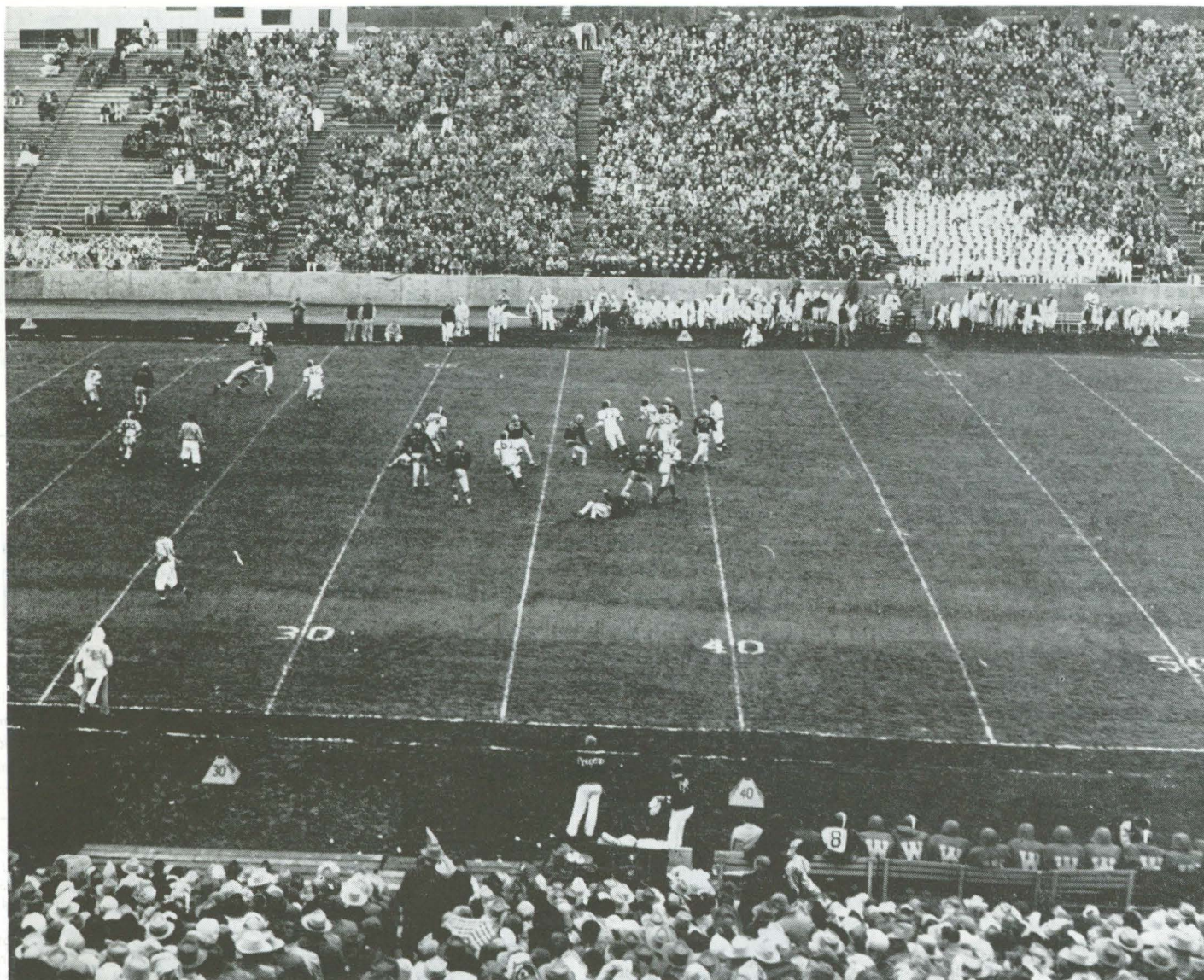
WITHYCOMBE HALL is one of the latest additions to the Oregon State College campus. It now combines with Food Technology building, Sackett Hall, and excellent landscaping to create a remarkable effect on the western fringe of the OSC campus. This area is called the Mall and it is one of which the casual visitor to the campus is usually unaware.

The building was dedicated May 24, 1952. There was no frantic searching of names for this animal industry building. Withycombe, after Dr. James Withycombe, was a natural choice.

Doctor Withycombe was born in 1854 and died in 1919. At the College he was first head of the animal husbandry and dairy department. He was state veterinarian, director of the experiment station and then finally governor of the state of Oregon.

Our poetess, Elizabeth Crawford Yates, '05, looked at the cover picture and was impressed by the reflections. Her poem gives tribute to the high standards set by Dr. James Withycombe.

A NEW ERA in Oregon State Homecomings blossomed during Homecoming weekend November 13 and 14.

An air of festivity swept over both students and over 4000 returning alumni and turned Corvallis into a crowded, fun-loving city for two days.

