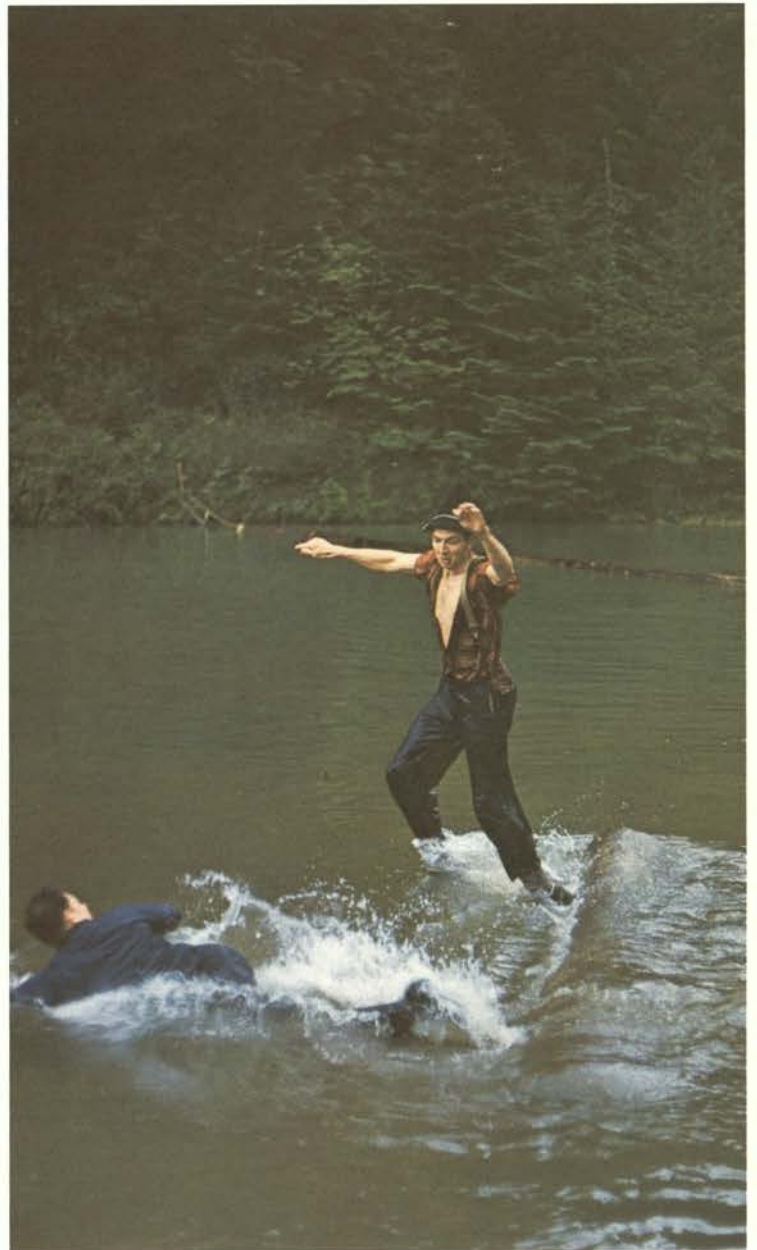

Wait until next year when Baker's away.*

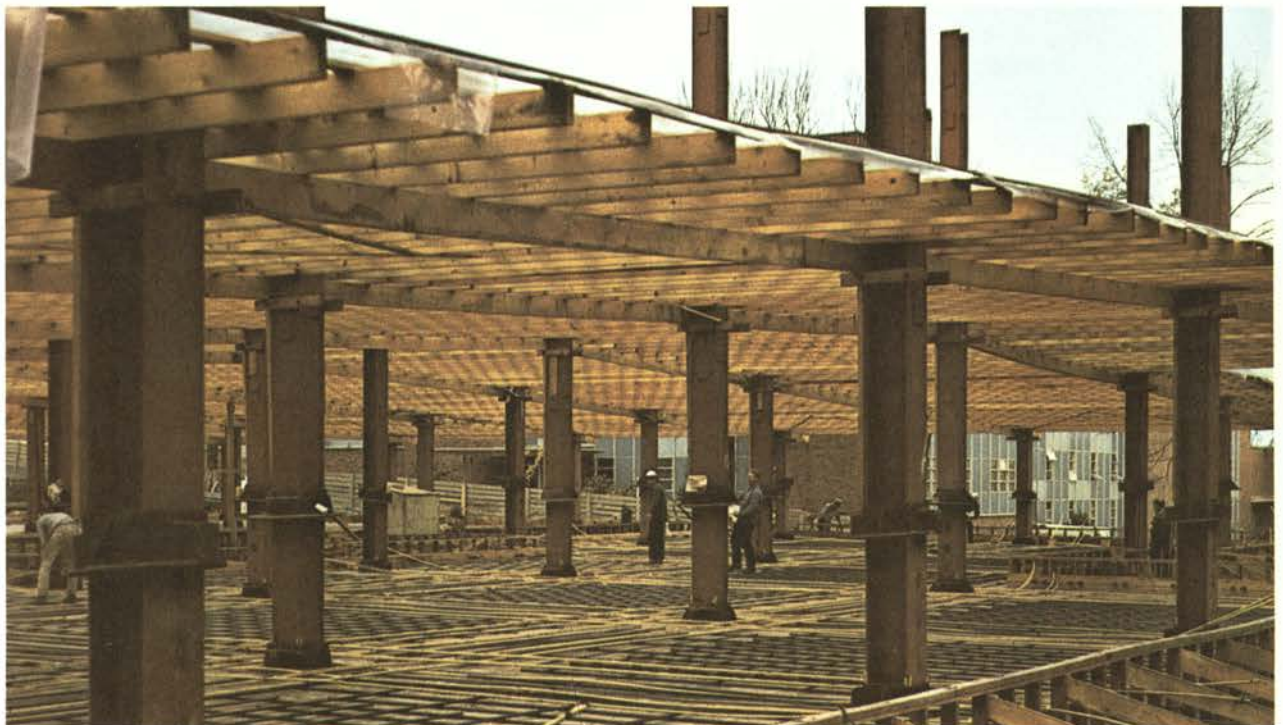

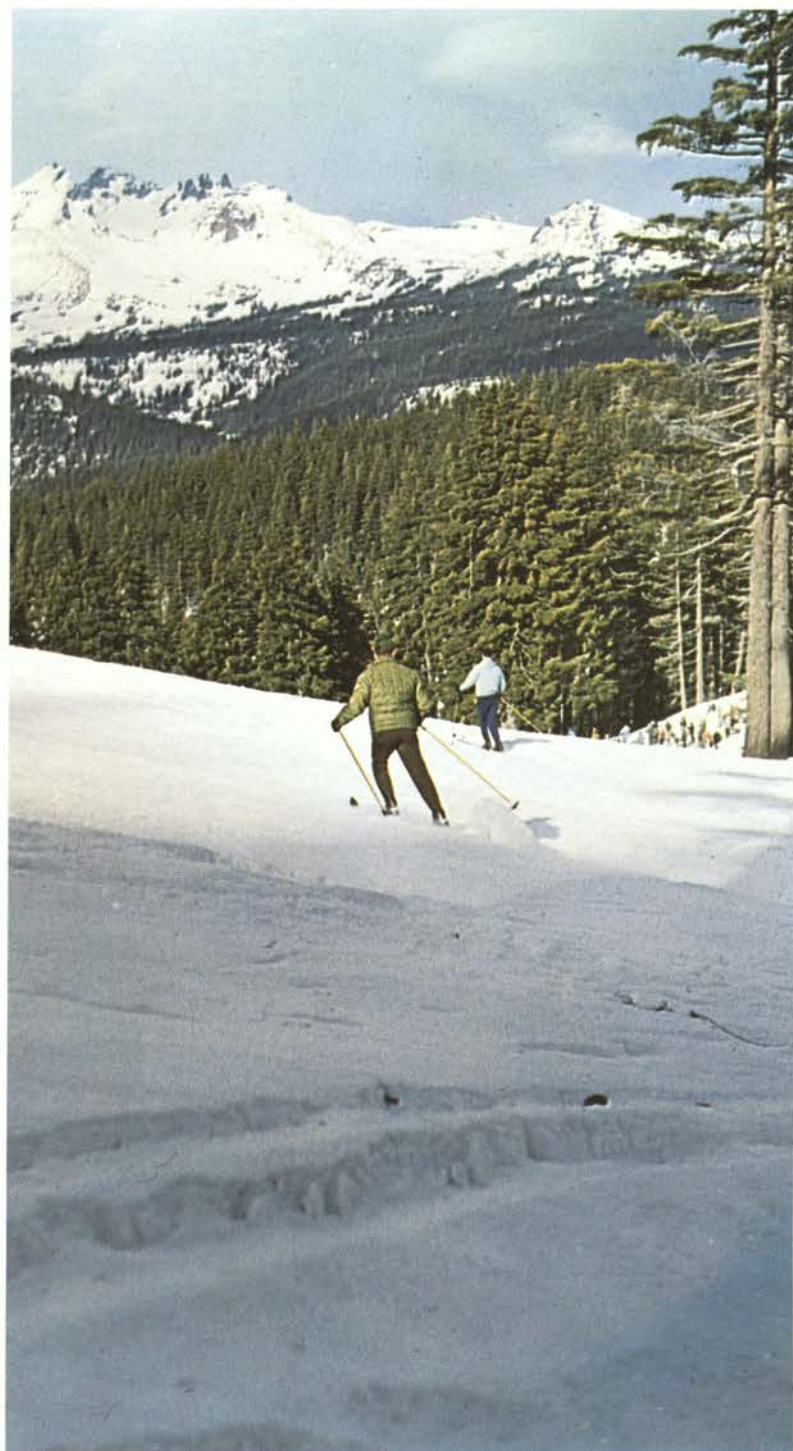

...Welcomes a "Ball"

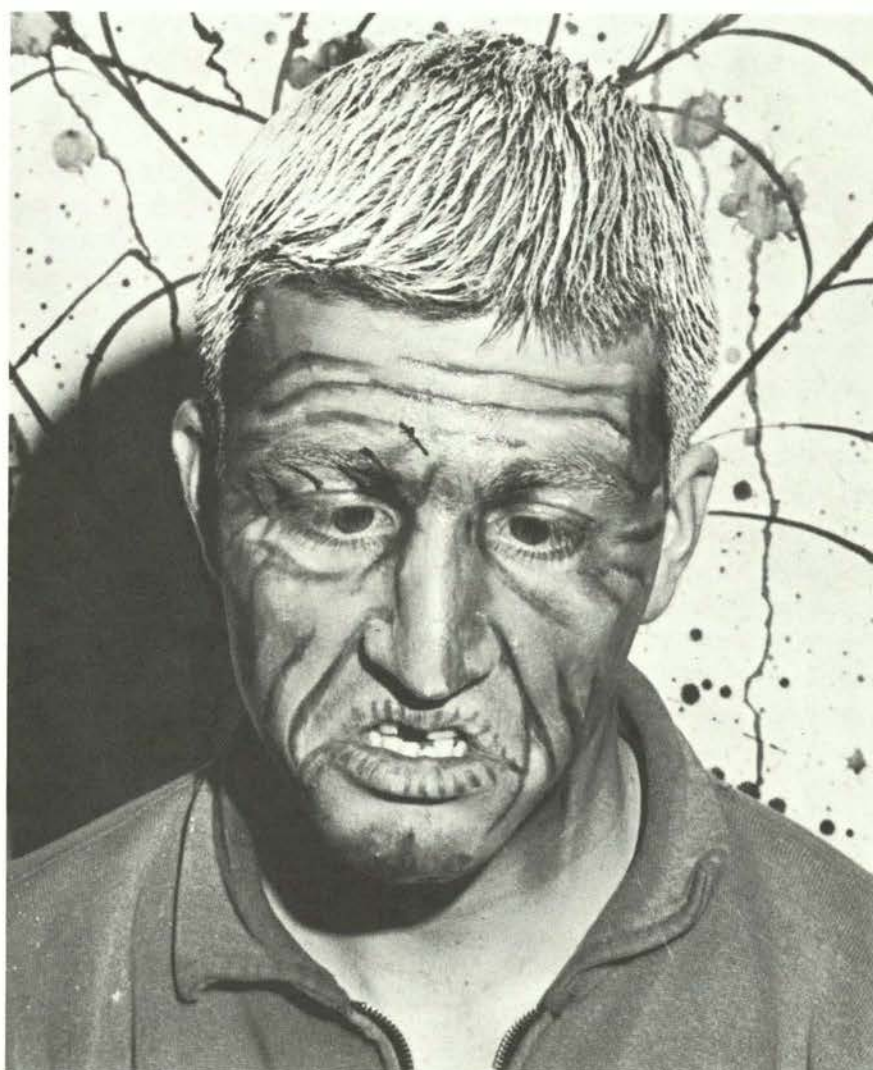

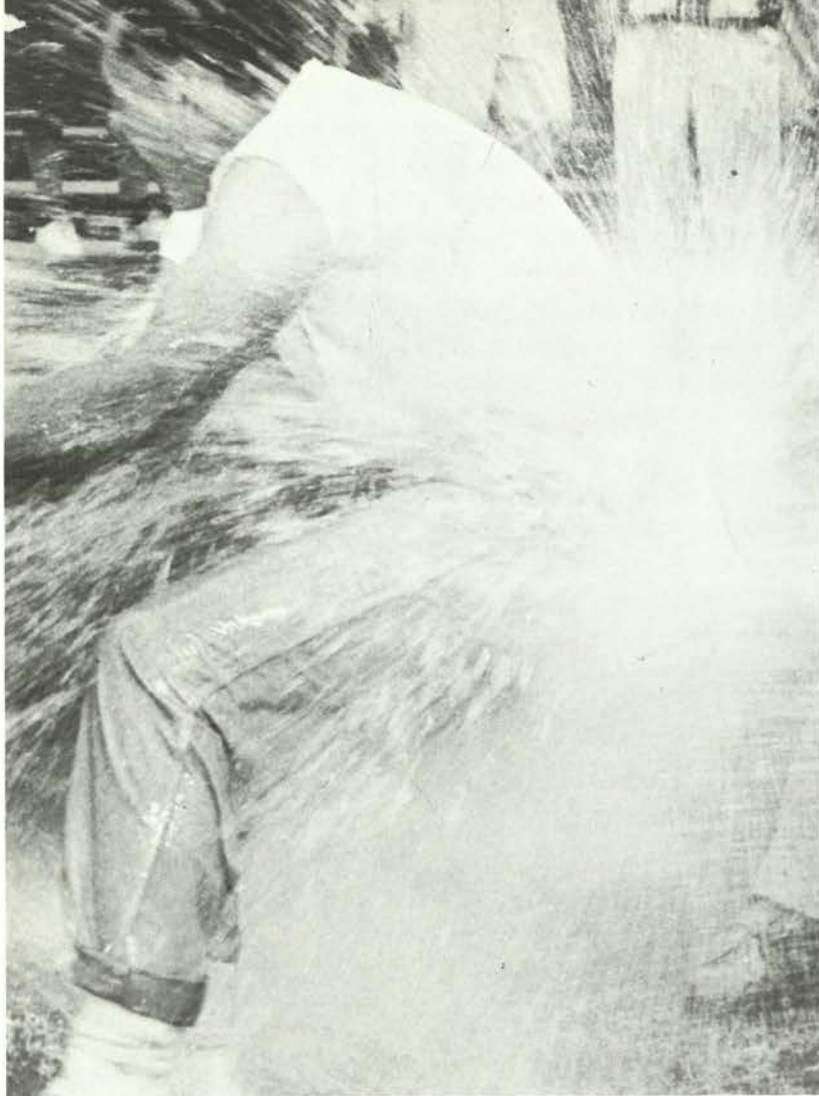




...and Thoughts of Spring

Have long awaited these dismal skies to clear.

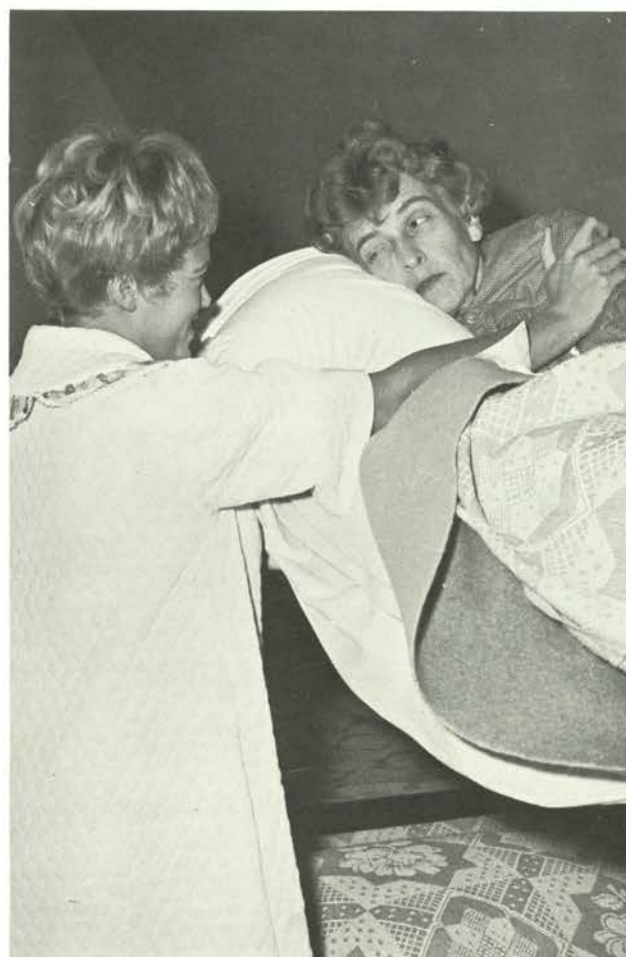
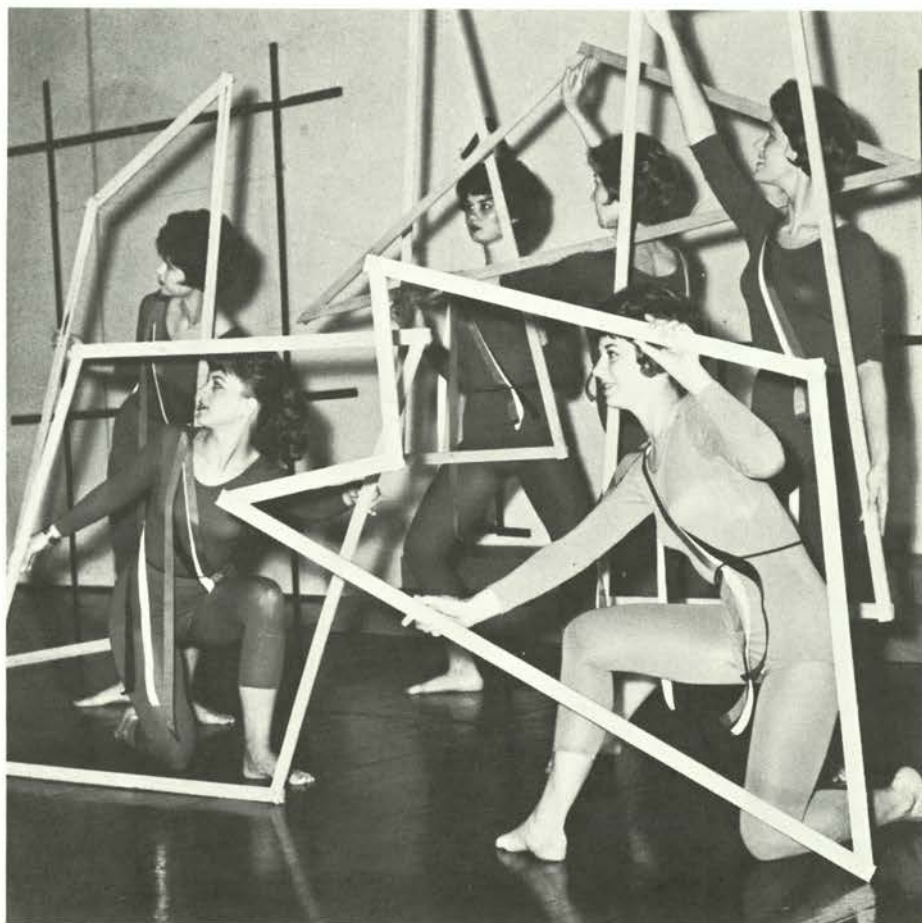
Creeping on silent feet, it steals into classes

