ASSOCIATED WOMEN STUDENTS

Freshman Week is the first contact that new students have with the campus at Oregon State College. The new class is divided into small groups according to schools and each group is supervised by some faculty member. All groups go through practically the same routine but at different times during the week.

At one time, however, all the new women are assembled at a meeting presided over by the officers of the Associated Women Students. This is an organization composed of all campus women, which is devoted to the advancement of college ideals and standards.

A. W. S., a chapter of the National Federation of Associated Women Students, is a truly active organization. It sponsors a lyceum series and brings to the campus famous singers, speakers, artists and other people of interest to the whole college community.

The legislative council of A. W. S. was formed to unify all campus women's organizations into a coordinated unit—all working toward a common aim—"Fuller, happier, more useful lives for Oregon State women".

This group is composed of the vice-presidents of all the organizations and the five A. W. S. officers. It holds a retreat just before school starts to discuss plans for the coming year.

Associated Women Students may be represented by a wheel, the hub of which is the common aim of the organization. The spokes represent all women's organizations, which are bound together by the rim, which symbolizes the legislative council with its democracy, sportsmanship and O. S. C. loyalty.

KINLANI LODGE

The Associated Women Students own a cabin retreat on the headwaters of Mary's River. This camp is named Kinlani Lodge, which means "house of many peoples". Located about seven miles from Corvallis, it is a popular place for co-eds to gather for picnics and "slumber" parties.

The cabin has a kitchen and big living-dining room on the first floor and sleeping quarters upstairs. There is a big fireplace with an old-fashioned "pot-hook". Behind the cabin, a winding path descends steeply past a cool deep spring, to the rocky chattering stream.

WOMEN'S CAMPUS ORGANIZATIONS

Pan-Hellenic is an organization made up of representatives from each sorority on the campus. It is a member of the national Pan-Hellenic which includes all women's organizations in the Greek-letter world. At its meetings mutual problems are discussed, and rulings made. Pan-Hellenic's biggest work last year was the initiation of closed rushing season for four months of the year—November, February, May and July. It is felt that this plan will work for the benefit of both the rushees and the sororities.

Phrateres is a national all-campus social organization to which both sorority and independent women are eligible. The group takes an active part in student activities.

Talons is a local service organization for sophomore women. It seeks to uphold Oregon State spirit and traditions among the incoming freshmen. Its members also serve the Associated Women Students by ushering at various affairs.

The Home Economics Club is composed of all students registered in the school of home economics. Since 1924 the club has given a scholarship to some foreign girl for study in home economics at O. S. C.

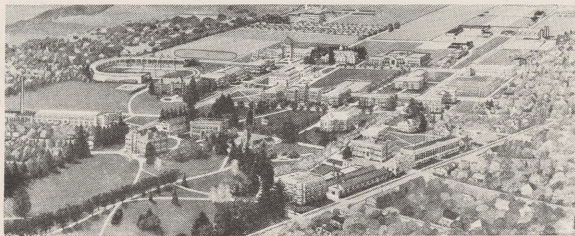
The Physical Education Club which is open to any woman interested in sports, is composed mainly of students minoring in physical education. The club sponsors informal meetings, hikes, and various campus projects.

The Women's Athletic Association sponsors athletic contests between living groups and classes. Membership is open to those who have earned a certain number of points by participation in sports—either on class teams or in the open hours. “Orange O” sweaters are awarded for continuous participation in sports.

The Y. W. C. A. is an international movement of women headed toward the more real values of life. Friendships are made and leadership is developed through common interests such as world fellowship, music, annual waffle breakfast, bazaar and teas. The Freshman Commission is open to any rookies who are interested. Those who show ability and aptitude for leadership may become Rookess Counselors. These are sophomore women who help freshmen to get established in their new home on the campus.

Greater Halls Council is composed of the officers of each of the women's dormitories and meets to discuss the problems of women in the halls.

Teminids is a campus organization for students who are members of the Eastern Star.