Weeks before Homecoming, intricate machinery was set into motion. There was plenty to do. Parker stadium was to be dedicated. There was a last minute rush to finish the myriad of details on the sparkling new football plant. Workmen struggled against time to whip the stadium area into shape. The fence around the stadium was quickly wired into place. The scoreboard was hoisted up and secured, the flagpole was encased in a concrete base and loads of gravel were spread around the soggy stadium area.

It had rained some the week before the game. Clouds and the warnings of approaching storms caused many persons to cast a wary eye toward the Pacific slopes. Friday night as many alumni dropped into Corvallis a slight drizzle fell but the colorful house signs, the noise parade and Rook bonfire scornfully ignored the weather.

Winning house signs this year were Alpha Omicron Pi, Sigma Phi Epsilon, Azalea House, and Hawthorne Manor. Second place awards went to Pi Beta Phi, Phi Kappa Psi, Sackett, and Gatch. Third were Alpha Chi Omega, Sigma Nu, Winston House, and Beaver Lodge.

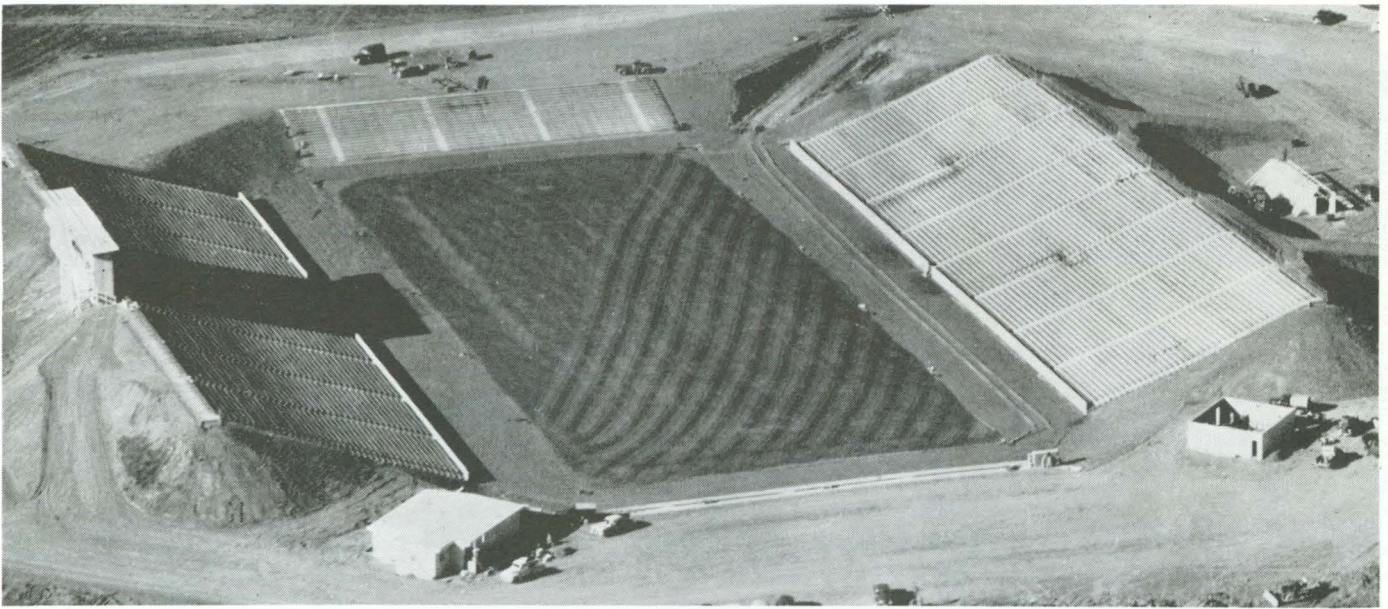
Winners of the noise parade contest were Delta Gamma and Theta Xi.

Saturday morning sparkled clear and sunny. It looked as if Homecoming was

blessed with good weather. Just before 10 a.m. the downtown parade began and units from marching bands to the Grants Pass Cavemen made up the show. Around 10:30 a.m. the winds whipped the clouds in from the Pacific ocean and true Oregonians were vindicated by their choice of rain gear.

The annual alumni barbecue in the armory served close to 2000 persons from 11 a.m. until 1 p.m. The rush of alumni around 12:30 jammed the serving lines but everyone enjoyed meeting old classmates and friends.

The impressive stadium dedication ceremonies began at 1 p.m. Marching units of the ROTC, the band, and dignitaries trudged onto the new Parker Stadium turf. Lynn Sabin, '20, sketched the background of the stadium campaign over four years. Charles Parker, '08, spoke briefly and then President



Strand accepted the stadium for Oregon State College. A plaque saying, "Parker Stadium, dedicated November 14, 1953," was unveiled. The teams came out onto the field again and the game between the Cougars and the Beavers began.

That the Orange and Black twisted the Cougar tail and made him say "uncle" would be an understatement. The OSC gridgers gave a preview of the afternoon on the very first play of the game when Halfback Jack Peterson raced 23 yards around right end. From then on it was all Oregon State.

