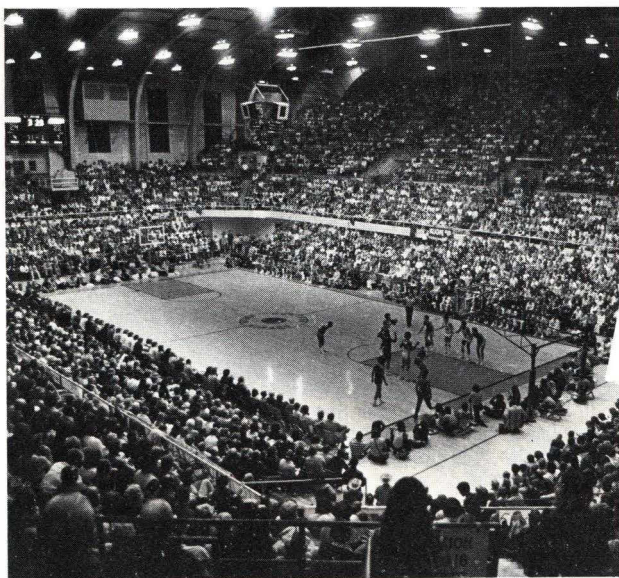
Gill Coliseum was the site of the Western Regional NCAA tournament in 1952, 1953, 1954, 1955, 1956, 1957, 1964 and 1967, and it also was where the now-famous Far West Classic began. Later, OSU officials moved the holiday tournament to Portland's more populous area.

The Gill Coliseum building project actually got underway in June of 1948 when excavation for the huge building was started. Two unusually severe winters put the building considerably behind schedule, but the Coliseum was completed enough for the first regularly scheduled game in December of 1949.

Gill Coliseum covers one and one-third acres. Peak of the building is 83 feet above the floor, equivalent of a four-story building. Framework of the structure consists of 12 fabricated steel arches. In all, there are 1000 tons of structural steel in the building, and 85 percent of the seats are on the sides.

Some 14,000 cubic yards of concrete, which amounts to 70,000 sacks of cement, went into the structure. In addition, more than 100,000 pumic blocks have been used inside for partitions and finishing work. Two years ago a brand new floor of the best wood variety was installed.

Attendance capacity is between 10,000 and 10,500. Actually, the largest throng ever to see a game at Gill Coliseum was in 1962 when 11,709 viewed the OSU-Oregon game. Because of fire marshall regulations, that figure can never be reached again.

Oregon State University is Oregon's oldest state-supported institution of higher learning. It uses Oct. 27, 1868 as its Charter Day.

Like many of the leading public universities in the U.S., Oregon State was established as a Land Grant or "people's college" under the historic Morrill Act signed by President Abraham Lincoln. The act provided grants of lands to the various states to start public colleges that would extend educational opportunities to all who had the will and ability to learn.

In its early years, the school was located in "downtown Corvallis." A 35-acre farm was purchased in 1870 for a new college campus west of town. The first building, Benton Hall, was completed in 1888.

In the beginning, the curriculum was typical of the colleges of the period. There was a classical course leading to the Bachelor of Arts degree and a scientific course leading to the Bachelor of Science.

Agriculture was added in 1869 under the impetus of the Land Grant Act. Commerce, household economy and engineering courses came soon too and in 1908, four professional schools were established: Agriculture, Commerce, Engineering, and Home Economics.

With 16,630 students now, Oregon State offers a complete university curriculum. The College of Science and the College of Liberal Arts are the largest academic units. Schools include Agriculture, Business and Technology, Education, Engineering, Forestry, Home Economics, Oceanography, Pharmacy, and a Division of Health and Physical Education.

OSU's 400-acre, tree-lined campus now has about 100 buildings and research laboratories. Classroom buildings, the library, and student activity areas are located in the center. Residence halls and research areas are on the edges.

In September 1971, Oregon State was designated by the U.S. Commerce Department as one of the nation's first four Sea Grant colleges as well. As such, it is charged with leadership in the wise development of marine resources.

Oregon State's ocean research vessels (four) are docked at Newport on the Oregon Coast, just 55 miles from the campus. The university's Marine Science Center there has become one of the top tourist attractions in the Northwest.

Ralph Miller

Head Coach

Ralph Miller, the fourth winningest active major college basketball coach in America, will be starting his 10th season as Oregon State's head basketball coach when the Beavers open the 1979-80 campaign.

Obviously, when anyone has the distinction of being the fourth winningest active coach in college basketball, success and winning play a big part of Ralph Miller's background, as a player and a coach.

In 28 years as a collegiate coach, Miller has known only two losing seasons and in both cases he had little control over the situation as it was his first year at Wichita State and his initial season at Oregon State.

Very few men in the sport of basketball have ever been named "Coach of the Year" from three different major conferences, but Miller has. Ralph was named Missouri Valley "Coach of the Year" in 1954 and '64; Big 10 "Coach of the Year" in 1968 and '70; and Pacific-8 "Coach of the Year" in 1975.

Miller is starting his 10th year at OSU and each year the OSU program seems to get better and Ralph certainly feels there is promise for another outstanding Beaver season this time around. Miller has recorded a 145-103 record at OSU in nine seasons, including three runner-up and two third place finishes in the last five seasons and one trip to the NCAA playoffs (1975), and a NIT Tournament playoff spot last year.

Now is his 29th year as a collegiate head coach, Miller has won 460 games and dropped 287. Only Marv Harshman (Washington), Frank McGuire (South Carolina) and Ray Meyer (DePaul) have won more games as active head coaches.

Prior to taking the OSU post in 1970, Miller enjoyed six outstanding years at Iowa where the Hawkeyes won 95 and lost 51, including the Big 10 championship in 1968 (co-champs) and 1970.

Miller's first collegiate head job was at Wichita State. He took over at Wichita State in 1952 and 13 years later produced a 220-133 record, including a Missouri Valley championship in 1964 and trips to the NIT Tournament in 1954, '61, '62 and '63.

Miller has always been a winner. His coaching career began in Wichita, Kansas as head coach of the Wichita, Kansas High School team in 1948. In three years he produced a record of 63-17, with a state championship team in 1951, his final year, and a runner-up finish in 1949 and a third place finish in 1950.

Even before launching a fantastic coaching career, Miller has known plenty of athletic success. He was a multi sport star at Chanute, Kansas High School as he earned letters in football (4), basketball (3), track (4),

golf (1) and tennis (1). Ralph was a three-time all-league and all-state pick in football as a quarterback and he duplicated that effort in basketball by being named all-state three times. He was also the Kansas prep low hurdle record holder when he left Chanute High School to enroll at Kansas in 1937.

Ralph was a two-sport star at Kansas, earning three letters as a starting quarterback in football and three letters in basketball, including winning all-conference honors as a junior and senior. Ralph still holds several football, game and season passing records and ranks 11th on the Kansas career passing list. He once passed for five touchdowns in one game (Washburn, 1938). All told, Miller hit 102 of 190 passes for 1,122 yards in his KU career.

Last year, Miller was inducted into the Kansas University Athletic Hall of Fame.

Miller is generally recognized as one of the top people in his chosen field. The OSU mentor believes that basketball should be entertaining in addition to producing a winning team. Miller believes in developing "pressure basketball" using full and half-court pressing defenses, using both man-to-man and zone principles of defense. Miller's teams are always in constant motion on offense, utilizing various fast break styles and a pass oriented quick hitting attack.

During his remarkable coaching career, Miller has developed some outstanding players such as Cleo Littleton, Don Laketa, Sam Smith, Al Tate, Ron Heller, Don Locke, Gene Wiley, Dave Stallworth and Nate Bowman, all players who played for him at Wichita State and former professional cagers; Sam Williams, John Johnson and Fred Brown, currently professional players from his former Iowa teams; and Freddie Boyd and Lonnie Shelton from his OSU squads.

Following his graduation in 1942 from Kansas, Miller served three years in the Air Force during World War II (1943-46) and was discharged as a First Lieutenant.

Ralph was married prior to his senior year at Kansas to the former Emily Jean Milam on September 5, 1942. Ralph and Jean have four children, Susan Langer, Ralph Jr., Paul and Shannon, a sophomore at OSU.