ACTIVITIES

There are many opportunities for women in campus activities of different kinds. Leadership, character, tact and college spirit are all developed by an interest in things outside of books. The contacts made with fellow students in these cooperative enterprises encourage valuable friendships which will last long after school is forgotten.

The tryouts and openings for positions are announced in either the notice or news columns of the Barometer.

If a girl is interested in journalism her first step should be to take the first journalism course, J 111. This is a prerequisite to all advanced work and a satisfactory grade in it is required for any editorial position on campus publications.

The Oregon State Daily Barometer offers opportunities for girls on both the editorial and managerial staffs and also as secretaries. This newspaper has four eight-column pages and is issued every morning but Sunday and Monday during the school year.

The Beaver, the student yearbook, also has many openings for those interested in experience of this sort. Work on the Beaver sales staff requires many people especially during the fall subscription campaign.

The Student Directory, published once each fall and winter term, requires sales people and clerical help. This publication lists the names, addresses, course, year in school, and telephone number of every

student registered in college. Faculty members are in a special section.

A girl interested in athletics has a choice of many sports of all kinds—both team and individual. The fine facilities of the women's physical education department, including a perfectly grand swimming pool, archery range, golf practice cages, a special natural dancing room and two large gymnasiums are available during extra hours. Instruction in these hours is given, without college credit, in most activities. The Women's Athletic Association sponsors interclass and interhouse tournaments in hockey, volleyball, basketball, archery, swimming, baseball and other things even including horseshoes.

The girl interested enough in athletics to take more than the regular required amount or who wishes to teach may take a minor in physical education.

Debate is a valuable activity which gives splendid training in quick and clear thinking, speaking, and leadership. Letters are given for participation in in-



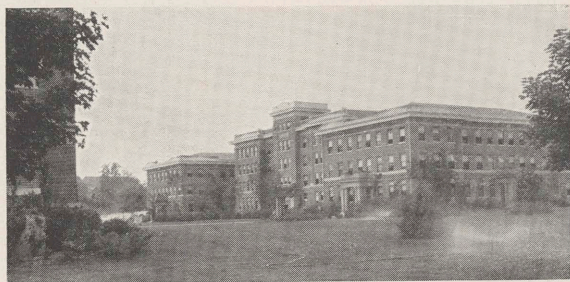
The College Library.

tercollegiate debates and barnstorming trips through the country are sometimes made. Many courses for this training are given in the department of speech.

Dramatics is another activity which comes under the department of speech. Training in interpretation, in courses offered, is a prerequisite to advanced work which may include community drama, stagecraft and experience in acting and directing plays.

Musically inclined girls will be interested in the Madrigal club. A voice test is given at the first part of the fall term for this and class credit is given. At certain times the Madrigal club unites with the men's Glee club to form the College Chorus which gives several concerts.

The Oregon State symphony orchestra is open to girls who can play an instrument, as is also the R. O. T. C. band. While the band is military and its women members are ineligible for a few of its activities, they play with it in concerts, and at football and basketball games.



Agriculture Hall.

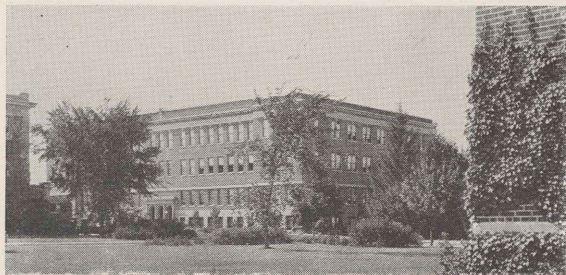
HONOR SOCIETIES

For Women

Mortar Board is a national honor society for senior women and is considered one of the highest honors a college woman may attain. Its members are chosen for their outstanding leadership in scholarship and activities and their strength of character and friendliness.

Alpha Lambda Delta is one of the first honor societies a girl may "make". It is a national scholastic society for underclass women and chooses its members during the third term of their freshman year. Each fall term it sponsors a banquet for those freshman girls who maintain high scholarship in high school and each winter term it gives a tea in honor of the first-year women who have a grade average of B or above.