The Beavers cruised up and down the gridiron and finally scored late in the second quarter. WSC failed to live up to its press notices. They also failed to come close to OSC's goal line all afternoon and the home team won 7 to 0. The field, which was planted only two months previous to the game, held up in wonderful fashion. There was just a hint of rain during the contest but the wind swept in hard from the southwest.

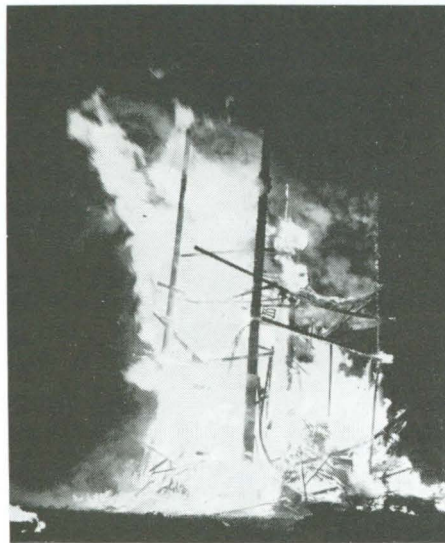
Most of the 13,500 fans at the game went away happy and many of them sampled the coffee and donuts in the coliseum immediately after the game. Living groups held open house for the alumni and that night the Homecoming dance was held in the coliseum.

There is still work to do at the stadium before the first game of the season next September 25 with Idaho. A few kinks will have to be ironed out. The late fans were jammed up on the ramps and they had a difficult time in getting to their seats.

There was much praise for the new stadium though. Sports writers were treated to a plush press box. They will get the word around now that OSC has athletic facilities unequaled by many colleges.

The Homecoming game for next year is undecided at the moment. Only two games are definitely scheduled at Corvallis. Idaho at the beginning of the season and Oregon at the end. Chances are that the UCLA game will be changed from Portland to Corvallis. This might be the Homecoming game of 1954.

Alumni who attended this great Homecoming will undoubtedly be back for more next year. Those who missed the 1953 Homecoming passed up a great show . . . They should return in '54.



First aerial view of Parker Stadium taken several weeks before Homecoming game. Beavers now boast of some of the best athletic facilities in nation.

