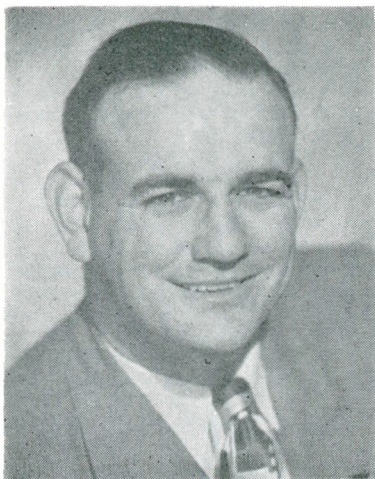

Prothro holds 2 wins and no losses over Stanford, California, Washington, Washington State and Idaho. He has single victories over Brigham Young and Missouri. He has defeated UCLA once and lost once to the Bruins. Only PCC clubs he has not beaten are USC and Oregon. He lost to USC in their one meeting, lost to Oregon once and was tied by the Ducks once. He lost twice to Iowa, 14-13 at Iowa City, and 35-19, at the Rose Bowl. Prothro's two-year league record is the best ever compiled by a Pacific Northwest school.

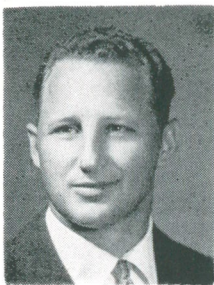

The Coaches

Tommy Prothro

Head Football Coach

Miracle man of Oregon State football . . . coach who did the impossible in building a doormat into a champion . . . choice citizen of Corvallis . . . grid genius who hasn't a one-track mind . . . a coach who draws the respect of everyone.

Those superlatives all describe 36-year old Tommy Prothro, the southern gentleman who led Oregon State football out of the wilderness smack into a Pacific Coast conference championship and berth in the Rose Bowl.

This will be Tommy's third season at the Orange helm, and Oregon Staters everywhere hope he'll be around for a good many years to come. Prothro's arrival at OSC three years ago came exactly at a time when Beaver football needed him most, and results since then are almost incredible.

First off, a second place finish in 1955 with basically the same personnel that wound up in the cellar just the season before. Then, a year later, the top prize in the league—the undisputed PCC crown and Pasadena berth on New Year's day. Few coaches anywhere, at any time, ever have so completely changed the football picture at their respective school in such a short space of time.

Some say that Prothro's biggest asset is his ability to get the utmost out of his players for each and every game—regardless of whether or not the opposition is heavily favored to win and boasts better personnel. To Beaver players, Prothro's word is final, and his analysis of a situation near-perfect.

Since moving to OSC, Tommy's teams have won 13 victories, as compared with six defeats (two by Iowa) and one tie. And, in the six setbacks, three were by one touchdown or less. All this for a school that had compiled only six total wins in three seasons of 1952, 1953 and 1954.

Prothro had a vast and distinct background in sports, dating back to the days when he competed in football, basketball, and track for Central high in his native Memphis, Tenn. in the years 1934-35-36. He participated in all those sports at Riverside Military academy in 1936-37-38. At Duke university in Durham, N.C., he was first-string blocking quarterback under Coach Wallace Wade.

He received the Jacobs award as the best blocker in the south and the Mills award for being the best blocker in the east. Prothro performed against Oregon State in the "Transplanted" Rose Bowl game of Jan. 1, 1942 at Durham. The Beavers upset Duke, 20-16, in that tilt.

Tommy also participated in baseball and lacrosse at Duke from 1938 to 1942. In 1942, he joined the navy and in 1945 was discharged as a lieutenant. Prothro coached the Vanderbilt university "B" squad in 1946 and in 1947 became backfield coach under Red Standers at Vanderbilt. Shortly before entering the service, he was line coach at Western Kentucky.

He went to UCLA with Sanders in 1949 as backfield coach and remained there until moving to OSC as headman prior to the 1955 campaign. Prothro generally is credited with developing such top backs at UCLA as Paul Cameron, Primo Villanueva and Bob Davenport. His first all-American at OSC was John Witte, who was a consensus choice in 1956.

Tommy is the son of well-known baseball figure "Doc" Prothro, one-time manager of the Philadelphia Phils and many other clubs. He is a nephew of Gen. Clifton B. Cates, former commandant of the U. S. Marine Corps. Tommy's attractive wife is the former Shirley Seagle of Memphis.

Assistant Coaches

CLAY STAPLETON

1st Assistant

Right-hand man to Coach Tommy Prothro at OSC is another southerner well-versed in the intricate balanced line single wing system, popular Clay "Stud" Stapleton. The one-time guard star at the University of Tennessee fits in perfectly with Prothro and the other assistants in building Oregon State into a national grid power.

Stapleton was a three-sports star at Fleming, Kentucky, and was an all-state grid lineman in his senior year. He played at Tennessee under Gen. Bob Neyland in 1941, 1946 and 1947, and was a member of the Orange Bowl squad of 1947.