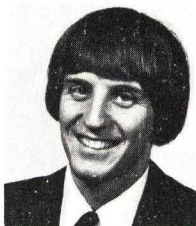

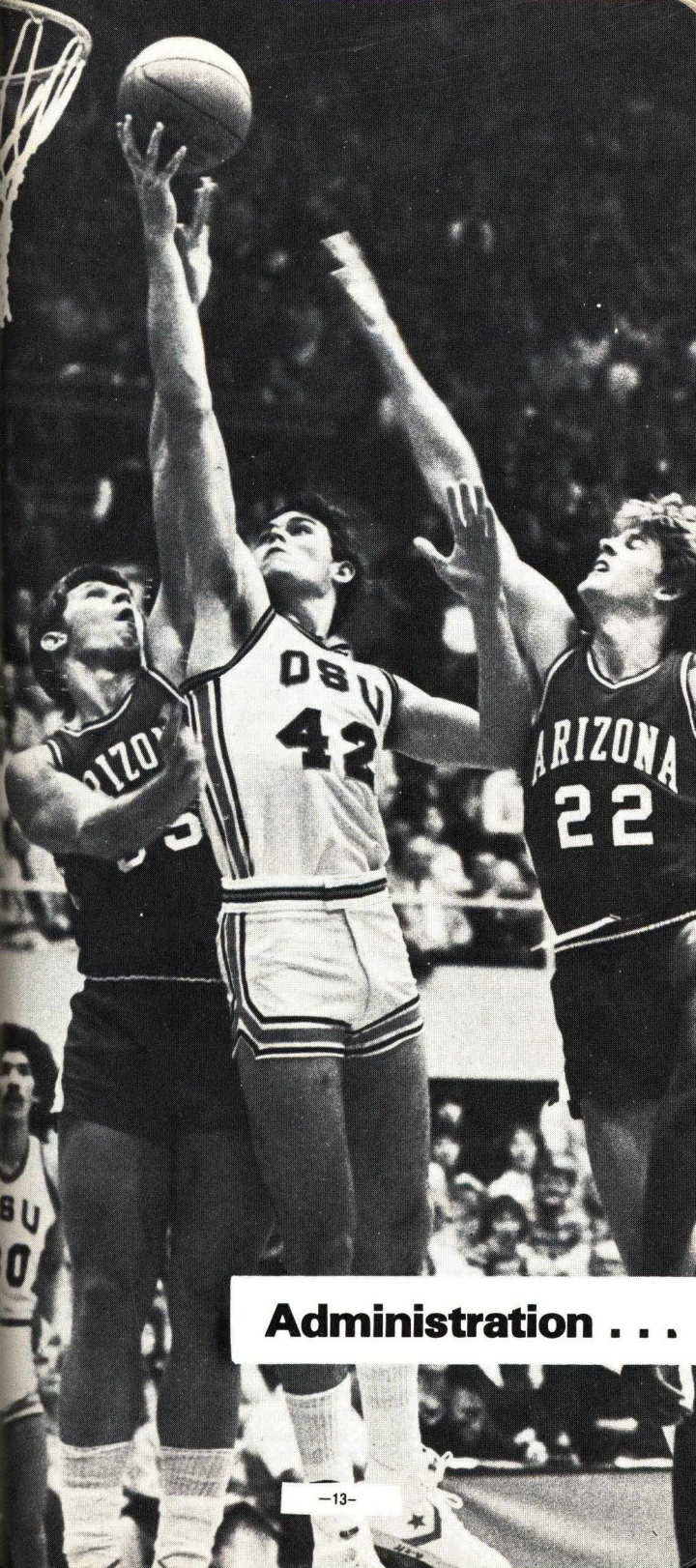

DEE ANDROS

Director of Athletics

"The Great Pumpkin" started a new "Era" at Oregon State University when he announced he was resigning as the Beavers' head football coach following the 1975 season. Shortly after his resignation as football coach, Dee was named as Director of Athletics, succeeding Jim Barratt to become the eighth Athletic Director in OSU history.

Dee's decision to give up the OSU football reigns ended a happy and successful 25 years as a grid coach, the final 14 as a head coach.

Dee's athletic career began back in Oklahoma City, where he was born October 17, 1924. Dee played four years of prep football at Central High School in Oklahoma City, plus he also earned an additional two letters in wrestling. After graduating from Oklahoma City High School in 1942, Dee entered the Marine Corps and served in the Marines from 1942-46 through the duration of World War II and was decorated with a Bronze Star in the battle of Iwo Jima for heroic achievement. Dee was a sergeant in the Marines at the time of his discharge.

Following his discharge in the Marines, Dee entered University of Oklahoma where he played football for four years, the first year under the late Jim Tatum and the Sooners went to the Gator Bowl that year. **The next three years were under Bud Wilkinson and twice the Sooners reached the Sugar Bowl. Dee graduated from Oklahoma in 1950.** It was at Oklahoma that he met and married his lovely wife, Luella. Demosthenes Konstandies Andreopoulos (Dee's full name) was married to the former Luella Thomas in January, 1949.

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Following his graduation from Oklahoma, Dee immediately launched his very successful coaching career. He started out as an assistant under Wilkinson on the Oklahoma staff for three years (1952-53). In 1953, Dee served as line coach at Kansas and then moved on to Texas Tech in 1954-55. He joined Pete Elliott as an assistant at Nebraska in 1956 and followed Elliott to California for three more years (1957-59). He also followed Elliott to Illinois for two more years (1960-61) before gaining his first head job, University of Idaho in 1962.

While Dee was serving as an assistant, Texas Tech went to the Sun Bowl and California to the Rose Bowl in 1959.

Dee spent three years at Idaho where he compiled a 11-16-1 record.

Dee was named head coach at OSU, following the departure of Tommy Prothro to UCLA, in 1965. Since Dee arrived at Oregon State, few coaches have ever enjoyed the national attention that has been bestowed on the "Great Pumpkin". Under Dee's leadership, the Beavers were runner-up in the tough Pacific-8 Conference four times.

Perhaps Dee's most famous season was in 1967, a team that was called the "Giant Killers". That year, OSU defeated then No. 2 ranked Purdue on the road and two weeks later tied No. 2 ranked UCLA in Los Angeles, which prompted Dee to say, "I'm tired of playing these No. 2 teams, bring on No. 1". His Beavers then proceeded to defeat the No. 1 ranked USC Trojans, led by O. J. Simpson, the next week in Corvallis, 3-0.

Dee's brilliant coaching career has brought him many honors and much acclaim. He has served as a coach in three different post-season all-star games, the Hula Bowl, the Coaches All-America Bowl and the East-West Shrine Game.

Some of Dee's teammates at Oklahoma included Jim Owens, ex-Washington coach; Darrell Royal, Texas; Bert Clark, ex-Washington State coach; and Jack Mitchell, ex-Kansas coach.

Dee got his famous "Great Pumpkin" nickname from a veteran Northwest sports writer, Harry Missildine, Sports Editor of the Spokesman-Review in Spokane, Wash. Harry noticed that Dee was always dressed in orange while near the gridiron, and for that matter most everywhere else he travels, thus the "Great Pumpkin" nickname.

Dee as a football coach, and even more now as an athletic director, is in constant demand as a speaker and tries to fill as many speaking engagements as possible.

Dee and Luella have one daughter, Jeanna, 22.

DR. ROBERT W. MACVICAR

President



Dr. Robert MacVicar, a national educational and scientific leader, has been president since July 1, 1970, of Oregon State University, Oregon's oldest public institution of higher learning.

He came to Oregon State from Southern Illinois University where he had served first as vice president for academic affairs and then as chancellor.

Earlier, MacVicar had been on the faculty of Oklahoma State University as professor of chemistry, dean of the graduate school, and vice president of academic affairs.

Born September 28, 1918, MacVicar received his bachelor's degree from the University of Wyoming; his master's degree in chemistry from Oklahoma State; and his doctor's degree in biochemistry from the University of Wisconsin.

When MacVicar was graduated with highest honors from the University of Wyoming in 1939, he was chosen to be a Rhodes Scholar. He was unable to go to England for the special advanced work, however, because of the start of World War II in Europe and his own military service as an officer in the Food and Nutrition Division, U.S. Army Sanitary Corps.