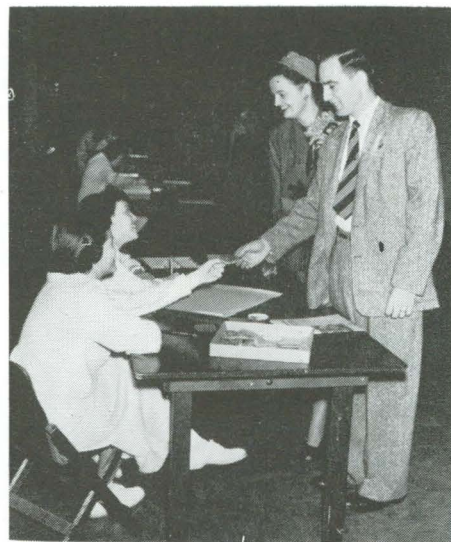

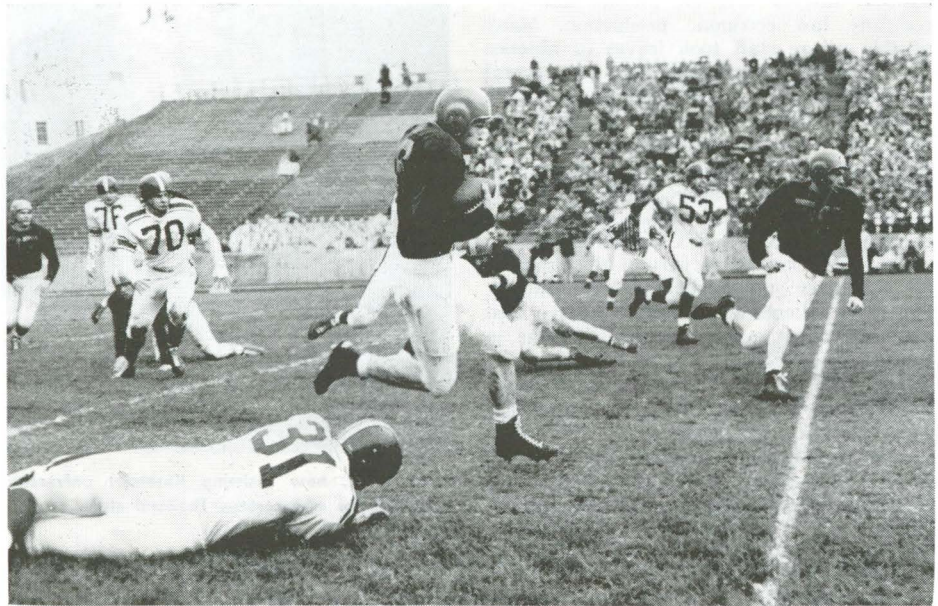

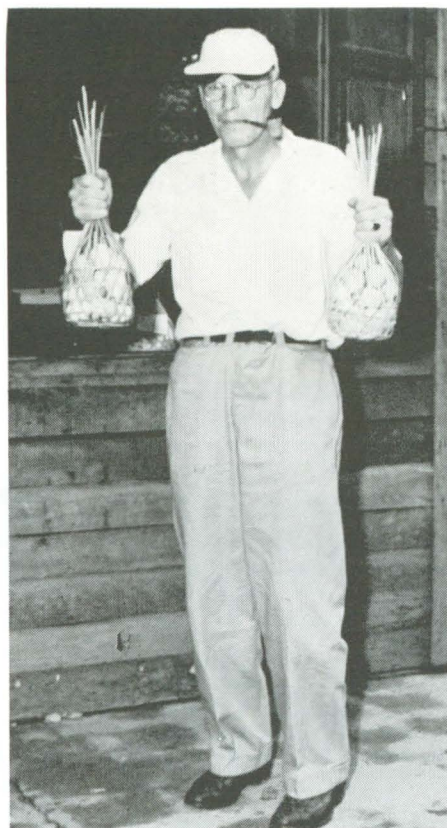

SEVERAL YEARS ago the faculty of Oregon State College became interested in the "technical assistance" (or Point IV) programs which grew out of the suggestions made by Secretary George Marshall in his commencement address at Harvard University in 1947. The idea of helping some of the so-called backward nations to help themselves, as an important adjunct to a foreign policy designed to combat the spread of Communism in the world, caught on rapidly. It appealed to the American missionary spirit; it was something of a definite nature that we could do; and it was soundly conceived for everyone is aware that Communism thrives best on the ills that accompany low economic production. Many of the college staff took leaves of absence and accepted assignments in the several federal agencies engaged in the assistance work. A few who were about to retire anyway, and others who resigned from the staff, are still so employed in countries of Central America, Europe, and Asia. One of our agricultural economists was on leave three years with the E.C.A. in Europe.

As a very important part of the program of assistance to disadvantaged countries, American colleges and universities have been urged to adopt, as it were, institutions in foreign countries or the countries themselves. Utah State College assumed rather heavy responsibilities in Iran, Michigan State College in Columbia, etc. The University of Michigan is working with the University of the Philippines. Cornell has an excellent program going with the College

announce the name of the institution, much less spell it. And besides the weather on Okinawa is terrible.) Nevertheless, the defeat spurred our interest. As a result of much letter writing and inquiries on the part of Dr. Ira S. Allison, chairman of our committee, and to some extent the coincidence of Mr. Austin Flegel, of Portland, being assigned as Chief of the M.S.A. mission to Thailand, we learned of Kasetsart university.

Kasetsart is located in Bangkok, Thailand. It is a state university but rather involved in its organization and financial support. As we did not care to enter into a proposition about which we knew very little, the Mutual Security Agency, now known as the Foreign Operations Administration, offered to send one of our staff to Thailand to investigate the possibilities. Professor E. L. Potter spent the month of September, 1952, at Bangkok, and returned with much enthusiasm for the project and for the Siamese people. However, in his report to the college and to the M.S.A., he made it clear that certain changes and improvements would have to be brought about before we should enter into any contract. For instance, the budget needed to be consolidated instead of being dispersed through several ministries of the government. The development of the campus at Bangkok, some twelve or fourteen kilometers out of Bangkok, should be facilitated by the construction of living quarters for the staff, sanitary measures taken to guard the health of faculty and students, and some deficiencies in laboratory

of Agriculture and Forestry at Los Baños, in the Philippines. There are many more. All find the cooperation very stimulating and there is little doubt about the value of the work in making real friends for America.

We at Oregon State, considering the present and probable future trade relations of the Pacific Northwest, thought we would like an institution in one of the countries of the Pacific Basin. A committee of the faculty decided it would be best to have a non-sectarian institution which would have

approximately the same educational interests as we have, at least primarily—that is, agriculture, forestry, engineering, home economics, science, etc. We lost out to Michigan State in a contest for a new university started by the U. S. Army on the island of Okinawa and known as the University of the Ryukyus. As in football, we gave them a close race, but the American Council on Education, which acted as the umpire for the Army, decided that Michigan State was the winner. (It is probably just as well for most of us would never have learned to pro-

accommodations corrected.

Last spring another member of the staff, J. R. Beck, together with Mrs. Beck, went to Thailand to work out the recommended changes with the Thai government and have been there ever since. A proposed contract has recently been received from him. The arrangement is to be financed by the Foreign Operations Administration for of course no state money could be used for such purposes. Our main contribution will be to furnish four or five teachers and in-

TWO MEN's cooperative dormitories will be constructed on the OSC campus next spring and summer as a promising experiment in a somewhat new type of housing. The two houses will be part of the college dormitory system but will be small units for 60 men each. This is something entirely new on this campus and so far as can be determined here will be the first housing of this particular type on any major college campus.

It is, in a way, a decentralization of mass dormitory living, eliminating some of the objectionable features of large dormitories and permitting some of the advantages claimed for smaller-unit fraternity-type of living. The plan is in sharp contrast with some tendencies in other colleges for mammoth dormitories—Michigan State, for example, which is in the midst of construction of a \$13,500,000 dormitory to house some 700 men.