Alpha Tau Delta is a national honor society for women in nursing which chooses its members from those taking pre-nursing training.



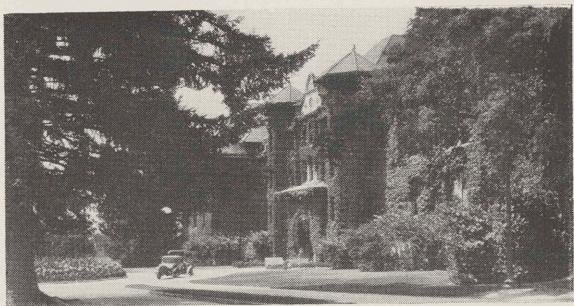
Administration Offices and Secretarial Science Center Here.

Euterpe, local honor society in music, chooses girls for their interest and talent in all phases of music.

Omicron Nu is a national honor group for women in home economics. It chooses women who are leaders of character in the profession. Each spring it awards the Omicron Nu plaque to that senior woman who, during her college career, has best lived up to the teaching of home economics.

Orchesis is a national honor society for women interested and proficient in interpretive dancing. Its members take leading parts in the dance recital and other affairs and encourage dancing among women students.

Parthenia, local honor group in physical education, chooses members from among women athletes on a basis of grace, skill and strength and desirable character attributes.

Phi Chi Theta, national honor society in business, chooses members on a basis of scholarship and leadership.

Theta Sigma Phi is a national honor group for women in journalism and chooses its members from those successful in campus publication work. It sponsors the Matrix Table, an annual banquet for those especially interested in journalism.

For Men and Women

Phi Kappa Phi, national scholastic honor fraternity, is the highest goal of scholastic achievement at Oregon State. Both men and women are elected on the basis of scholastic attainment, leadership and strength of character.

Rho Chi, national honor group in pharmacy, chooses its members from students of that school who have done meritorious work.

Delta Sigma Rho is a national honor society in forensics which elects its members from those successful in varsity debate and oratory.

Kappa Delta Pi is a national honor and professional fraternity in education which chooses its members on a basis of scholarship and attributes that make a successful teacher.

Mu Beta Beta is a local professional organization for students interested in 4-H Club work.

Phi Sigma, is a national honor fraternity in biological science which recognizes superior work.

National Collegiate Players recognizes superior dramatic ability and chooses those men and women who have experience, ability and sincere interest in both acting and directing.

Pi Mu Epsilon is a national professional fraternity in mathematics and chooses men and women who are outstanding in this field.

SOCIAL AFFAIRS

Social affairs are not a small part of college life. Authorities recognize that there is much to be gained from contact with one's fellows as well as from books.

Oregon State has an interesting and varied social program, and one socially inclined is sure to be entertained.

There is great emphasis on dancing in the schedule of events but if a girl doesn't care to dance—why, there are lots of other things to do.

The first social event of the year is the Freshman Mix during freshman week. This is a big get-together for everybody to become acquainted with his or her classmates. Held in the armory and sponsored by the "Y. W." and "Y. M.", it is decidedly different. (Note to freshman girls—Be sure to wear comfortable shoes that won't fill up easily with sawdust.)

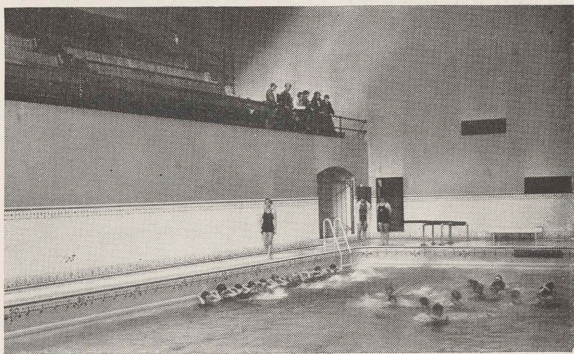


Room in one of the Halls of Residence.