President MacVicar is currently serving as a member of the American Council on Education's new Commission on Leadership Development in Higher Education. He has been on the Council of the Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges; consultant to the U.S. Office of Education, 1956-70; consultant to the Atomic Energy Commission, 1958-69; and was a member of the Educational Advisory Committee of the National Science Foundation, 1957-69.

He also was a founding member of the board of the Central Educational Midwest Research Laboratory, St. Louis, Mo., and chairman of the Laboratory executive committee for three years.

In April 1972, he was one of seven representatives of government and higher education named to a policy-level steering committee to guide a nationwide program for higher education information exchange. The program is directed by the National Center for Higher Education Management Systems.

In 1971, MacVicar was named to the Oregon committee for selection of Rhodes Scholars. He is a member of the nation's two major academic honor societies — Phi Kappa Phi and Phi Beta Kappa — and the national research honorary, Sigma Xi. He is author of some 135 papers, reports and articles.

MacVicar's professional memberships include the American Society of Biological Chemists, American Chemical Society, American Institute of Nutrition, Nutrition Society of Great Britain, and the Society for Experimental Biology and Medicine.

MacVicar Active President

Since he became Oregon State University's 14th president in 1970, Dr. Robert MacVicar has become noted in the Northwest for his tremendous energy, long work days, and his ability to communicate with people — students, parents, legislators, business men, senior citizens.

Breakfasts for him are times for meetings. Evenings are for speaking engagements, meetings and conferences, teaching a class at the university on trends in higher education, and for inviting students into his home for informal talks and for listening to their points of view.

In 1972, the university president moved into a resident hall for part of a week to better appreciate student needs and wishes concerning their college programs. On a continuing basis, he and the student body president hold regular question-and-answer sessions on campus for anyone who has something to say or ask.

During the first year in Oregon, MacVicar traveled more than 30,000 miles to become acquainted with the people, resources and needs of the state. His pace hasn't slackened since then. He has visited every part of the state and spoken in almost every community.

His voice has become one of the best known and most heeded in the Northwest on educational, scientific, and research programs and problems.

Mrs. MacVicar is an educator too as well as homemaker. She holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Oklahoma State University and met her husband while both were professors there. They were married in 1948. Mrs. MacVicar also taught for two years in Boston at a day care center and did a year's advanced work at Child Education Foundation in New York City.

The MacVicar's have two children.

PAUL VALENTI

Associate Director of Athletics



Paul Valenti graduated from Tamalpias High School in Mill Valley, Calif., in 1938 and that fall enrolled at Oregon State University. Except for time out for World War II and service in the Navy (1942-45), Paul has been a member of the OSU family ever since, first as a player, then as a coach and administrator.

Paul played four years of basketball at OSU, earning three letters under legendary Slat Gilj and playing on two Northern Division championship teams, 1940 and 1942. Following his stint in the Navy for World War II, Paul returned to Corvallis and joined his old coach, Slat, as an assistant, a capacity he served until 1958 when Slat retired as an active coach to become athletic director.

Paul was the logical man to take over the OSU basketball post when Slat retired and he did an outstanding job for six seasons as the Beavers' head coach. His six-year record found Valenti's teams winning 85 and losing 74 and his 1966 team captured the Pacific-8 championship, the last team to wrestle the title away from UCLA.

Jim Jarvis, Loy Petersen, Charlie White, Freddie Boyd and Ed Fredenburg were some of the outstanding players to perform under Valenti during his tenure as Beaver basketball coach.

After relinquishing his head basketball position, Paul was named Assistant Athletic Director and tennis coach. He was OSU's tennis coach for six years before the sport was discontinued at OSU following the 1975 season.

When Dee Andros was appointed Director of Athletics, Paul was immediately promoted to Associate Director of Athletics by Andros and given much more responsibility. Among many duties, Paul is responsible for the grounds and maintenance of OSU athletic facilities.

Paul was an outstanding athlete as a prep, earning four letters in basketball and tennis and earning all-league honors three times in each sport. After earning his B.A. Degree in 1942, Paul also added his Master's from OSU in 1949.

JIM RUDD, Assistant Athletic Director & Executive Director Beaver Club

His title was changed to Assistant Athletic Director for Fund Raising and Travel Coordination in January, 1977. Jim remains in charge of Beaver Club. Jim enjoyed an outstanding athletic career at Northern Iowa, winning three

BOB HERNDON, Assistant Director Beaver Club — Bob joined the Oregon State staff for the second time in August, 1978. Bob was a former



assistant football coach at OSU under Dee Andros from 1967-72. Bob is a 1951 graduate of Medford High School, Medford, Oklahoma and a 1956 graduate of Oklahoma, where he earned a B.S. Degree in Education and was on the Dean's Honor Roll. He was a three-year letterman offensive and defensive back at Oklahoma, playing under Bud Wilkinson (1952-54). Oklahoma was ranked #3 in 1953 and #2 in 1954. Bob was the leading ground gainer on the undefeated 1954 team and played in the first 20 of Oklahoma's record 47-game winning streak. He was a student assistant football coach under Wilkinson at Oklahoma in 1955 and his coaching stops have included California (1957-59), Illinois (1960-66); OSU (1967-72); Miami (Fla.) 1973-76. JACK RAINEY, Administrative Assistant — Jack is currently in his ninth year at OSU and serves as an Administrative Assistant to Dee

HAL COWAN, Assistant Athletic Director for Public Relations & Promotions — Joined the OSU staff in January, 1976, as Director of Sales &



Promotions and was promoted in April to Director of Public Relations & Promotions and to Assistant Athletic Director in October, 1979. Cowan is in charge of the Sports Information Department, ticket sales and promotions. Prior to joining the OSU staff, Cowan served as Director of Public Relations with the Portland Storm of the World Football League; Sports Information Director at the University of Oregon (1967-74); Assistant Sports Information Director at the University of California in Berkeley (1966-67); Sports Information Director at Central Michigan University (1965-66). Cowan is a 1964 graduate of Linfield

College with a B.A. in Journalism. Cowan also was a sports writer for the Oregonian and Oregon Statesman and served in the U.S. Army as a 1st Lieutenant in the Medical Service Corps before taking the SID position at Central Michigan. Cowan is a 1958 graduate of North Salem High School. He participated in football, basketball, cross country and baseball at North Salem and baseball at Linfield. Several of Cowan's press books, football, basketball, and track/baseball, have won national awards and he also served on the NCAA Public Relations Committee. JOHN EGGERS, Sports Information Director — John is starting his 29th year on the OSU staff: John joined the OSU staff on July 1, 1950, as an