The co-op dormitories will be constructed on the site of old Hudson Hall, which was a temporary structure brought in from the Vancouver shipyards in the big-enrollment era following the war. Hudson Hall, just east of Sackett Hall and west on Jefferson Way from the men's main dorm, was badly damaged by fire last year while standing idle, and is now being torn down.

The two new two-story buildings including furnishings will cost about \$134,000 each, according to E. B. Lemon, dean of administration. Funds will come from a little war housing surplus, restoration funds from Hudson Hall fire and a bond issue that will be paid off from rental income.

Regular college dormitories must be self-financing and since Sackett Hall is still being paid for—and this obligation will be continued for some time—there are no resources for a new dormitory of the usual type, anyway. Experience with Azalea House, the new co-op dorm for women, showed that this type of small-unit housing can be constructed for about half the per-student cost of the large dorms.

Living in these new co-op dormitories will be a little different than in the regular dormitories. They will be complete units in themselves. The men will operate their own food service and hire their own cooks and other help that is absolutely necessary, but the men will do most of their own work to reduce costs and carry their own load on a co-operative basis.

Residents will be selected from men who apply for dormitory housing and who are willing to join with others in contributing some of their time to operation and management of the house to reduce costs.

Dean Lemon says he believes the co-op dorms will be popular not only because of the modest saving in costs but also because

they will provide more of an atmosphere for small-group living and will eliminate some of the quantity-food gripes that almost periodically arise from dormitory residents.

Construction on the co-op dorms will get underway next spring and they are expected to be ready for occupancy next fall.

Azalea House, which was made possible through contributions of 15,000 home economics extension unit members throughout the state, is sort of the "pilot plan" for the new men's houses. Co-ops for both men and women have long existed at OSC but these two new houses will be the first to be operated directly within the dormitory system.

While we're on the subject of housing and buildings, a statement made by Dr. R. E. Kleinsorge, president of the state board of higher education, at the dedication of Azalea House is worth passing on. Among other things, Dr. Kleinsorge, who for many years has taken an intense interest in the system's building program as chairman of the board's building committee, said:

"One of the most pressing problems facing the board at the present time, as we look into the future just a few years, is to obtain the funds necessary to construct adequate housing and more classrooms on the various campuses to take care of the great enrollment increases that will soon be upon us.

"We must make immediate provision in our building program and in funds sought from the legislature to care for this great need. We do not want students housed in plywood dormitories or classes conducted in temporary huts. Such buildings are inadequate, expensive to build and maintain.

"If the state will provide sufficient funds annually to build up the physical plants of the various schools making up the state

system of higher education, we can meet the increasing demands without too great a strain upon the state's finances."

Incidentally, the large quonset hut back of the men's dorm which was built in 1946 to serve as a cafeteria for students living in temporary Central and Hudson Halls will be developed into a naval science armory.

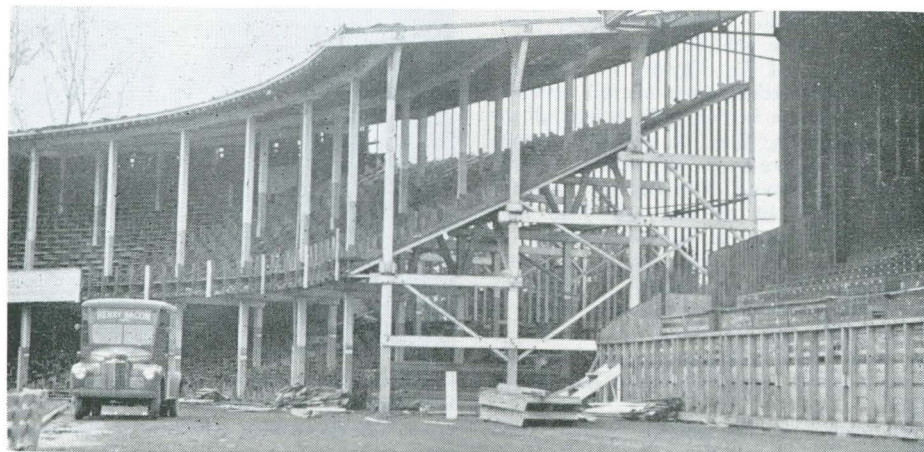
The main 40 by 100 foot section will be used as an inside drill area, an auditorium for training films and lectures and for offices. The 40 by 60 foot wing, formerly the kitchen, will be converted into classrooms. A third 24 by 70 foot wing will be used for weapons and equipment storage and training. All have concrete floors.

The Naval ROTC has been in rather cramped quarters in a quonset hut next to the forestry building, with some offices in the forestry building. The new armory, which has been commended by officers of the 13th Naval District, will release the hut and rooms in the forestry building for other classes.

WINNING is fun, but it isn't everything. . .

