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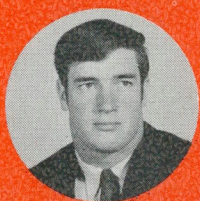
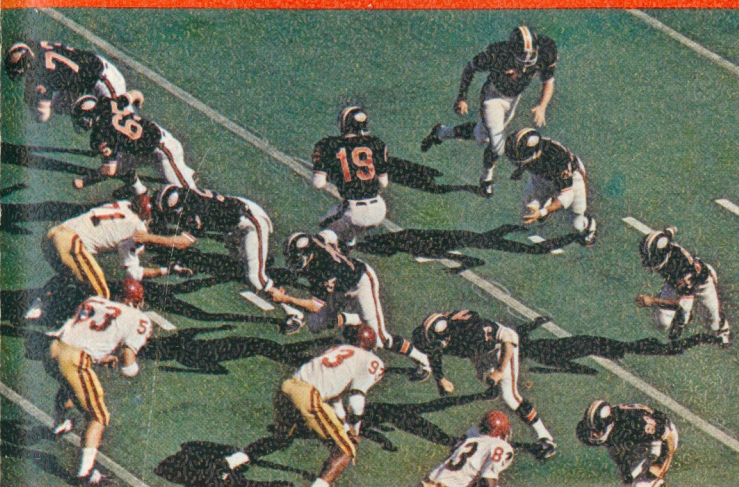

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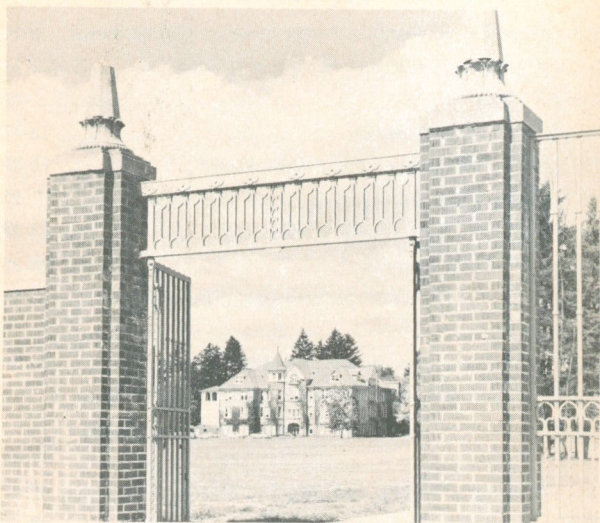

A Land-Grant Institution

Oregon State University was established as Oregon's Land-Grant institution by legislative action on October 27, 1868, the first state-assisted institution of higher learning in Oregon. This date is observed as OSU's Charter Day.

The Morrill Land-Grant Act, signed by President Lincoln July 2, 1862, is still heralded after a century as the most significant action ever taken by this nation in the field of higher education. It brought into being an entirely new concept of higher education in America—a college education for all who have the will and the ability to learn.

The Land-Grant Act established, and the program has continued to foster for more than a hundred years now, colleges and universities that have involved themselves in determining solutions to everyday problems confronting society.

The term "Land-Grant College" originated because of the method developed to help pay costs. To finance the new colleges, the Act gave a grant of federal land to each state on the basis of 30,000 acres for each Congressman. Oregon's share was 90,000 acres.

Current income from a trust fund established through the sale of these lands is now very nominal. But the new educational philosophy that gave America an unsurpassed educational shot-in-the-arm was much more important than the "Land-Grant" income, even a hundred years ago. There are 69 Land-Grant colleges and universities in the United States.

A Sea-Grant Center

A hundred years after it was chartered as a Land-Grant institution, Oregon State University on February 20, 1968, was designated as one of the first three Sea-Grant Centers in the United States (OSU, Washington, and Rhode Island).

The Sea-Grant program, funded by the Congress through the National Science Foundation and matching state funds, is aimed at

developing the practical uses of the ocean. This includes instruction, research, and extension work in oceanography, agriculture, marine fisheries, seafood technology, ocean engineering, ocean law, and other marine sciences.

Sea-Grant is a broad program involving four different OSU schools and a dozen departments, the OSU Cooperative Extension Service, Clatsop Community College, and the University of Oregon School of Law. Coastal studies and research are centered at the OSU Marine Science Center at Newport.

Oregon State University had the nation's first full-time fisheries extension agent in 1967. With nine marine extension agents and specialists, it now has the nation's largest marine extension program.

President Lyndon Johnson signed the Sea-Grant Act on October 15, 1966. There are now a total of eight Sea-Grant centers in the United States.

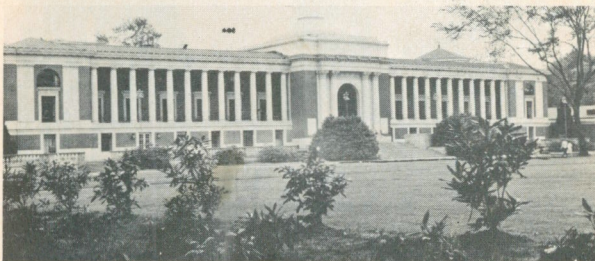
OPERATING BUDGET—Current operating budget of OSU totals around \$58,000,000. Less than half of this—41 per cent or \$24.3 million—comes from the state general fund; 28 per cent (\$16.2 million) from federal sources; 11 per cent (\$6.0 million) from student fees; and 20 per cent (\$11.5 million) from miscellaneous sources such as board and room, athletics, and student aid.

PAYROLL—OSU's annual payroll is approximately \$40,000,000. This goes to about 5,200 employees, including those on the part- and full-time payroll. Of these, 2,200 are academic staff members and about 3,000 non-academic classified or civil service. Adding materially to the campus payroll are two federal affiliates, U.S. Forest Service Forest Sciences Laboratory and USDI Pacific Northwest Water Laboratory, with combined yearly expenditures of \$3,800,000.