Another event for the freshmen is the Rook Dance held during the early part of the second term. Only freshmen are allowed to attend and each rook must take a girl home or suffer the consequences. All the "bashful boys" are herded together by the sophomore service group and taken around to serenade all the sororities and halls. There may even be a few paddles used, too.

Annual and traditional formal dances are the Sophomore Cotillion, the Junior Prom and the Senior Ball, sponsored by the classes and the Military Ball, sponsored by Scabbard and Blade, the military honor society. These are all grand affairs with special decorations and programs and famous orchestras.

Another dance new on the campus last year, which deserves a special paragraph all its own, is the Mortar Board ball. Sponsored by the senior woman's

honor group for which it is named, this dance is unique in that it is the only all-school formal at which the women are the hosts.

The co-eds invite the men, buy the tickets and flowers and squire the collegians around in grand and unaccustomed fashion! To see a sprightly miss in a flowing gown opening the car door for her big he-man, closing it after him, then going around and getting into the driver's seat is some experience—and one you don't want to miss!

Another dance, this time a fall term one, is the Co-Ed ball. This is for women only—and woe betide the adventurous male who dares to enter the portals! Everyone dresses up in costume to suit her fancy—beautiful, ridiculous, tragic or comic—and comes along to have a good time. Many sororities or other living groups carry out a theme in their costuming or all dress alike. Prizes are offered in different classes for dress and attendance.

Other social events are the plays sponsored by National Collegiate Players and advanced drama classes. These are given once a term.

The Horse Show in which women and men riders participate, is a feature of Military Weekend, in the spring term.

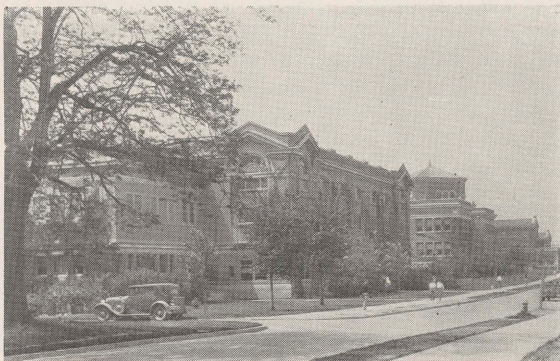
Junior Weekend, another big spring term affair—everything seems to come in the spring—includes the Junior Cord dance at which the dirtiest pair of cords wins a prize, the Junior Breakfast, the Rook-Soph Tug-O-War at the mill race, the All-Campus Convocation and luncheon, and river sports including crew racing and canoe tilting. Many are the cases of

sunburn suffered as a result of this busy, full-of-fun Saturday.

Between all these events are sandwiched numerous fraternity, sorority, club and hall dances and parties of all kinds. Most of the fall ones are informal and a great many winter ones are formal.

The Associated Students also sponsor informal student-body dances about once a term.

Rally dances are often held before big games to foster school spirit and enthusiasm. The rally committee, formed of loyal and hard-working Oregon Staters, also has charge of the Wednesday afternoon rally dances. These are held in the Memorial Union ballroom from 4 to 6 o'clock and are grand places to get acquainted with new people and to meet your friends. They are "non-fussing", which means that you go without a date; and the music is furnished by different campus orchestras.



The Men's Gymnasium.



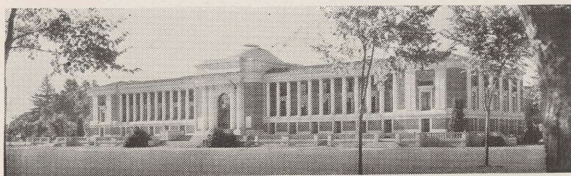
The Women's Building.

MOTHERS' WEEKEND

The second weekend in May is set aside at Oregon State to honor the mothers of all students. The idea has developed gradually through thirteen years from the annual Women's Day held for mothers of Oregon State women.