We learned that axiom the hard way this fall, in watching the football Beavers take their lumps one time after another—and still give it the old college try, without any sign of disorganization, whimper or alibi. Any less-determined group of young men might have folded completely, under the circumstances, but not so with the 1953 squad members. It's easy to string along with a winner, but the real test comes when you're losing.

From a won and lost standpoint, the '53 campaign turned out just about as expected. With only limited material, the going would naturally be rough against such opponents as Michigan State, UCLA, Stanford, USC, California and Oregon. Despite all the setbacks, disappointments and heartaches, however, it was truly wonderful to watch those kids hold on to their spirits—week in and week out. And those of you who returned to the campus for the Homecoming game and stadium dedication will certainly agree.

Unfortunately, the deadline for this column preceded the traditional game and season's finale with the University of Oregon at Eugene. The Webfoots, with their best team in years, were heavily favored to win. But regardless of what happened in that game, the '53 Beavers will always be remembered as the club that wouldn't quit.

The two victories, at this writing, were posted over Idaho and Washington State. And both those schools were favored to whip the men of Kip Taylor. The Cougars, in particular, packed more overall material, and deserved the favored role. It was all the more gratifying, then, to see the Orange edge the Cougars by a 7-0 count in a wonderful Homecoming. The Beavers won far more respect out of that one than they lost in losing some of the other battles.

Parker Stadium, in case you didn't know, is the plush new grid plant of the Beavers. Threatening weather kept the crowd at a 13,500 figure, but it's almost a certainty we can draw 25,000 in future seasons. Especially if the football team plays as it did against WSC.

We had some fine players on the roster this fall. Who would deny that Right Halfback Ralph Carr is one of the best in the conference? Or that Captain LaVerne Fer-

guson and Center Joe Fulwyler are capable of playing on any football team. And certainly Left Halfback Jack Peterson has the

natural speed and running ability to compete with the best. In short, Oregon State just didn't have enough "horses" to keep pace with the chase.

Remember—we only lose nine men from the entire squad of 1953. Returning next September will be such men as Peterson, and Wes Ediger, and Bill Johnson. Dick Van Lom, Andy Skief, Laird Brattain, Tommy Little—they're all right there for the '54 nucleus. And give long overdue credit to Jimmy Withrow, the quarterback with still another year remaining. Withrow, please recall, was the man of the hour in both Beaver victories. He played all season long minus 20 of his normal poundage. He also became a top-flight defensive halfback.

You'll be hearing about some of our freshmen, too. They lost a 7-6 heartbreaker to the Oregon Frosh, but it was the type of contest that could have gone either way. Our personal guess is that the Rooks could whip the Ducklings three out of four times, were that to happen. They trounced Lower Columbia JC, 57-6, in their only other competition.

So in wrapping up football for another year, let us leave this passing thought.

"It wasn't easy, to lose in stride. Defeats were black, and tough on pride. But battle they did, with spirits high. A bright future looms, beckoning nigh."

Things are looking up—way up—in Oregon State basketball.

Principal reason, of course, stems around a 7 foot 3 inch sophomore center named Swede Halbrook. The big guy, reportedly the tallest college player in the nation, has all the qualifications to be an all-time great. He's agile, a good shot, and can play defense. Whether he will rise to the occasion as a sophomore is another chance for speculation. We think he will. And he should have a lot of help from such veterans as Tony Vlastelica (6-5), Ted Romanoff (6-8), Johnny Jarboe (6-2), Ron Robins (5-8), Bill Toole (5-10), Reggie Halligan (6-2), Tex Whiteman (6-6) and Ron Fundingsland (5-10). Up from the 1953 freshman club that lost only one game out of 18 are Ralph Carroll (6-8), Jerry Crimins (6-0), Jim Moya (5-9) and Larry Paulus (6-5). Many of the sophs likely will see only practice action this winter, but are sure to aid the cause in future years. And best of all—Romanoff is the only senior on the squad.

