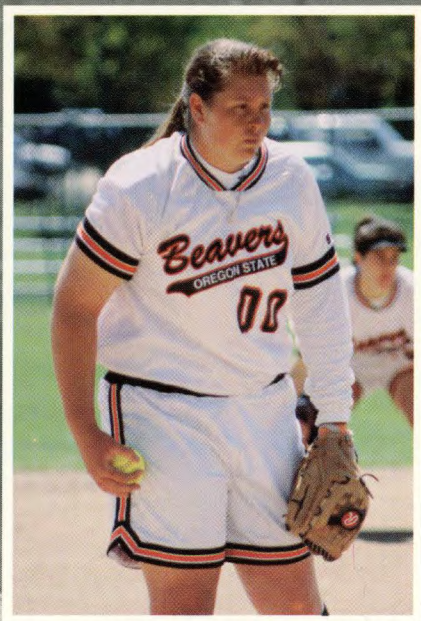
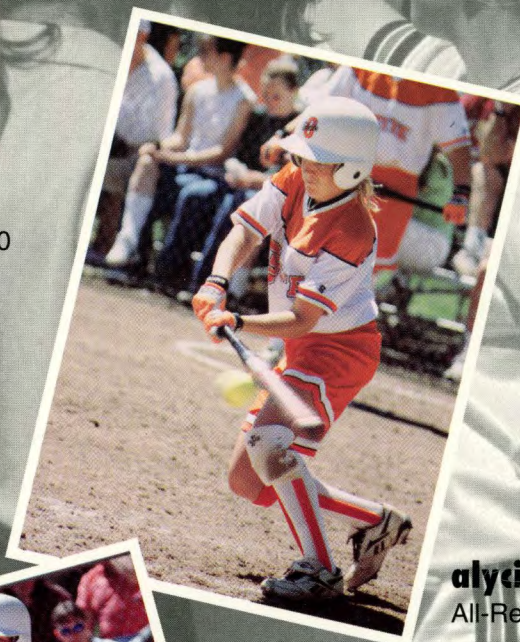

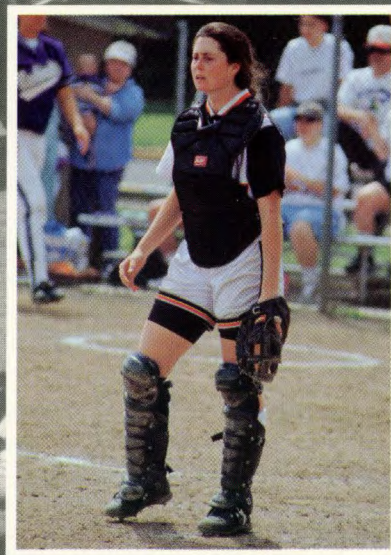

development stations, manages two research forests, and conference/education centers in Portland and Medford.

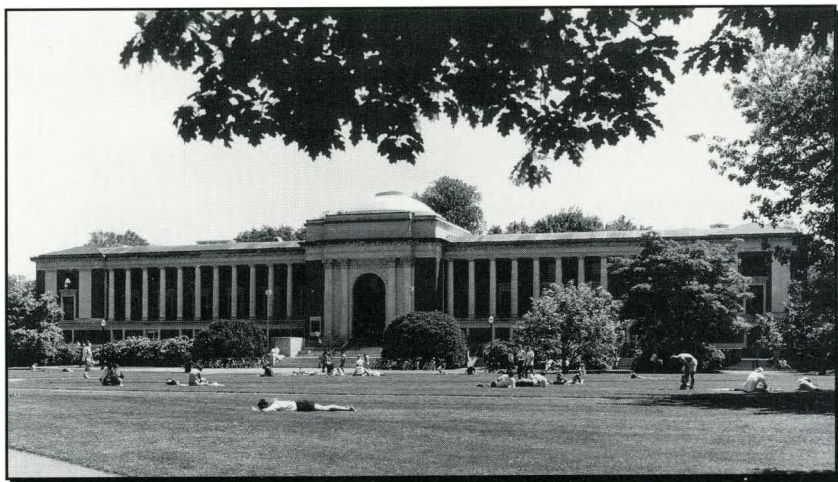

1998 OUTLOOK

Considering the talent and experience level that this year's Oregon State softball team has, it's no wonder head coach Kirk Walker is expecting great things from his 1998 squad.