Now, although co-eds take charge of all the arrangements, the men's mothers are also invited for the weekend.

Events of particular interest are the honor convocation at which all women's honor societies announce their pledges, awards are made and A. W. S. officers installed; the dance recital; the annual mother-and-daughter banquet; the Mortar Board ball and exhibits of class work. The Co-Ed Barometer, edited and written entirely by women, is issued Saturday morning.

TALONS RULES

1. All rookesses shall attend convocation, student-body assemblies, class meetings, women's league, and Y. W. C. A. meetings.
2. Every Wednesday, with the exception of the time between Thanksgiving and the beginning of the winter term, all rookesses shall wear the customary green ribbon, which is to be put on before breakfast and not to be taken off until bed time. If a rookess wears a hat, the ribbon must be worn on the hat.
3. Rookesses shall show proper respect to all spohomores and other upperclassmen and extend them the usual courtesies.
4. Rookesses shall not walk on campus grass.
5. Rookesses shall speak to all members of the faculty and be congenial with all students.
6. There shall be no fussing at athletic events.
7. Rookesses must know all college songs.
8. Rookesses shall not have library or mid-week dates.
9. Rookesses shall be familiar with all college rules and traditions.
10. Violations of all rules are tried by Talons and punished accordingly.

These rules are made so rookesses will know campus traditions and customs and not because Talons feels that freshmen are not as good as upperclassmen. The rule about walking on the grass is a very necessary one to protect the lawns in rainy weather.

HOURS

A-1. *Hours to be observed.*

- (a) Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday: Closing hour—10:00 p. m. (Women will leave the library in time to reach home by this hour.) Lights out—10:30 p. m.
- (b) Friday, and vacations, except evening before classes—Closing hour—11:30 p. m.
Lights out—12:00 p. m.
Friday afternoon—callers 4:00 to 6:00 p. m.
Saturday afternoon—open to callers.
Saturday evening, closing hour, 12:00 p. m.
- (c) Sunday—Calling hours—2:00 to 9:30 p. m.

A-2. *Preceding Holidays*—The hours on evenings immediately preceding college holidays are the same as on Friday and Saturday nights.

A-3. *Social Functions*—Social functions close 11:00 p. m. Friday; 11:30 p. m., Saturday. (With the exception of Junior Prom, Senior Ball, and Military Ball, which closes at 12:00 p. m. if held on Friday or 11:45 p. m. if held on Saturday evening.)

A-4. *Upperclass Privileges*—Seniors and juniors may, with the permission of their housemothers, have one mid-week social engagement, but they will be in at the closing hour for week days.

A-5. *Freshman Privileges*—The weekend social engagements of freshman women are limited to one afternoon and two evening engagements.

A-6. *Telephone*—After 7:30 on study nights the housemother is responsible for the telephone, calling the women only in cases of emergency.

A-7. *Register*—Women leaving the house after 6:00 p. m. will register with the housemother and check off with her time of return.

A-8. *Absence From Meals*—It is courteous to inform the housemother before being absent from meals.

SOCIAL

B-1. *Scheduling Social Events*—

- (a) Social events involving men and women, except class and student-body events, are scheduled with the Student Interests committee through the office of the dean of women.

Fall term events are scheduled within two weeks following registration day.

Winter term events are scheduled two weeks before the close of fall term.

Spring term events are scheduled two weeks before the close of winter term.

Due notice of definite dates for scheduling events is given in the Daily Barometer.

- (b) Informal parties, and dinners in residence halls, sorority houses and fraternity houses, are scheduled with the Dean of Women.

B-2. *Chaperons*—

- (a) After an event has been approved, chaperons are arranged for as follows:
 - Sunday dinner parties—one couple or faculty woman.
 - Dancing parties at sorority house—housemother.
 - Dancing parties in rented halls (either on the campus or in town)
 - three couples.
 - Picnics—two couples.
- (b) Chaperon cards will be signed by chaperons in person.
- (c) Students may not act as chaperons.
- (d) The chaperon card must be filed in the office of the Dean of Women by *Wednesday noon* preceding the weekend in which the event is to be held so that it may be acted upon by the Social Life Committee, which meets every Wednesday.