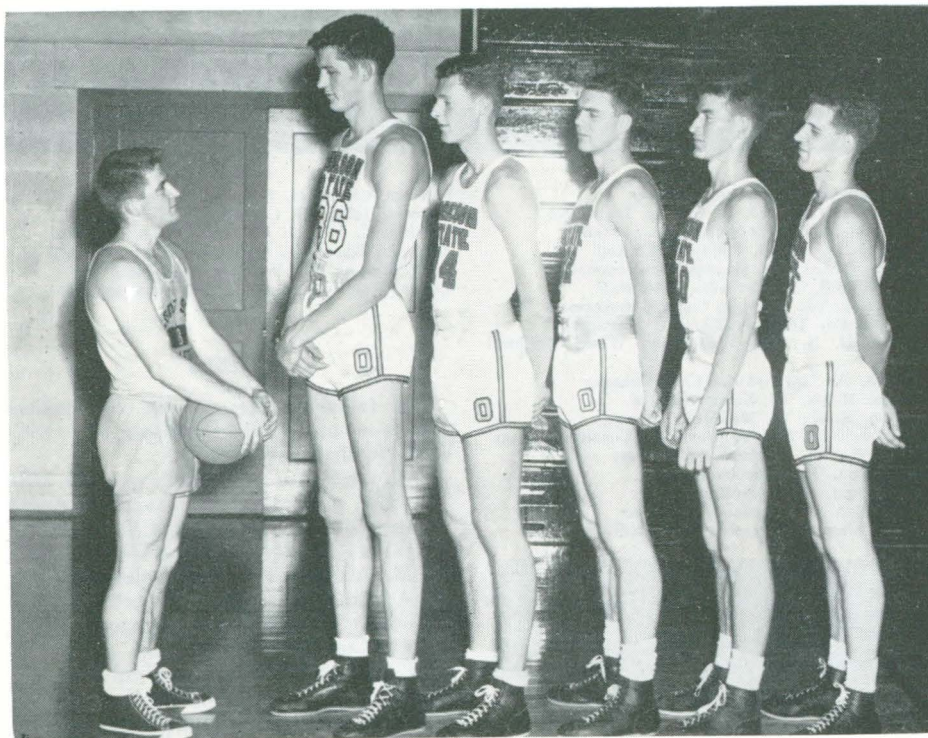
Jay Dean, the big 6-5 baseball first-baseman, is giving basketball a try, too. He missed the last two seasons because of illness, but when in top physical condition is somewhat of a basketeer. As a rebound man, he could be another John Mandic.

In early drills, Coach Slats Gill apparently was set on at least four of his possible starters. He used Vlastelica at one forward post, Halbrook at center and Robins and Toole at guards. This could all change by the time you pick up your Oregon Stater, however. For the fifth man, Gill was alternating among four players. Tex Whiteman, Larry Paulus and Romanoff would add height to the lineup, while Jarboe probably has more all-around versatility.

The so-called experts have already placed Oregon State on the "spot" for the coming season. Almost unanimously, the Beavers have been picked to win the northern division flag. While such pre-season ratings

often fail to materialize, it still feels nice, and hasn't happened for several years. At OSC, we all realize that Oregon will again be strong, and Idaho didn't lose too many men from the team that placed second to Washington last year. Jack Friel has a knack for developing tough Cougar teams, and while Tippy Dye at Washington doesn't have touted material on hand, it's difficult to surmise the Huskies as weak.

All in all, it should be Oregon State's most interesting season since 1949.

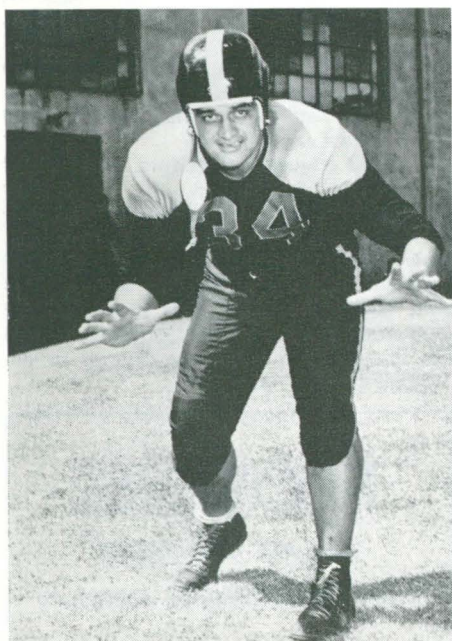

As usual the University of Oregon football squad apparently believed their press clippings and figured all they would have to do would be to make an appearance on the field for the annual "Civil War" November 21.

As usual the befuddled Ducks tasted defeat against Oregon State.

It was the fifth straight year that the Beavers had won over Oregon.

That it is a tradition at OSC to take the "Big One" can hardly be denied. Coach Kip Taylor has never lost to Oregon.

The Orange and Black gridders, didn't fare too well during the early season. They failed to score the first five games. But all this time the inexperienced OSC club gained a little more experience and a little more confidence.

Starting with the Idaho game the Beavers came to life. They took that game 19 to 0. Next came touted Michigan State. The Beavers lost 34 to 6 but seemed to find themselves during the last half. The Spartans scored only once the last half.

The Homecoming game with the Cougars verified the fact that Oregon State gridders had found themselves. They dominated play and won 7 to 0.

Now for the Ducks. Touted as being one of the "greatest" Oregon teams in recent years the Ducks had lost quite a few games but still were favored over OSC by 13 points.

The Beaver line rocked and socked 'em right from the beginning. Late in the first quarter Oregon confidently went back to pass deep in their own territory. The pass bounced off the Duck receiver and Tommy Little, Beaver fullback and son of former football star Frank Little, '32, grabbed the pigskin and raced untouched 25 yards for the score.

That was it as far as scoring went. The Beavers kept their opponents well bottled up and the Ducks could only manage to get down to the OSC 20 yard line. Here is how the PCC ended.

Over 4,000 visiting alumni were included in the crowd of 13,500 persons present at the inaugural of Parker stadium. The traditional Homecoming events of noise parade, house signs, barbecue, midnight show, and presentation of the queen and her court all sparked the enthusiasm and enjoyment of Oregon Staters, past and present.