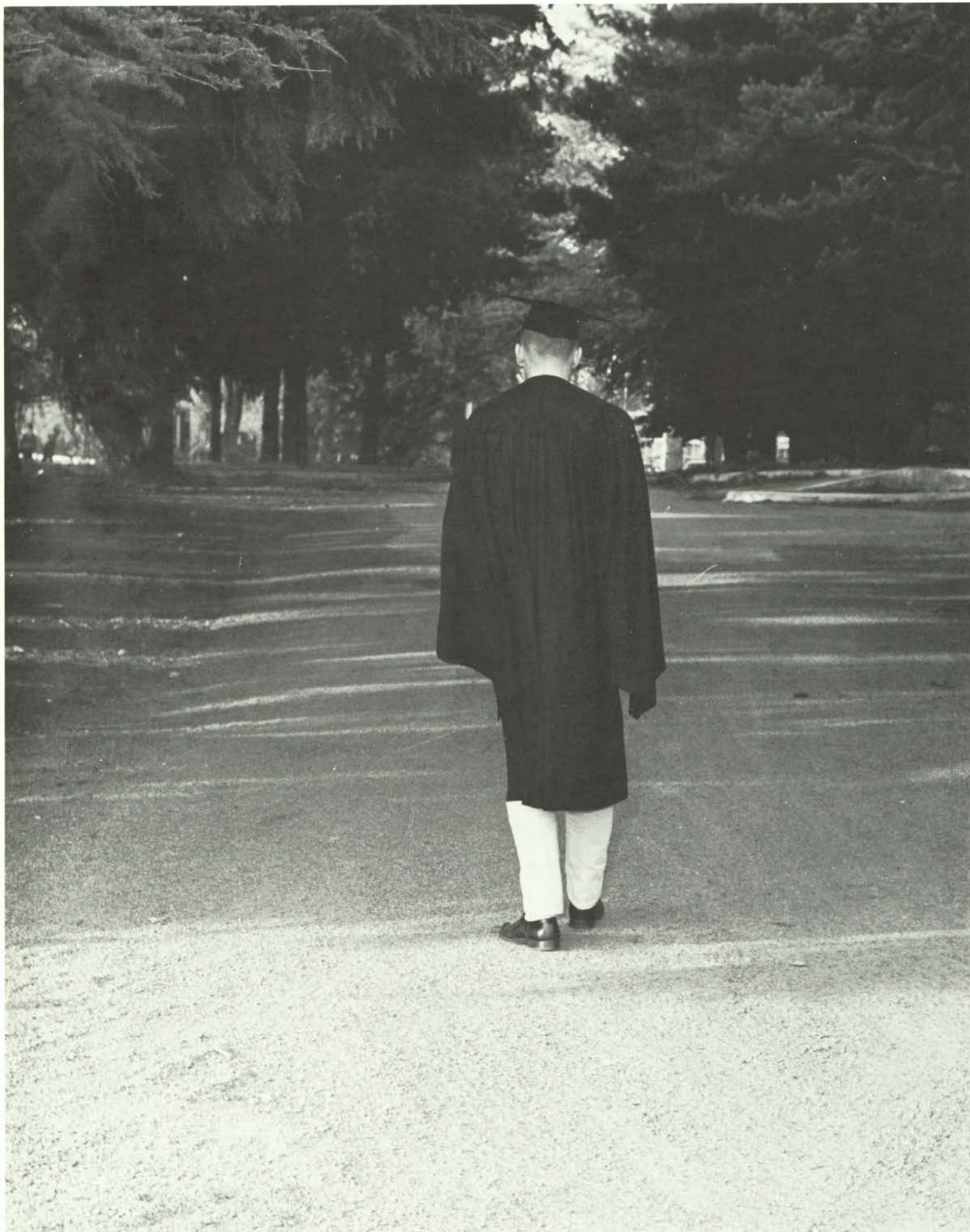

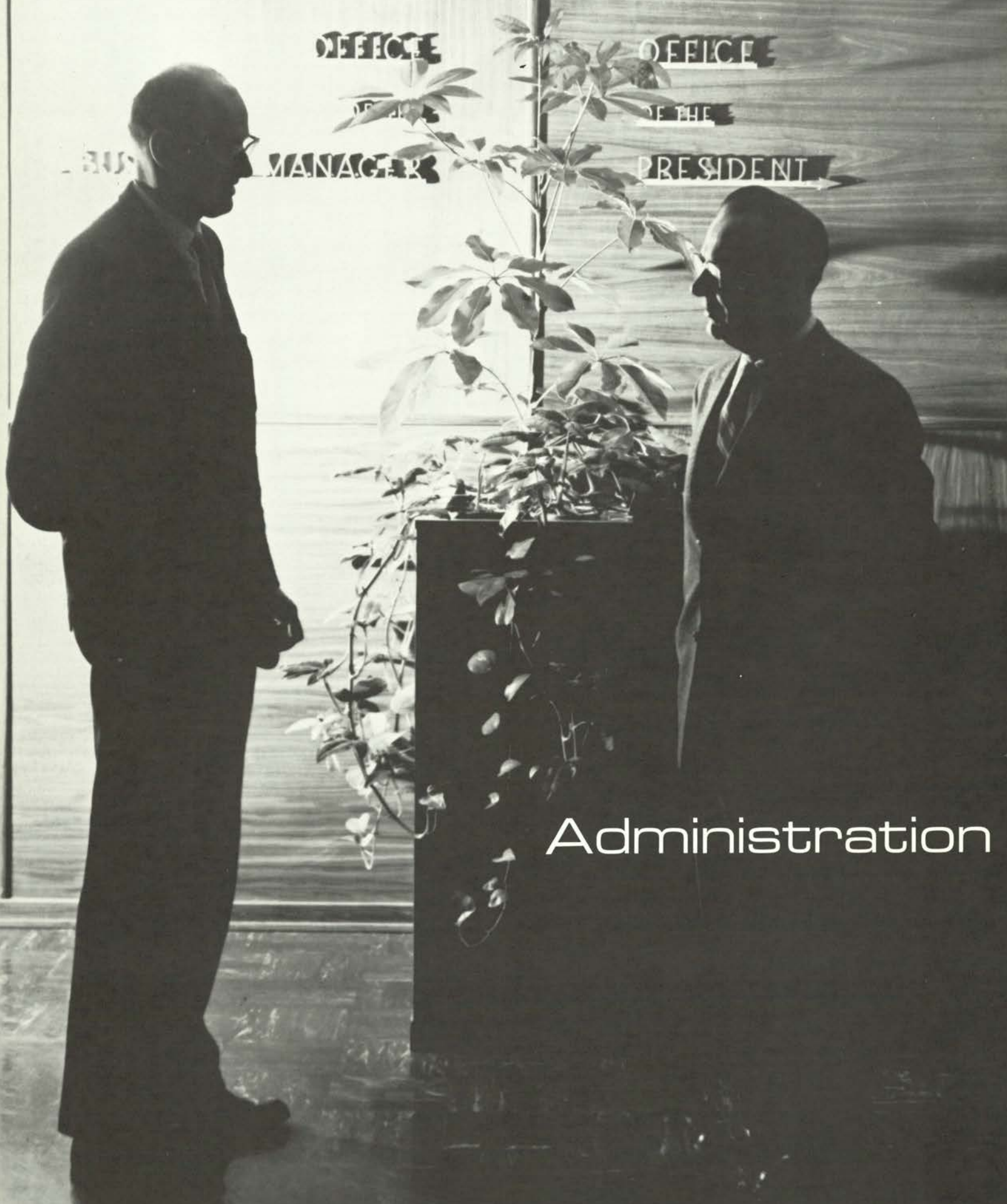

Memo from the President:

A faculty committee was commissioned several years ago to compose in a few words a statement of the aim of Oregon State University. This would appear to be a rather simple undertaking. Actually, it was a tremendous task.

What IS the aim of Oregon State — a land-grant university made up of schools in nine separate areas of study plus a graduate school covering almost the gamut of higher education in one complex institution? How would **you** describe the aim of Oregon State in 50 words?

Committee members spent months in discussion. They considered their ideas with wisdom and weighed their words with care. They finally agreed on this 55-word statement:

"The aim of Oregon State University is to provide both opportunity and inspiration for gaining knowledge and for developing attitudes and abilities which contribute to living in a democratic society. This aim requires the development of the individual and of society, as well as the development and conservation of resources through instruction, research and extension."

The committee supplemented this aim with a few explanations of how the objective is to be achieved, such as pursuit of truth and the advancement of knowledge, and others. Few if any Oregon Staters would seriously disagree with the statement, even if they may complain that it doesn't go far enough or that it is too general.

Much of my time on campus has been spent in trying to evaluate the accomplishments of the past and in planning for the future. During these first two years at Oregon State, I have gone through many of the experiences that students encounter. I have had to learn the location of buildings and offices, to know the people who work in them, and what they do. I have come to know the many and varied activities that are carried out.

The better these matters become known to me, to students, to new staff members, and to alumni and friends, the more certain we all are that Oregon State University, with its rich heritage and its tremendous accomplishments, is a significant force in the life of the citizens of Oregon and of the nation.

That Oregon State may continue to serve as a citadel for intellectual and scientific activity and that it may serve as a friendly and effective university is our fervent wish and prayer.

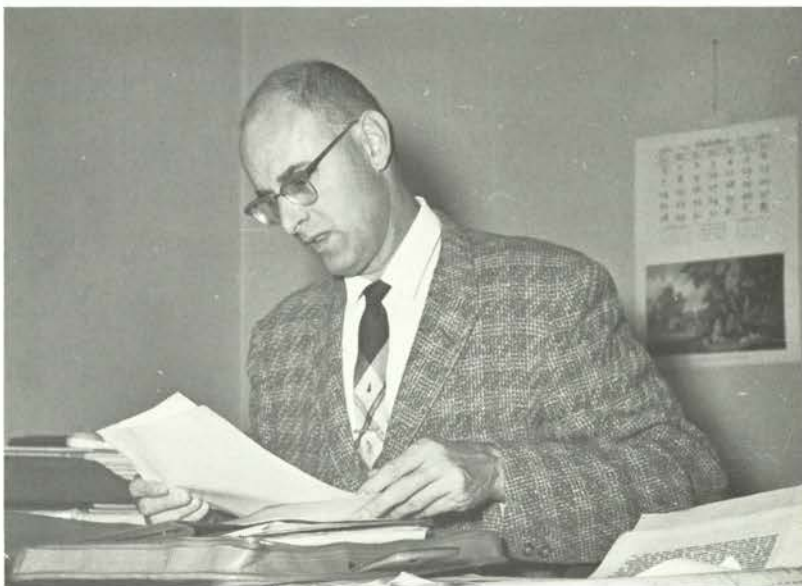

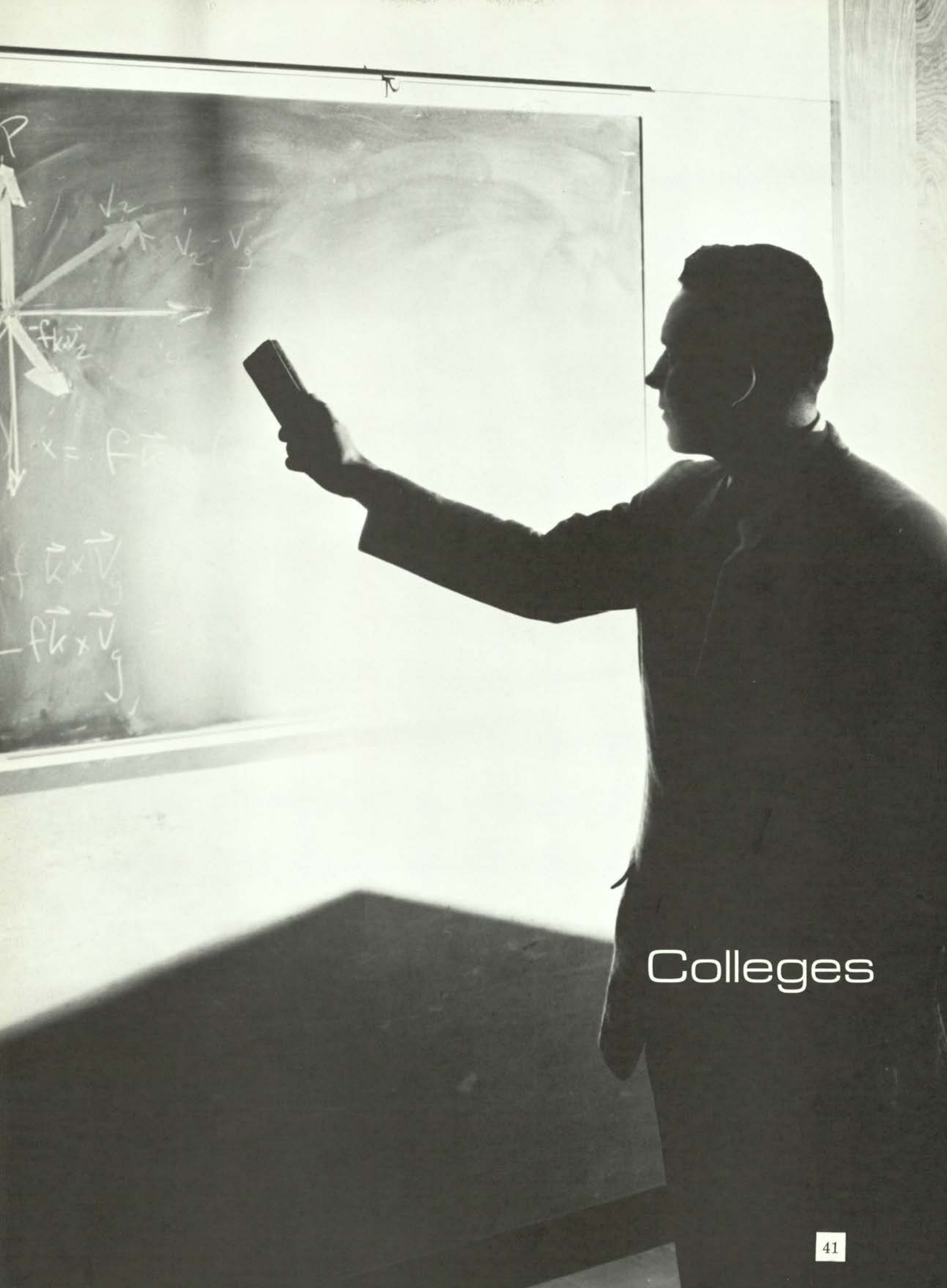

Graduate School Contributes to Community

Oregon State Graduate School not only teaches but it learns through its many research projects now underway. A graduate school's first duty is to train persons in the disciplines and techniques of independent and original investigation that culminates in a definite contribution to knowledge. It should also develop students in the disciplines of scholarship and communication. Scholarship is the organization, interpretation, criticism and evaluation of knowledge which increases the breadth of learning and prepares for leadership and participation in society and culture. Communication is the dissemination of knowledge and ideas. This must involve a command of fundamental processes. Communication concerns other things than the written and spoken word. A graduate student should have enthusiasm in his research which later will serve to stimulate and inspire others. The Graduate School of Oregon State University coordinates all three: research, scholarship and communication.

The first record of graduate work at Oregon Agricultural College is the conferring of the first master of arts

degree in 1875. A total of fifteen master's degrees were conferred between 1875 and 1910. In 1910 a Committee on Advanced Degrees was formed, which may be considered as the predecessor of the Graduate School. Another turning point in the development of the Graduate School was the formation of a Graduate Division of the State System of Higher Education in 1932, and the Graduate Committee was replaced by the Graduate Council at OSC in 1933. The Graduate Division was dissolved and OSC and U of O were given autonomous graduate schools in 1946.

After World War II graduate enrollments increased rapidly. Presently the enrollment is over 1,000. There are doctor of philosophy degrees offered in about 70 fields of study, distributed through 29 departments of instruction. Various types of master's degrees are offered in the same fields as the doctoral and 18 additional fields in 13 departments of instruction. There are over 300 staff members on the graduate faculty. A number of graduate teaching and research assistantships are awarded annually to graduate students at OSU.

Botany

Faculty and graduate students have worked for years to perfect the Blue Lake bean through scientific breeding. Because of the problem concerning the picking of beans by machine, it has been up to horticulturists to rebuild the bean itself by changing it into a bush type that has all the desirable qualities of pole Blue Lake. After 10 years, OSU scientists have developed a bean close to the type they desire, although further goals of heavier yields and resistance to disease are being pursued.

During the breeding program, scientists have had to consider many factors and have not overlooked bean plant diseases—rust, root rot, common and yellow mosaic viruses. Bean rust is one of the diseases that graduate student, Arlen Davison, is working on. In the picture to the left Mr. Davison is shown inoculating a bean plant with rust.

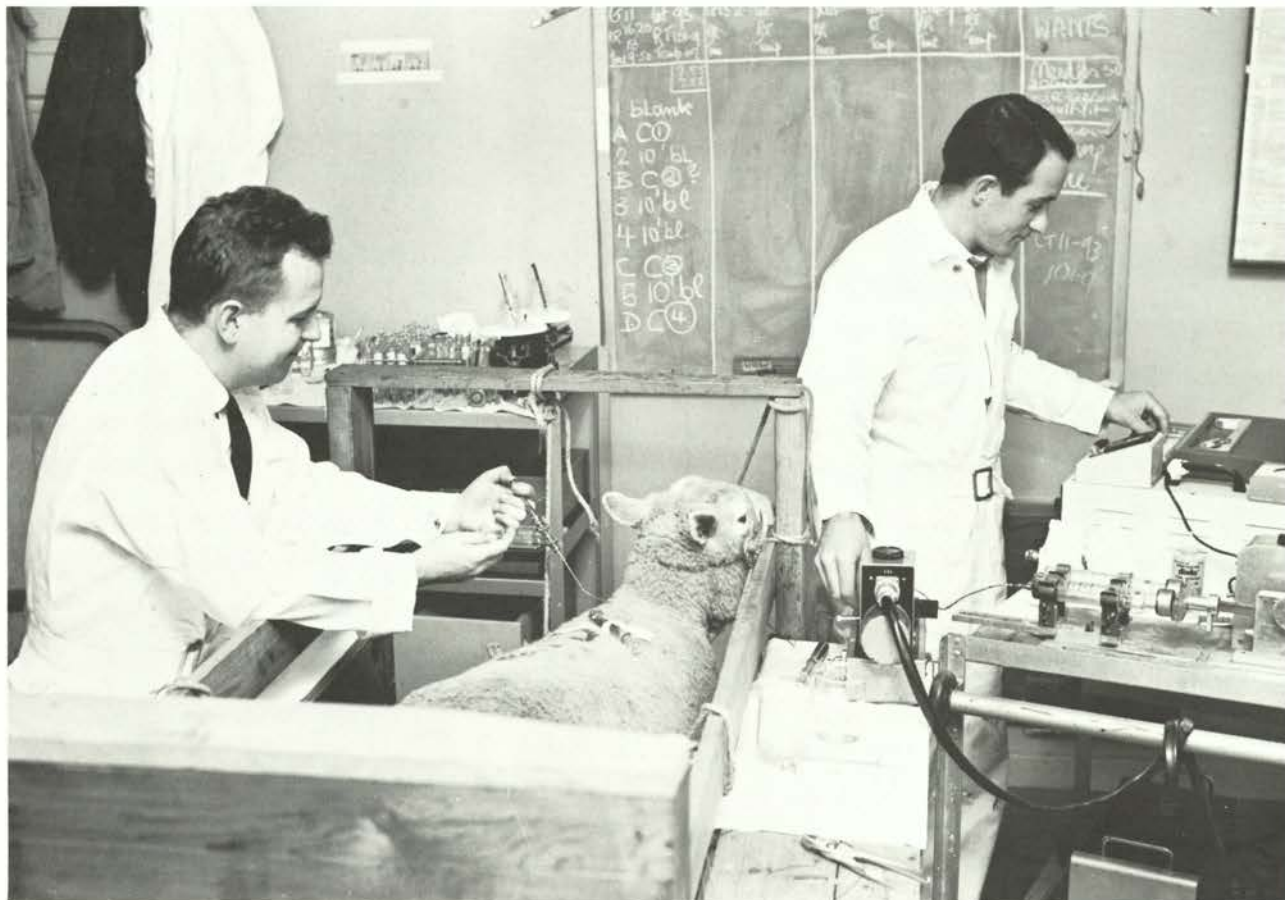


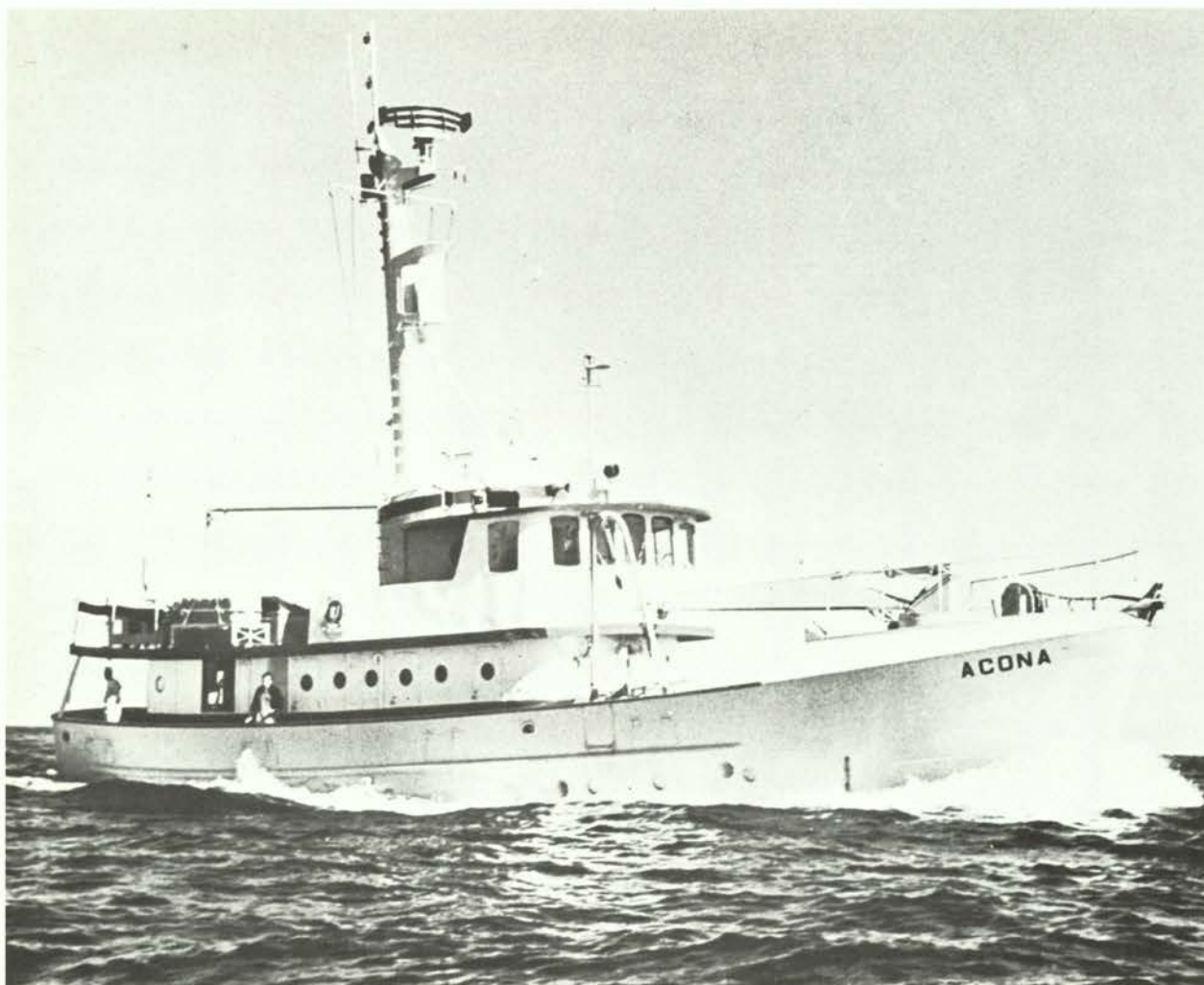

Animal Science

AT RIGHT: Ova are being removed using surgical techniques, for use in transplantation studies. By superovulation of the donor and synchronizing the estrus cycle of the donor recipients, determination can be made on the relative effects of inheritance and material environment on prenatal growth and development. Graduate students Lynn Hunt and Joseph Riker are ready to flush the ova from the reproductive tract of a ewe.