TAXES—OSU's 16 sororities and 32 fraternities pay approximately \$168,000 a year in Benton County property taxes.

INVOLVEMENT—More than 125 students serve on 34 faculty and University committees. More than one-fourth of the faculty participate in University governance when separate school and departmental committees are included.

DEGREES—OSU offers bachelor's degrees in approximately 150 different areas, master's degrees in a hundred fields, and doctor's degrees in 50 fields.

LIBERAL ARTS—The School of Humanities and Social Sciences offers degrees in 20 different major fields of study.

RESEARCH—OSU's vast and complex research activities involve a \$17,000,000 program, financed largely from federal and private grants. It is estimated that around 800 research projects are constantly in progress. The Agricultural Experiment Station has its 12 field stations throughout Oregon, for example, are engaged in some 350 active projects. The School of Forestry has about a hundred.

10 MAJOR SCHOOLS—The School of Science is OSU's largest school with over 3,000 students. Education and Humanities and Social Sciences are next with about 2,500 students each. Engineering is fourth. Others in order of enrollment are Business and Technology, Agriculture, Home Economics, Forestry, and Pharmacy. OSU has about 2,000 graduate students.

UNIVERSITY CAMPUS—OSU's main campus of about 500 acres, its 97 named buildings, and its equipment and grounds have an investment value of more than \$100,000,000.

RECORD ENROLLMENT—OSU passed the 15,000 enrollment mark in fall term 1969-70 with 15,244 students. This is more than three times the enrollment in the early 1950's and almost double the enrollment 10 years ago. The average increase has been about 750 students per year for the past decade.

IN FISHERIES AND WILDLIFE The OSU Department of Fisheries and Wildlife is recognized as one of the best in the country. It has pioneered many advances through instruction and research since it was established in 1935. The Department is strategically located within easy access of state fish hatcheries, a game farm, a waterfowl refuge, a game management area, experimental ponds, and an experimental stream.

IN FORESTRY. The OSU School of Forestry is recognized nationally for its strong undergraduate program. The OSU Forest Re-

search Laboratory and the U.S. Forest Service Forest Sciences Laboratory make the campus one of the largest forest research centers in the country. The School administers some 14,000 acres of forest land, much of which is only a few minutes from the campus.

IN FOOD SCIENCE. Oregon State is recognized internationally for teaching, research, and extension in the traditional areas of food production. Since about 1919, the OSU Department of Food Science—largest of its kind in the largest industry (food) in the world—has helped in pioneering, through research and development, the introduction of spectacular innovations in food processing. These include freezing, dehydration, brining, and fermenting foods. Research is conducted in cooperation with the OSU Agricultural Experiment Station on campus as well as at the OSU Seafoods Laboratory at Astoria.

IN RADIATION SCIENCES AND NUCLEAR ENGINEERING. As the State of Oregon enters the nuclear era and increasing demands for nuclear power are heard, OSU is strengthening and developing new programs for training and research in nuclear energy under the coordination of the University's Institute of Nuclear Science and Engineering. The School of Engineering and the OSU Radiation Center, for example, started the first nuclear technology program on the university level in the United States. It is expected to serve as a pattern for other colleges and universities.

IN COOPERATIVE EXTENSION. Oregon State's campus and many of its programs are actually extended to every county in Oregon through the OSU Federal Cooperative Extension Service. All Extension specialists and agents both on and off campus are members of the OSU faculty. Last year they served more than 250,000 Oregon men and women in educational programs. They also supervised one of the largest 4-H Club programs in the nation, involving more than 36,000 boys and girls and nearly 6,000 volunteer adult leaders.

IN ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCES. Oregon State University has for many years been concerned with environmental quality and its effects on human welfare. The many courses and programs on campus associated with environmental quality are coordinated and stimulated by the Environmental Sciences Center. This center was one of the first and is one of the most extensive in the nation. At least six of OSU's nine major schools are directly involved in the

University's broad program of environmental health training of qualified professional people and research.

IN MARINE SCIENCES. Leading scientists from throughout the United States and many other countries look to Oregon State for leadership in oceanography and other marine sciences. The OSU Marine Science Center at Newport is an ideal location to supplement this extensive instruction and research on the Corvallis campus. It is only a mile from the open sea, adjacent to rich mud flats along Yaquina Bay, and 55 miles via U.S. highway 20 from the OSU campus. Few other similar laboratories can match its natural advantages. About 213,000 persons visited the Center's museum-aquarium in 1969, and some 650,000 since it was opened in 1965. Additional coastal OSU marine science facilities are the Sea Food Laboratory at Astoria, Netarts Bay Research Area, and the Marine Biology Laboratory at Port Orford. OSU's Oceanography fleet of four research vessels, including the 180-foot Yaquina, is berthed at the Center's dock.

IN OCEANOGRAPHY. The OSU Oceanography Department was organized in 1959. Now it ranks near the top in the United States in enrollment of graduate students and sixth in operating budget. Ocean research off Oregon and into the wide reaches of the Pacific has advanced rapidly. From one part-time staff member in 1954, the Oceanography staff has grown to more than 150. Most funds for this rapid advance have been provided through federal agencies.

IN AIR, SOIL, AND WATER RESOURCES. The very nature of Oregon State's instruction and research in problems relating to soils and water, its nearby natural resources, and its available facilities makes opportunities for soil and water research programs at OSU equalled by few places in the nation. Readily available are such natural resources as the Willamette River and the entire Alsea River basin; Yaquina Bay; other streams, estuaries and lakes; rich and marginal farm lands; virgin and logged-off timber lands.

