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Authority on Animal Life to Appear at Lincoln High

MOTION pictures of wild animals of North America, taken when they did not suspect the presence of a human being, will be shown in the auditorium of Lincoln High School Wednesday night as one of the lectures of the school's lyceum course.

William L. Finley, noted western naturalist, who has been acclaimed one of the most outstanding authorities on wild animal life in the world, will be in Canton in person, to show the five reels of pictures and to tell something of his experiences when he carried his camera into almost inaccessible places in the Rock Mountains to take the pictures.

Finley, who has spent 25 years in tracking native American animals with the camera, has had many thrilling experiences. At one time, he dressed as a goat in order to be able to get closeup pictures of the wild mountain goats.

What Martin Johnson has done in dramatizing the wild life of African jungles, Finley and his wife have done for the wild animals of the Continental divide. Finley has caught the mountain goat play, the big black bears, the antelope, the mountain sheep, the fascinating bobcat, and all the other animals native to North America, in the most interesting of poses.

One of the five reels is called, "Getting Our Goat," and Finley took many daring chances in catching a camera study of the Rocky Mountain goat, the most daring steeple jack of the continent.

Finley, who is a native Oregonian, is known to hundreds of thousands of persons through his

thrilling photographs in the National Geographic, Atlantic monthly and other national publications.

The Finley pictures are said to be the finest films of American wild life ever made. Mr. Finley, however, is much more than a photographer. He is a recognized authority on the life and habits of wild animals and birds, a knowledge gained from intimate experience in studying natural history in all parts of the United States and Canada.