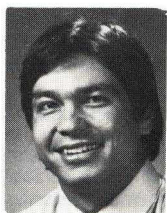

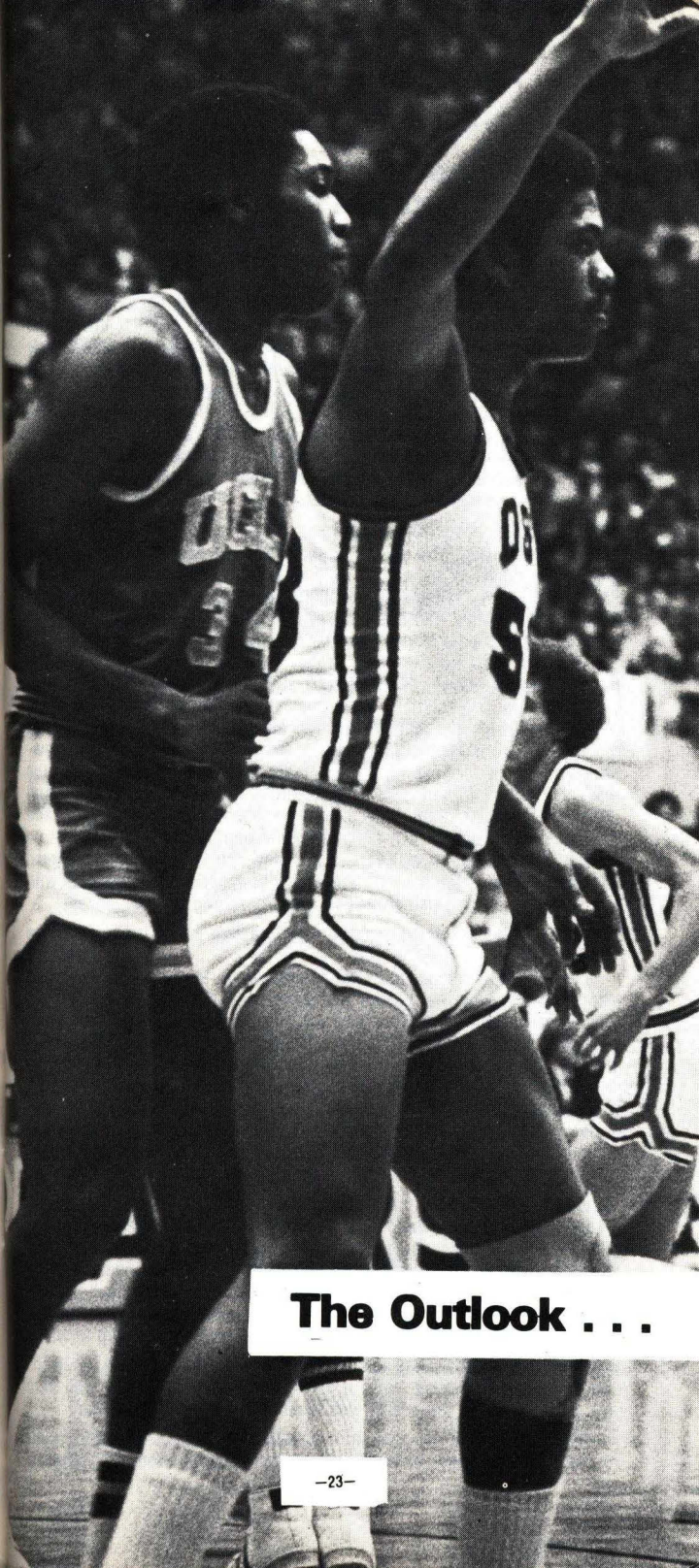

OSU OUTLOOK

RALPH MILLER TALKS ABOUT OSU BASKETBALL

Question: Evaluate this year's squad?

"Most of the pre-season predictions imply that Oregon State is a potential title contender. Noticeably missing from descriptions are such words as young and inexperienced which definitely changes our life style for the coming season. These omissions are justified because one-half of our club has at least two years of experience in varsity competition. We have five players that should add depth, quickness, speed and ball handling skills to the group. Lofty pre-season predictions are understandable, but we still must improve a lot to fulfill them. Last year we played well enough to defeat anybody in the United States upon occasion, but we also played very badly at times. Therefore, consistent performances by individuals and the group have not been proven, and consistency is mandatory for us to live up to expectations."

Question: What about your personnel?

"Most returnees have started upon occasion. Heading the list is Steve Johnson, and he is backed up by Tony Martin. Our small forward was Dwayne Allen who is back for his senior year. Our two starting guards of last year were Mark Radford and Ray Blume, and technically, they have two full years of experience. On paper it would appear that our strong forward or high post man is up for grabs. Three returnees operated at the spot last year namely, Rob Holbrook, Bill McShane and Tony Martin. Jamie Stangel, a freshman, could possibly step into this position along with Danny Evans and Jaap Verkerk. All three rooks can be considered as potential swing personnel for strong or small wing spots. Jeff Stoutt swings as a guard or wing and Andy McClouskey, point guard, fill out the list of lettermen. We have two fine young guards in Vince Hinchin and William Brew. Our young players have excellent speed, quickness, and ball handling talents which definitely adds depth to the squad. We are two and three deep at all court positions which is the result of a good recruiting season. We have a combination of experienced personnel with good, young players that makes for good coaching circumstances."

Question: What are the strengths and question marks going into the season?

"The strength of this club is the experience of returning personnel and the depth provided by a good recruiting year. Steve Johnson was All Pacific-10 and All-District last year as a sophomore. Dwayne Allen is not known for his shooting ability, but as far as I am concerned, he is an excellent all-around basketball player, and Mark Radford and Ray Blume were starting guards last year. The only question is who may start at the big forward position. No matter how you look at it, the strength of this ball club is in the returning personnel and depth. Consistency is our main problem, and improvement in this area remains to be seen. The ingredients to overcome the problem are available."

Question: Evaluate new players.

JAAP VERKERK — Jaap is a young man about 20 years old from Holland. He has been worked under some old Oregon State players, Gary Freeman and Vince Fritz. Vic Bartolome has also seen him play. We believe he has good raw talent, and when such is refined, he will become a fine player. He jumps exceedingly well, and he is a tough rebounder with good defensive potential. He will be used as a small or big forward.

JAMIE STANGEL — Has the ability to be the strong forward we need. He is a tough hard-nosed type of player who shoots extremely well from the perimeter, and this ability was lacking in our group last year.

VINCE HINCEN — Is a young man with skills to become a point or off guard or a small wing. He is a fine shooter, averaging around 30 points a

game last year, but prior to his senior year he was the ball handling type of floor leader.

WILLIAM BREW — Is a point guard all the way, and the only point guard recruited in recent years. He also happens to be an outstanding defensive player and was a standout on the gridiron in high school last year.

DANNY EVANS — He is the small ball-handling wing with great jumping ability. He shoots well and possesses excellent speed and quickness which can make him a good defensive player.

Question: What about the Pacific-10 this year?

"The Pacific-10 will be a tougher conference from top to bottom than it was last year. Our Champion, UCLA is now in a rebuilding stage for the first time in many a year, so they are not predicted to walk away with the conference title. USC was No. 2 last year and is back in tack, except for Cliff Robinson. Arizona and Arizona State had fine young ball clubs last year, and they have added some good recruits which should make them stronger. Cal had a fine recruiting year, and they will be similar to us because of good older players that can be blended with a fine crop of youngsters. Washington State could have their best team to date under George Raveling. In fact, no Pac-10 team will, or should be weak. UCLA again recruited a fine group of people and they still have three or four old heads to help mold the youngsters into a great team, you cannot rule them out as a potential contender.

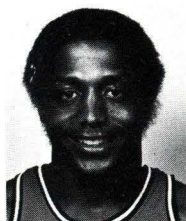

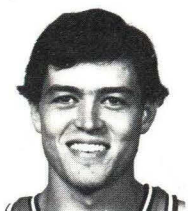

OSU as a freshman following the broken foot to Steve Johnson, Bill spent his time in a reserve role at center and high post, or the big forward last year, starting only one game, that against Arizona . . . he wound up with only 38 points, a considerable drop from his 172 point performance as a freshman . . . he was the third leading scorer on the club as a freshman and shot .558 from the field (67-120) . . . his shooting fell off to .344 (11-32) last year . . . he was hampered with a severe ankle sprain in pre-season practice and he never really fully recovered and got into the swing of things last year . . . he is much stronger this

year and his confidence appears completely restored as well . . . he is a candidate to start at strong forward this year, and, of course, is always available for backup duty at center . . . as a freshman, Bill entered OSU with probably more accolades than any other prep basketball player in the State of Texas . . . Bill has all the necessary skills and with more strength and maturity this year, Bill should be even more productive . . . Bill received a multitude of awards while playing for Strake Jesuit . . . he was named all-state as a junior and senior, all-greater Houston as a junior and senior and all district as a sophomore, junior and senior . . . he was named to the all-Catholic prep All-America squad as a senior . . . he also had the honor of representing the State of Texas in two post-season all-star games, the All-American Cage Classic in Akron, Ohio and the Faith 7 All-Star game in Shawnee, Oklahoma, which matched the top Texas prep players against the top Oklahoma prep players . . . Bill was also captain of his team as a junior and senior . . . Bill played basketball for Coach Larry Hargett at Strake Jesuit . . . 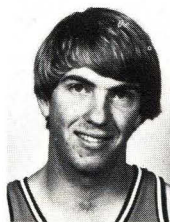

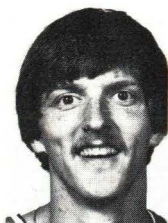

He will be used as a small or big forward," Miller said . . . he played on the Holland National team the last three years with Freeman and Fritz . . . their team finished fourth in the Dutch playoffs last year as Verkerk averaged 14 points, 11 re-