HONORS PROGRAM—The University's Honors Program originated in the School of Science in 1959. This led to the present University-wide program which provides enriched educational opportunities to students of superior scholastic abilities.

HOUSING—University-sponsored housing accommodates about a third of the OSU students. Twelve residence halls have a capacity of 4,200, and seven cooperative houses provide living accommodations for 375 students. There are 150 married-student units and five off-campus cooperatives. The 48 fraternities and sororities have a capacity of 2,660—18 per cent of the student body.

ATHLETICS—About 10 per cent of the OSU student body participated last year in some phase of the nine major varsity and freshman sports in the intercollegiate Athletic program. Major sports are baseball, basketball, crew, football, golf, swimming, tennis, track and wrestling. Oregon State is a member of the Pacific-8 conference. Parker Stadium, now with Astro Turf, holds 41,000 and Gill Coliseum 11,000.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS—A total of 719 international students from 66 other countries are attending classes at Oregon State.

FINANCIAL AID—Student aid is "big business." Student loans, scholarships, grants, federal work-study, and student employment for approximately 7,000 students last year involved about \$6 million.

EDUCATION—The OSU School of Education is outstanding in science education, vocational education, and counselig and guidance.

BUSINESS—The OSU School of Business and Technology is one of four Pacific Northwest schools fully accredited by the American Association of Collegiate Schools of Business at both graduate and undergraduate levels.

ROTC—The Navy ROTC unit is the fifth largest in the United States. Oregon State is one of only 35 universities that offers ROTC in all branches of the service—Air Force, Army, Navy, and Marine Corps.

INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMS—The OSU School of Agriculture is cooperating with federal agencies in international assistance programs on three other continents: South America, Africa, and Europe.

MINORITY AFFAIRS—A special student-faculty committee assists in supervision of the OSU minority and special services program for assimilating minority students into campus and academic life.

HOME ECONOMICS—The OSU School of Home Economics is the oldest in the west and the fourth oldest in the country.

PHARMACISTS—Well over half of the practicing pharmacists in Oregon are graduates of the OSU School of Pharmacy.

FOREIGN STUDY—OSU has student centers in Stuttgart, Germany, and Tokyo, Japan. OSU students all attend the Italian Study Center at Pavia, and liberal arts programs in London, Paris, and Stockholm.