BELOW: Dr. W. Moll, University of Oregon Medical School, injects Evans' blue dye into the jugular vein of a pregnant ewe to measure the cardiac output. J. T. Parer, graduate student at OSU, is simultaneously recording the density of dye in arterial blood drawn at a constant rate from the exteriorized carotid artery. This is part of a cooperative project between the Oregon Medical School and OSU.





Oceanography

First oceanographic vessel built in the United States in almost 30 years, the ACONA is operated for research and training in Oregon coastal waters by the Department of Oceanography. Sea experience on the ACONA is part of the training of the graduate students. The fish in the picture to the left is one of strange rare fish of the open ocean that was caught on the ACONA. This Bathylcnops exilis (deep-light-eyed) fish is being sent to the Oregon Medical School for inspection. Oceanography is a composite subject which uses the sciences of physics, chemistry, biology and geology to study the processes which are taking place in estuaries and in the sea.

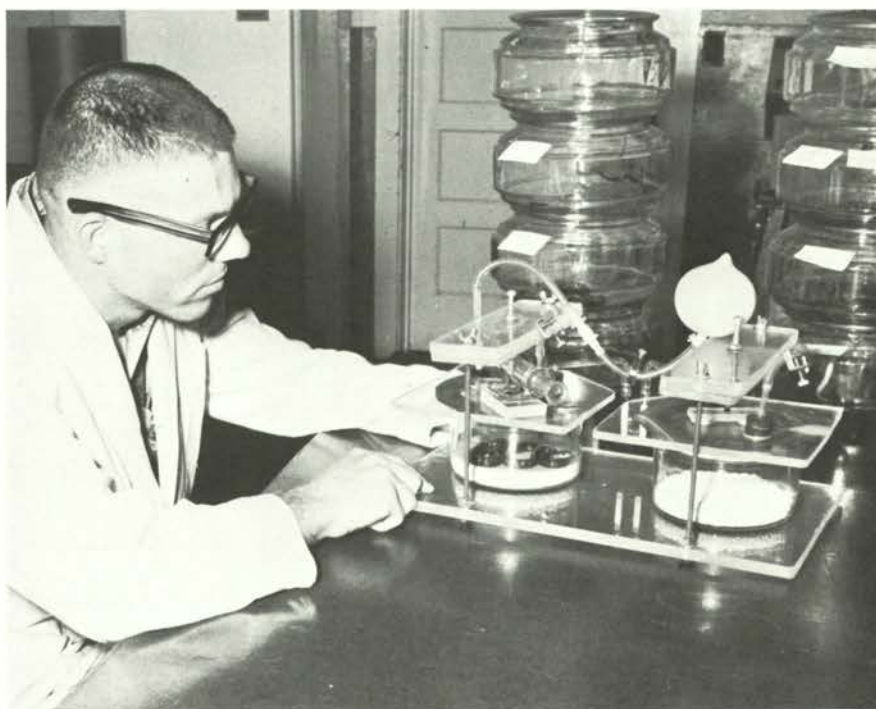


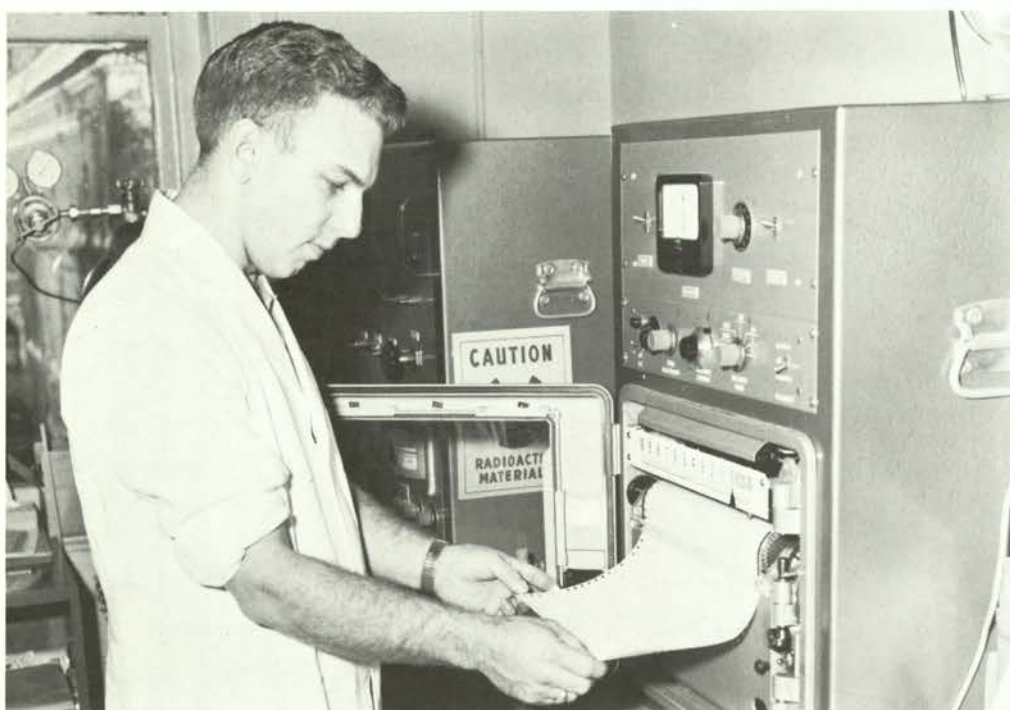
Forestry

Professor Ray A. Yoder discusses with Banleu Chuaintra, a graduate student from Thailand. Banleu's future plans. This particular faculty-student combination is exceptional since Professor Yoder was Banleu's instructor in Thailand.

Zoology

Mr. Glenn Stewart, graduate student, is demonstrating a device he uses in the study of snakes. This instrument, called a respirometer, measures the metabolic rate. The metabolic rate is the ability of snakes to increase metabolism to compensate for cold exposure. Unlike Mr. Stewart some must do their projects in the field.





Microbiology

The instrument above, called a liquid scintillation spectrometer, enables microbiologists to determine how bacteria degrade different chemical compounds which they use for growth. For example, cells may be fed radioactive sugar from which they will obtain energy and basic cellular material. After a short period of growth, the bacteria are broken into small pieces using high frequency sound waves and separated into different classes of chemical compounds. Then the amount of radioactivity in each different type of compound is measured using the scintillation counter. The results will allow the scientist to draw conclusions about how much sugar is converted into protein and carbohydrate. The picture below shows a gas chromatograph that is used to identify chemical compounds provided by bacterial cells in very minute amounts.



Clothing and Textiles

Having completed her undergraduate work at UCLA, Lynda Frescura (above) is doing graduate work in Oregon State's Department of Clothing and Textiles. Working closely with a children's hospital in Eugene, Mrs. Frescura is developing clothing for handicapped children. By designing and constructing clothing for patients in the hospital, Mrs. Frescura's project is unique in that she is developing self-help clothing that will enable a child to dress himself regardless of his handicap. The dress she is working on is for a child who does not have the use of her fingers.

Foods and Nutrition

Working in Foods and Nutrition on her Ph.D., Betty Sue Joiner (right) is determining the varied constituents of the flavor of apples. With the help of an instrument called a gas chromatographer, Mrs. Joiner separates apple concentrates into their various chemical parts. The gas chromatographer graphs both the qualitative and quantitative degree of the chemicals present in the concentrate. By comparing this graph with graphs of the chemicals themselves, which are known to have certain flavor characteristics, the desired degree of flavor influence a chemical has on a particular apple may be determined. While Mrs. Joiner is working in pure research, applications in apple production and cooking are practically unlimited.

School of Agriculture Prepares for Tomorrow

As modern conveniences are the result of scientific research, the School of Agriculture at Oregon State is training its graduates in research to encourage improved agricultural practices and procedures.

The agriculture curriculum provides an understanding of the sciences: chemistry, botany, entomology, bacteriology, zoology and physics. These courses along with courses in social sciences, business administration and economics equip agriculture graduates to apply themselves in farming, industry, teaching and research. Only about 15 percent of the graduates of the school engage in farming; however, demand for trained personnel in the related agricultural fields is rapidly increasing.

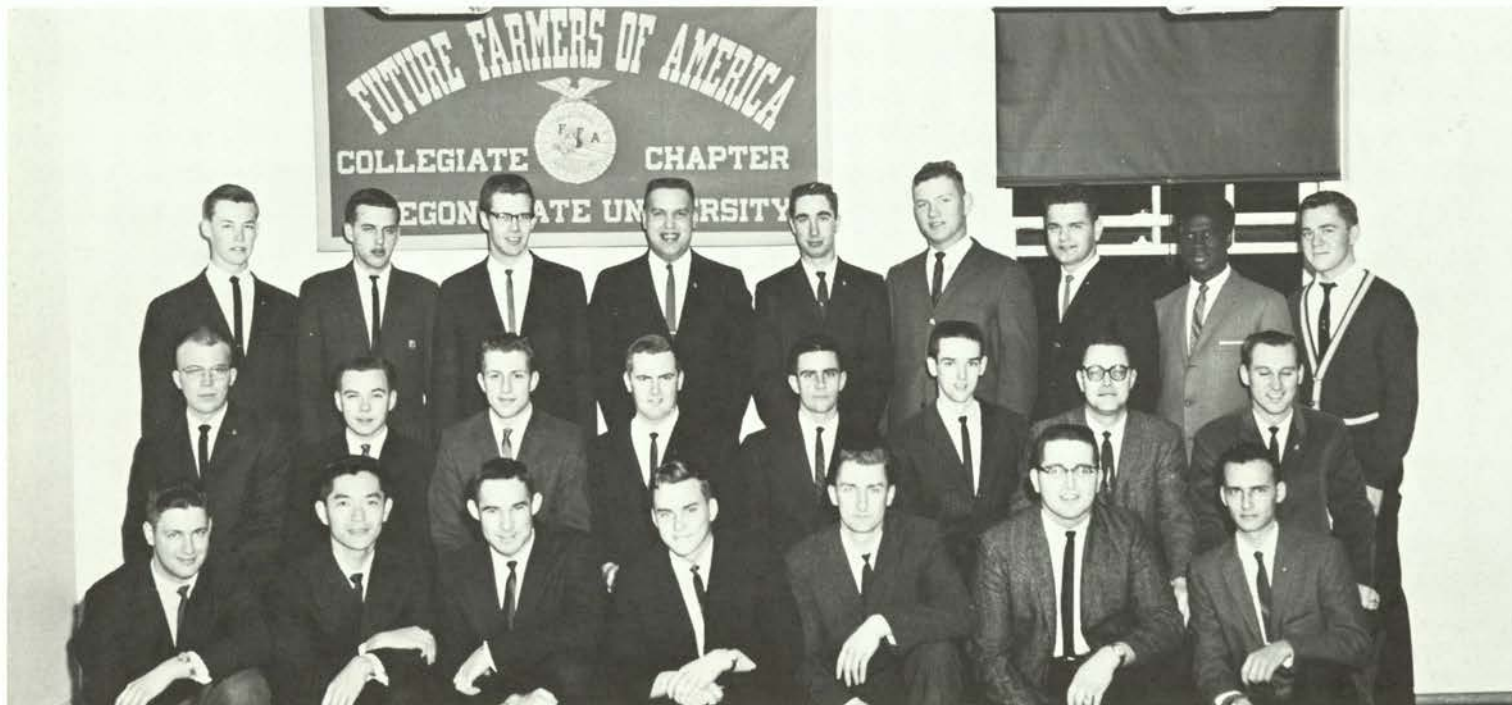

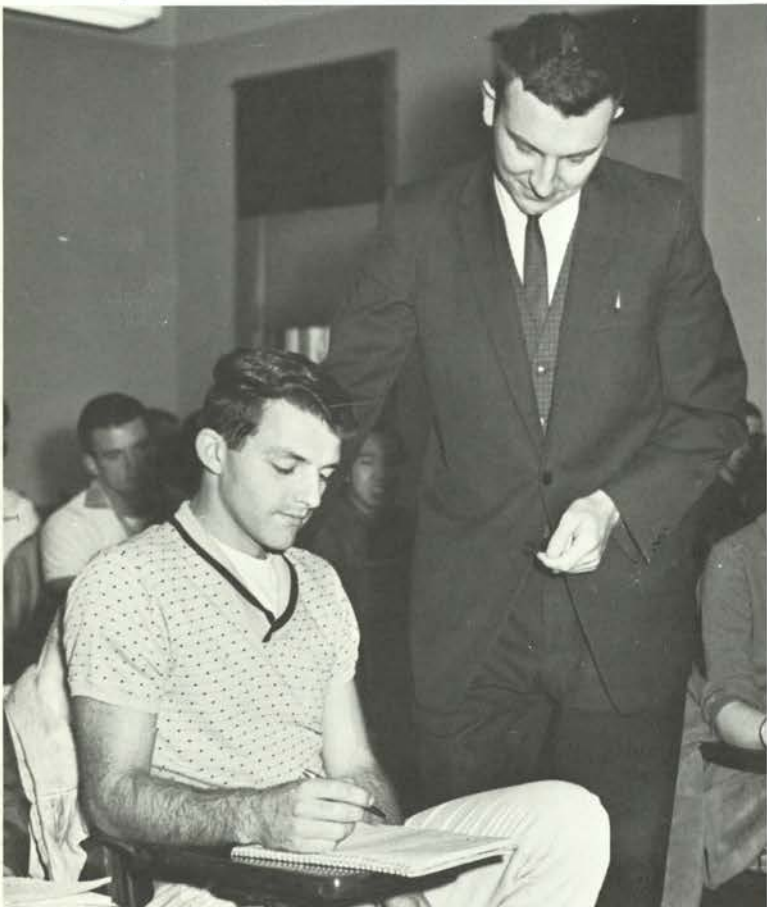

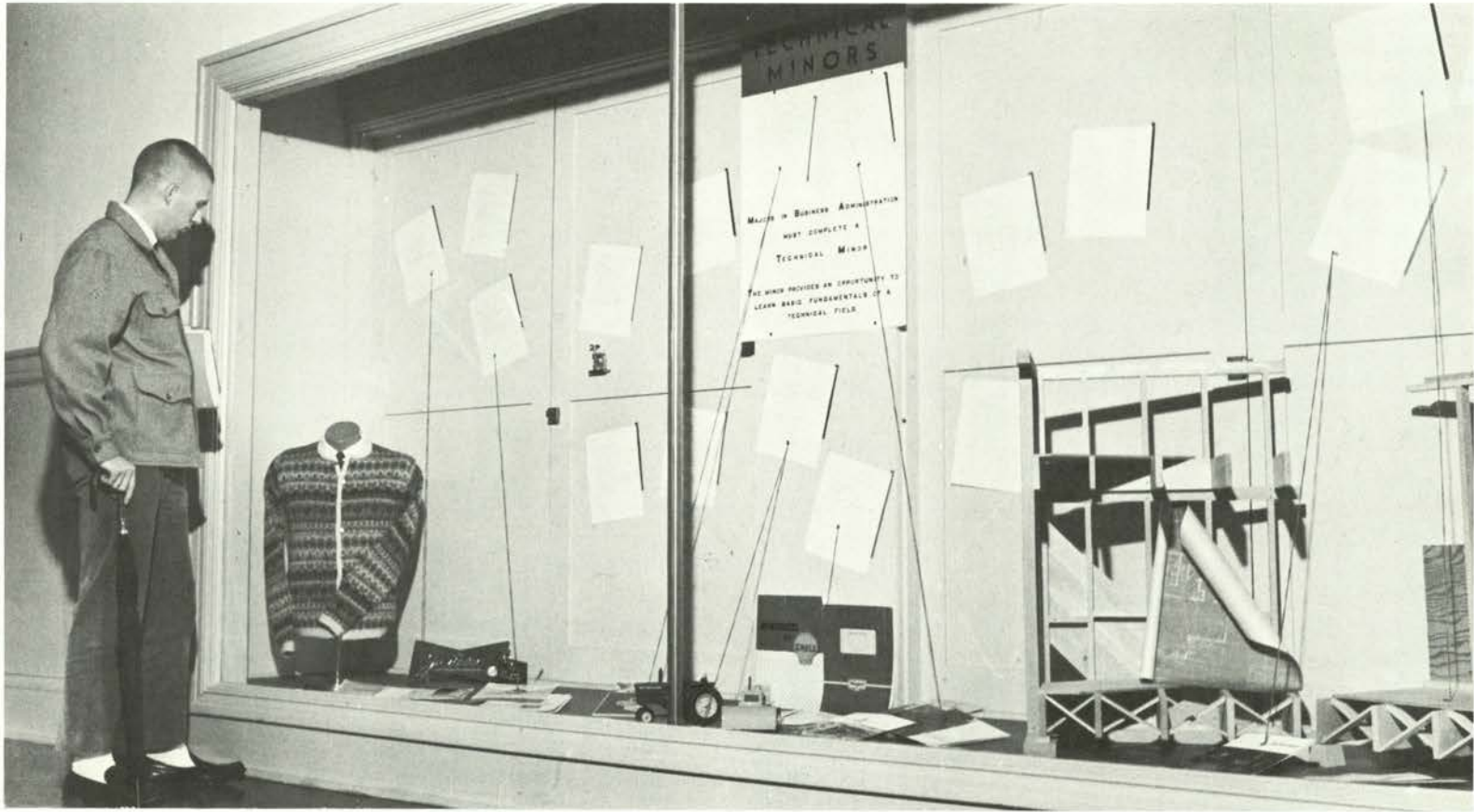


Business and Technology Provides Leadership

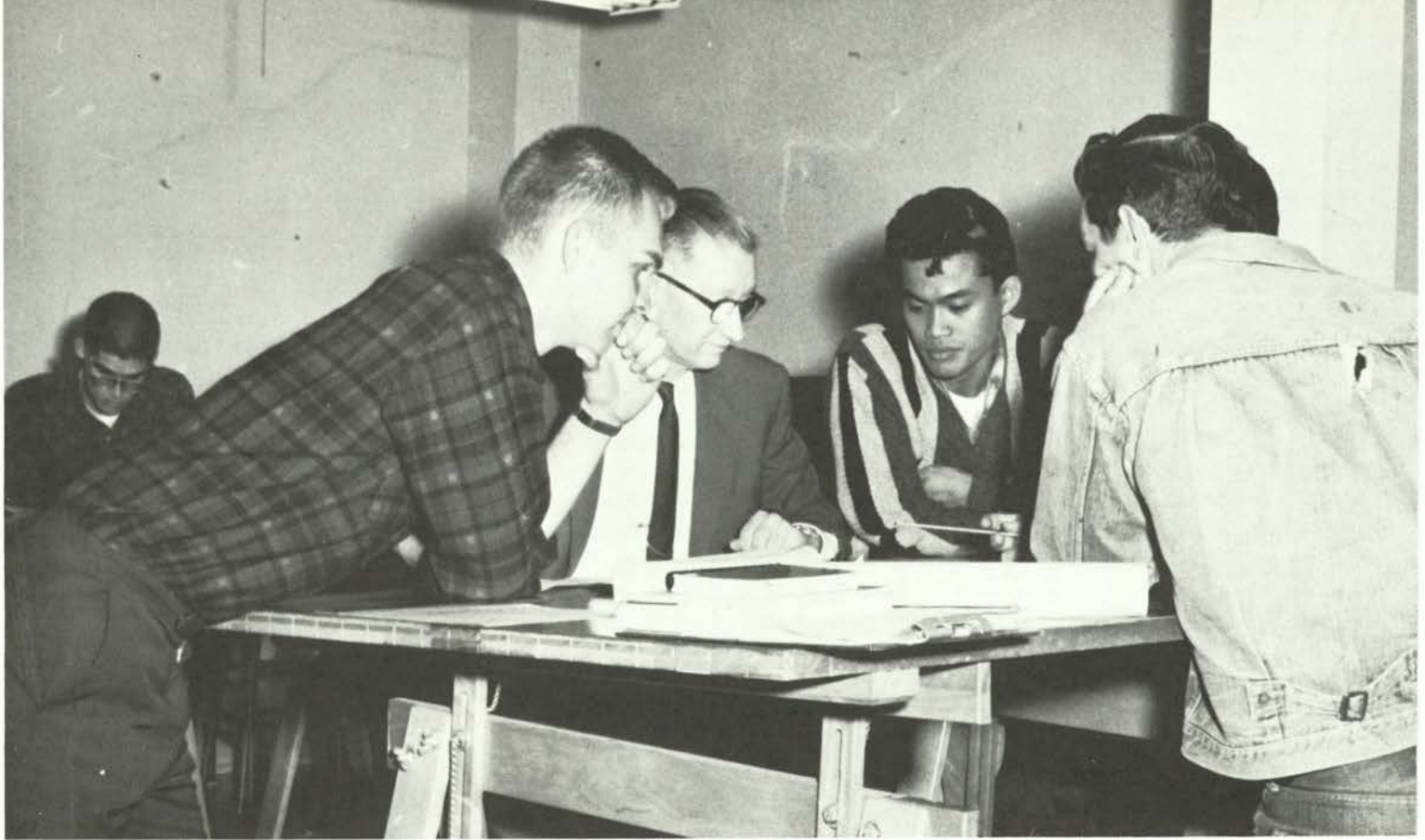

Forestry students shown above draw detailed maps of forest lands.