33CLARENCE STEPHEN (STEVE) JOHNSON, 6-10½, 230, Jr., 21, San Bernardino, CA (San Geronimo)** — Steve returns for his junior season



at OSU as one of the premier centers in the United States . . . he has been selected on some pre-season All-America teams after enjoying a very outstanding sophomore season at OSU . . . Steve was named All-Pacific-10; All-District 8 by USBWA; second team All-Coast by UPI; All-Pacific-10 by Basketball Times; All West Coast by Sporting News; honorable mention All-American by AP; MVP on the OSU squad and he represented the United States while playing on the U.S. team that played China and took a European tour this past summer . . . to say that Steve had an outstanding sophomore year is an understatement . . . he scored 498 points, an average of 18.4, shot .661 from the field (197-298), had 178 rebounds and scored over 30 points three times with a high of 36 against Arizona . . . he also scored 33 against USC and 31 against Washington . . . Steve's .661 shooting percentage was the third best in the nation last year, behind Murray Brown (Florida St.), .691, and Jeff Ruland (Iona), .671 . . . Steve led the Pacific-10 in field goal percentage, obviously, and was the fifth leading scorer in the conference . . . Steve started all but one game last year, USC in Los Angeles . . . in fact, he has yet to start a game against USC in Los Angeles as he has either been hurt or sick on both trips . . . Steve set several OSU records last year . . . his field goal percentage of .661 equals the mark held by Vic Bartolome . . . he also set records for six blocked shots in one game (Wyoming & Gonzaga); most field goals made in conference play, 130, and most fouls in conference play, 68 . . . Steve currently ranks 18th at OSU in career scoring with 937 points and his 498 season total was the 10th best single season effort . . . staying healthy is the key to Steve's overall success . . . this summer on returning from Europe, he had a screw surgically implanted in his right foot to stop a possible stress-fracture as he suffered following his freshman year in his left foot . . . at this point, he appears to be in the best overall physical condition of his career . . . after a brilliant freshman year in which he started all but five games and scored 379 points (13.5 average) and shot .596 from the field, third best mark in OSU history, he suffered a hairline fracture of his left foot one week after pre-season drills started last year . . . the break healed in time for him to see his first action against Seattle Pacific, OSU's sixth game of the year . . . he played in three games, the maximum allowed by the NCAA and Pacific-10 in order to receive another year of eligibility, which he was granted, before suffering a clean break in the same foot that kept him out of action the rest of the year and later required surgery for a bone graft . . . all told, he was in a cast for a period of eight months . . . in those three games he played 62 minutes and scored 60 points and had 29 rebounds . . . if any player fits the term often applied to professional players — "he is the franchise" — Steve Johnson would be in that category . . . "potentially, Steve has all the tools to become the best post man in OSU history," Ralph Miller feels . . . he still needs to improve his passing skills and reduce committing personal fouls to become the player he can be," Miller added . . . Steve was the second leading scorer on the Beaver squad as a freshman with 379 points (13.5 average), while playing only 616 minutes, an average of 22 minutes per game, due to fouling out of 18 of the 28 games he played in . . . Steve still accomplished a lot in his rookie season . . . Steve was in double figures in 22 of his 28 games as a freshman . . . he set an OSU game record for field goal accuracy by connecting on 14 of 16 shots against Arizona (.875) . . . Steve also accounted for the third best shooting percentage in OSU history for a season with a .596 mark (159-267), behind Vic Bartolome's marks of .661 (1968) and .622 (1970) . . . Steve's .596 mark was good enough

to lead the Pacific-8 Conference in field goal accuracy for the season . . . 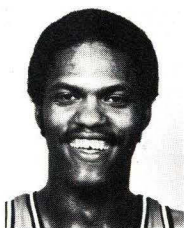

22RAY BLUME, 6-4, 186, 21, Jr., Portland (Parkrose)** — Ray came into his own in a big way last year, leading the Beavers in playing time with



961 minutes and he was third in scoring with 374 points (13.4 average) and in assists with 95, while shooting .500 from the floor . . . Ray, along with Mark Radford, formed what many consider the best guard tandem in the Pacific-10 last year . . . obviously with another year of experience under their belts, Blume and Radford should be even more productive this season . . . Ray scored in double figures in 21 of OSU's 28 games last year . . . Ray did suffer through a shooting slump during the final month of the season which pulled down his shooting percentage . . . Ray's top two games last year were

against Oregon, hitting 22 in the first game and 24 in the second . . . he hit 9-12 in the first game and 11-14 in the second game from the field . . . Ray is in a position this year, if his performance increases as much as it did last year, to be a candidate for post-season honors . . . Ray did not start a game for Oregon State as a freshman, but he had to be the most valuable sixth man in the Pacific-8 Conference that year . . . he wound up as OSU's sixth leading scorer with 155 points, 6.2 average, and in 14 conference games he scored at a 9.9 clip . . . he shot .521 (62-119) from the floor for the year and was even better at .553 (52-94) in Pacific-8 play . . . he had six double figure scoring games, his high was 22 against USC in Los Angeles when the Beavers scored an impressive 89-82 overtime victory . . . Ray was the second leading scorer in the State of Oregon his senior year with an average of 24.2 points per game (second only to OSU teammate Jeff Stoutt of Lake Oswego who had a 24.8 mark) . . . Ray was an all-state and all-league selection after leading his club to third place in the state AAA championships, losing on-

ly to North Eugene, the eventual champion . . . the defeat was the only loss of the year for Parkrose (25-1) . . . Ray played under coach Terry Woods at Parkrose . . . Terry had very high praise for Blume, "Ray is the greatest athlete I have coached and he is a great leader . . . Ray was well respected on and off the court and I know he will be a tremendous asset to OSU" . . . Ray was selected to the all-tournament team after leading his club to the third place and was named the outstanding player of the tournament . . . even though he played guard for Parkrose, he virtually did everything . . . he led his club in all statistical departments . . . as a senior, he shot .589 from the floor, .801 from the foul line, averaged 10.9 rebounds and 24.2 points with a single game high of 37 . . . Ralph Miller says, "Ray has good leadership, he is a fine shooter, passer and is a good ball handler, plus he jumps well for his size" . . . being selected MVP in the state tournament has been Ray's top athletic thrill and he credits his high school coach Terry Woods for being the person who has inspired him the most in athletics . . . he has four brothers and sisters, Tony, 22; Ken, 22; Steve, 17; and Tami, 14 . . . he is a Liberal Studies major . . . born 9/23/58 in Georgia.

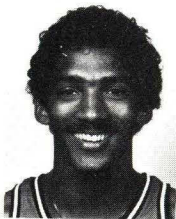

Mark has been selected the past two years in a row on the Pacific-10 honorable mention All-Conference list . . . he teams with Ray Blume to give the Beavers one of the outstanding collegiate guard tandems in the nation . . . Mark was selected, along with Steve Johnson, last year to play on the United States team that toured China and Europe . . . he was also selected honorable mention All-Coast by UPI . . . Mark has been very consistent during his initial two seasons at OSU . . . he scored 286 points as a freshman and 383 last year, second highest on the club for a 13.7 average . . . he was second in assists with 112, third in minutes played with 849 and he shot .511 and .776 from

the field and line, respectively . . . he scored in double figures in 19 of OSU's 28 games last year, with a career high of 28 against Portland State . . . some of his better shooting nights from the field were 11-14 against Seattle; 10-12 against Arizona and 8-11 against California . . . he also set an OSU record with a string of 22 straight free throws made last year . . . he has started every game of his OSU career, a string which now runs to 55 . . . OSU's 27-Game Win Streak

One of the most fantastic records anywhere in basketball was Oregon State's 27-game winning streak at the annual Far West Classic before finally losing in 1966.

The Beavers won 10 straight championships. They were 2-0 in 1956, 1957, and 1958, before the tournament was increased to eight teams instead of four. From 1959 through 1965 they were 3-0 each year en route to the title. OSU returned as champion in 1970.