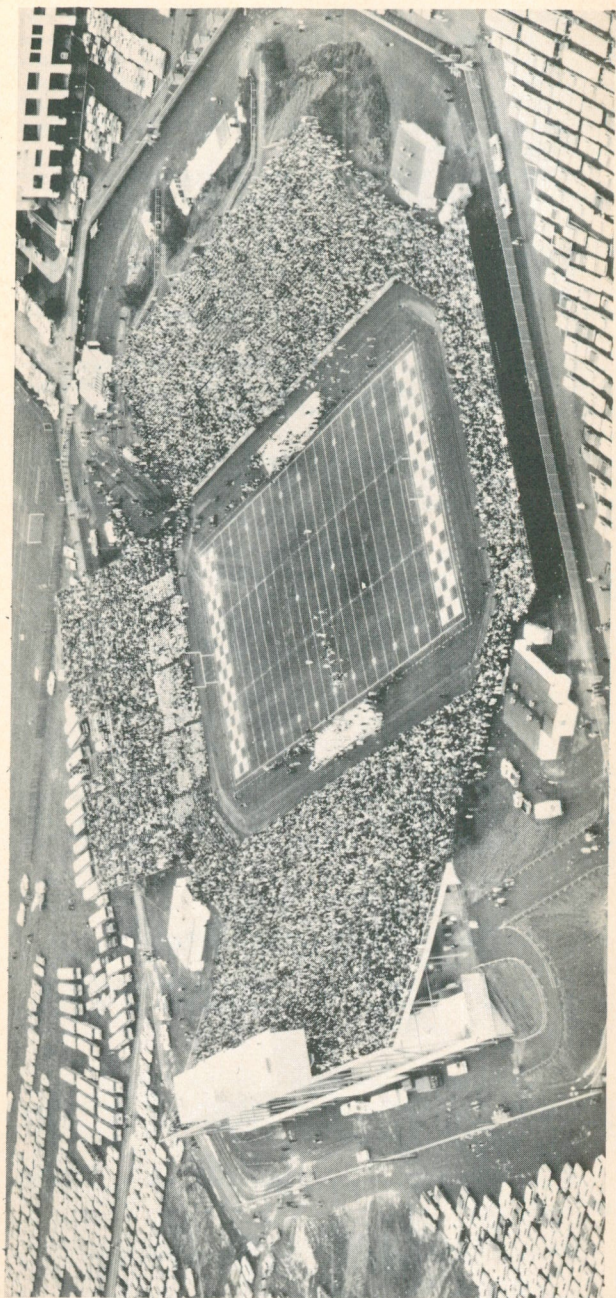

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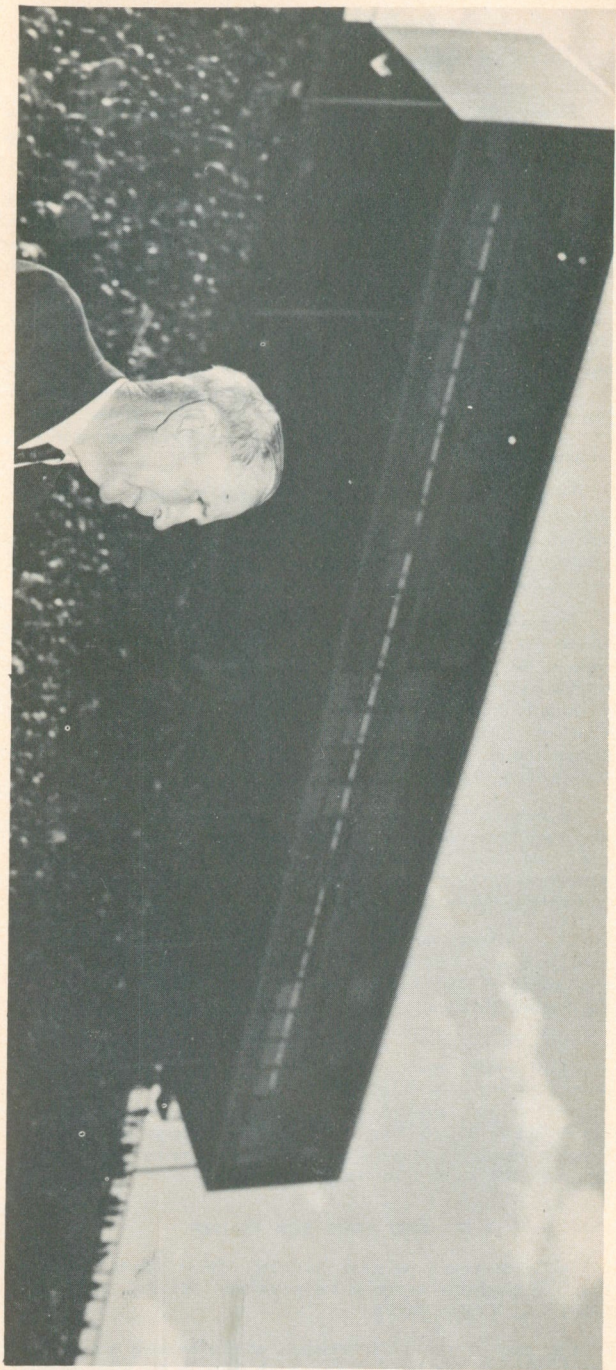

PARKER STADIUM

"Home of The Beavers"

Parker Stadium, right in the heart of the beautiful Oregon State University campus, ranks as one of the finest and most up-to-date football plants in America.

Three years ago, they added 9000 west sideline seats, bringing the total capacity to 40,750 seats. An overflow crowd of 41,494, largest then ever to witness an athletic event in the state of Oregon, was on hand to watch Oregon State hand National Champion Southern California its only defeat (3-0).

About 27,500 seats at Parker Stadium are of the sideline variety. There are 82 rows on the west sidelines and 40 rows on the east sidelines, and the entire east sideline of 9000 seats has been turned over to OSU students. "If student interest remains high, and students fill the entire sideline for our home games, there is no reason why this cannot become a permanent arrangement," Athletic Director Jim Barratt said.

Parker Stadium is named for Charles T. Parker, a Portland businessman and OSU graduate who played a major and financial role in its opening in 1953. The stadium was built at no cost to taxpayers, through donations from OSU alums and friends. Original seating was 28,000, which at that time appeared adequate.

Four years ago, additional seats in the end zone and corners raised the total capacity to 33,000. Then, in time for the 1967 season, the new west sideline addition raised it to 40,750, and contributions again helped make this possible. Mr. Parker made a sizeable contribution, just as he had in 1953, and his gift was matched. Jack Brandis, Portland and Corvallis forestry executive, headed up a small committee that secured the matching funds. OSU athletic department funds also were used.

In August, 1969, Astro-Turf was installed at Parker Stadium, also new lights for night football and other events. Asphalt base and general work cost \$69,361, lighting cost \$52,168, and the Astro-Turf \$202,505. Miscellaneous and contingency made the estimated total figure \$350,000.

Chief architect for the new addition was Dan Zarosinski, Portland engineer. Zarosinski received his B.A. and M.A. degree in Engineering at OSU and played three years of varsity football for the Beavers (1949-51).

Parker Stadium is picturesque, as well as practical. There's a lot of parking space, within close walking distance of the stadium. Every seat is a good seat, with no posts. From some of the higher rows, one has a beautiful view of the McDonald National Forest, Mary's Peak and the Coast Range of mountains. Dressing rooms for players are located in close-by Gill Coliseum, less than 100 yards from the playing field.

NEW PRESS BOX PRAISED

The press box, high atop the west sideline stands, is one of the most workable to be found anywhere. It's big, the view is terrific and it's practical.

First floor is strictly for members of the working press. There are 56 seats in the front row, and 52 seats in the elevated back row, with lots of walking room in between. Nobody is crowded.

Another big working area is located back of the two press rows, where Western Union machines and operators are situated. Also, there is a lunch bar, with tables, chairs, etc., plus cheerful employees anxious to serve the media. The Memorial Union Building catering service provides tasty dishes, such as fried chicken, roast beef, etc.

The second floor is reserved for radio and TV media, plus home and visiting coaches (phones to field). Two huge TV and photography booths are 22 feet 6 inches across each, and 27 feet deep. Ten smaller booths, each 11 feet 3 inches across and 27 feet deep, are used by radio, coaches, statisticians, etc. Under good weather conditions, the press box roof also could be used for TV or photography purposes.

One of the best additions is the press box elevator, which was made possible by a donor who prefers to remain anonymous. The elevator runs from the lower level to all floor levels.

And if all this isn't enough for visiting scribes, the Parker Stadium press box is adorned by 10 attractive girls who act as usherettes, food waitresses and smiling hostesses. They're mini-skirted members of the Corvallis high school "Sparta-Pacers" drill group. They'll usher you to your seat, bring you coffee or soft drinks and run errands if necessary. Oregon State University takes great pride in having this group of high school seniors on its working staff at the press box.