Oregon State's softball team finished the 1997 season with more wins (29) than it had the previous two seasons combined, and eight of those wins last season were over Top 15 opponents.

And don't forget that Oregon State had an All-American on the team for the first time in 13 years last season, and she was just a freshman.

Or that Oregon State softball rewrote the program's record books upon breaking or tying a total of 16 records last year.

Then consider that Oregon State returns seven starters and 78 percent of the offense from that 1997 squad.

Put the pieces together, and Oregon State could see one of its best ever softball teams take the field in 1998. Walker is confident the success from last season has carried over to this year's team.

"The positive things that we accomplished last year have all carried over into this season, and we're starting at a better place than normal," Walker said. "We have a lot of depth in all positions, and we have brought in some athletes who are going to push the current starters for playing time.

"Defensively, we're far more experienced in every position except for shortstop. Offensively, we have an increased amount of power as well as additional speed. We have a very balanced attack, which should create probably the strongest offensive team we've had since I've been here."

The Beavers will look for that increased offense and experienced defense to lead them through another tough schedule, as the Pac-10 remains one of the nation's top softball conferences. Oregon State's 1998 schedule has the Beavers playing at least 26 games against 11 teams that finished the 1997 season ranked in the nation's Top 25, including five Pac-10 teams and four top five programs.

THE INFIELD

The Beavers should have an experienced infield, with almost all of last year's starters returning.

The Beavers have extreme depth at first base. Third team All-America sophomore Tarrah Beyster will see action at first base when she is not pitching. As a freshman, Beyster hit .391 with 66 hits and 35 RBI, an OSU single-season record, and her 12 home runs makes her OSU's career leader after just one season with the Beavers. In addition to her offensive power, Beyster is a strong defensive player, having committed just two errors last season.

Freshman Jenni Jodoin could be a key factor for the Beavers at that position as well.

"Jenni, who is very versatile and can play many positions, could be one of the best defensive first basemen this conference has seen in awhile," said Walker.

Junior Courtney Stewart has shown tremendous improvement over the past two years and could also see some time at first.

The Beavers return the leadership of senior Denise Brown (formerly Denise Gutierrez), who will anchor the infield at second.

"Denise's attitude, desire and hustle will help this team attain a lot of great things," Walker said.

Freshman Jennie Green, who was injured a bit in the fall, could also see some time at second.

The shortstop position is a position being fought for between junior Tasha Hedding and freshman Brooke Rutschman.

"Tasha has a lot of experience with our system and how we work and has the inside track to opportunity," Walker said. "Brooke has stepped up to show tremendous potential as a shortstop. Her physical skills are exceptional and she will see a lot of playing time at shortstop as well as possibly in the outfield or other infield positions."

Sophomore third baseman Parisa Plant started every game but one last year and will return to her third base role this season. Junior Heather Chinn has been playing extremely well and could see action at third base or another infield position.

Junior Kim Herman, who missed 25 games with a dislocated finger in 1997, returns at catcher after earning All-Pac-10 honorable mention recognition last season. Sophomore Kelli Kranz, who transferred from Southwest Texas State, was the CIF Player of the Year in 1995 and will also challenge for playing time at the catcher position.

"We're very excited to have Kim back healthy and look forward to a full season of competition from her," Walker said. "Kelli brings in tremendous strength and depth for us to use her catching and offensive ability. She's going to make a major impact on our program."

THE OUTFIELD

Oregon State's outfield also will have an experienced look to it, with three starters from last year returning to the field in 1998.