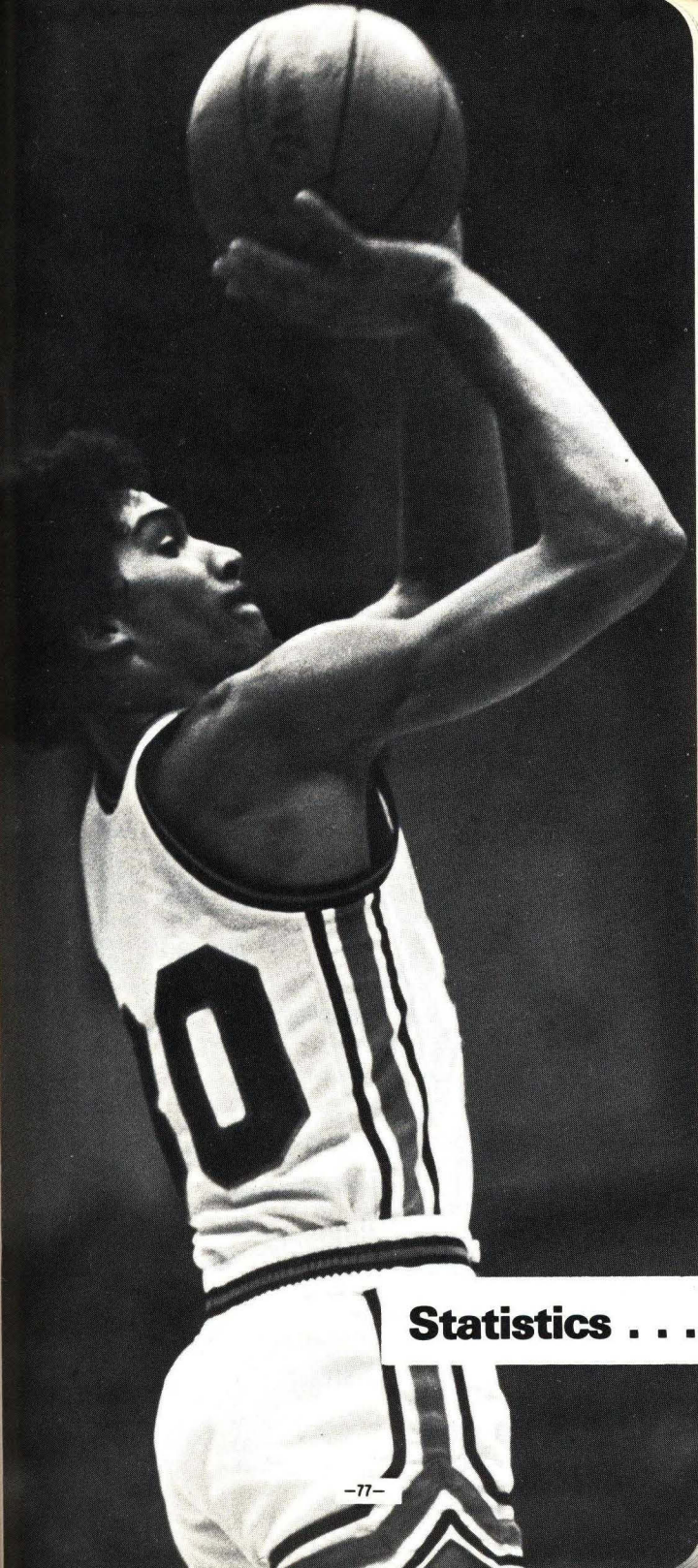

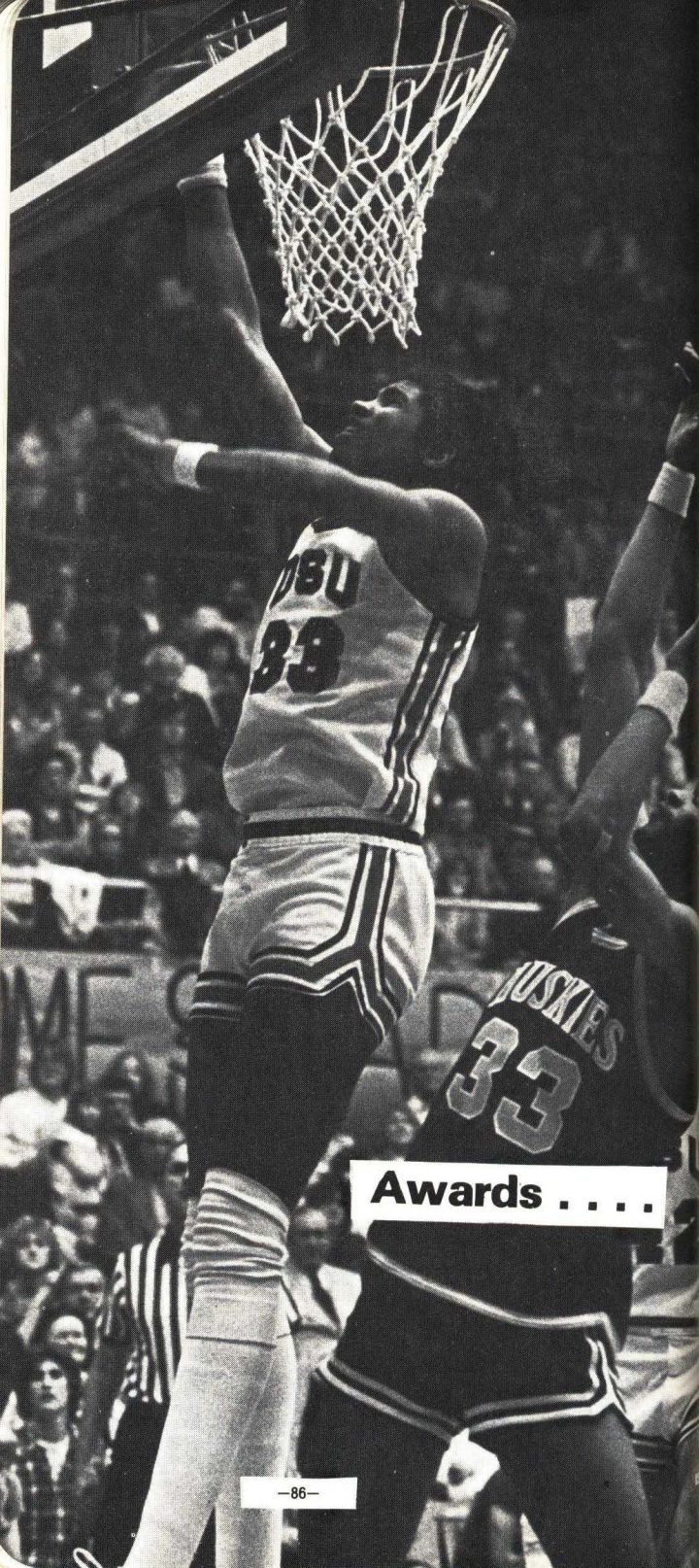

Chancellor's Trophy

In 1953, Dr. Charles D. Byrne, then-chancellor at higher education in the state of Oregon and an avowed sports fan, originated the Chancellor's Trophy to be awarded annually to winner of the basketball series between Oregon State University and the University of Oregon.

It was retired at the end of 11 years, with the team ahead in years won retaining permanent possession. In the years where there were four games instead of three, and a tie resulted, the team that had won the season before retained the trophy for its showcase.

Chancellor Roy Lieuallen started a new trophy nine years ago. The award was discontinued after the 1975 season.