Prizes galore were presented to spectators at the game. One co-ed, a Portland girl, hasn't decided yet whether she was lucky or not—she won 1,010 pounds of prime beef still on the hoof and very much alive. Asked how she liked her new Aberdeen Angus steer, she commented, "Haven't gone to see him yet, I'm afraid I might become attached to him." Agreed, he would make an awkward house pet!

The world-famous Longines Symphonette orchestra, with their performance in Gill coliseum recently, opened the fall concert series on the campus. The group is on an 18-week tour through the United States and Canada. The 31 New York musicians were under the direction of Mischel Piasiro, who was with the New York Philharmonic Symphony orchestra for many years.

A new approach to encouraging student attendance at convocations will be tried this year. In the past, all freshmen have been required to attend convos; Talons and Thanes enforced the tradition. The new policy makes each living group responsible for the attendance of its members. The hope is that voluntary attendance will make convos more appealing to students, both upperclassmen as well as Rooks.

Dedication of the new wing on the home economics building has been set for February 20. All alumnae of the home economics school will be invited to attend the ceremony. The new home ec auditorium has already become a valuable and much-used site for convocations. In it was held a memorial service for the three OSC navy reserve officer training corps cadets killed July 17 at Minton, Florida, during a summer camp air transfer lift. The three, Dennis Sheets, Portland; Jerald Robin Russell, Orland, Cal.; and Elwood Albert Tracy, Klamath Falls; were among 41 killed in the crash of a flight from Corpus Christi, Texas, to Norfolk, Virginia. Four Corvallis ministers and the chaplain of the thirteenth naval district, Seattle, took part in the service. Organ music and choral selections by the OSC music department contributed to the memorial tribute.

A color movie including scenes of the Oregon State campus had its premiere showing during the annual journalism open house sponsored by Theta Sigma Phi, national professional honorary for women in journalism. The film was produced for the Oregon state system of higher education as a training experiment for the staff by the departments of visual instruction. Scenes show the threefold functions of colleges in Oregon; instruction, research and service. The eight Oregon campuses are included in the movie, together with several experiment stations and demonstration areas.

1,400 pints has been set as the goal for this year's campus blood drive. The blood will be used for the production of gamma globulin to fight polio and measles. Some will also be used by the armed services, and by civilian hospitals.

Exchange dinners between sororities have been inaugurated this fall by Panhellenic. Under the new system, which is the same as that used for men's and women's living group exchanges, half of the group's members will remain at their own house, and half will go to the other house for dinner. The system has been established as a method of strengthening Panhellenic relations and to help members become better acquainted.

investigators in fields fundamental to the improvement of Thai agriculture and fisheries. Not all have to be from our staff; we can engage competent persons from outside the staff if we can find them.

In September we profited in our thinking from a visit here by two high officials of the Thai government: Mr. Phra Prakas, under-secretary of the Ministry of Agriculture, and Mr. Insee, director general of the Department of Agriculture. Both are men of very high caliber. They pointed out the danger of persons unfamiliar with a country making recommendations on the applications of science and technology. They want, on the other hand, fundamental teaching on which they, themselves, in Thailand, can build sound and profitable applications. Some of the subjects would be chemistry, soil science, and aquatic biology. The latter is important from the standpoint of the development of their large fishery interests. Fish is the main source of protein for all the rice-eating peoples of Southeast Asia. This concept made very good sense to us and gave a good basis for developing our plans. Fundamental science is the same in Thailand as in Oregon; we couldn't go wrong on that. They want also the visiting instructors to do as much research as they may have time to do.

Both Professors Potter and Beck have observed one thing that should be of interest to our child development specialists. The Thai children are so well behaved, friendly, and courteous that it was hard to believe. Perhaps we can learn a good deal from the Siamese as well as helping them.

There is one condition to be fulfilled which is very important to the success of any such project as this. Persons engaged in it must be interested in something more than the advantages of foreign travel. They must have a sincere interest in the work and in the people. To me the best example is the institution at Los Baños, a few miles south of Manila, in the Philippines, which I mentioned above in connection with Cornell university. I have seen no other educational institution anywhere superior to Los Baños in what it does to its graduates and to others who have contact with it. Its indomitable spirit and the nobleness associated with its name and reflection in its students did not just happen. They came from the hard work and sacrifice of the many American teachers who gave themselves unstintingly to Los Baños' founding and development.

The future of this project with Kasetsart university will depend on arriving at satisfactory terms with the Foreign Operations Administration, approval of the State Board of Higher Education, but most of all on the attitude of our staff toward serving as teachers in a foreign land. The Thai institution needs the kind of aid we can give it. The teachers we send will be paid the equal of their salaries here, plus transportation and an allowance to cover exceptional costs incurred in taking themselves and their families into foreign service. It is really nothing particularly new to Oregon State College. Our graduates and faculty have long been active in aiding peoples of other lands and some have devoted their entire lives to such devoted teaching.