Senior leftfielder Alycia Stevens, an All-Pacific Region selection in 1997, will lead the outfield as well as be a key force in OSU's offense. A year ago, Stevens shattered her own school record with 72 hits, 15 more than her previous single-season mark. She hit .317 on the year and led the Beavers with 33 runs.

"We expect her to be vying for an All-American candidacy this year," Walker said.

The Beavers also return junior rightfielder Jodi Chmielewski, who earned All-Pac-10 honorable mention recognition after hitting .307 with 24 RBI and a school record 11 doubles last season.

Sophomore centerfielder Amber Anderson, who started every game but one as a rookie, is back, and senior Sara Caughell and freshman Brooke Rutschman are vying for playing time in the outfield.

"Amber's confidence and aggressiveness have shown much improvement, and we look for her to be a leader for us in the outfield," said Walker. "Sara has been playing extremely well, and Brooke could also see playing time, which would give us tremendous speed and depth in our outfield."

THE PITCHING

Third team All-American sophomore Tarrah Beyster looks to improve on a highly successful rookie season as she leads the Beaver pitching staff.

"Tarrah being named third team All-American as a freshman was tremendous for our program. Her growth already this fall and last season leads us to believe that only greater things will be coming from her on the mound," said Walker. "We look for her to be a very strong force in the Pac-10 and nationally."

Sophomore Brooke Hofstetter and junior Jodi Chmielewski also will see action on the mound. Hofstetter pitched in 27 games as a freshman, while Chmielewski returns to the mound after pitching two years ago.

"Brooke is stronger than ever. She's added a few pitches and gained a lot of strength, and that combined with her strong work ethic will help Brooke improve and be a contributing factor in far more games than she saw last year," said Walker.

"Jodi pitched some her freshman year. We didn't utilize her last year because we had four pitchers, but she will see some pitching time this season. She's very effective, being a leftie, and has a very good off-speed."

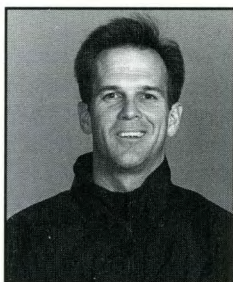

Kirk Walker is in his fourth year as head coach of the Oregon State University softball program, and while his overall record is not overly impressive on the surface, the program has made huge strides.

The Beavers have routinely beaten nationally-ranked teams and have shown improvement every season under Walker. The 1997 team won 29 games, the third most in OSU softball history. The team's batting average improved 41 points between his first and third season, and the pitching staff's earned run average has been more than cut in half, dropping from 5.35 in 1995 to 2.60 in 1997, and its fielding percentage notched nearly a 23-point improvement from 1995 to 1997.

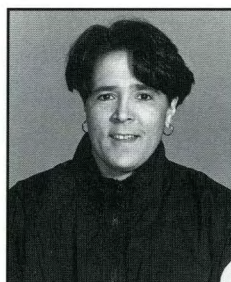
Walker came to Oregon State after spending 11 seasons at national powerhouse UCLA as a manager and assistant coach. During his time in Westwood, the Bruins won six NCAA titles and made 10 appearances in the College World Series. The Bruins recorded an impressive 111-17 (.867) record and won five Pac-10 titles during his stint. As the head pitching instructor, Walker produced several All-Americans, including Lisa Fernandez and Dee Dee Weiman.

Walker is also very involved in the offseason by working at many camps and coaching in the American Softball Association. He has served as the head coach of the California Commotion team, which has won the national title the past two years.

Walker is a native of Woodland Hills, CA. He earned a bachelor degree in kinesiology from UCLA.

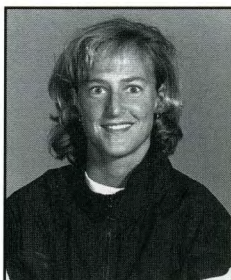
Kirk Walker's top assistant is former UCLA All-American Gina Vecchione. Vecchione, in her fourth year at Oregon State, was a standout outfielder for the Bruins from 1980-82. She helped the Bruins to their first national title in 1982.