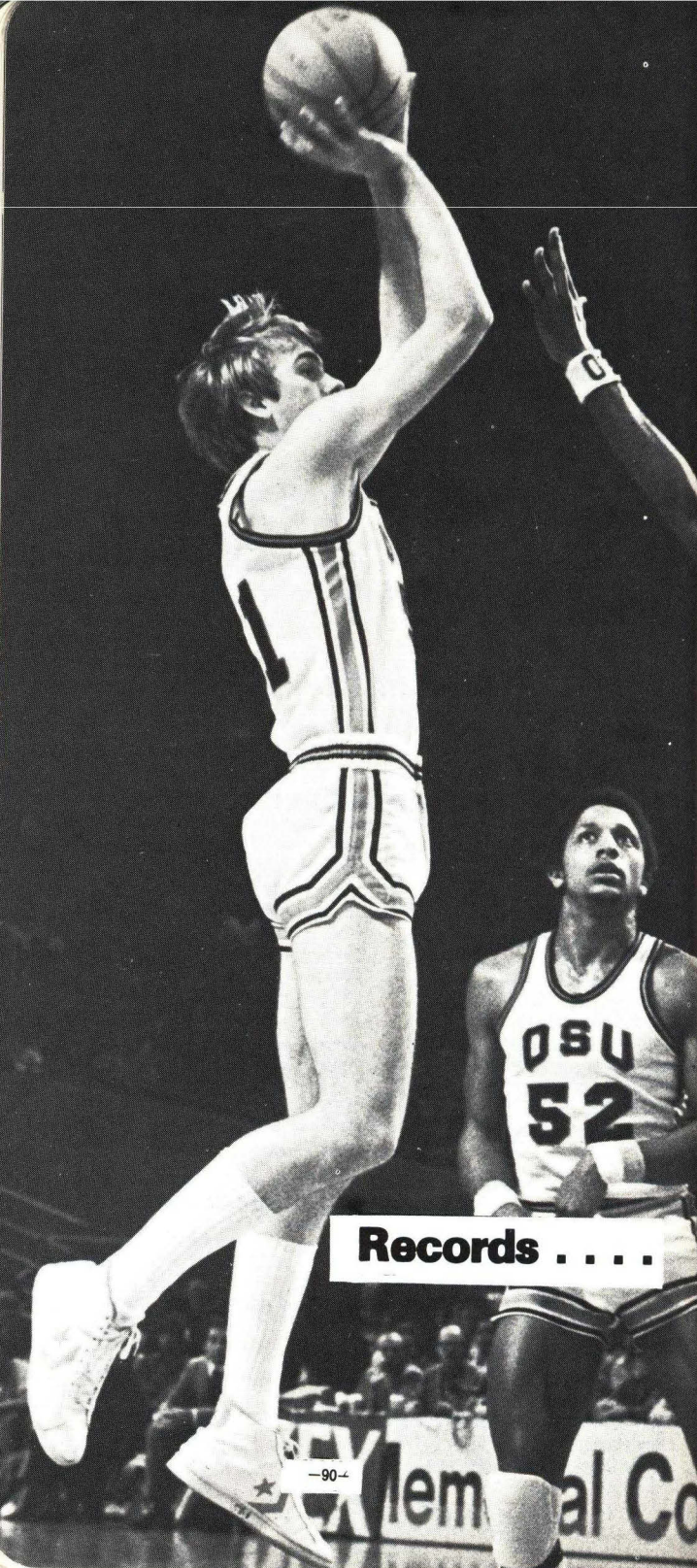

Most of the freshman scoring marks at Oregon State belong to Vince Fritz, Mel Counts, Steve Ericksen and Swede Halbrook.

Fritz, for example, holds the single game record of 48 points against the Linfield jayvees. He hit 19 of 32 shots from the field and added 10 of 12 free throws. He had 35 points in the first half and played only 32 minutes in the game.

Counts owns the freshman season record of 534 points in 20 games for a 26.7 average with his high being 41 against Clark College. Ericksen scored 519 points. Halbrook once scored 42 points against Moor's U-Drive AAU team of Vancouver.

1972 OSU Team Owns Point Record

Oregon State's 1971-72 basketball team finished the season as the highest scoring outfit in the school's history. The Beavers averaged 77.3 points per contest over the 28 game span. The 1975-76 season OSU averaged 76.7 per game.

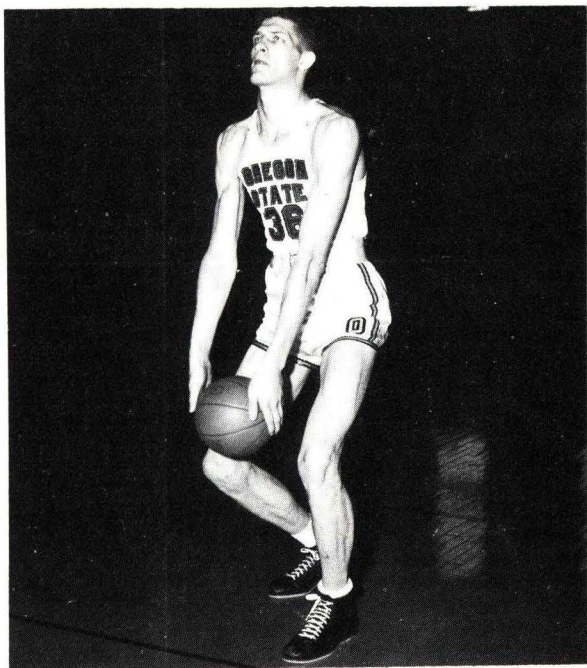

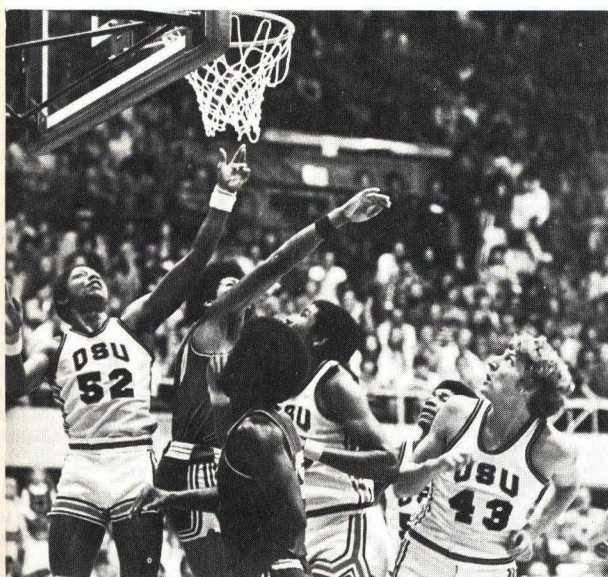

What They Said About OSU Last Year

"Oregon State is a team that may be on the threshold of greatness. What Ralph Miller is doing with that club is very exciting for someone who is a basketball purist. Seldom do you get outside players with the speed and quickness they have and still have a force in the middle like Steve Johnson," **Jim Brandenburg, Wyoming Coach**

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"I have to give Oregon State's Coach Ralph Miller credit for our zone offense. We saw what he did to open up the middle and it helped us," **Jack Schalow, Seattle Coach**

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"Outside of Michigan State, the Beavers are the most impressive team I've seen this year, and that includes games I've seen on television. They have all the ingredients to be an outstanding team . . . a championship team. They have the big guy (Johnson) in the middle. He's an offensive force and a big defensive factor. They have adequate overall size and outstanding quickness. Oregon State is playing excellent defense. This is just one of the best Oregon State teams I've seen in my 21 years in the league," **Marv Harshman, Washington Coach**

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"The Beavers are the No. 1 team, No doubt about it. They are the team to beat to win it all," Ned Wulk, Arizona State Coach before playing Beavers. "You guys (press) all laughed when I said Oregon State was the best team in the conference. I've felt that way ever since they beat the Russians. But you guys (press) think I'm being facetious. I meant that. I think they've got an outstanding team. They've got quickness, they play with intensity. I've coached against Ralph for 81 years and I know he thrives on this type of team. He's an excellent coach anyway, but I think this is what he wants," **Arizona State Coach Ned Wulk** said after losing to OSU 97-80.

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"They are real exciting to watch. Defense is what makes them go. Most teams can't handle that kind of pressure. It's a pleasure to see the ball go to the open man all the time instead of the player putting his head down and dribbling. They make the game easy," **Mel Counts, ex-OSU All-America and 12-year NBA veteran.**

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"How good is OSU? Very good," said **Dick DiBiao, Stanford Coach.** "I've always thought so. Their strengths are their quickness, agility, speed and ball handling ability. And that's what basketball is all about," said DiBiao.