B-3. *Approved Events*—Women may attend only scheduled social events. Approved lists are sent each weekend to the housemothers.

B-4. *Fraternity Houses*—Women will not go to fraternity houses, except to attend scheduled social events.

SPORTS

C 1. *Canoeing*—

- (a) A special swimming test is provided by the Physical Education department for those women who desire to participate in canoeing, after which a letter is written to the parents asking for their wish in the matter.
- (b) The housemother will have a list of those who qualify.

GOING OUT OF TOWN

D-1. *Permission to Leave Town*—A woman wishing to leave town:

1. Secures from the housemother cards with her signature.
2. Secures approval of the Dean of Women.
3. If the trip is not to her own home, the woman obtains a letter of permission from home to show the housemother and to file in the office of the Dean of Women at the time the cards are signed.
4. Leaves one card in the office of the Dean of Women. Files the other with the housemother. (These are issued for each occasion.)

CHANGE OF RESIDENCE

E-1. *Permission to Change Residence*—College women will not change residence without a written statement from the Dean of Women.

INITIATION

F-1. *Sororities*—Sorority initiations are scheduled in the office of the Dean of Women.

HINTS FOR FRESHMEN

"Carry Me Back to O. S. C.," the Alma Mater, is the song which we always rise to sing. To the old grad it brings back happy memories of his pleasant years at the "college on the hill." To the undergraduate it brings pride to his college, love of its traditions and its ideals.

The college health service is just south of the administration building. Medical attention is free to students.

You are an Oregon Stater now—always boost for your college and strive to be a credit to it.

Be a loyal freshman—play the game and do what is expected of you. Attend all athletic contests.

Go to all your class meetings.

No smoking is allowed in the halls or on the campus.

Don't begin cutting classes. It doesn't pay.

Make some activity your objective; stick to it.

CONSTITUTION OF THE ASSOCIATED WOMEN STUDENTS

Article I. Name

The name of this organization shall be "The Associated Women Students of Oregon State Agricultural College".

Article II. Object

The object of this organization shall be to further the educational, social, and cultural aims of the women of this College.

a. To make possible the representation of all women, either directly or indirectly, in the organization.

b. To create a spirit of cooperation among the women as a whole and of those activities, organized or not organized, in which women participate.

c. To further the cooperation of women's activities with the purpose of the administration.

d. To maintain a general loan fund for women.

e. To create a spirit of cooperation among the women students with the Associated Women Students of Oregon State Agricultural College.

Article III. Membership

Section 1. All the women of the College shall automatically become members of this organization upon matriculation at the College.

Sec. 2. All alumnae and women who are members of the faculty shall be honorary members of the organization.

Article IV. Administration

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be a president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, and sergeant-at-arms.

Sec. 2. The governing body shall be the legislative council to consist of the following representatives: president of Associated Women Students, president of the Greater Halls, president of the Women's Athletic Association, president of the Y. W. C. A., president of the Pan-Hellenic, president of the Down Town Girls club, secretary of the Associated Women Students, chairman of Talons, and one representative each from the Barometer, the Honor Committee, and the Home Economics club.

Duties of the Legislative Council:

a. This body shall be the means for greater representation of all women.

b. It shall be responsible, as a medium for advertising, to place before all representative activities any undertaking of interest to the women of the College.

c. It shall be democratic and shall further the spirit of democracy among women.

d. The powers of individual organizations shall remain individual, and shall not be interfered with by this body.

e. This council, or any representative of it, if desirous of presenting a report, petition, grievance, criticism, or any business matter, may present a written statement of the business to the secretary before the meeting.

f. It shall prevent duplication of work and meetings to the best of its ability.

g. It shall keep the interests of all women in mind always, making life at Oregon State bigger and better, and dividing the responsibility of the organization among all women.

h. The legislative council shall consider and discuss all questions appertaining to the objects and problems of the Associated Women Students, and all things concerning the women students or their problems in the College, these matters to be referred to the general body.

i. The legislative council shall also allow all bills and expenditures and suggest the character of entertainments.

j. The legislative council shall elect the manager of the annual women's stunt show at the end of fall term.