Following her collegiate career, she stayed at UCLA in the athletics department. She served as a volunteer assistant coach and worked in events management.

Her playing experience also includes 12 years with the Raysbestos Brakettes of Stratford, CT. The Brakettes won eight ASA titles and three World titles. Vecchione was named to the All-American team seven times, and she was the top hitter at the 1988 national tournament with a .444 average. Vecchione was also a member of the 1983 U.S. Pan American team.

Vecchione was inducted into the National Softball Hall of Fame in 1997.

She is a native of New Rochelle, NY and earned a bachelor degree in sociology from UCLA.



JENNY CONDON

Jenny Condon is in her first season as an assistant coach for the Oregon State softball program.

Condon comes to Corvallis after spending the 1997 season as the first assistant coach at Northwestern University. Prior to that position, she was an assistant coach at UNLV from 1994-96, when she helped guide the Rebels to a third-place finish in the 1995 Women's College World Series.

Condon played collegiately at Iowa State, where she was an NCAA All-American. She also excelled academically and was named a GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-American twice.

Condon is a two-time member of the U.S. National Team. In 1994, she helped the United States to a World Championship, and she was also a member of the 1995 Pan American Games gold medal team.

A native of Edina, MN, Condon earned a B.S. in physical education from Iowa State in 1991.

THE NICKNAME "BEAVERS"

Oregon State University, like many other universities in the United States, is named after its home state's official animal.

In the early days, Oregon State's athletic teams were known as the Aggies. When orange uniforms replaced the drab sweatshirt-gray and tan jerseys, the teams were referred to as the Orangemen.

But in 1916, when the school yearbook was renamed "The Beaver", the name Beaver became associated with the school. It is believed the press also had some influence in changing the name, particularly L.H. Gregory of the Oregonian newspaper. At any rate, the name gained instant popularity among alumni and students.

THE OSU MASCOT

The mascot at Oregon State is Benny the Beaver. The name of course coincides with the team name, Beavers. Benny the Beaver was adopted as mascot in 1952, and remains so today. Previous to Benny, there were at least three other mascots. One was a coyote named Jimmie, owned by one M.M.H. Kriebel, in 1893. In 1909, a second mascot appeared on the scene. Dr. John Bell, a pastor in Corvallis and former regent of Corvallis when it was taken over by the state and became Oregon Agricultural College became the OSU mascot. In the early 1900s, "Doc Bell" was considered to be the varsity football squad's "mascot" because of his steadfast attendance and advising. In 1921 there was an attempt to make a live Beaver, "Bevo", into the school mascot, but with little success.

Benny Beaver, OSU's current mascot, was introduced by the school's rally squad to the student body on September 18, 1952, in an effort to pick up sagging school spirit.

"Benny Beaver, the rally squad's candidate for handsomest man in school, has never been on campus before," according to the *Barometer*, the student newspaper. "The animal stands six-feet tall, wears vivid orange knickerbockers, a black jersey, and his familiar orange and black rooters lid." Adopted as the official mascot in 1952, Benny Beaver still fires up the crowds at OSU athletic events today.

OSU COLORS

Oregon State played its first football game in 1893, and the color orange that was adopted as the school color remains so today. Oregon State athletic teams have generally worn uniforms using orange, black and white as base colors. However, orange is still the official color, even though Oregon State teams generally use orange and black as official colors. Basketball coach Slat Gill and football coach Tommy Prothro popularized all black uniforms during their head coaching stints at OSU.

ROPES-FETROW FIELD

Ropes-Fetrow Field is the home of the Oregon State softball team.

The field is located in the southwest corner of campus. The dimensions of the field are 225 feet to centerfield and 190 feet down the lines.

During the summer of 1992, the field underwent a major facelift thanks to the generous support of Russ and Sharon Fetrow and many Beaver Club contributors.