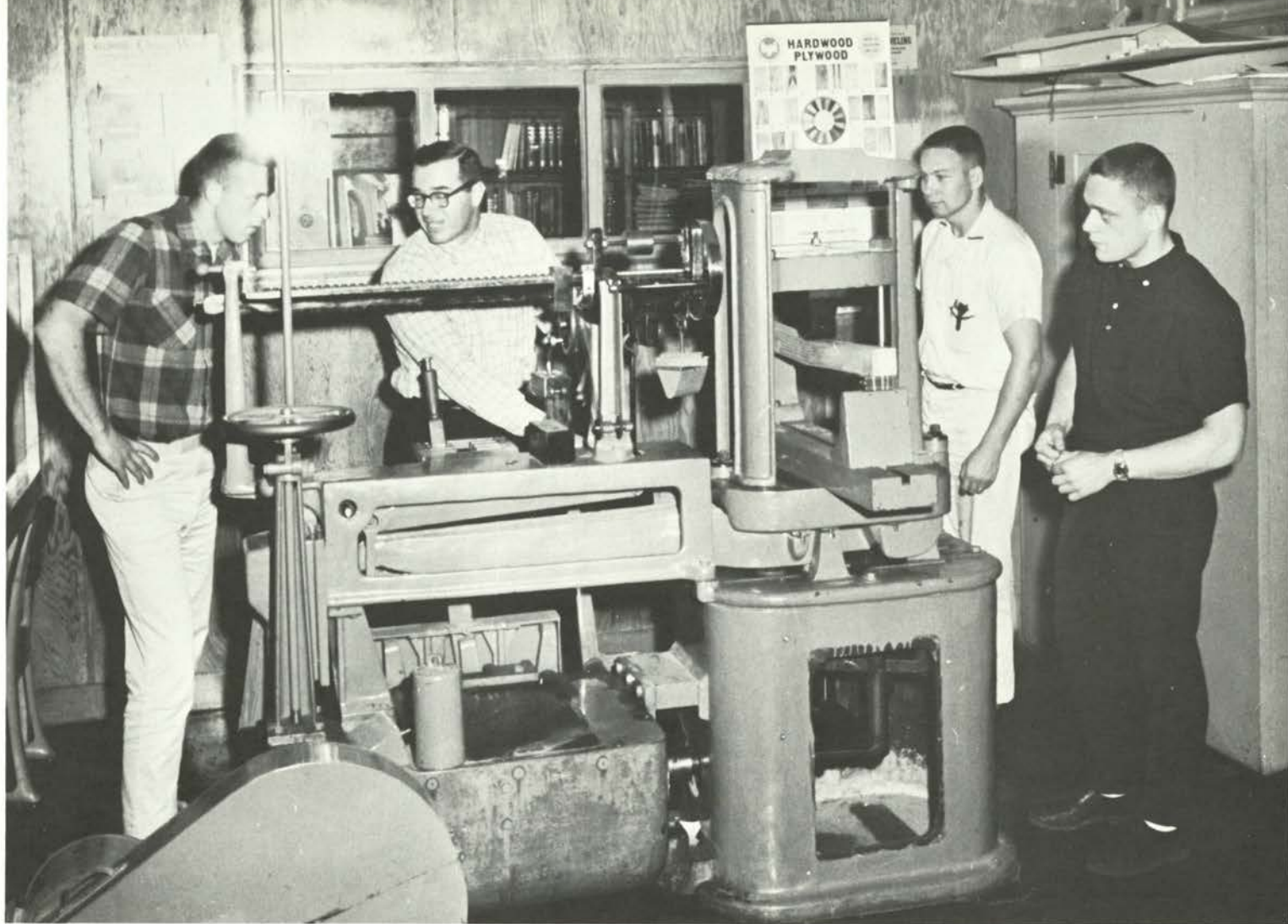

School of Forestry Plans for Future

Forestry at Oregon State is a highly respected field, for the management of our forested lands in Oregon is under the future control of the graduates of the School of Forestry.

Home Economics Gives Diversified Study

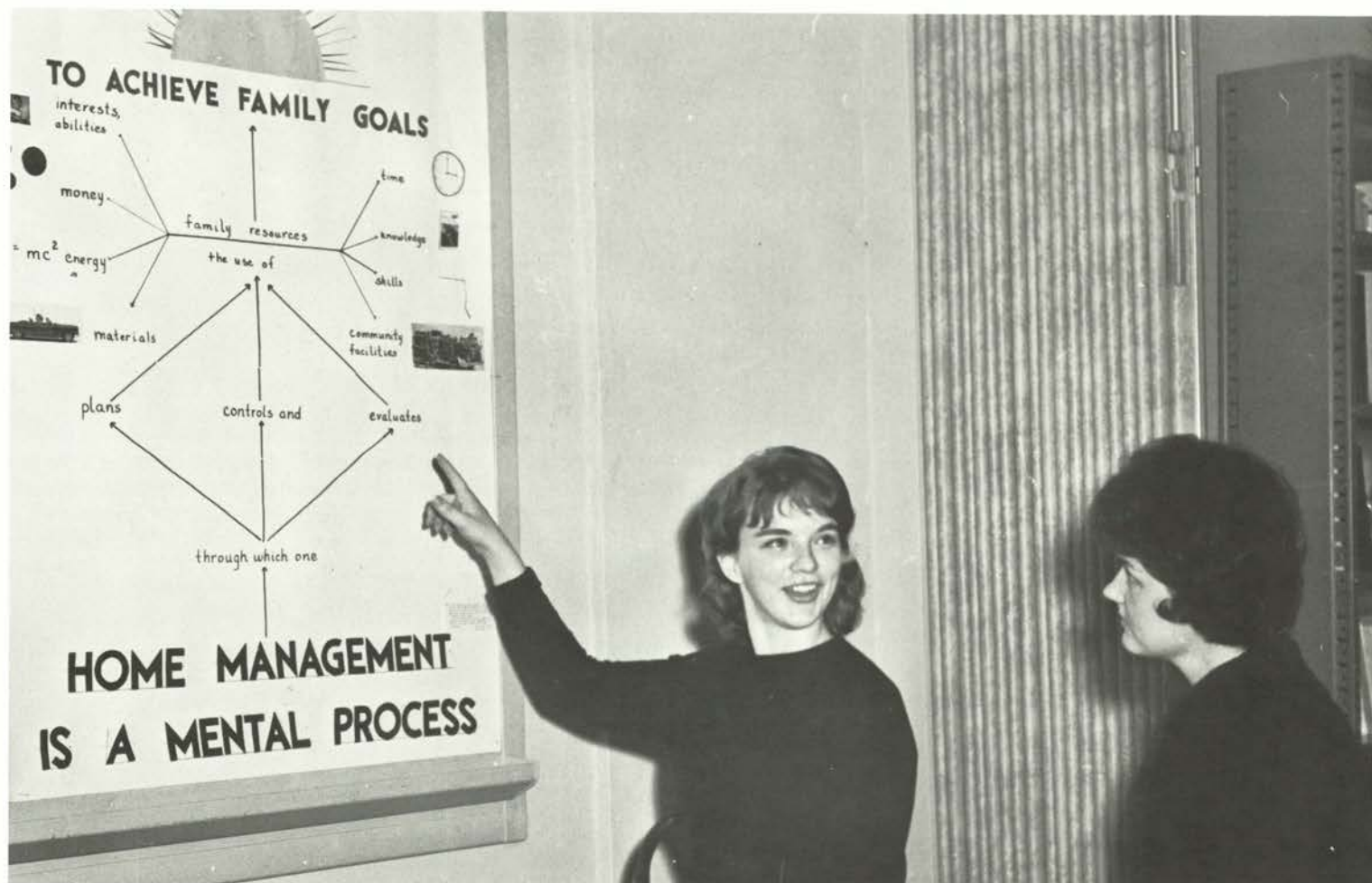
The School of Home Economics at Oregon State, established in 1889, was one of the first to be established in a land grant institution. It has since grown to seven major departments all offering graduate and undergraduate degree programs. The curriculum is liberal and flexible consisting of a background of science, social science, humanities and the arts.

Graduates are qualified for opportunities in business, education, research, extension, welfare and public health, dietetics and communications. Facilities for home economics education are complete in all departments. Also provided are home management houses and nursery schools, which offer opportunities for application of skills acquired in the classroom.

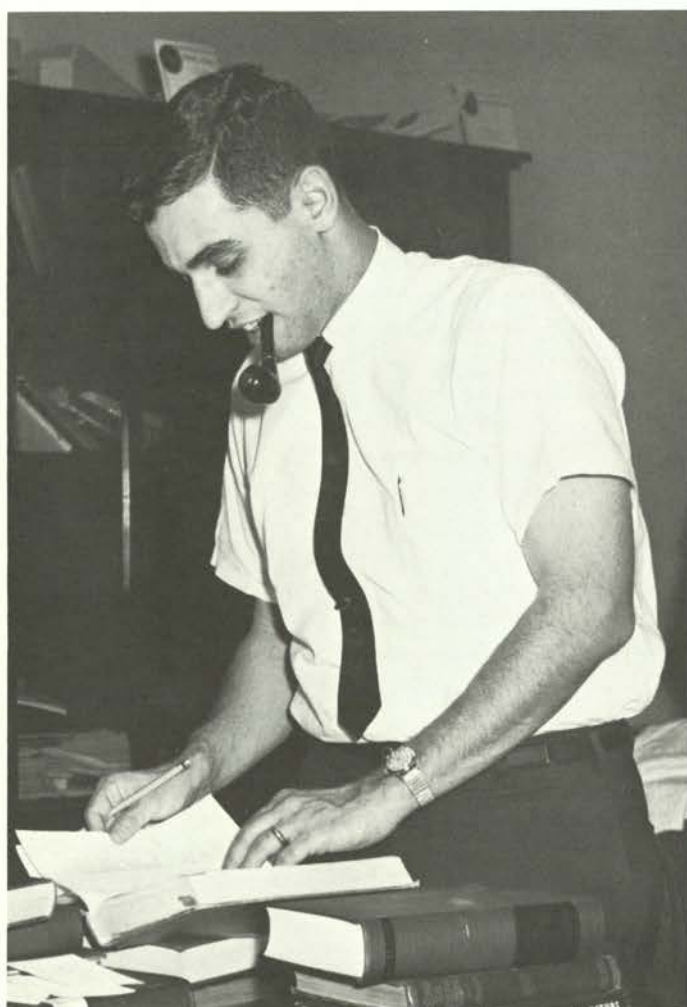




School of Pharmacy Has Five-Year Program

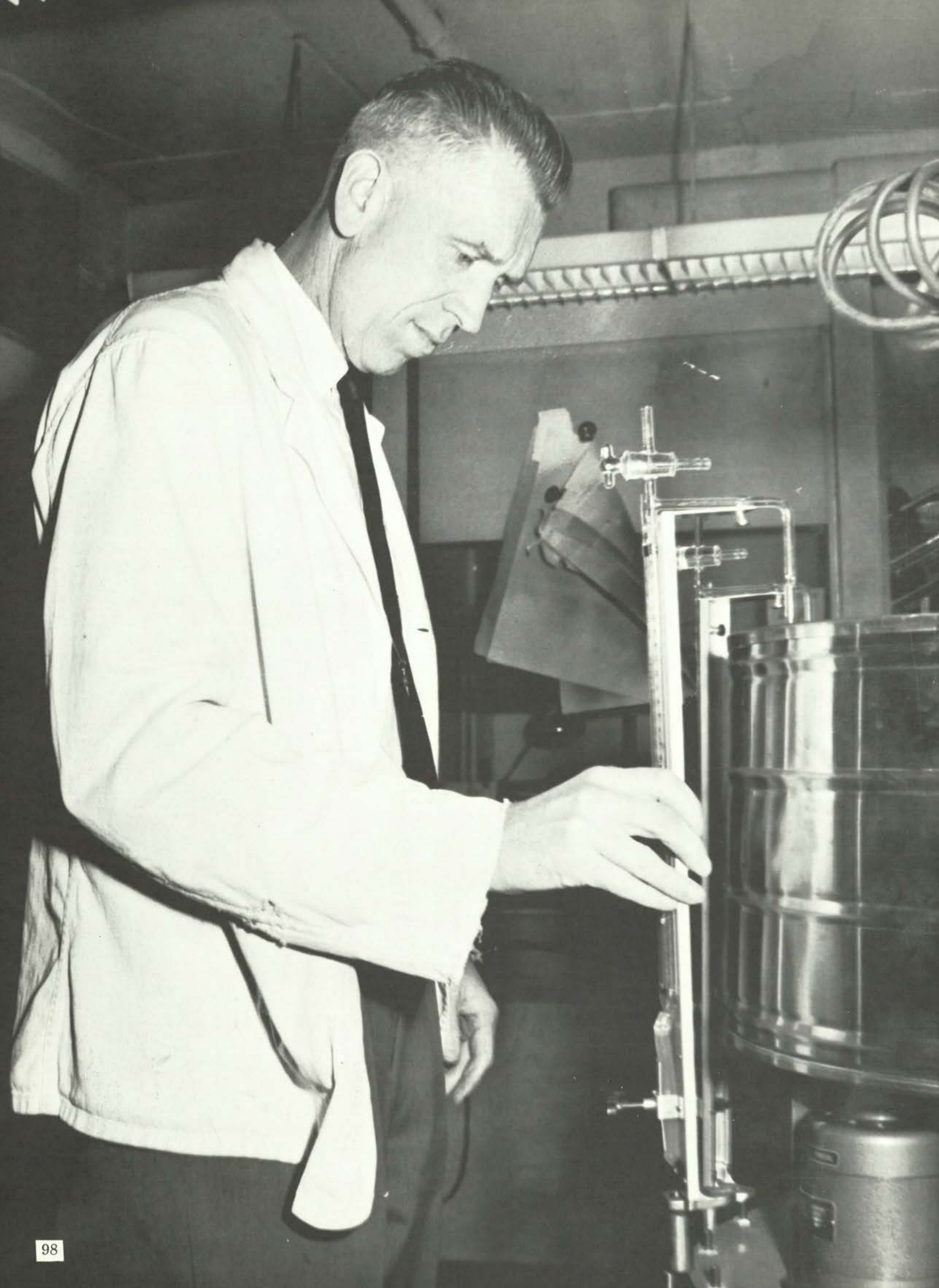

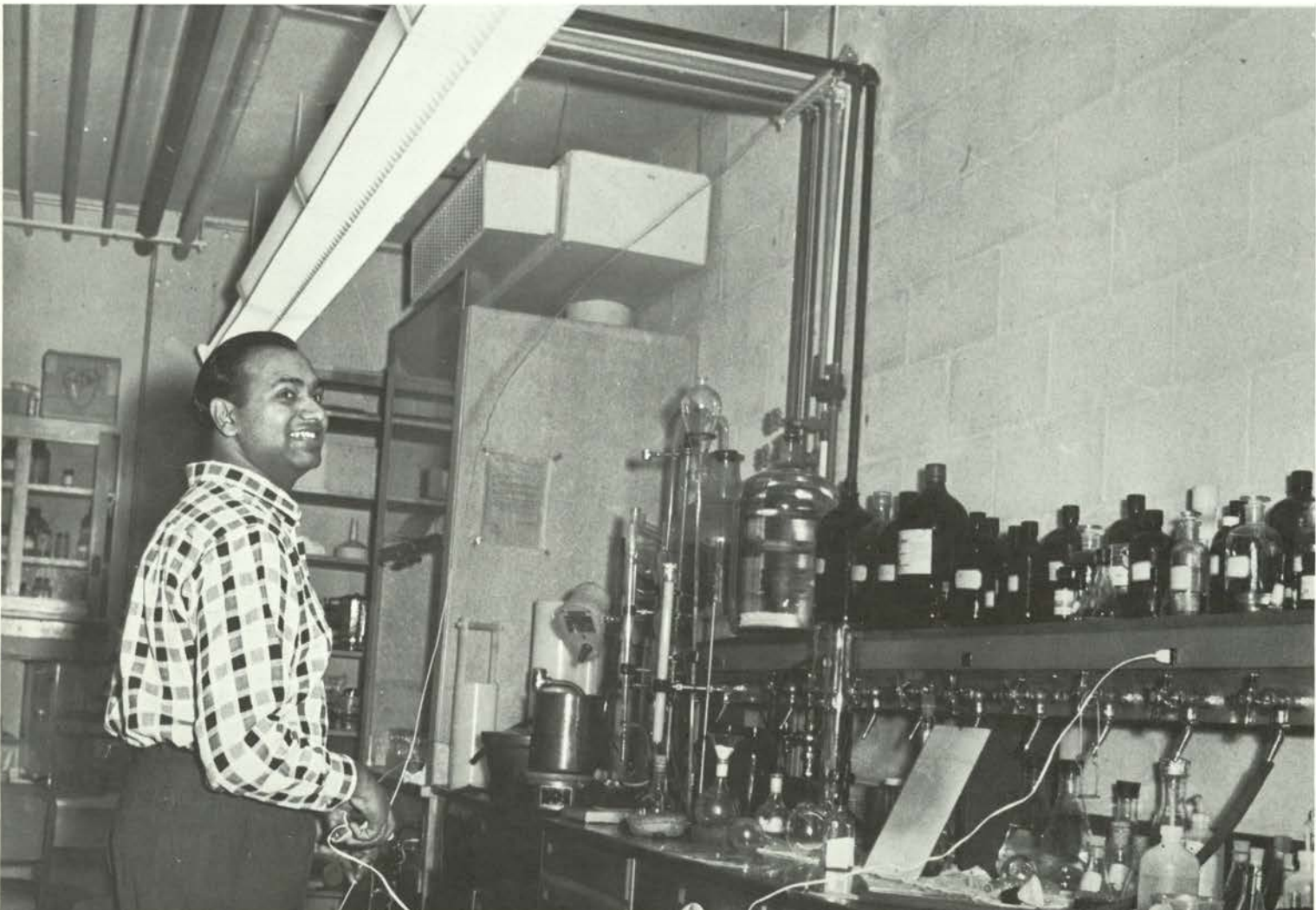

In addition to offering the necessary service courses for students with other majors, the school maintains divisions of general science, pre-dental and dental hygiene, pre-medical, pre-veterinary, pre-nursing and medical technology. Science graduate study is available with courses of one to three years of study.

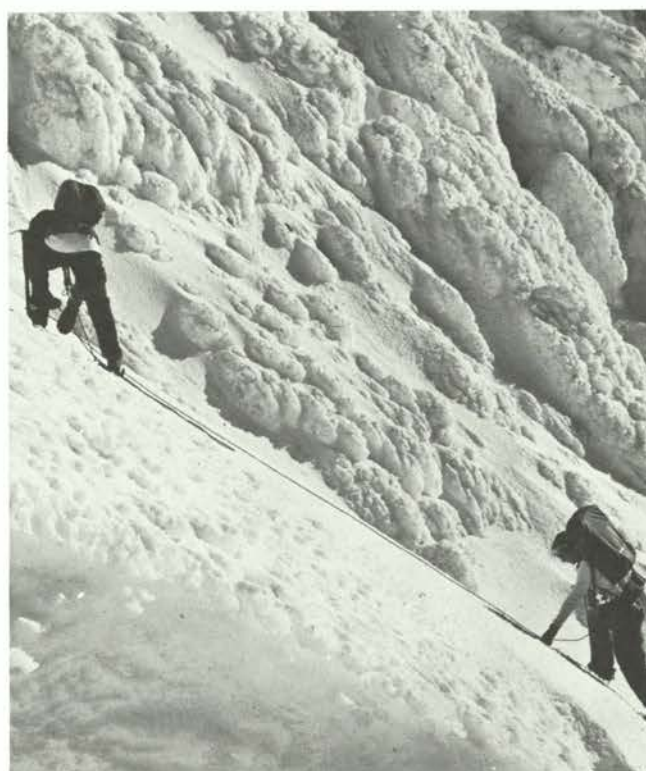
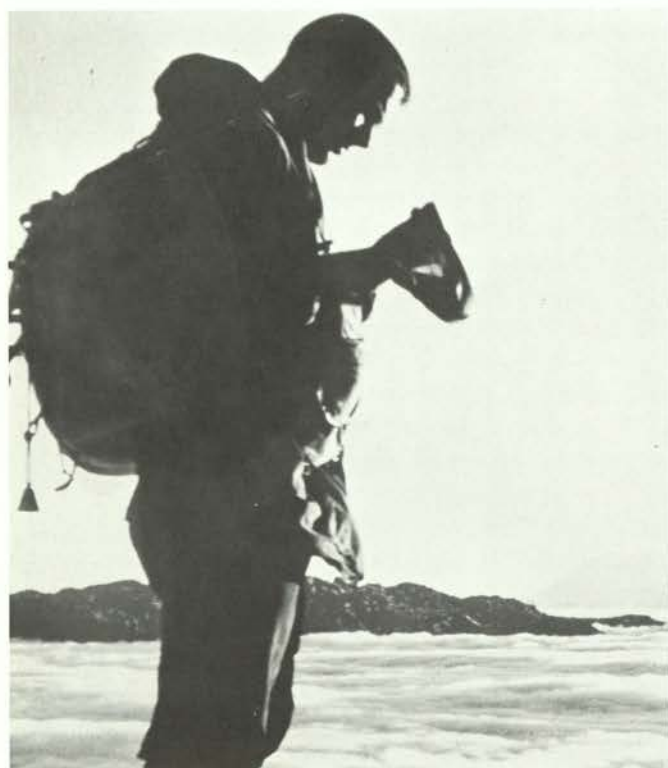

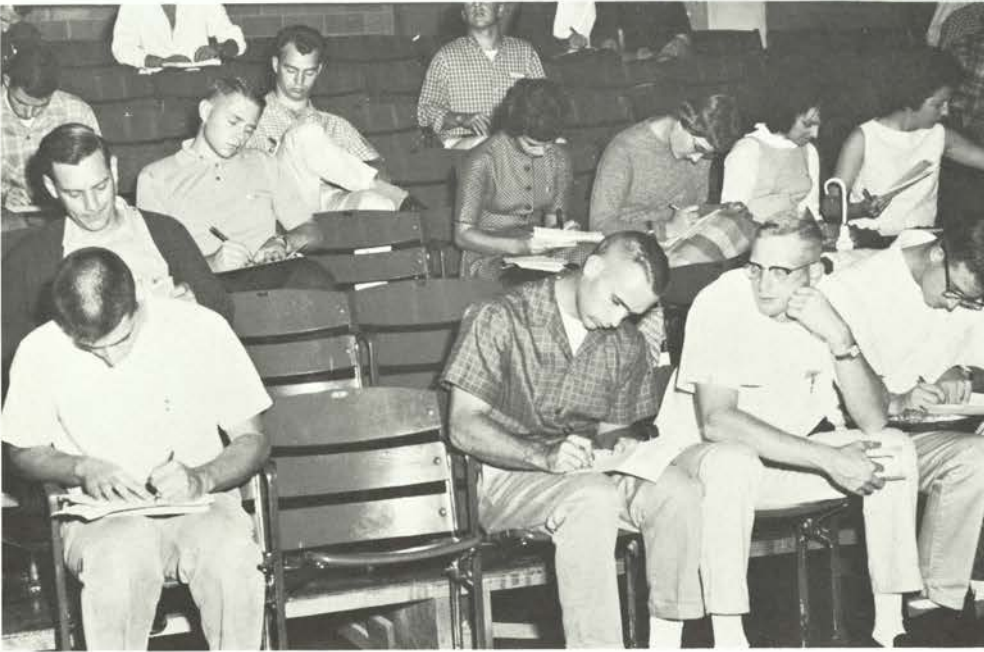
Basketball season meant an exciting trip to the Western NCAA play-off games in Provo, Utah, after a thrilling overtime play-off game with Seattle University.