The Astro-Turf Story

Oregon State University is extremely proud of its Astro-Turf, installed at Parker Stadium in Corvallis in time for the 1969 season.

Athletic Director Jim Barratt and various members of the Physical Plant and OSU staff conducted a vast research before deciding on a certain brand of synthetic turf. The all-weather and all-purpose Astro-Turf field, along with new lights installed this summer, gives OSU a plant that can be used for many purposes.

High school games will be played at Parker Stadium on Friday nights, as one example. And, of course, it can be used for Beaver grid practice sessions, rugby and soccer games, band rehearsals, intramurals, physical education and many other phases. Cost was \$69,361 for asphalt base and general work, \$52,168 for lighting and \$203,505 for the Astro-Turf itself.

Here are some questions and answers about Astro-Turf:

Who makes Astro-Turf? Answer—The Monsanto Company, one of the world's major science-based companies, a leader in nylon research and innovation. Monsanto has 61,000 employees, with headquarters in St. Louis, Mo.

Where are there college Astro-Turf fields? Answer—Alabama, Arkansas, Boise State, Boston U., Hofstra, Illinois State, Ohio State, Oregon State, Oregon, Penn, SMU, Texas, Texas A & M, Texas Tech, Washington, and West Virginia.

How has Astro-Turf changed since the original Astrodome installation? Answer—It has undergone considerable improvement since first installation in 1966. The present football surface has a rugged 45 ounces of special nylon face fiber per square yard and a 5/8 inch shock absorbing pad bonded to it. The Astro-Turf in the Astrodome, going strong after years of use, has 32 ounces of nylon per square yard and originally had no pad. All Astro-Turf is made of 500 denier nylon.

What does "Denier" have to do with it? Answer—The husky 500-denier construction of Astro-Turf nylon is basic to the success of a synthetic playing surface. Denier is a term used to measure the weight of a single strand of nylon. The heavier the denier, the greater the resistance to wear and ultraviolet light. It makes for superior traction and helps achieve better drainage. Standard industry tests show that a thinner fiber, say 50 denier, will not stand up to heavy duty use and ultraviolet rays of the sun.

How is Astro-Turf installed? Answer—The surface and shock-absorbing pad are bonded directly to the asphalt base. The Astro-Turf is put down in rolls 15 feet wide by up to 200 feet long. The rolls are usually seamed together on the marking stripes.

Does Astro-Turf drain? Answer—Excellent drainage is achieved by crowning the field by some 14 to 18 inches. The material is impervious to water, and the crown, lower than many natural grass fields, allows the water to drain off the field to the sides.

What about injury reduction? Answer—Crippling knee and ankle injuries, the most common serious football and soccer injuries, are reduced up to 80 per cent on Astro-Turf. Cleats never penetrate through Monsanto's 500 denier nylon fiber, eliminating foot lock. The foot is free to move with the blow instead of catching in the ground.

Are there other Astro-Turf surfaces? Answer—Yes, there are specially-engineered nylon Astro-Turf surfaces for golf tees, golf greens, playgrounds, field houses, landscaping and tennis.

JIM BARRATT — Athletic Director

Athletic director at Oregon State is personable Jim Barratt, who, over a long period of time, worked his way up through the ranks of athletic heirarchy at OSU.

Barratt, 45 years of age, was appointed to the post in 1966, following the death of Slat's Gill.

Barratt is Oregon State personified, and his roots are deep. As an undergraduate at OSU, he was editor of the school daily paper, The Barometer, and extremely active in campus affairs. Following graduation in 1950, he became assistant alumni director, and a year later moved over to the athletic department as ticket manager.

Next came the role of athletic business manager, and when Gill became athletic director in 1964, Barratt moved up to the post of assistant athletic director. Then, immediately after Gill's death, Jim became acting director, prior to the final permanent appointment.

A native of Heppner, where he was raised and graduated from high school, Barratt later enlisted in the Navy for World War II and saw a lot of overseas duty. In 1946, when he entered OSU, he married his childhood sweetheart, the former Dorothea Wilson. They have two daughters and one granddaughter.

Barratt handled all ticket sales for many years and his never-ending enthusiasm and attention to details helped establish him as one of the top men in the field. As chief aide to a pair of fine athletic directors, Spec Keene and Gill, Jim helped with virtually every affair of the department and learned his apprenticeship well.

The athletic boss for the Beavers has been well-trained for his job and has the personality and business-sense to go with it. Oregon State can look forward to an era of sound athletic accomplishment under his guidance.

COMM HENNESSY, athletic business manager, has been with the athletic department since February 1, 1961, after serving nine years with the physical plant at Oregon State. He was born in Fontana, Kansas, but came west to Oregon in 1946. When he joined the athletic staff, he took on the duties of ticket manager and handled that role until recently, when he was moved up to athletic business manager and top accountant for the department. Hennessy is well-versed in all financial matters and proved as ticket manager that he has the personality and charm to get along well with people. Among other duties, he is athletic office manager and in charge of grounds and maintenance.

DENNY HEDGES, assistant athletic director, is a fine addition to the staff and is a welcome one. Hedges, an OSU graduate, has a solid athletic background, having been a student aide to Barratt while in school. Later, he was manager of Multnomah Civic Stadium and assistant manager of Multnomah Athletic Club. Prior to that, he was assistant admissions control supervisor at Memorial Coliseum in Portland. His responsibilities there included handling of tickets, pay roll, scheduling employees and other management. At OSU, he is in charge of promotions, game management and travel arrangements.