Sec. 3. Requirements for office:

a. The president shall be chosen from the senior class and the vice-president from the junior class.

b. The secretary shall be chosen from the sophomore class.

c. The treasurer shall be chosen from the junior class.

d. The sergeant-at-arms shall be chosen from the junior class.

Sec. 4. Special elections shall be held for vacancies made by officers.

Article V. Duties of the Officers

The President

- a. She shall preside at all assemblies of the Associated Women Students and at the meetings of the legislative council.
- b. She may act as ex-officio member of all committees.
- c. She shall devote her time to studying the problems of women and shall advise and construct plans for betterment of conditions.
- d. She shall work in close cooperation with the vice-president, checking on her work.
- e. She shall represent the women at the state or the interstate conference of college or state women when it is possible for her to do so.
- f. She shall have the power to call special meetings.
- g. She shall invite to the campus women speakers of national or state importance as authorized by the legislative council.

The Vice-President

- a. She shall preside in the absence of the president.
- b. She shall work in close cooperation with the president.
- c. She shall attend the state or interstate conference for college or state women when it is impossible for the president to do so.

The Secretary

- a. The secretary shall call the roll and read the minutes of the legislative council. At business assemblies she shall read the minutes of the last business assembly of women.
- b. She shall manage the secretarial correspondence and keep the files and important papers for the association.
- c. She shall call all members to their respective meetings.
- d. She may appoint an assistant secretary to assist her.
- e. She shall keep a scrapbook as an illustrated example of the year's events, which shall be filed in the office of the Dean of Women.

The Treasurer

- a. The treasurer shall manage the finances of the association.
- b. She shall make out the yearly budget for the association.
- c. She shall have her books audited at the close of her term of office.
- d. She shall attend to the collection of dues.
- e. She shall make an annual report of the year's finances.

The Sergeant-at-arms

- a. She shall make all arrangements for meeting room and seating.
- b. She shall keep order.

Article VI. Meetings

The meetings for the association shall be held as assemblies for all women, and shall be held at least once a term. Meetings shall be called only when the most interesting things can be presented to the women (Speakers, artists, etc.). Meetings shall be considered regular when approved by the officers of the association.

Article VII. Elections

a. Nominations of officers shall take place at the last meeting of the second term.

b. The executive board shall appoint the nomination committee of five members, two of whom shall be from the executive board and three from outside that body. Two of the five shall be from the halls, two from the sororities, and one from the Down Town Girls' club.

c. Elections shall take place on registration day of spring term, the time and place to be determined by the officers of the Association.

d. Installation shall take place at the next regular meeting.

Article VIII. Amendments

Amendments to this constitution shall be proposed in writing at a regular meeting and shall be voted on at the next regular meeting. Two-thirds of all votes shall be required for adoption. Voting shall be by secret ballot.

Article IX. Loan Fund

A permanent loan fund shall be maintained to be lent to the Associated Women Students with the approval of the Dean of Women and the president.

BY-LAWS

1. A quorum shall consist of fifty members.

2. A majority vote shall be required to carry all measures.

3. These by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at a regular meeting.

4. The meeting of the Associated Women Students shall be governed by "Robert's Rules of Order".

5. The following oath of office shall be used: "I do hereby solemnly promise, in the presence of these witnesses, to execute faithfully the requirements of this constitution, to uphold and maintain the dignity of the office to which I have been elected, and to perform to the best of my ability all the duties that devolve upon such an office".

6. If at any time it is deemed advisable to secure cooperation of men students, it shall be in the power of the chairman of the acting committee with the legislative council to make the necessary temporary arrangements.