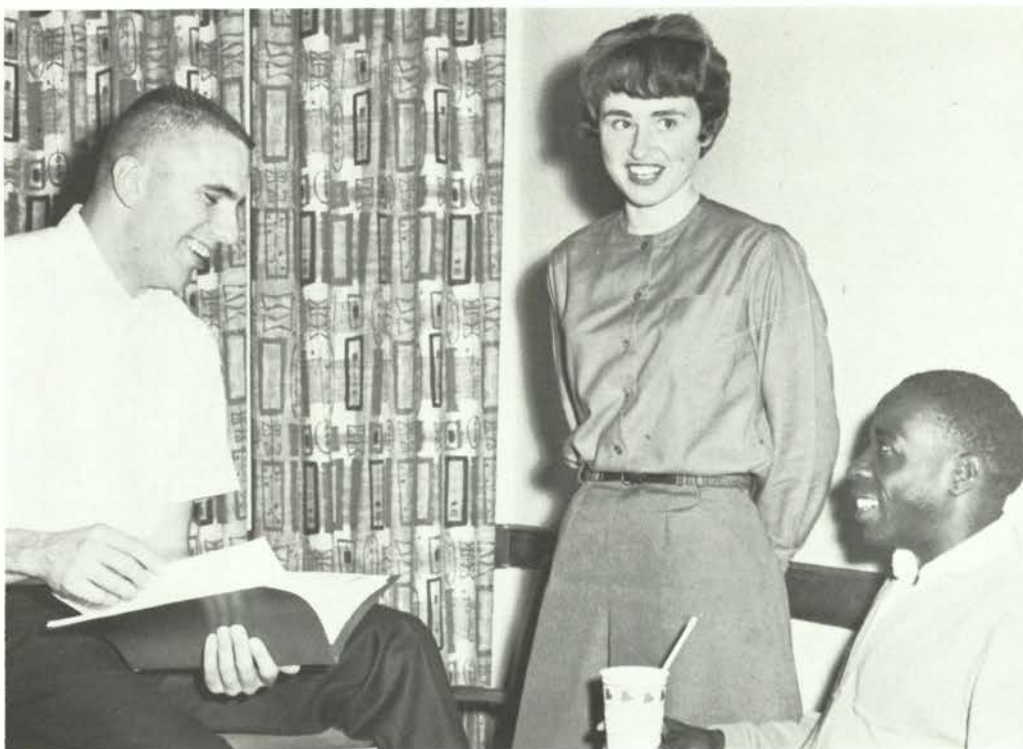

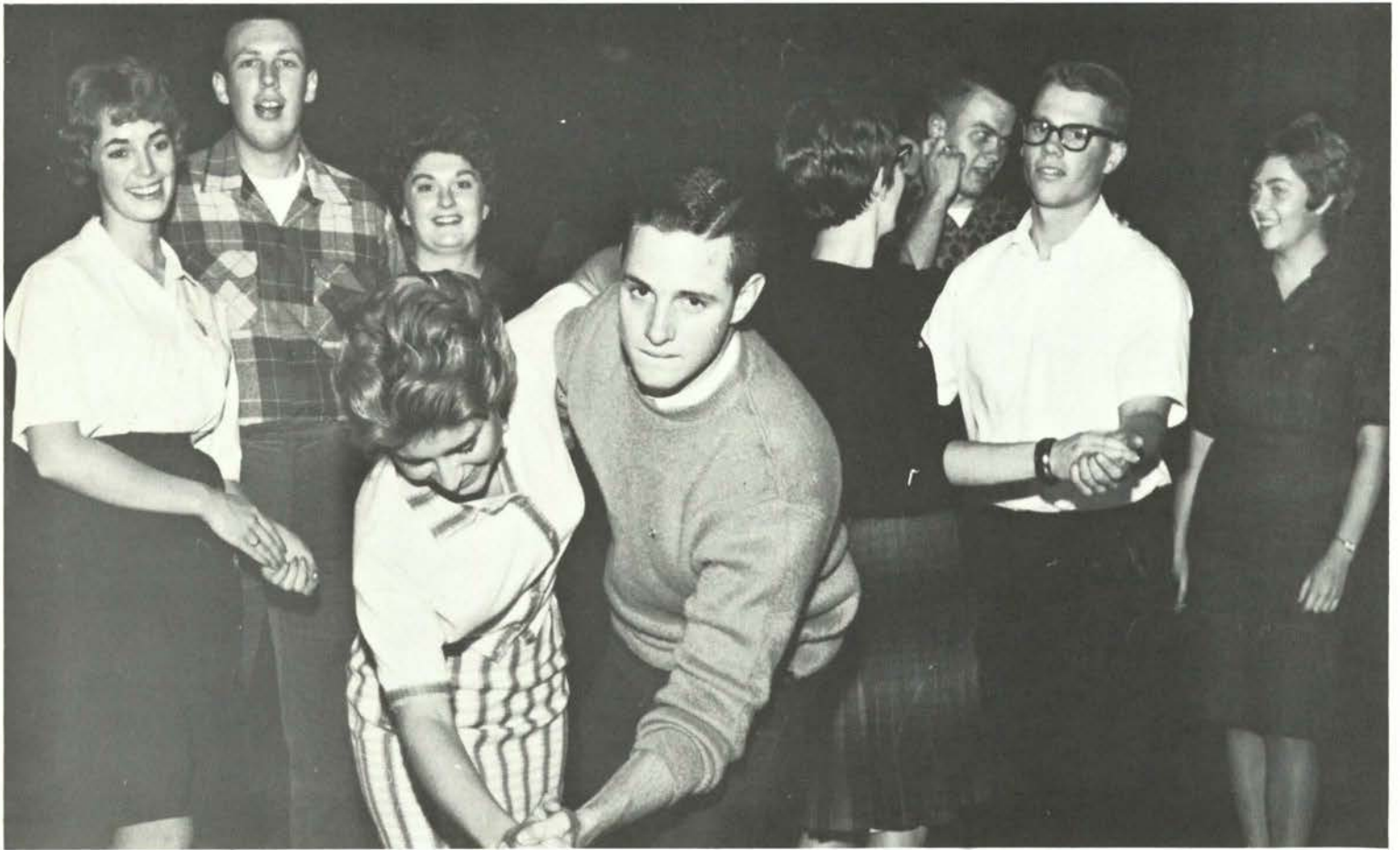

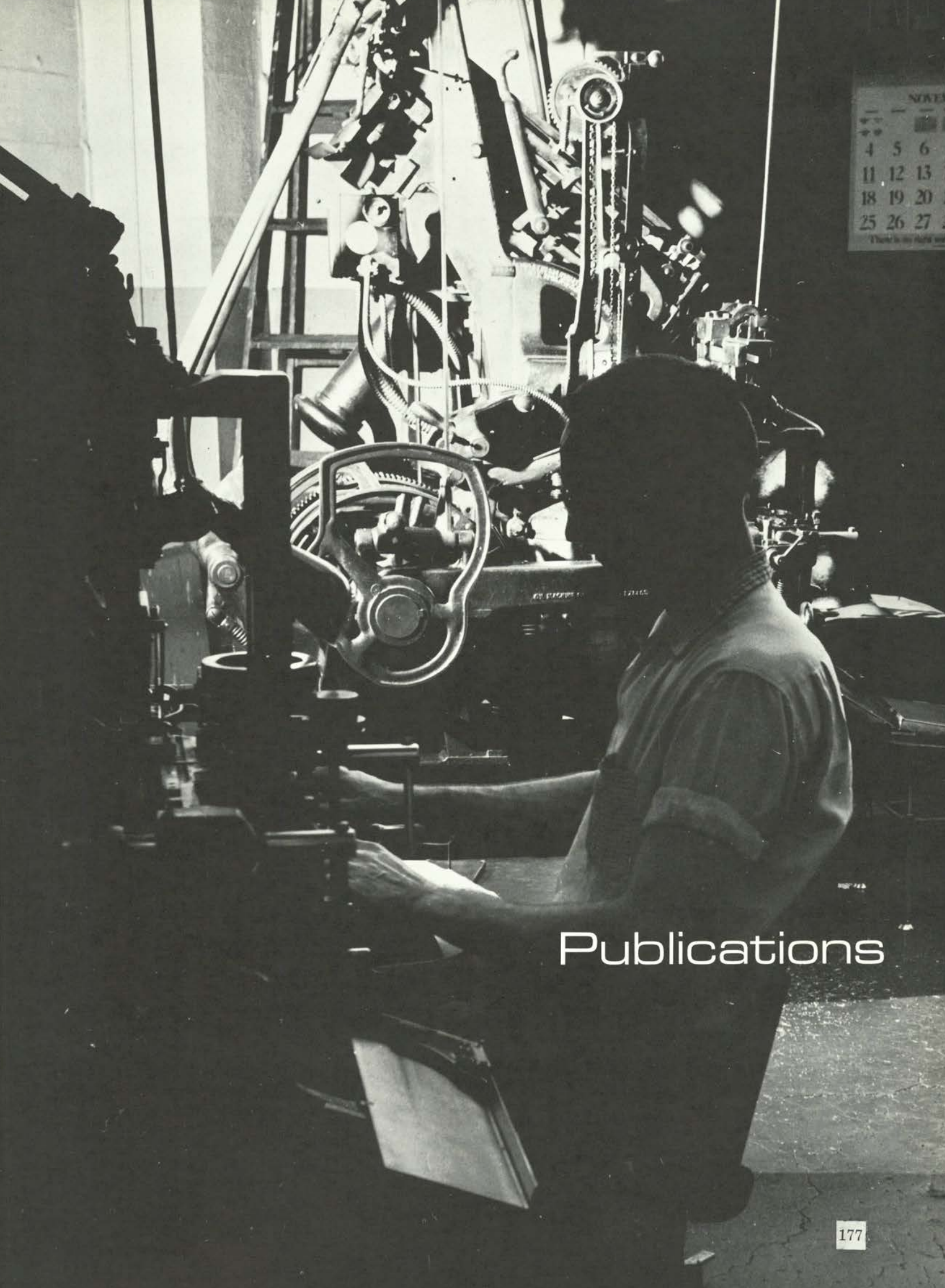

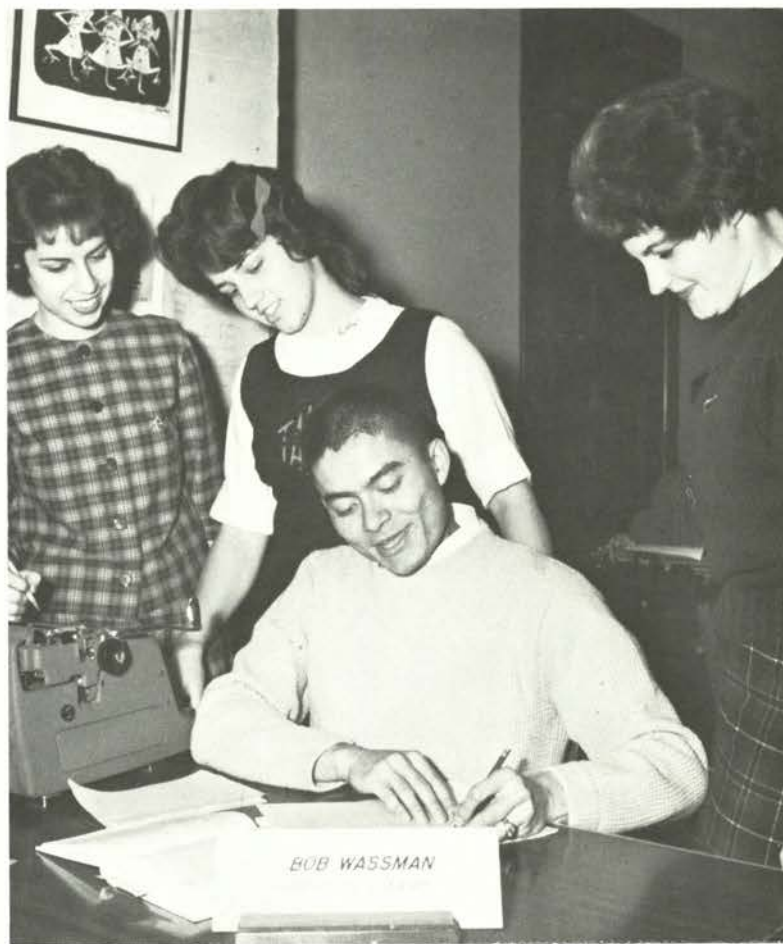

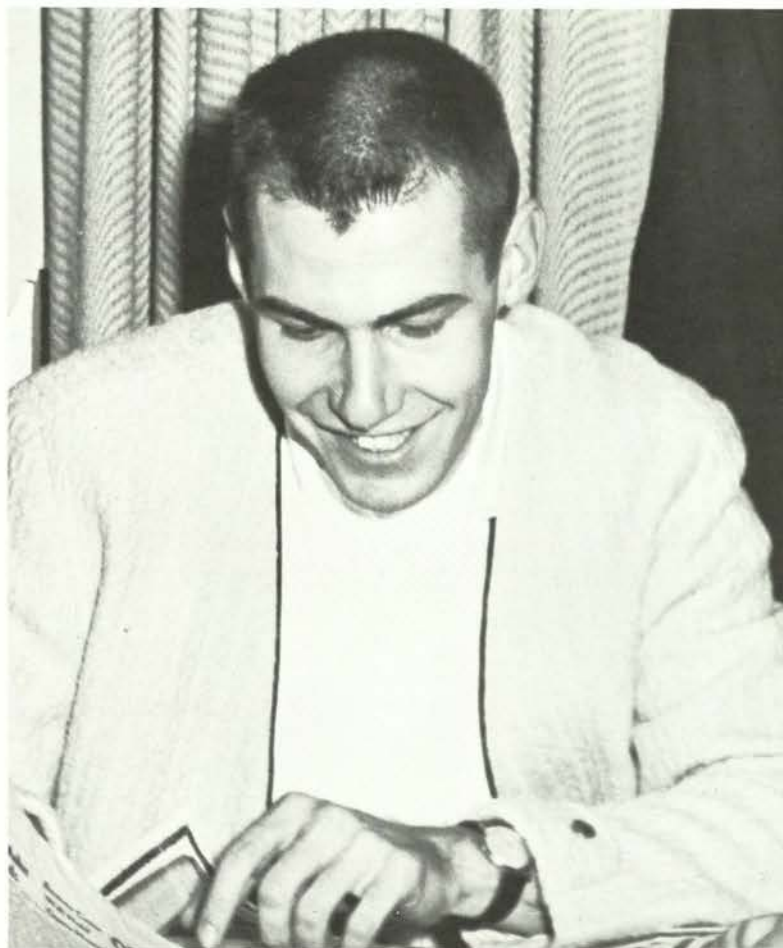

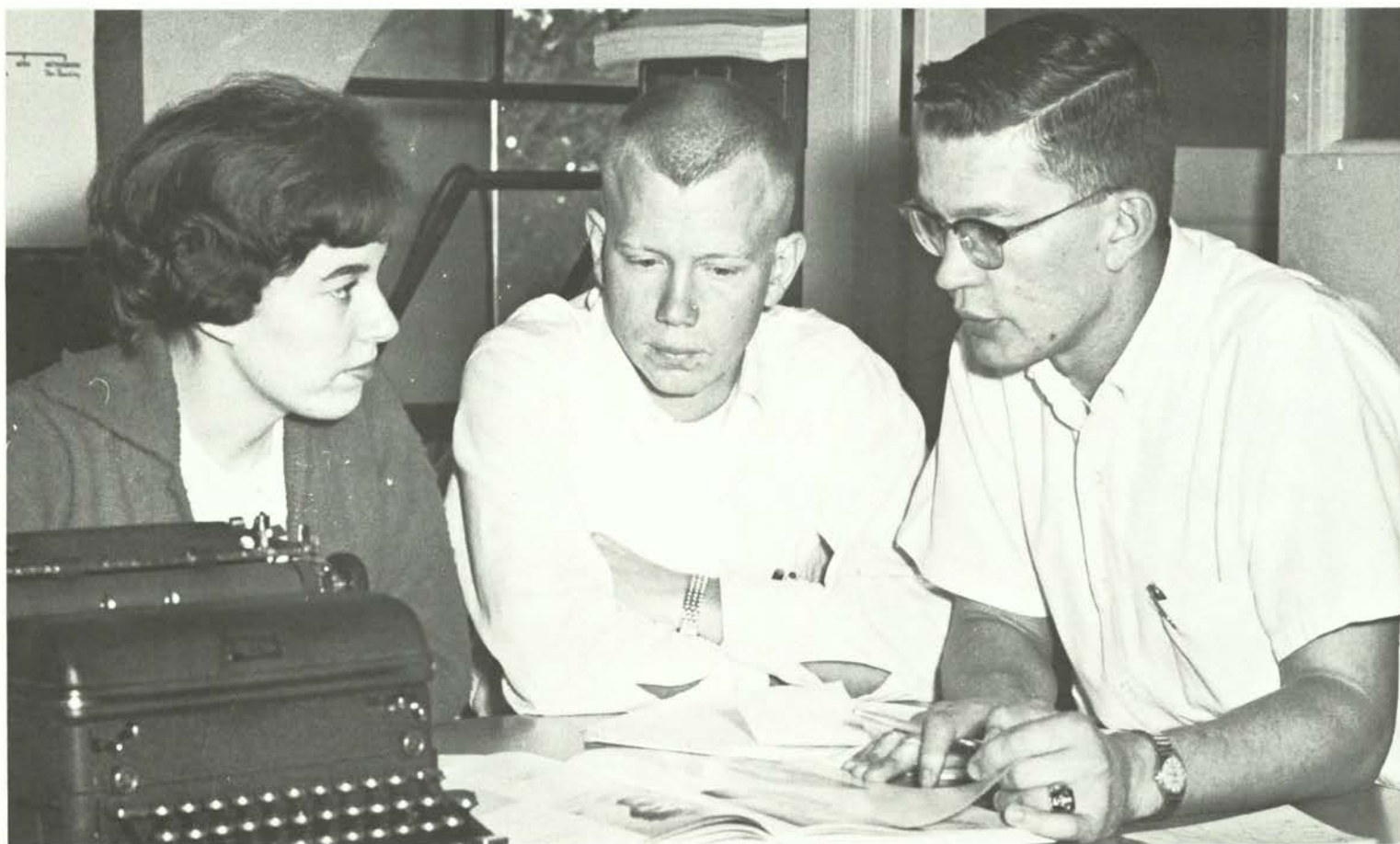

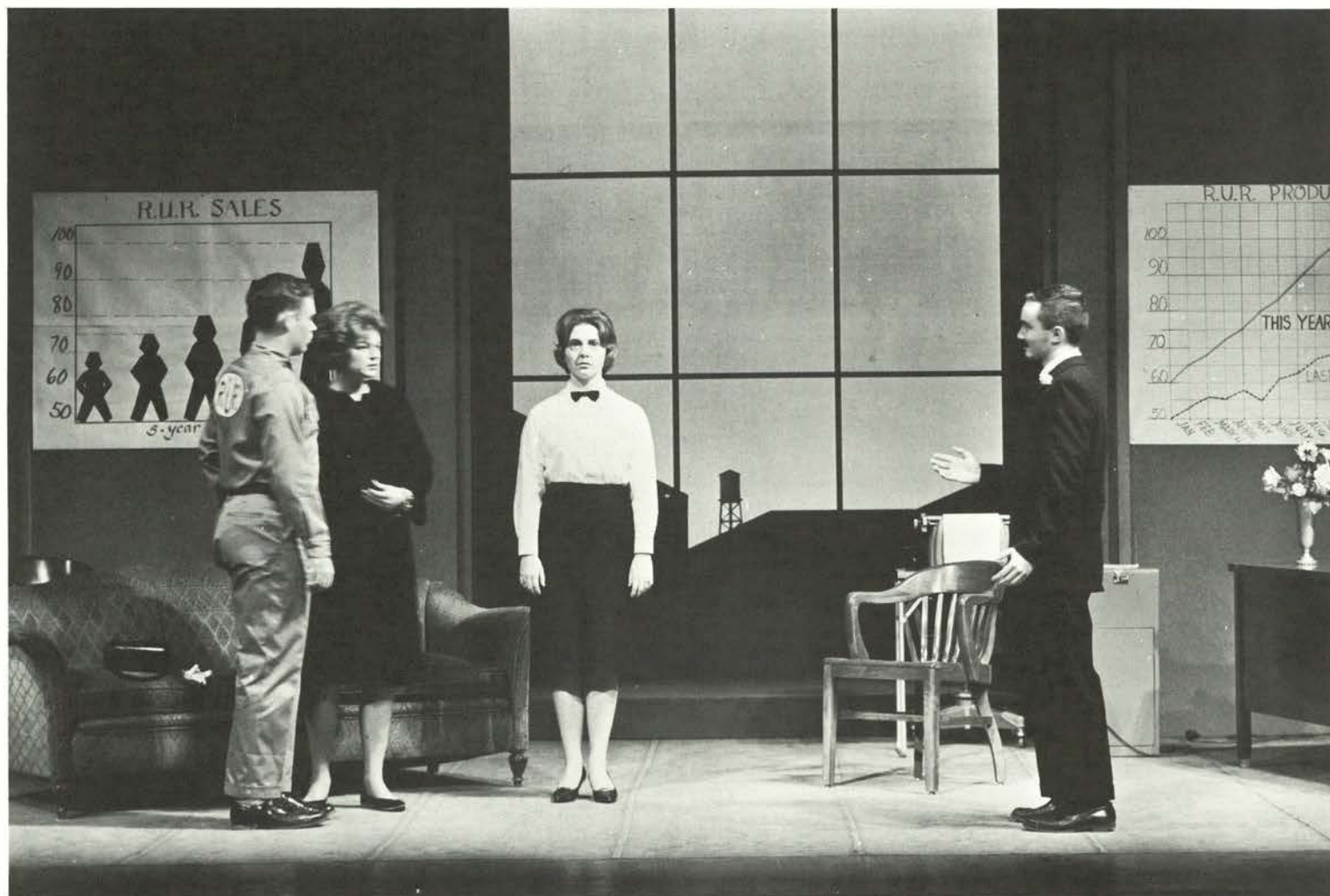
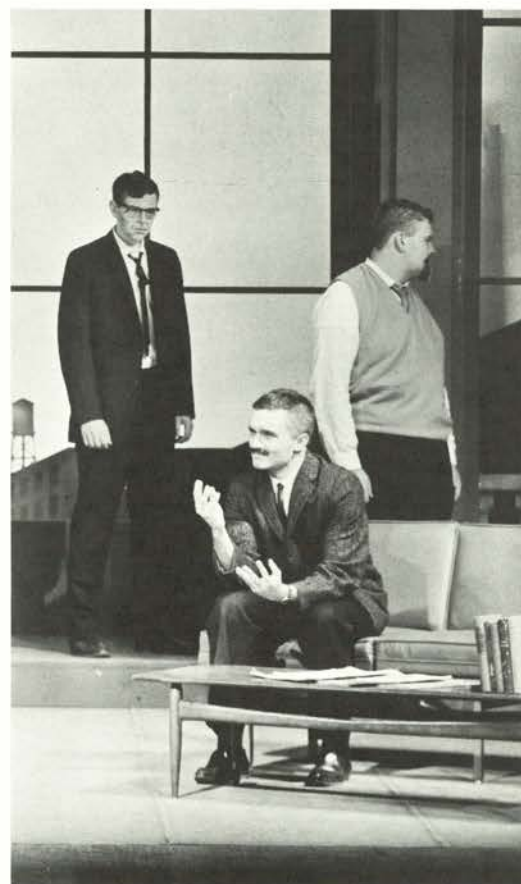
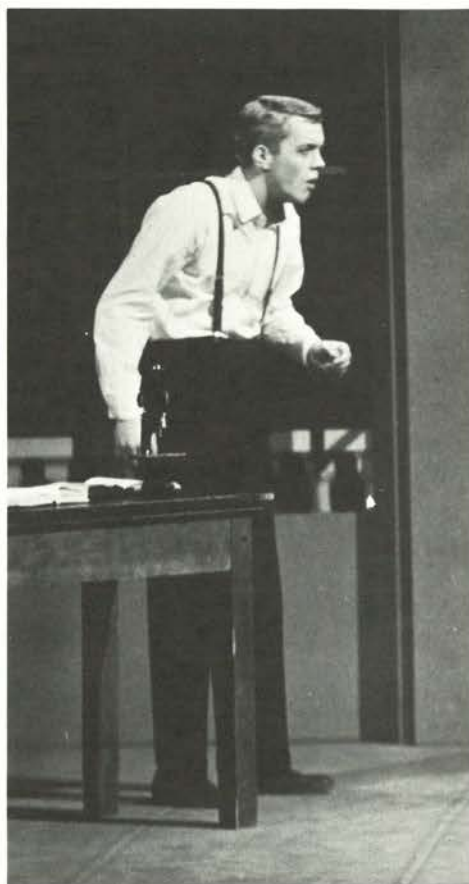
anti-Jewish persecution, life in cramped quarters with two other families and an adolescent love were revealed through the dynamic stage lighting and other dramatic effects.