PAUL VALENTI, assistant to the director, is now on the administrative end of the athletic department instead of on the coaching staff for the first time in 24 years. Paul came to OSU in the fall of 1938 as a student, and except for World War II service in the Navy, has been a Beaver ever since. He played basketball under the late Slat Gill from 1940-42, and then returned as his assistant in 1946, following discharge. When Gill retired from coaching in 1965, Valenti took over as head coach at OSU and promptly led the Beavers to a Pacific-8 championship in 1966. Valenti voluntarily resigned at the close of the 1970 campaign, and in addition to his new office routine, will coach the OSU tennis squad next spring.

BILL ROBERTSON, head trainer, has been chief of the OSU tape brigade for 24 years, and long has been one of the most popular citizens in the Corvallis community. Famous for his always well-received vocal rendition of "Casey At The Bat" and dozens of other recitations, Bill is much in demand at banquets and social gatherings. The athletes call him "Rope-sole", and his reputation as an athletic trainer ranks right near the top of that field. Robertson originally is from Vancouver, B.C., but became an American citizen many years ago and has lived in the Pacific Northwest ever since. He served in the army in World War II, and saw duty in both Italy and the Aleutians. Bill is a graduate of OSU.

LOREN SOLUM, assistant trainer, is a 1965 graduate of the University of Idaho. He also obtained his master's degree at OSU this past spring. Originally from Wallace, Idaho, Solum played football at Idaho and later was assistant trainer for the Vandals. He coached three sports at Wallace high following graduation, in addition to teaching biology and physical education. He replaces Eddie Ferrell, who resigned in order to return to his home state of Arkansas.

JOHN EGGERS, sports publicity director, recently observed his 20th anniversary on the athletic staff at OSU. He joined the staff on July 1, 1950, as an assistant to director Irwin Harris, and was moved up to the top spot on July 1, 1952. Eggers was born and raised in Pendleton, the "Round-Up City" of eastern Oregon. He was an all-state basketball player at Pendleton high, a prep teammate of Lew Beck who later went on to win all-America fame at OSU and play in the Olympic Games. Eggers played one varsity basketball season at Willamette while only a freshman before enlisting in the Navy for World War II. After discharge, he attended OSU from the fall of 1946 through 1949. Before returning to the OSU staff, he worked for one year as a sports writer on The Oregonian in Portland.

ROD COMMONS, assistant sports publicity director, is a 1966 graduate of OSU and was editor of the Newberg (Ore.) Graphic. He also specializes in photography. Originally from Nashville, Ore., Commons graduated from Siletz high school. He joined the OSU staff on May 1, 1968, and assists Eggers in all phases of the Athletic News Bureau operation, in addition to taking all department pictures. Commons is in charge of a new photography dark room located right next to the office of he and Eggers in Gill Coliseum.

The Coaches . . .

DEE ANDROS, Head Coach



Born in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on October 17, 1924. Attended Central High there, graduating in 1942. Went directly into the Marine Corps for service in World War II. Won Bronze Star for valor at battle of Iwo Jima. Was discharged in February of 1946 and enrolled at University of Oklahoma in Norman. Freshman year played varsity football under late Jim Tatum and went to the Gator Bowl, beating North Carolina State. Next three years played under Bud Wilkinson, and twice went to the Sugar Bowl. The Sooners beat North Carolina in 1949 and Louisiana State in 1950. Among his teammates were Darrell Royal (Texas); Jim Owens (Washington); Jack Mitchell and Bert Clark. Graduated from Oklahoma in 1950 and was assistant on Oklahoma staff in 1950-51-52. Line coach at Kansas in 1953. Went to Texas Tech in 1954 and 1955, and team went to Sun Bowl. Moved to Nebraska as assistant to Pete Elliott in 1957-58-59, team going to Rose Bowl on January 1, 1959. When Elliott became head coach at Illinois in 1960, Andros joined him there and was at Champaign in 1960 and 1961. Andros became head coach at Idaho in 1962 and served three years before taking the head job at Oregon State. In 1963, the Vandals posted a 5-4 season for their first winning campaign since 1938 when they were 6-3. They also beat Washington State in 1964 for first time in 10 years and only the third time over a 32-year span. Idaho, in 1964, almost upended Rose Bowl-bound Oregon State, losing out to the Beavers, 10-7. Vandals narrowly lost to Oregon 14-8) and to Iowa (35-25). Andros is married, and he and his wife Luella have one daughter, Jeanna, aged 13. He is now in his sixth season as head coach at OSU, having compiled a 5-5 record in 1965, a 7-3 record in 1966, and an even better 7-2-1 record in 1967. In 1968, OSU was 7-3 and second in the PAC-8 race for the third straight time. OSU just missed the Rose Bowl three times under Andros. Last year, OSU was 6-4.

SAM BOGHOSIAN, Assistant



Born in Fresno, California, on December 22, 1931. Attended Fresno High School, and was all-Northern California guard. Also all-Valley in baseball. Played at UCLA in 1951-52-53-54, and was starter on national champions of 1954. All-Coast, Scholastic All-American. 1954. Played in 1954 Rose Bowl game and also in the Shrine East-West game. Joined UCLA coaching staff, handling freshmen in 1955, the junior varsity in 1956 and was an assistant with varsity from 1957 through 1964. Married to former Judith (Judy) Lorraine Busch and they have two children, John James, 8 years, and Jodi Kathleen, 6 years.

ED (BUD) RILEY, Assistant



Born in Guin, Alabama on November 30, 1925. Played football, basketball, baseball and track at Marion County High School in Guin. Came west to University of Idaho with Dixie Howell and was a halfback for Vandals in 1948-49-50-51. Had highly-successful prep coaching career, 7 years at Wallace, Idaho, and 3 years at Lewiston, Idaho. Served as freshman coach at University of Idaho in 1962-63-64. Also held job as administrative assistant. Married to former Mary Shumaker and they have three children—Mike, 16; Eddie, 12; and Peter, 6 years.