In honor of Fetrows' donation, the facility partly carries their name. Ropes was the nickname of long-time athletic trainer Bill Robertson.

The leading quality of Corvallis is people. Athletic-minded, friendly people proud of their city and its top resource — Oregon State University.

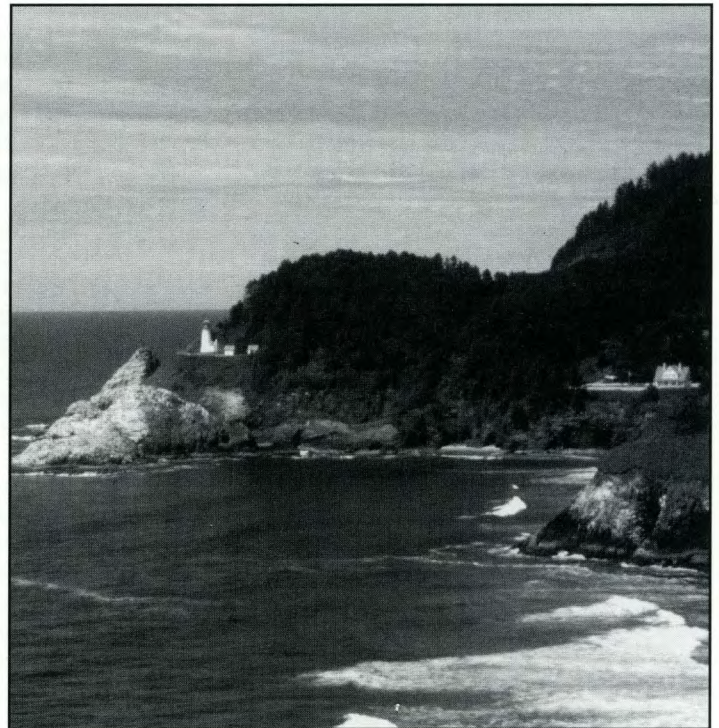
THE STATE OF OREGON

BALANCE

(Beaver Athletes for Lifeskills Awareness and the Necessary Choices For Excellence)

Imagine going to your first job interview and not having a clue about what to expect. Imagine you're a college freshman with three final exams the same day. Imagine you were one of the most popular students in high school and now you're just one of many in college. To many of us these situations aren't hard to imagine at all; they are real life experiences.

The Oregon State University Athletic Department is helping its student-athletes cope with these kinds of situations by initially being one of 46 colleges and universities to participate as a pilot institution for the NCAA's parent Life Skills Program. This program has grown considerably over the last two years and now there are more than 176 Life Skills programs across the country.

Oregon State's program has inherited the name BALANCE, standing for Beaver Athletes for Life Skills Awareness and the Necessary Choices for Excellence. The purpose of this program is to focus on the whole person -- academically, athletically and emotionally.

"To be successful and happy with everything you do, each area of your life -- academics, athletics and your personal life -- needs to be functioning well," BALANCE Coordinator and former OSU softball standout Andrea Talcott said. "This program is designed to give the student-athletes the knowledge and the skills to make the right choices in their life."

Oregon State sees 100 percent of its student-athletes involved with some aspect of the program.

"Whether the men's basketball team is collecting food, or the women's golf team is taking a nutrition workshop, each team and each student-athlete is somehow affected by the BALANCE program," Talcott explained. "The student-athletes can't get enough of this program. They continually want to do more, not only help the community, but to promote their program and to better themselves."

At Oregon State, the BALANCE program has developed into an educational value as well for the student-athletes. There are three credited classes offered to the student-athletes, in addition to a number of seminars and workshops. The freshman

orientation course includes over 20 topics such as nutrition, time management, diversity and communication skills. The Drugs and Sports class focuses on the relationship between a student-athlete and use of drugs. This class concludes with a presentation to a local junior high school class about the student-athlete's position on drug and alcohol use. The third class, Athletes in Transition, is for juniors and seniors and focuses on career development. Topics include interviewing, networking, and resume and cover letter writing.