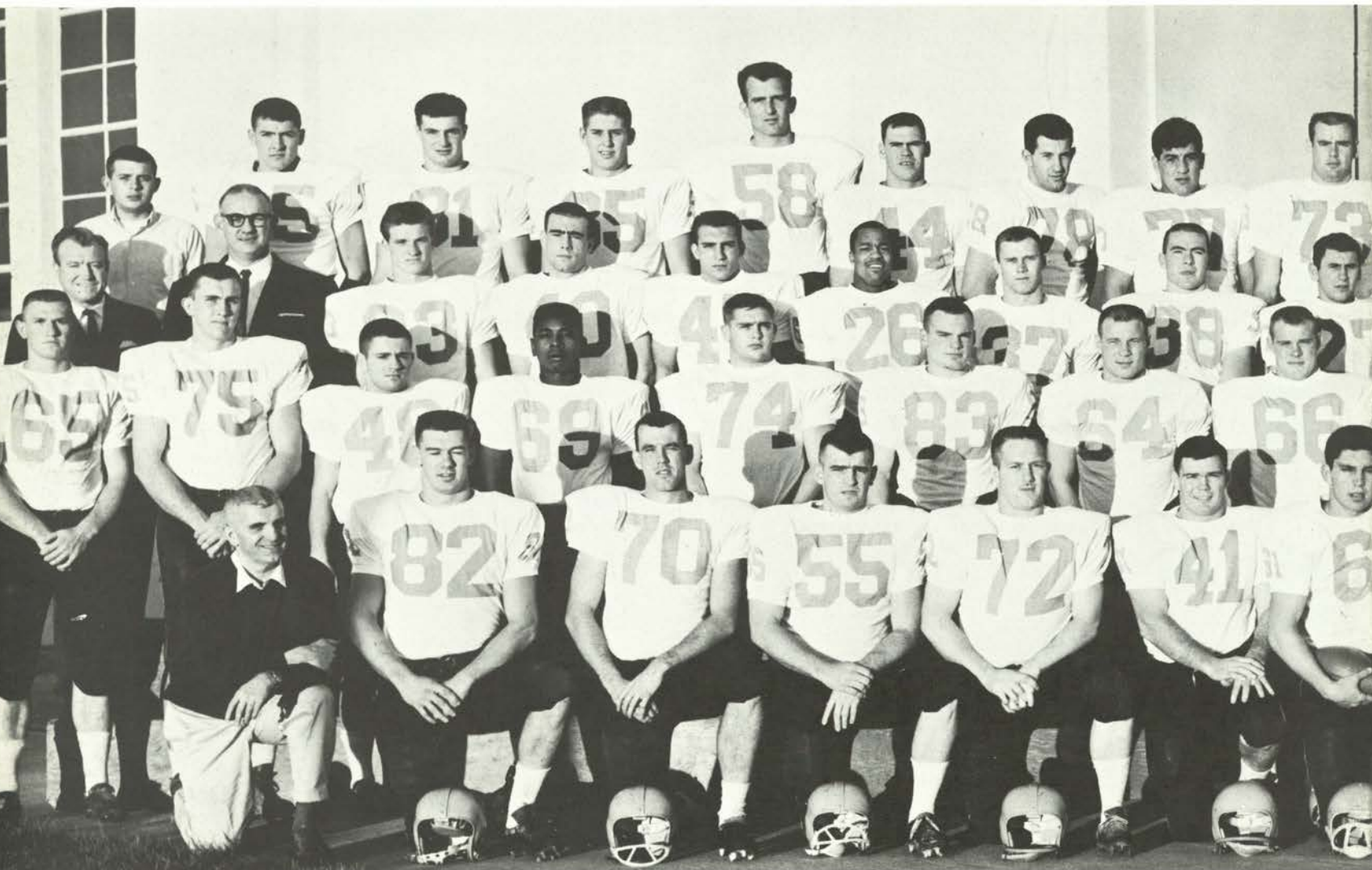

"Greatest" team rolls into Liberty Bowl

Oregon State football 1962: What was it? What made it, as Coach Tommy Prothro claimed, "the best OSU team I've coached"? Why were "gallant" and "amazing" used so much in connection with this team?

It was those intangibles character, poise and desire that molded the 1962 Beavers into a football squad that ended up 8-2 in regular season play and 15th among the nation's best. It was "one of the greatest quarterbacks of our time," Terry Baker, who made every All-American squad, became the first Heisman Trophy winner (an award given annually to the outstanding football player in the nation) west of the Mississippi and more important led the Beavers with flawless poise and execution throughout the season.

It was an end named Vern Burke, the second half of the greatest passing combination in NCAA history,

who with his spectacular pass receiving set 12 OSU and national marks. It was a group of small, quick, aggressive linemen nicknamed the "light brigade" who won every game with dominance both offensively and defensively over opponents up to 35 lbs. per man heavier.

It was Leroy Whittle, a jet quick halfback, and a "three-yards-and-a-cloud-of-dust" fullback Bruce Williams who provided the running balance on the 2nd best offense in the U. S. It was a team that improved week by week, had the ability to pull a game out of the fire when it seemed lost, that beat Oregon and won a trip to the Liberty Bowl. It was, according to its coach, "probably the best OSU team of all time."

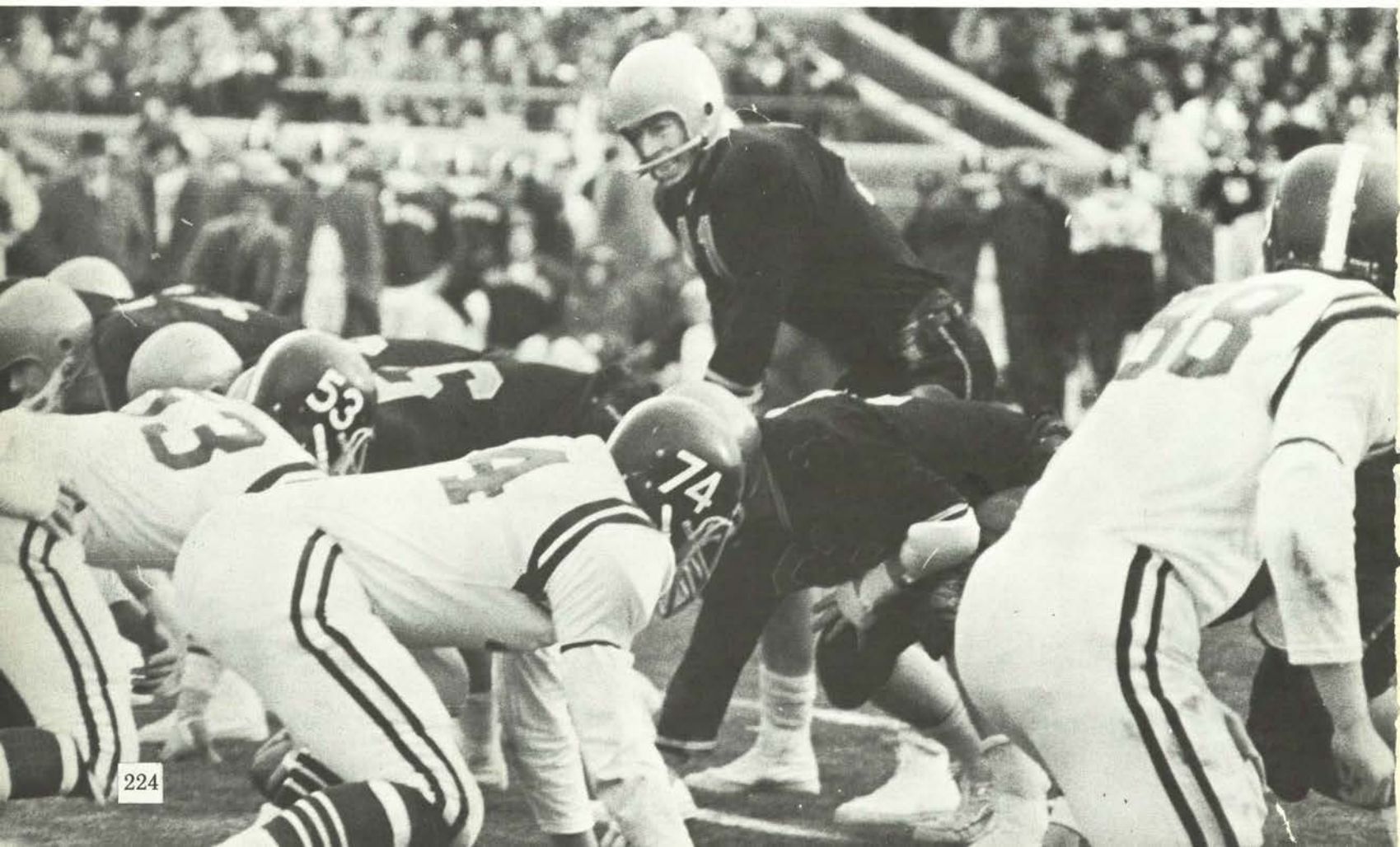


Terry Baker: All-American

In 1962, Terry Baker became the second greatest ground gainer in collegiate football history. Only Johnny Bright of Drake has ever surpassed Baker's season and career marks of 2276 yards and 4980 yards respectively.

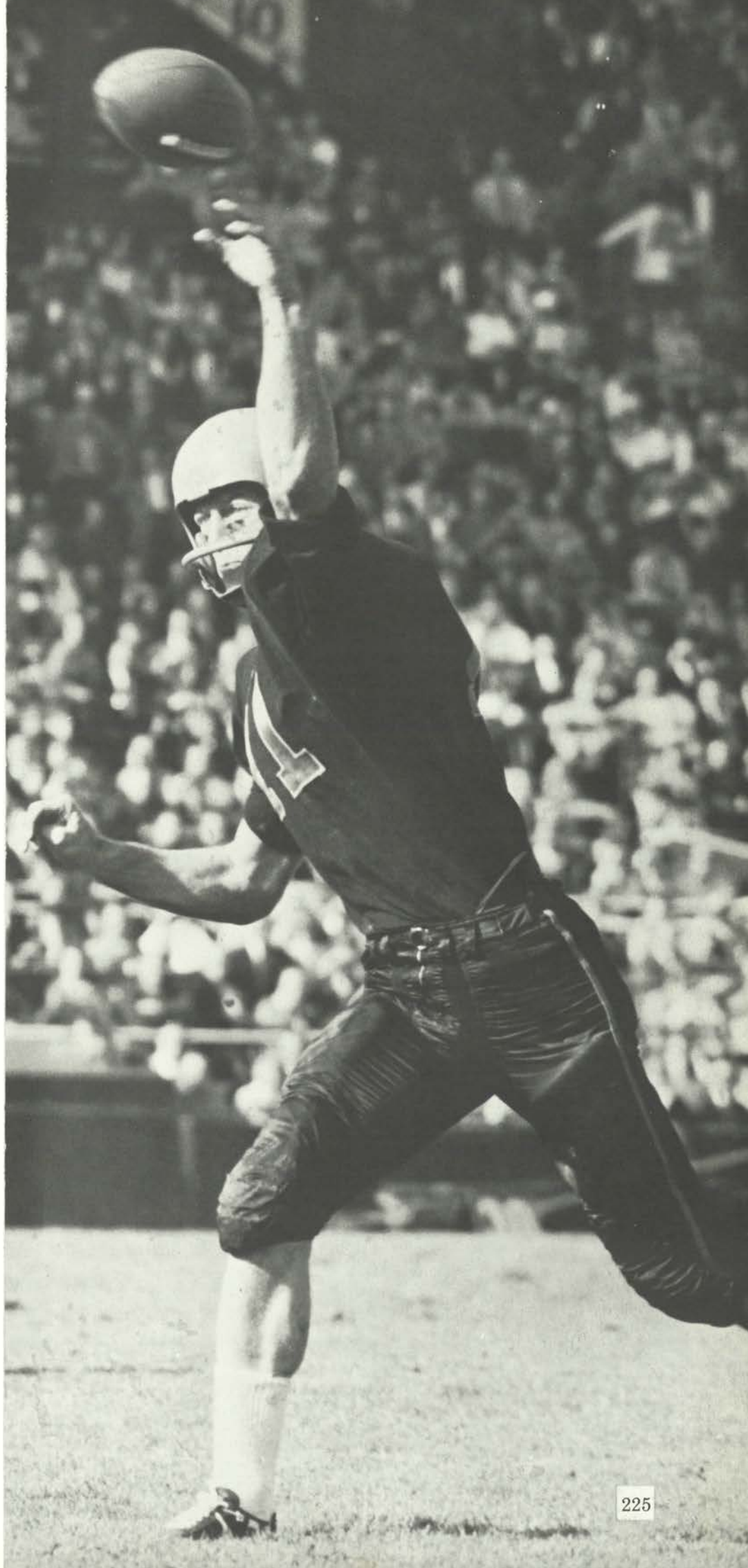
He was an unexcelled passer (1738 yards) and a deceptive and elusive runner. After Baker had led a slaughter of the West Virginia team, Coach Gene Corum commented, "He's the best T-quarterback that I've ever seen." A pro scout best summed up Baker's talents in this report: "An amazing athlete, excellent passer short or long. Throws well under pressure. A tremendous runner . . . Very intelligent, very good signal caller and an outstanding leader."

However, statistics and coaches' opinions don't begin to tell of Terry Baker's contribution to the football season. To the team, he represented the force that made its offense go. He was able to pull the team out of trouble and into victory almost at will. When Colorado State closed dangerously on the Beavers 14-19, in went Baker and in three plays guided



the team 54 yards to the score. Baker was a cool and precise component in a sport that demands just those qualities for success. He turned what seemed like huge losses on attempted pass plays into sizable gains with his uncanny running. Against West Virginia, he bobbled a pass from center on an extra point attempt. With the opposing team hanging on him, he flipped a pass to Vern Burke for the points. One of OSU's assistant coaches said that Terry was "like a coach" on the field. He employed the Beavers' offense in places where it would produce the best results. The Liberty Bowl win came on Baker's surprising call of an end-sweep from his own one-yard line (see pg. 233).

At the season's end, the awards poured in. He was named to virtually every All-American team, was No. 1 draft choice of the National Football League, won one of eight national scholar-athlete awards, became *Sports Illustrated* Sportsman of the Year and was awarded the Heisman Trophy, symbolic of the nation's outstanding football player (receiving it from Attorney General Kennedy left). According to *Sports Illustrated*, Baker was "the first football player in all the years of the game to be so unanimously decorated."

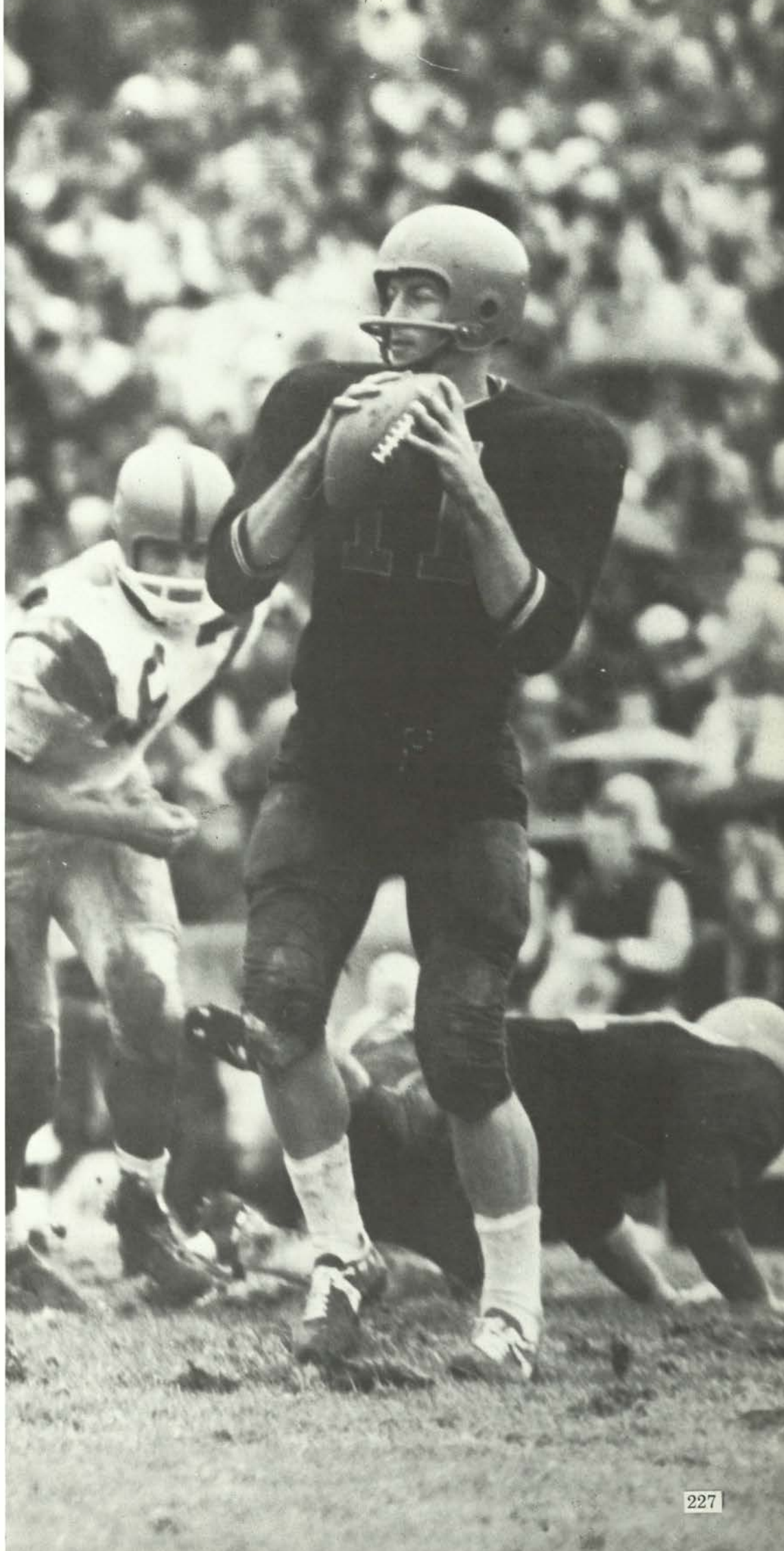
When Terry Baker passed eight yards to Vern Burke in the second quarter against Iowa State, he started an offensive machine that was to become the greatest of its kind in collegiate football history. These two football players combined for 1007 yards on 69 completions, both new NCAA records for Burke. Furthermore, Baker and Burke gave this year's team the most dangerous offensive weapon a team can have—the ability to score quickly and from any place on the field. Eleven times this season the Beavers scored within one minute of either half, and in



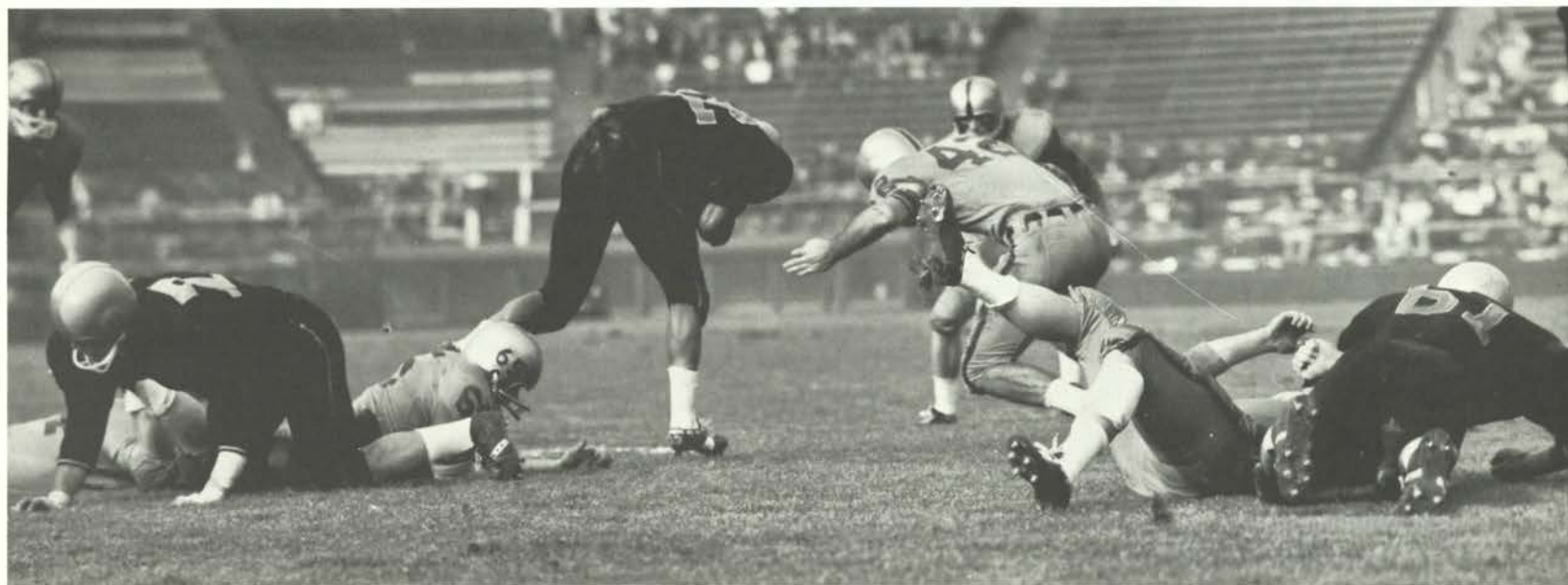
all cases the TD was scored on a "B to B" aerial or set up by one.