DICK ROACH, Assistant



Born in Faribault, Minnesota on August 23, 1932. Attended high school at Cathedral high school in Rapid City, South Dakota, where he was all-conference in both football and basketball. Was a guard and tackle at Black Hills, S.D. Teachers college, winning all-conference and honorable mention Little All-America. Did prep coaching in Wyoming and South Dakota, before moving on to Montana State University in Bozeman as a varsity assistant coach. He was at Montana State in 1966-67-68-69 as first assistant, and came to OSU last winter in time for spring drills. Married to the former LaVerne Olesen and they have three children, Edward 10, Matthew 8 and Stacy 6.

BOB HERNDON, Assistant



Born at Hydro, Oklahoma on January 28, 1933. Played football, basketball, baseball and track at Medford, Okla. high school. Twice all-state in football. Three-year grid star at University of Oklahoma, 1952-53-54, and graduated in 1955. Won all conference honors there, and played in Blue-Gray All-Star game. Assistant coach at Oklahoma in 1955, and on California staff 1957-58-59. At Illinois, as assistant, from 1960-1966. Married to former Marcia Perkins and they have one daughter, Kelly, aged 12. Has had experience coaching both offensive and defensive backfields.

MIKE DOLBY, Assistant



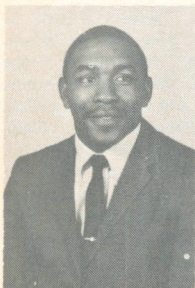

Prep coaching at Morton Hi (Wash.), Shelton Hi (Wash.), Oak Harbor (Wash.), and Moses Lake (Wash.), before moving on to Western Washington College in 1957-58. Assistant Coach at Washington State from 1964-67. Joined OSU staff last spring. Married to former Joyce Davies and they have four children, Greg, 21; Diane, 19; Gary, 15; and Shannon, 5.

GENE HILLIARD, Assistant



Born in Mississippi on March 13, 1939. Four sports star at Weed, Cal. high school, and most valuable athlete in 1958. Played at Yuba, Cal. JC in 1958-59 and at OSU in 1960-61, where he was wingback. Lettered three times in baseball. Obtained B.S. degree in 1963 and Master's degree in 1965. Graduate assistant coach at OSU in 1962-63. Taught and coached at Highland View junior high in Corvallis, 1964 to 1969. Joined Oregon State staff on July 1, 1969. Married to former Jerry Sue Dodd and they have three children, Cynthia Rae, 6; Scarlet Lee, 3; and Janice Lyn, 16 months.

"THE GREAT PUMPKIN"

Dee Andros

Newspaper men affectionately named Dee Andros "The Great Pumpkin" as this colorful coach led his Beavers from one unexpected victory through another. When Dee arrived in San Francisco as a coaching aide for the West team against the East, the S. F. Examiner promptly ran a banner headline titled "Great Pumpkin Here." His colorful coaching apparel includes bright orange jacket, orange and black tie, orange and black shoes, and orange socks.

Dee Andros' only training rule to his players is: "We will not tolerate a player who will embarrass me or the University."



In 1967, Andros was elected "West Coast Coach of The Year" and also was runner-up for the National Coach of The Year honors to John Pont of Indiana. He was head coach for the West team against the East in the annual Coaches All-America Bowl game at Memphis. He has been on the East-West game staff and on the Hula Bowl staff.



Some of Dee's more well-known teammates at Oklahoma included Jim Owens from Washington, Darrell Royal from Texas, Bert Clark (ex-WSU) and Jack Mitchell (ex-Kansas). Dee played football under the late Jim Tatum and Bud Wilkinson at Oklahoma.



He's had lots of experience with Bowl games. While a player at Oklahoma, he went to the Gator Bowl once (they whipped North Carolina State), and to the Sugar Bowl twice (they beat North Carolina and Louisiana State). As an assistant coach at Texas Tech he made it to the Sun Bowl. While with Pete Elliott at California, he got to the Rose Bowl one year.



Andros traditionally charges out on the playing field ahead of his team prior to game time. He admits it's getting to be a bit tougher every year, though. Also, it's tough for the players to not pass him.



As a Marine Corps sergeant on Iwo Jima in World War II, Dee Andros was awarded the Bronze Star for valor in battle. Here's the inscription on his plaque:

"For heroic achievement in connection with operation against the enemy while serving with the Marine Infantry Battalion on Iwo Jima volcanic island from 13 March 1945 to 25 March 1945. Field Cook Andros volunteered for two combat patrols against enemy resistance pocket. As a member of these patrols, he acquitted himself with distinction in the face of accurate machine gun and rifle fire. His devotion to duty was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service.



Andros is in great demand as a public speaker and key figure at civic affairs. He was "King of Fun" at Portland Rose Festival in 1969, also Grand Marshal of the Miss Oregon Pageant. Also has been Grand Marshal for Lebanon Strawberry Festival and Philomath Frolic. He loves crowds and he loves people.



Other "Orange" items in his repertoire: Bright orange automobile, a basement bathroom at his home completely decorated in orange, orange electric golf cart, orange office desk, orange golf bag, and orange scarf.

OSU Football Outlook 1970

Dee (The Great Pumpkin) Andros has never experienced a losing season since he arrived on the Corvallis scene in 1965.

But he gets his biggest test in 1970.

Actually, the Beavers figure to have a very respectable football team, as all Andros-coached clubs are. Yet, they did lose a lot through graduation, and may still be a year away from being a top contender for Rose Bowl honors. It, primarily, is a junior dominated team, and sometimes junior teams can be dangerous.

