## HUNTING BAN VISIONED

SHOOTING OF DUCKS MAY BE PROHIBITED, FINLEY SAYS.

Many Lakes Evaporate After Drouth and Drainage, Causing Heavy Death of Fowl.

Unless the United States and Canada can purchase and reflood certain ancestral breeding and feeding grounds of ducks and geese, which have been dried up by drouth and drainage for agricultural purposes, shooting of the birds will have to be prohibited, William L. Finley of Portland, member of the national advisory board under the migratory bird treaty act, said yesterday on his return from Washington, D. C., where he attended a meeting of the board.

The board, he reported, favored the introduction at the next session of congress of a bill creating a federal hunting tax or license to furnish money for purchasing some of these grounds. Many of the lands drained by men for agricultural purposes, Mr. Finley said, have proved to be of much less value for raising of produce than for breeding and feeding migratory birds.

A resume of reports from various parts of Canada and the United States, Mr. Finley said, indicated that 1931, the driest season on record, caused many ponds and lakes to evaporate and took great toll of ducks and geese. Also, during the past 20 years, 75,000,000 acres of natural feeding and breeding grounds have been drained as the agricultural industry developed in the United States and Canada. Many lakes in southeastern Oregon have dried up.