Both Baker and Burke had the necessary qualities for their particular positions; however, their success and value to the team was their ability to work together. After watching them team together for twelve completions and two TDs, Iowa State coach Clay Stapleton claimed that Burke was "... the best one that I've seen." Going against a favored Stanford team, Baker and Burke were successful on every attempt as they connected on eight passes and led a Beaver rout of the Indians, 27-0. This unstoppable duo scored with six seconds remaining in the first half of the West Virginia game when eight Mountaineers dropped back to defend against the pass.

Baker and Burke gave the Beavers a quality of greatness and class that few teams have ever achieved.







"Light Brigade," Whittle lead rush offense

OSU's rushing offense, combining a hard-hitting line and a fast, powerful backfield, teamed with its strong passing arm to rank second nationally and set 15 new OSU records. The "light brigade" line led by Captain George Gnos, Ross Cariaga, Jerry Neil and Jim Funston tore wide holes (as above against West Virginia) in its bulkier opponents line. The Beavers' elusive backs were quick to capitalize on these openings for game-winning yardage. Leroy Whittle (far left) combined excellent games against West Virginia (120 yds.) and Idaho (a 91 yd. kickoff return) into 396 yds. and a 4.9 average to lead the team. Handling the ball when the Beavers needed short yardage, Bruce Williams (left) piled up 207 yds. In 58 carries, Bruce never lost a yard, never fumbled and was seldom denied when a TD was at stake (seven TD's).

Defense keys team's improvement

Developing from an inept group that allowed Iowa State 380 yards in the opening game to the cohesive unit that held Oregon to two first downs in the second half of the season's finale, OSU's defense keynoted the team's improvement. In the first few games, the Beavers' opponents moved the defensive line at will, and the secondary acted more like a sieve than a protective umbrella. Then everything changed. Starting with the Stanford game and continuing throughout the

season, the "light brigade" line started hitting furiously and gang tackling with abandon. The secondary welded into an effective pass defense.

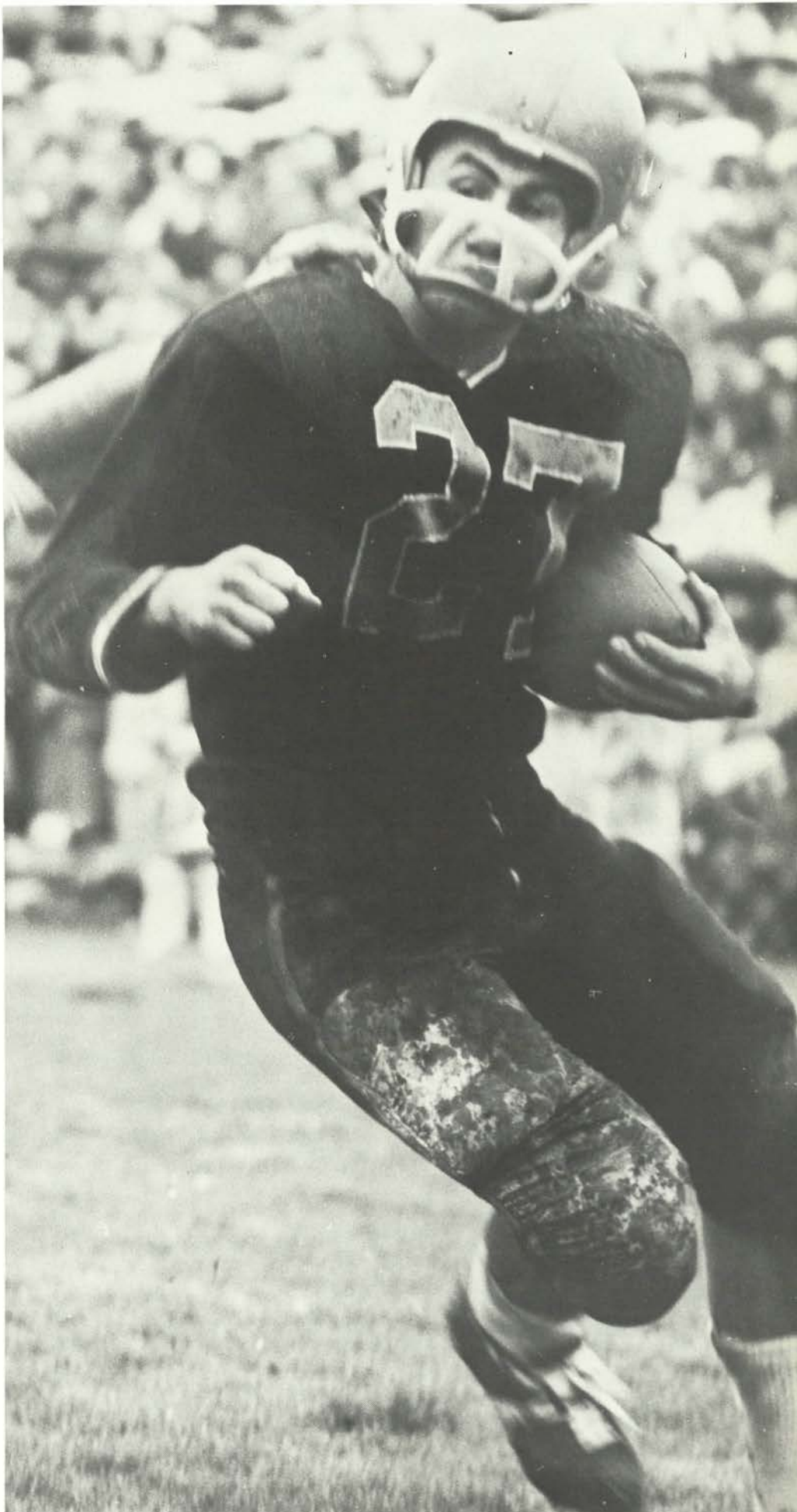
Against Washington the linemen led by Rich Koeper, Ross Cariaga and Paul Seal plugged up the Husky interior line while linebacker Rich Brooks slammed the Washington backs for losses on end sweeps. Brooks performed so effectively that he was voted the Linebackers' Player-of-the-Week award. Although the Beavers dropped a one-point decision to the Huskies, the defensive effort was a shadowing of what was to come.

Facing a keyed-up Washington State team, the defensive secondary saved the day. With the Beavers leading 18-12 and only minutes left in the game, WSU was driving for what looked like the game-winning score. When all seemed lost, Danny Espalin (right) streaked out of nowhere to intercept a Cougar aerial and preserve the OSU victory. It was the third such theft of the game for the 5'6" safety man who was described by Head Coach Tommy Prothro as "... too small, too slow.



All he can do is play football." Danny went on to tie an OSU interception mark of nine in regular season play.

The Oregon game was perhaps the best effort of the season. In two series of plays the Beaver defense brought the team victory and a Liberty Bowl bid. Early in the game OSU fumbled on its 9 and Oregon recovered. In four plays the high-powered Duck offense led by Mel Renfro managed only 7 yards. On their final play Renfro hit at the Beavers' left side and was savagely stopped by Koeper (No. 7 showing on jersey, above), Seal (making tackle at Renfro's legs, above) and Dan Sieg (No. 37 above). Late in the game with OSU leading 20-17, the Ducks got possession of the ball for one last try at a score. The Oregon quarterback tried to get it through the air. He didn't get a pass off because the line rush was so hard. Four straight times the ever-valuable Seal crashed through his blockers and smashed the Duck QB and Oregon's victory hopes. The fourth tackle resulted in a fumble, which Cariaga alertly recovered, and the game was over.



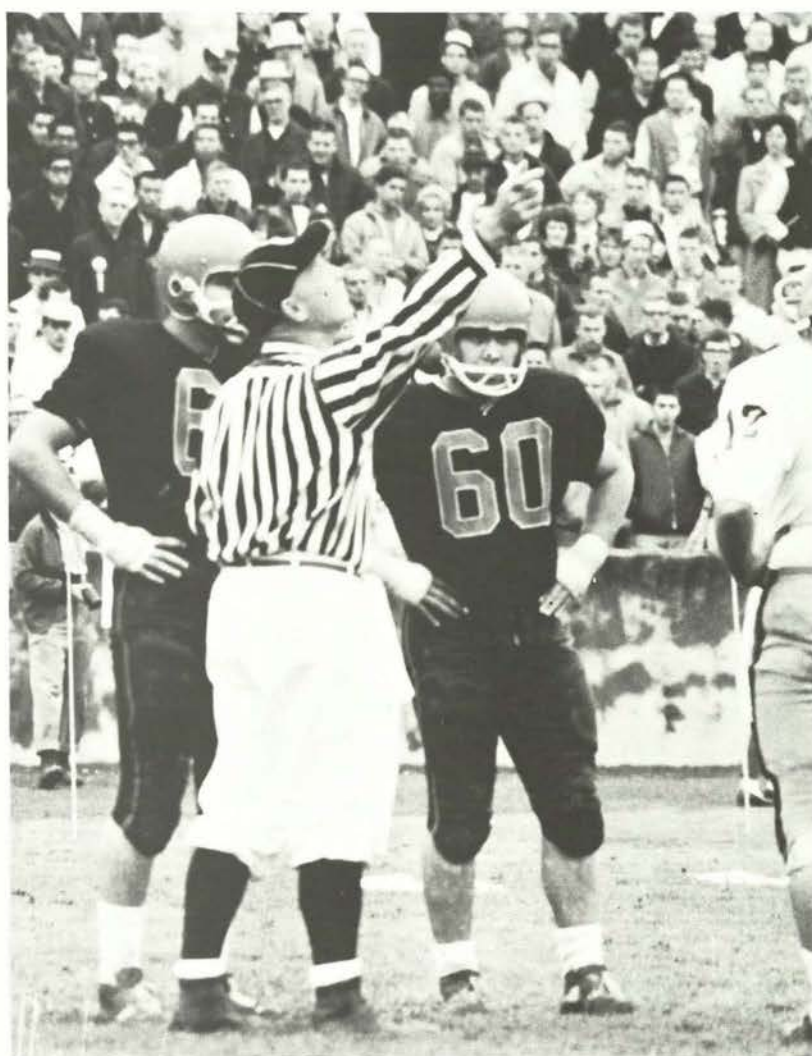


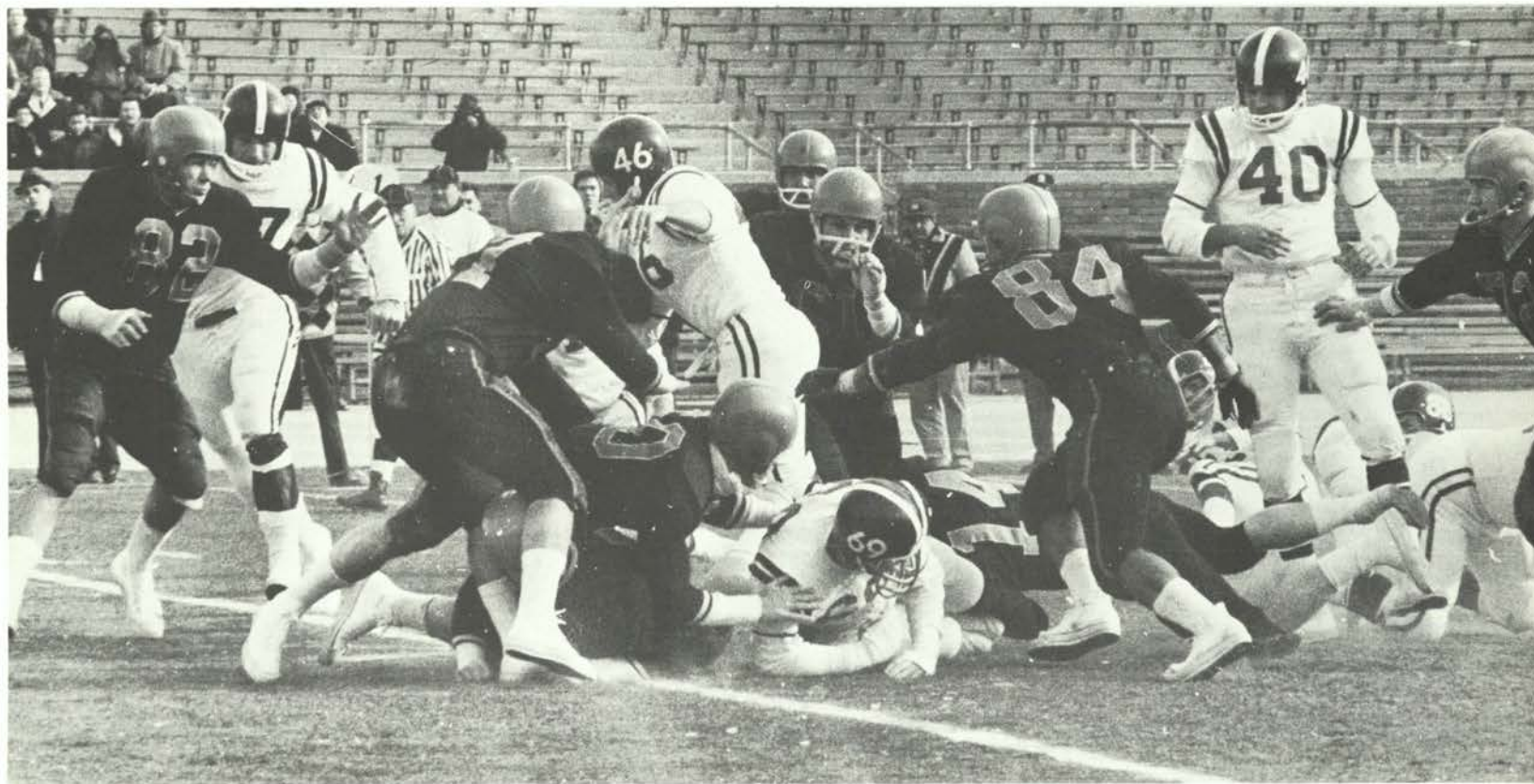

Coach, Captains and...

The man who brought OSU to the top in grid prominence—that's Tommy Prothro, head football coach. In eight seasons, he has compiled a 50-28-2 record and has suffered only one losing season. Coming from UCLA in 1955, Tommy produced a PCC runner-up with a 6-3 record during his first year. In 1956, Prothro took the Beavers to the Rose Bowl and the following year tied with Oregon for the PCC title. This past year he added another feather to his cap by coaching his first bowl winner.

Before the season, the Beavers chose their two starting guards, George Gness and Ross Cariaga to lead them. Gness (partially hidden behind official, right) was elected captain while Cariaga (No. 60, right) was voted the alternate. They were both bulwarks of the "light brigade" line throughout the season. George played outstanding games against Pacific and Oregon while Ross won the Linebackers' Player-of-the-Week award for his Oregon game.

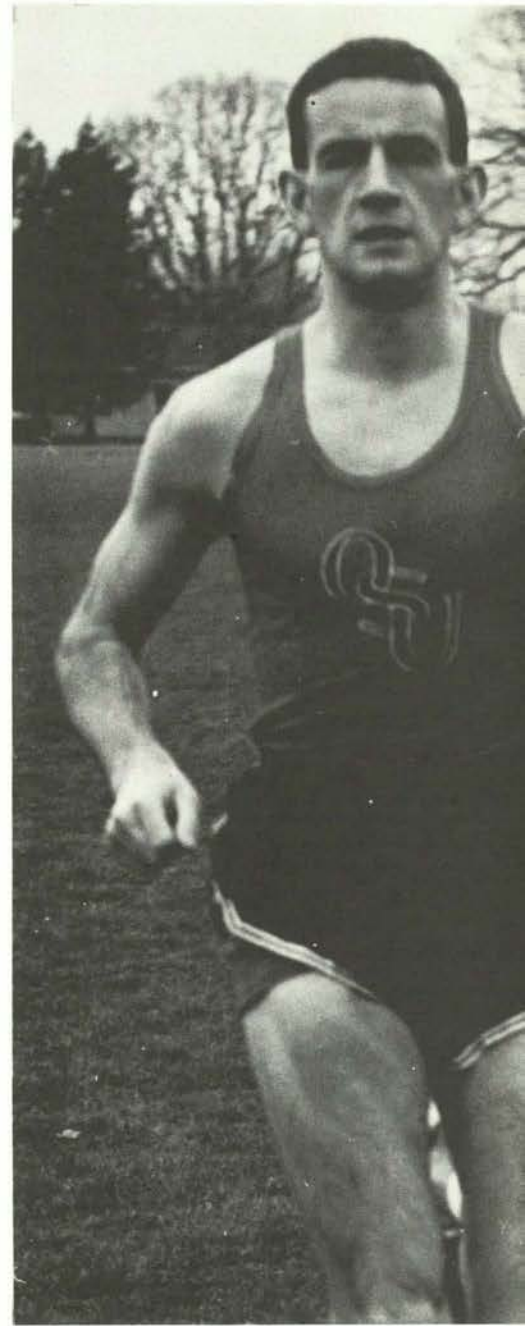
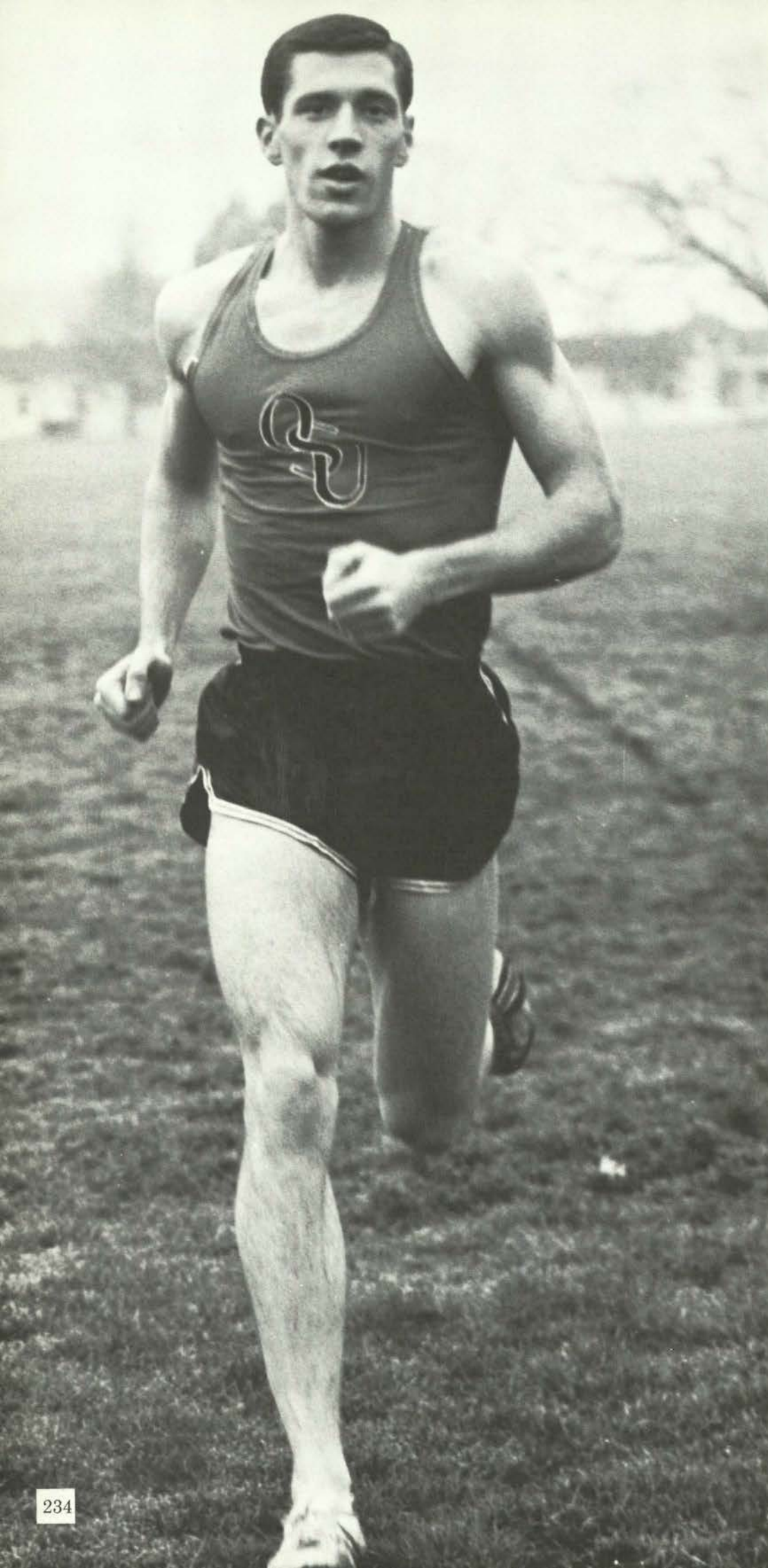
...the Liberty Bowl

In 17° temperature, the Beavers wearing long underwear, tennis shoes and gloves, marched onto the frozen turf of Philadelphia's Municipal Stadium and won the Liberty Bowl 6-0 over Villanova.