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"We haven't played the Southern California schools, but if they're better than Oregon State I won't believe it," **Joe Nehls, Arizona guard and leading scorer.**

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"I don't want to come up here (Corvallis) as long as they (OSU) has those three guards. They make it impossible for you to get the ball where you're supposed to. I'm embarrassed about this," **Greg Goorjian, ASU guard.**

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"I personally think this is Ralph's best team ever. They don't do anything spectacular, they just do the basics. And they do a great job of them," **Fred Snowden, Arizona Coach**

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"The difference in their (OSU) big guards and other people's big guards is they're so quick, so powerful. They're the best four guards (Radford, Blume, Dwayne Allen, Jeff Stoutt) I've ever seen. They play like they're 5-10. But they're tremendously strong. Their passes travel 30 feet, like a bullet," **Fred Snowden, Arizona Coach**

"Oregon State hurt us. I'll tell you gentlemen, that's a very good ball club we defeated tonight," **Jud Heathcote, Michigan State Coach**

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"I wouldn't be surprised if they win the whole thing. They are good, and should be right on the money as long as Steve Johnson stays healthy," **George Raveling, WSU Coach**

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"Ralph really likes that team, you can tell. And so do I," **Jim Heffner, USC Assistant Coach**

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ON STEVE JOHNSON

"They (OSU) have one of the most promising young centers in all of basketball in Steve Johnson," **Dick DiBiao, Stanford Coach**

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ON BLUME, RADFORD

Asked to rank the best guard tandems in the Pacific-10 this season — "It's Blume and Radford, easily. They aren't flashy but they have no real weaknesses. They're unselfish, they shoot well, penetrate and play better defense than the rest. I'd call them the complete backcourt," **John Caselli, California guard.**

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ON DWAYNE ALLEN

"Never measure Dwayne Allen's performance by the scoring column. He is probably our most important, most consistent player. I've never had a more intimidating defensive player in the pressure game than Dwayne Allen. He has an excellent nose for the ball, and he and Mark (Radford) and Ray (Blume) go out there smelling it. But Dwayne is the key," **Ralph Miller, OSU Coach.**

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ON DWAYNE ALLEN

"I love that guy. I voted for him as the Most Valuable Player in the tournament (Far West Classic). He's something," **Jud Heathcote, Michigan State Coach.**

The Pacific-8 Conference was organized July 1, 1959 and was originally called the Athletic Association of Western Universities. The Conference adopted the name Pacific-8 Conference September 3, 1968.

Original 1959 conference membership consisted of University of California, University of Southern California, Stanford University, University of California, Los Angeles, and University of Washington. Washington State University became a member July 1, 1962, with the University of Oregon and Oregon State University joining July 1, 1964

Pacific-10 Conference Conference of Champions

For the ninth consecutive year, Pacific-8 Conference members have won at least five NCAA team championships in one year. It is a rather remarkable achievement considering the Pac-8, which became the Pac-10 Conference July 1, 1978 with the addition of University of Arizona and Arizona State University, is the only major collegiate athletic conference to ever win five national team championships in a single year.

Southern California led the way in 1977-78 as the Trojans won NCAA titles in track and field and baseball within the span of five days. Stanford won the tennis title, while California came out on top in water polo and Oregon ran away with the cross country championship.

Pacific-10 members have won NCAA team titles at an incredible rate. To illustrate — 13 basketball titles, more than any other conference. The Pac-10 is also the only conference to have four different members (UCLA, California, Oregon and Stanford) win the basketball title; 11 of the last 12 baseball titles; nine of the last 16 in swimming; 18 of the last 19 in tennis; 15 of the last 18 in outdoor track; seven of nine in volleyball; eight of the last nine in water polo.

Southern California is the national leader in both team and individual NCAA titles. The Trojans have won 63 team championships, with UCLA the runner-up with 36. USC has won at least one NCAA championship every year since 1959 and is the only school to ever win championships in seven different sports. Stanford is right behind, having won titles in six separate sports. A sport by sport look:

— Basketball — 13 titles overall, including 10 by UCLA in the last 15 years.

— Baseball — 18 titles overall, including 11 of the last 12. Southern California won this year, with new Pac-10 members Arizona State and Arizona winners in 1977 and 1976. Thus, the Pac-10 will have the past three national champions going head to head in conference play next season.

— Cross country — Oregon won in 1977. In fact, the Ducks have taken four of the last eight titles.

— Crew — Washington and California have taken 19 IRA Championships between them.

— Golf — Stanford has taken six titles. Arizona State was runner-up in 1978.

— Swimming — Southern California has won nine titles, including four in a row from 1974-1977. California won last year.

— Tennis — Almost totally dominated by the Pac-10 with 29 of 36 championships. Stanford won in 1977 and '78, UCLA and Southern California have each won 12 tennis titles, and UCLA won in 1979.

— Track (indoor) — Washington State won the 1977 title.

— Track (outdoor) — Southern California has won 27 of 58 NCAA track titles, including 1978. Arizona State won in 1977.

— Water Polo — Pac-10 teams have won nine of the last 10 titles contested. California, winners in 1977, has four titles, UCLA has three and Stanford won last year.

— Volleyball — Pac-10 has won seven of nine volleyball championships, with six of those victories by UCLA.

— Football — There is no NCAA championship in Division I, but Southern California has finished atop the wire service polls five times in the last 17 years.

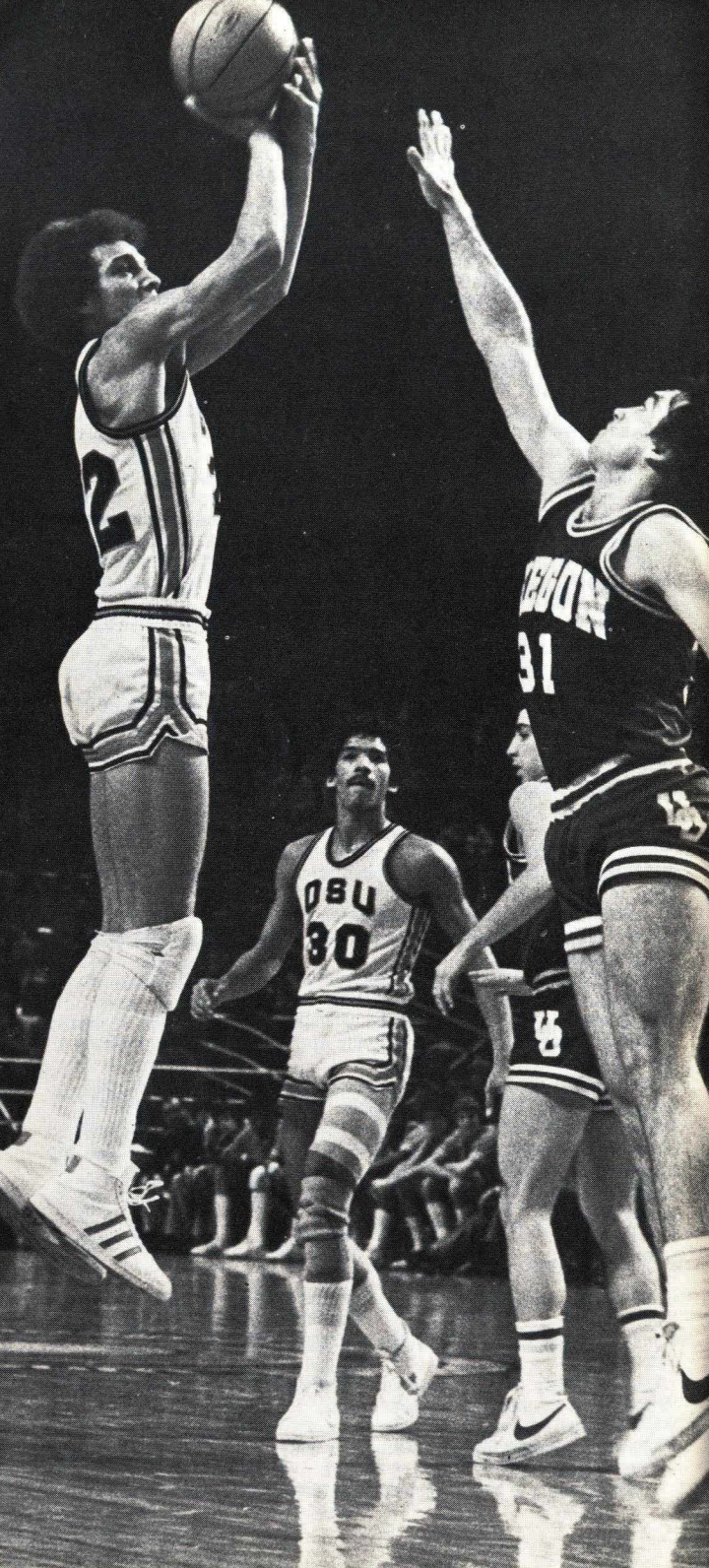