The schedule is certainly against having a winning campaign. Adding an 11th game, with the University of Houston, only increased the challenge awaiting the Beavers. For example, OSU must start right off with UCLA, Iowa, Oklahoma and USC, before taking on Houston, Washington, Stanford, California, WSU and Oregon. The days of having "breathers" somewhere on the schedule vanished years ago.

The quarterbacking should be excellent. Slick Steve Endicott had a fine season as a sophomore, and has the talent and desire to be even a lot better the next time around. Steve passed for 1251 yards last year, third best in OSU history behind only incomparable Terry Baker and Gordy Queen. He'll have better receivers this fall, one of whom is Jeff Kolberg who also broke in strongly as a sophomore a year ago.

For sheer power, there may not be a better fullback in the country than junior letterman Dave Schilling. He follows a long line of blockbusting fullbacks that Andros so loves to have around (Ray McDonald, Pete Pifer, Bill Enyart) and has speed enough to break for the outside.

The offensive line is big, composed mostly of junior holdover lettermen. Defensively, the Beavers lost a lot more through graduation, including their entire starting defensive secondary. One great one still around, however, is 6-3, 240 pound defensive tackle Craig Hanneman who might well be headed for all-America honors.

At ends on defense, OSU also can count on Steve Bielenberg and Jim Sherbert. Gary Barton, formerly a quarterback, has taken over as defensive safety, along with two reserves from last year. Dave Graham and Dennis Draper are with him in the secondary.

Linebacking, while young, should be good. Jack Faulkender won his spurs as a soph in 1969, and Butch Wicks sat out the year as a red-shirt.

All in all, it will be an interesting football team to watch—one capable, perhaps, of beating anyone on a given afternoon or evening.

Arcs To Test Beavers

Members of the coaching staff at Oregon State University are happy now lights were installed at Parker Stadium last fall, for the Beavers play under the arcs three times in 1970. At least they can practice under the lights at home for the night games they have billed. First is against Iowa at Portland's Civic Stadium on Saturday night, September 19. Then on October 3 at Memorial Coliseum in Los Angeles, they take on Southern California. That, too, is on Saturday night. The third night game is in the Astro-Dome at Houston, against the University of Houston, on Saturday, October 17. That was Oregon State's 11th game added to the 1970 schedule. In 1969, OSU was under the lights against UCLA, Arizona State and Utah, and lost two of those contests. The Beavers walloped Arizona State, lost handily to the Bruins and dropped a close one to Utah.

Yes, as you might expect, Oregon State University already has one of the top marching bands in America and will strive to be even better in the years ahead.

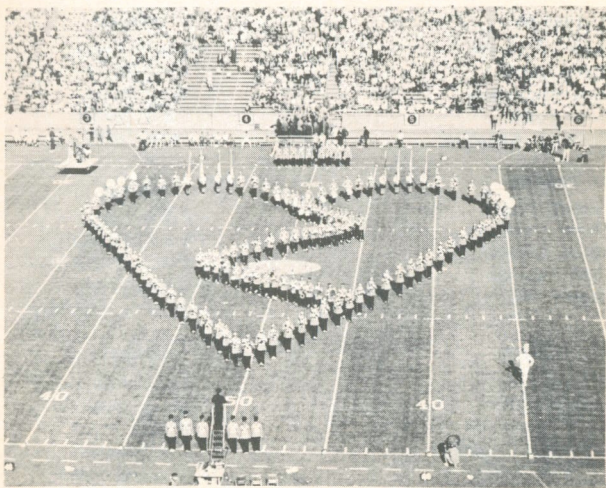

Douglass now holds a master's degree from Ohio University. He obtained his B.S. degree from the University of Denver, and has done work towards his Doctor of Musical Arts degree at Michigan. In the list of teachers under whom he has studied are such famous men as Rafael Mendez, Renold Schilke, Vachianao and Giesler.

OSU's halftime shows at football games last fall were tremendous, and appeared on both national and regional TV. The music the band plays seems to "lift" the team emotionally, and it also has a big effect on those in the stands, both students and others included. It's a 150-piece band, by the way, and possibly the best on the entire Pacific Coast.

Like the athletic teams at Oregon State, the Beaver band is a real winner.

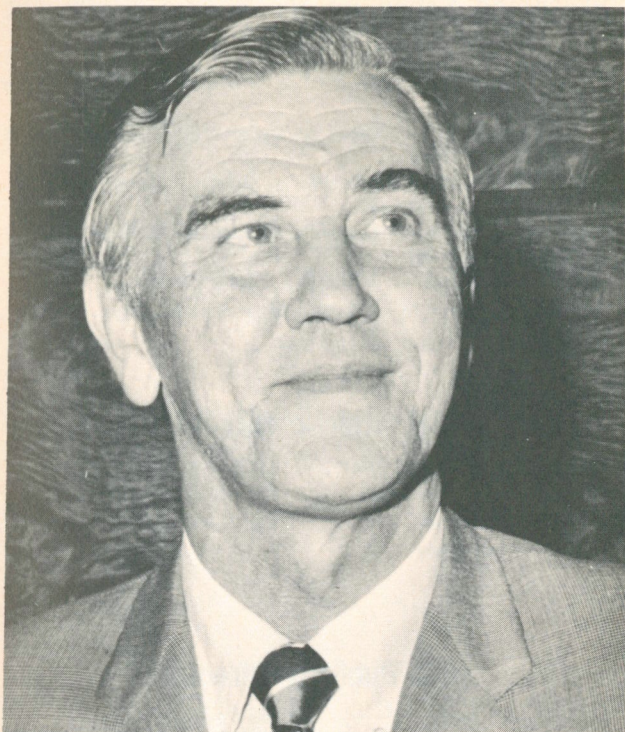