While in the Navy during World War II, Stapleton was a Chief Aviation Metalsmith. After discharge, he was line coach for five seasons under Phil Dickens at Wofford college in Spartanburg, South Carolina. He moved to Wyoming with Dickens as line mentor, where he served until he came to OSC prior to the 1955 season. He is married to the former Edith Tucker and has no children. Like Prothro, he is 36 years of age.

BOB ZELINKA

Line Coach

Every coaching staff needs a "spirit man" to keep things moving along, and at OSC that person is hustling Bob "Tiger" Zelinka, another capable Red Sanders protege from UCLA. Zelinka attended high school in Los Angeles, where he was a guard star, and later went to Santa Ana junior college where he starred before transferring to the Bruins.

Zelinka played for the Bruins in 1950 and 1951, graduating in 1952. He assisted with 1952 spring practice at UCLA and coached the line for the San Diego navy in 1952-54. He then returned to UCLA as freshman line coach.

Sanders once referred to "Tiger" as the "finest coaching prospect to attend UCLA since I've been here." Much of the success for developing all-America tackle John Witte goes to Zelinka. He helps provide the spark and enthusiasm in practice. Zelinka is the youngest member of the staff at 28.

BOB WATSON
Backfield Coach

Anyone who has followed state of Oregon athletics for the past 15 years would soon recognize the name Bob Watson, for he's one of the all-time greats to come out of Medford high school in southern Oregon. While a prep star, Watson swept all-state honors in both football and basketball in 1946.

Watson turned down numerous college offers to enroll at UCLA and play three seasons of football with the Bruins—both as end and as a back. He graduated from UCLA in 1951 and assisted with spring practice there when free from his job with a metropolitan firm.

Like so many of his OSC coaching adversaries, Watson is well-versed in single-wing football and is also one of the best scouts in the business. He's a great outdoor enthusiasts and plays a lot of recreational tennis.

Watson is married, has two children and is 29 years old.

DICK TWENGE
Assistant Coach

They called him Dick "The Tank" Twenge when as an Oregon State fullback he was banging away with great success at opposition lines from 1946 through 1949. Now he's one of Tommy Prothro's valuable assistant coaches, on the staff of his alma mater.

Twenge was a prep star at Newberg high school, south of Portland. He served in the Navy in World War II and came to OSC in the fall of 1946, winning a first-string berth on the varsity as a freshman. A regular left half at first, he spent his final three seasons at fullback.

The Newberg product, now 30, first coached at Tigard high and later at Corvallis, where he compiled top records. He joined Kip Taylor's staff as freshman coach in 1954 and is the lone holdover from that staff.

He is married and the father of three children.

JOHN THOMAS
Assistant Coach

Thomas played football at OSC from 1949 through 1951, serving as team captain one year, and ranged as one of the better ends on the coast.

John came to OSC from St. Benedict's Prep, near Newark, N.J. He won three letters in football and as a sophomore was named most valuable player on the squad. As a catcher in baseball, he gained three awards and won all-coast honors.

Following graduation from OSC, Thomas served in the Air Force in Japan, where he gained valuable coaching experience and at the same time played both football and baseball. He was all-service in both sports. Thomas is 28 years old and single.

General Outlook

This is the year of the big question in Oregon State football.

CAN THE BEAVERS NAIL DOWN THEIR SECOND SUCCESSIVE PACIFIC COAST CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIP?

A lot of pre-season prognosticators already have singled out Oregon State as the team to beat in the 1957 grid chase on the slopes of the Pacific—which comes as somewhat of a tribute to Tommy Prothro and his efficient single wing staff. But you'll find nobody in the Beaver camp ready to lay claim to the title until that final game is played late in November. Everyone at Oregon State well realizes how tough it might be, and that champions are made in the fall—not the summer months.

Basically, this should be one of Oregon State's strongest teams, possibly even, the best Prothro has had since he took over the coaching reins in 1955. On the probable starting eleven, there's a letterman at every position. The Beavers have experienced ball-toters and fair size up front. And in several lads, they have good speed.

It's a matter of depth, or lack of it, that causes OSC fans the most worry. In some spots, the Beavers are shallow. Loss through injury of any of their starters would hurt, for Prothro's second lineup likely will consist of eight sophomores, two juniors and a senior. On his third unit, it's seven sophomores, which should be implication enough that beyond the first eleven, Oregon State has an inexperienced ball club.

Inexperience often can be offset, in part, by spirit—and at OSC since Prothro took over, spirit has been the biggest item of all. In a large part, it has brought the Beavers through to a second and first place PCC finish in two seasons. It was evident in 1957 spring practice that Tommy Prothro's legions plan no let-up in their determination drive. This is sure to be another of Prothro's spirited Oregon State football teams.

The Beavers lost heavily through graduation and other channels. They lost six 1956 regulars, mentioned here with minutes played in parenthesis—LE Norm Thiel (333), LT John Witte (424), LG John Sniffen (433), C Dick Corrick (318), Blocking Back Gerry Laird (338) and FB Tom Berry (446). All that, to go along with reserves Frank Negri (304) and Paul Lowe (230), reflects a lot of experience that will be missing.

It's a big challenge this fall for Oregon State.

Those close to the scene sincerely feel the Beavers are ready to accept the challenge. Win or lose, it should be a successful season for Oregon State football.