The desired outcome of the BALANCE program benefits the student-athletes and the community as a whole. The program features materials presented by athletics department staff members, other university personnel and community leaders.

A mentorship program was just added to the BALANCE program last fall. Once a student-athlete chooses a career path, a member in the community is selected to guide them in choices regarding internships, what the job is really like, and most importantly, emotional support.

"What a wonderful opportunity for a student-athlete to ask the questions only someone in the career would know," Talcott said.

"We are constantly looking for members in the community, boosters or friends of the university who would be interested in getting involved in the mentorship program," Talcott added. "This is an opportunity for others to be involved in the growth and education of the student-athlete. It is an incredible feeling to know you helped someone succeed in their life."

So while BALANCE at a first glance appears to be skewed toward making the student-athletes' college stints successful, it also is an important program in preparing the individual for their post-college days.

"An athlete who uses the resources offered to them through the BALANCE program will have a considerable amount of experience to take with them as they go out into the real world," Talcott said. "Combined

with their degree, what they have learned from real life situations, and what they have learned from being in athletics all of their lives, these student-athletes will have a lot to offer."

The BALANCE program's reputation has grown considerably on a national level over the last two years and is considered one of the top programs in the nation.

Those heart-pounding, stressful situations like a first time job interview might be a little easier to handle for the athletes you are seeing on the field and courts today because of the efforts of many people in this class. These same student-athletes could be working for you in the future, and thanks to the BALANCE program they will already have the skills necessary to be successful employees and citizens of your community.

WARM

(We Are Role Models)

In addition to the BALANCE program at Oregon State University, the WARM program was established. We Are Role Models is an athletic department bureau of student-athletes who are trained in public speaking. These student-athletes are available to local schools and youth organizations for various presentations.

WARM students speak on topics such as the importance of hard work, sportsmanship, goal setting, education or the dangers of drugs and alcohol. This service is provided free of charge to the schools and youth organizations.

SAAB

(Student Athlete Advisory Board)

The Student Athlete Advisory Board is a student organization within the athletic department. Two student athletes (Jodi Chmielewski and Courtney Stewart from softball) from each athletic team make up the board. The goal of the Student Athlete Advisory Board is to act as the communication link between the athletes and the athletic administration.

Through SAAB, the athletic teams interact with one another and help promote each other's sports. Throughout the year, the board meets and discusses ideas and concerns regarding the athletes. Social activities, such as a pizza feed, are also scheduled during the year.

OREGON STATE UNIVERSITY AND ACADEMICS

Oregon State University is looking for student-athletes who desire not only to help the Beaver program succeed in the Pacific-10 Conference, but will also use the opportunity to obtain a quality higher education.

The resources are here, as is the desire, to see student-athletes prosper in whatever comes their way after graduation from OSU. It's up to the athletes to take advantage of what a respected university and knowledgeable coaching staff have to offer.

There are numbers that back up the claim that the Oregon State system works:

- The current GPA of the OSU student-athlete EXCEEDS that of the general student body on campus.
- Approximately 96 percent of the athletes who complete their eligibility here also leave with a diploma.

The Oregon State University athletic program is simply a highly visible facet of an institution that has accepted the challenge of providing a worthwhile education to its

enrollment. Academic counselors Mary Alice Stander and Marianne Vydra are in charge of advising student-athletes throughout their college educations, and the 96 percent graduation rate is directly attributable to their work.

Among the programs that rank among the nation's finest are Oregon State's colleges of engineering and forestry, both priding themselves on their placement with research firms, some of which have offices in Corvallis.

Overall, the university prides itself on well-rounded offerings and serving as an institution for everyone. Membership in the Pacific-10 Conference demands each school consider the affiliation not only a strong athletic one, but also a tie between some of the finest academic institutions in the nation.

Teaching is number one at OSU, but it is also recognized as one of the major research centers in the United States with grants towards research totaling more than \$100 million.