This victory was not as spectacular as earlier contests but was, in many ways, a typical OSU game. Terry Baker (left) spelled the offensive difference in the game. Of OSU's 299 total offense yards, Baker had 260, and he scored the only TD of the game on a 99 $\frac{2}{3}$ -yard run.

Danny Espalin came up with his tenth interception of the year on a game-saving snare in the second quarter, and once again the "light brigade" held a heavier opponent in check. Throughout the game, the Beaver line yielded yardage between the 20 yard lines but tightened up when the Wildcats threatened. Late in the fourth quarter with Villanova camped on the Beaver's nine yard line, OSU tightened, causing a fumble, with Paul Seal recovering it and the ball game.

Following the game, Baker was named its most valuable player and sophomore Warren Cole was named line-man of the game.

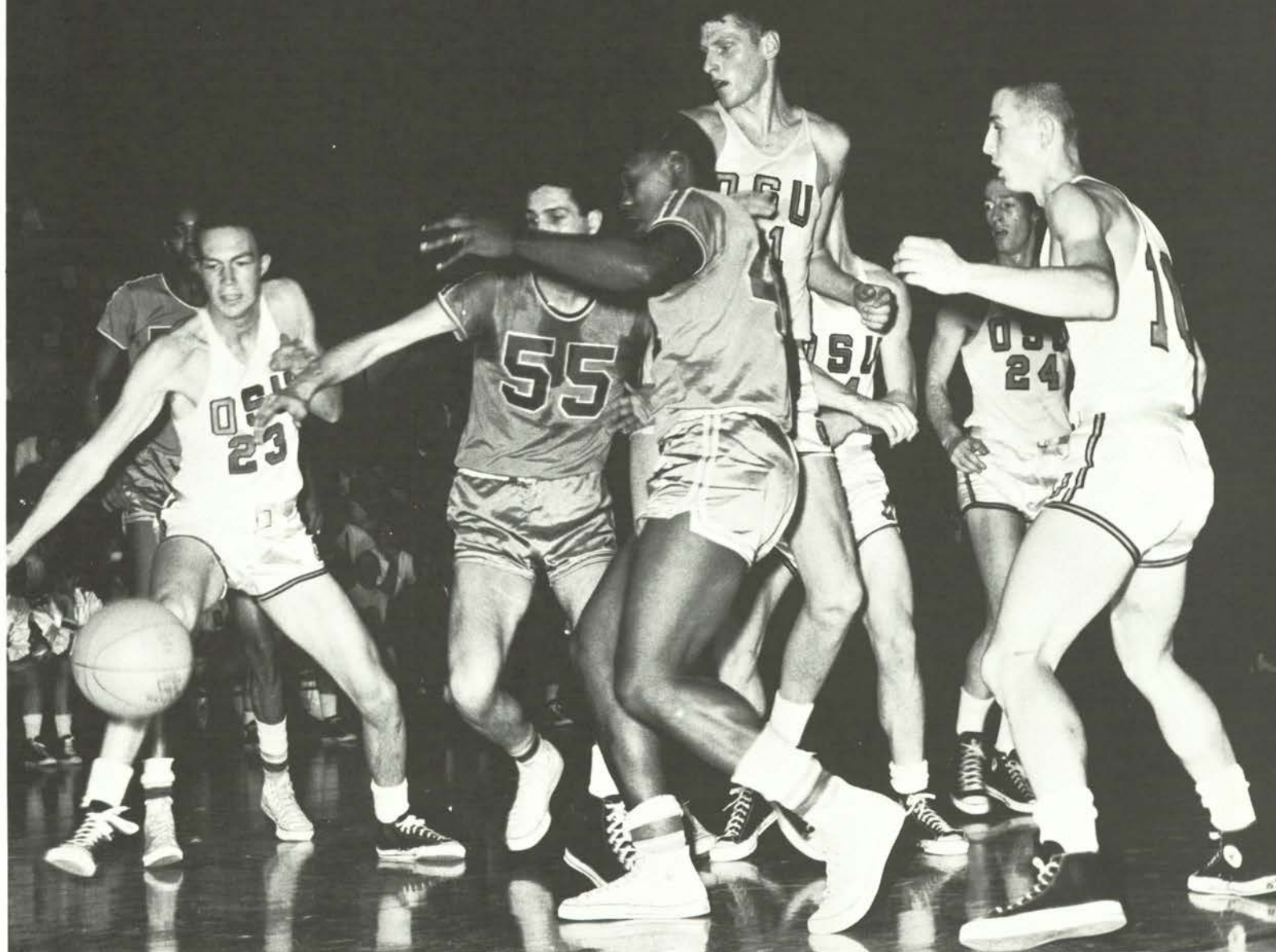


Since Cross-Country is one of the lesser known sports at Oregon State, perhaps a few words of explanation as to its nature and growth would be helpful preceding an analysis of the 1962 season. Considered by many as a preparatory sport for spring track, Cross-Country involves running long distances of up to four miles and more. A team consists of five runners and the team score is the accumulative numerical finishing positions of the runners. Therefore, unlike most sports, the team with the lowest score wins the meet. Although it is considered a minor sport, the skill and enthusiasm with which Coach Sam Bell and his athletes have run the program has lifted OSU Cross-Country into national prominence. Last year for the first time, Bell took a team to the Nationals and Oregon State became the first Far West Coast school to win an NCAA Cross-Country title.

This year after an abbreviated schedule, they tried again and managed an 8th-place finish.

Led by Norm Hoffman (far left) and Rich Cuddihy (middle, above), this year's team won two of their three meets. The Beavers' first meet against Lewis and Clark proved to be their most difficult. Hoffman, Cuddihy and Jan Underwood finished 1, 2 and 5 respectively to turn back the Pioneer threat. Against Idaho and Washington State, Dale Story, last year's NCAA champ, ran away from the field and led a Beaver rout. In the Nationals, Cuddihy and Hoffman were only 3 seconds apart and sparked the Beaver charge for the NCAA crown. Out of a field of 139 runners over a 4-mile course, they finished 19th and 21st respectively. Other Beaver finishers and their places were Story (33rd), Underwood (60th) and Jerry Brady (73rd).

Beavers Finish As Fourth Best Team In Nation

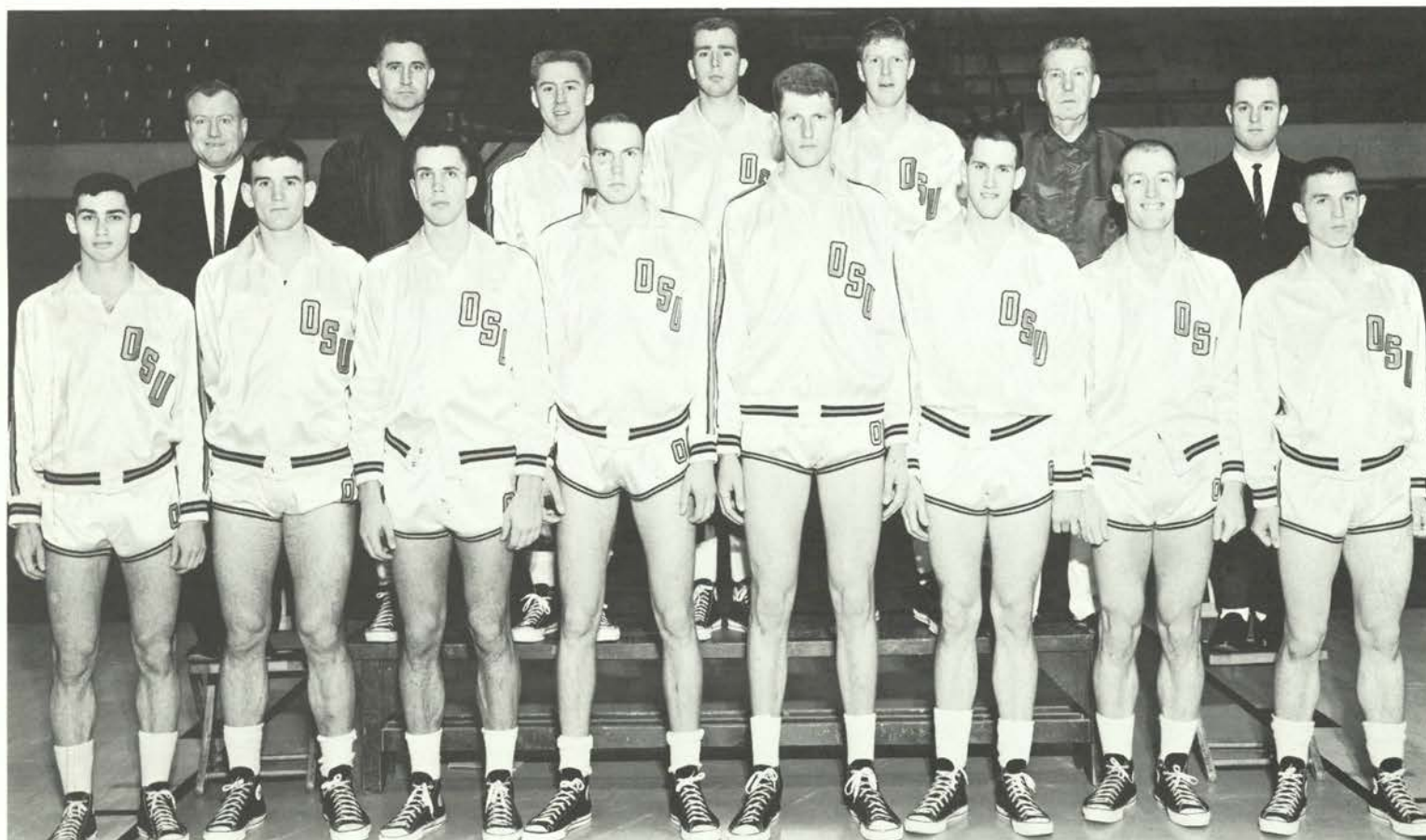
In 1963, Coach Slat's Gill's Beavers went all the way to the finals of the NCAA tournament before finishing fourth in the nation. This was the highest finish ever for a Beaver team and capped an extremely successful 22-9 season.

Nationally ranked fifth on pre-season polls, the Beavers had the pressure on them from the outset. Even with Mel Counts' high scoring and rebounding, the Beavers lost three of their first six games. Returning from the Liberty Bowl game, Terry Baker added a quality of leadership that the

team had lacked. Beginning with their seventh consecutive successful defense of the Far West Classic, the Beavers won nine of their next ten games. OSU split their next weekend series with Portland U, Oregon and USC. They had many people wondering just how good a team they were. Reflecting the competitiveness that had marked their play all season when the going got tough, the Beavers hit a late season peak that carried them undefeated through their remaining games and into the NCAA tournament (pg. 245).

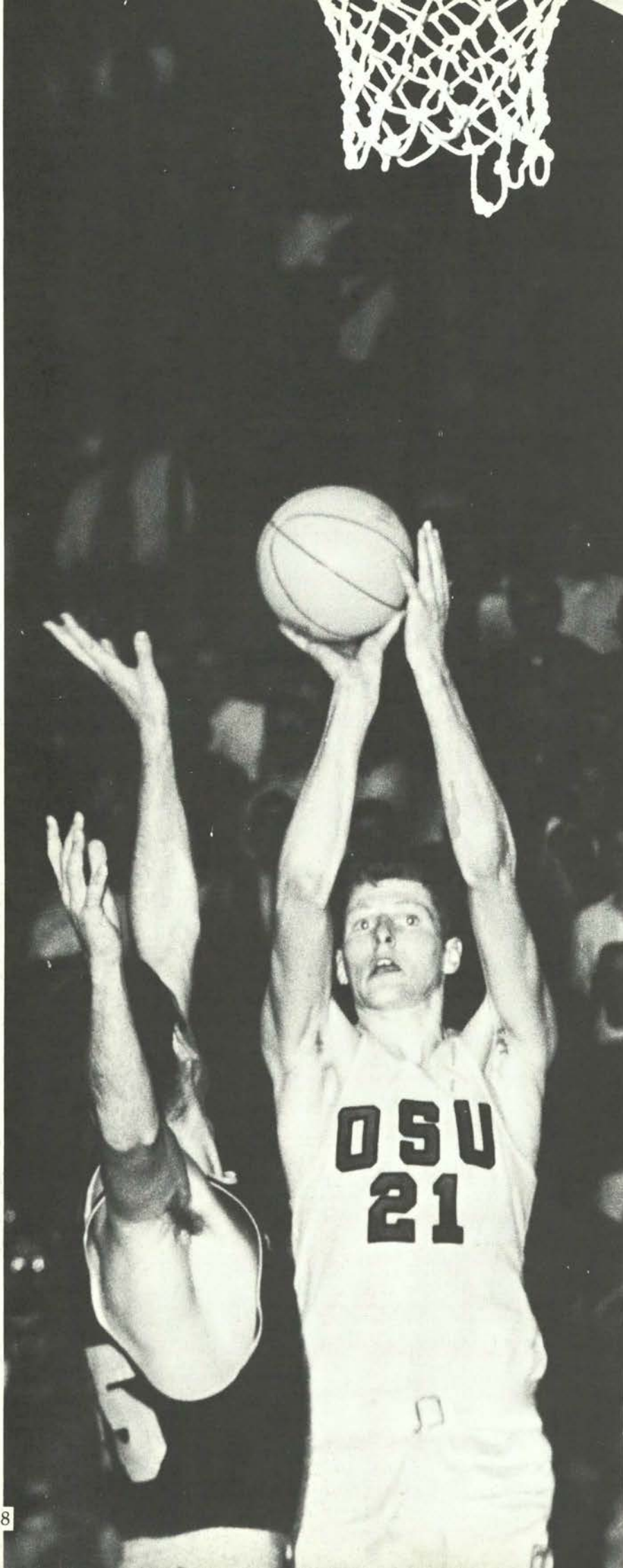

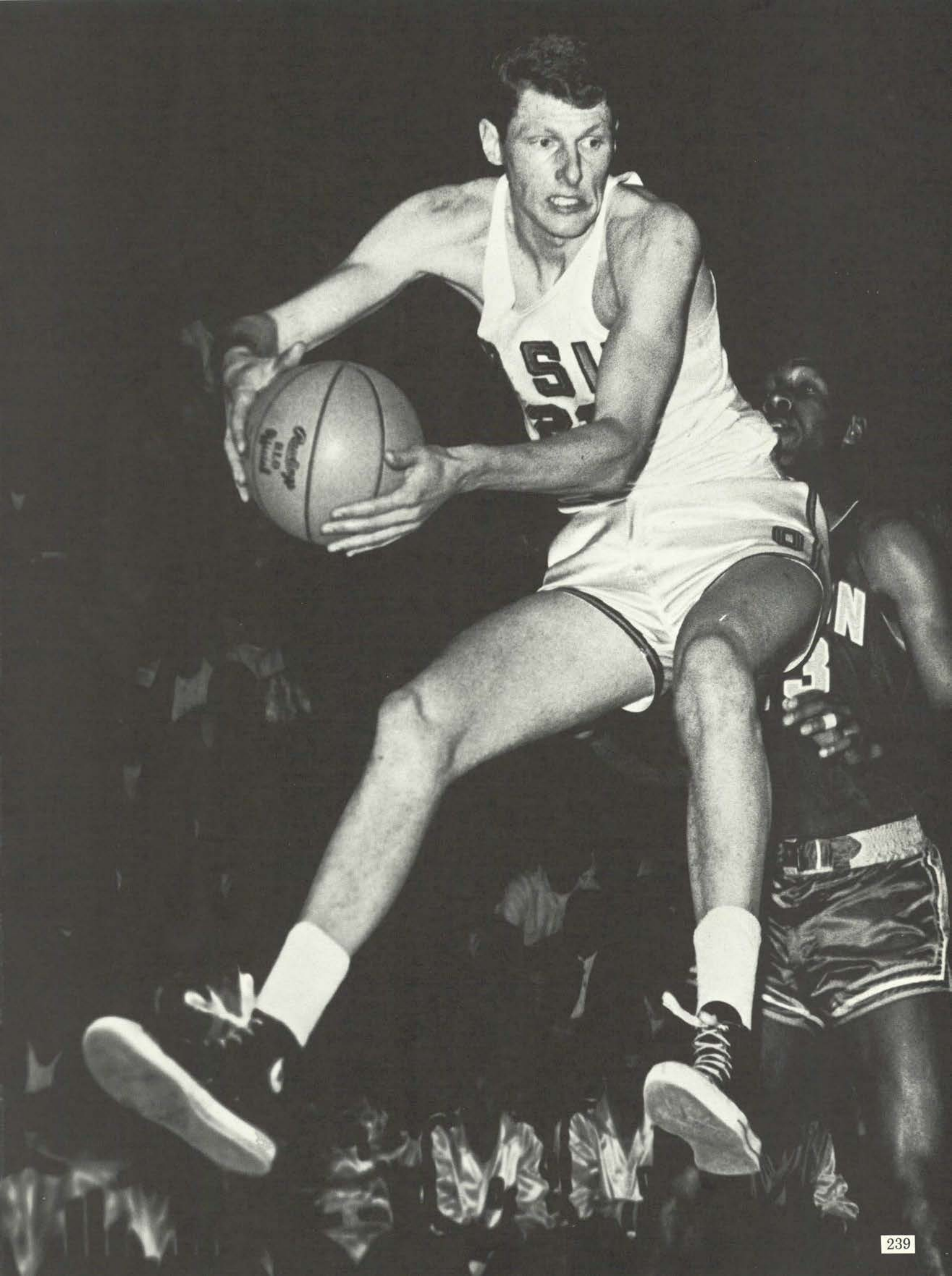
Mel Counts Sets New OSU Scoring, Rebounding Records

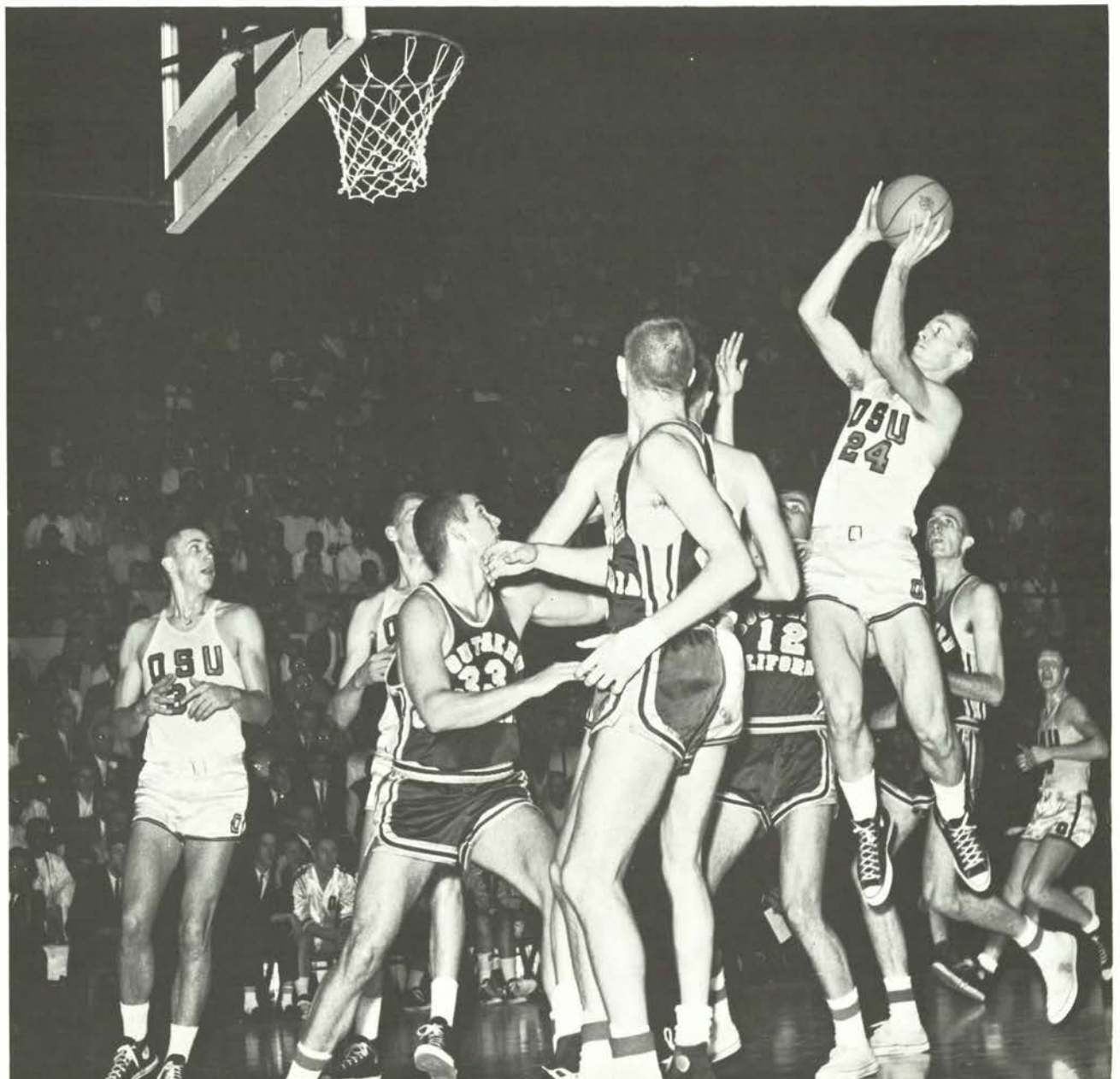
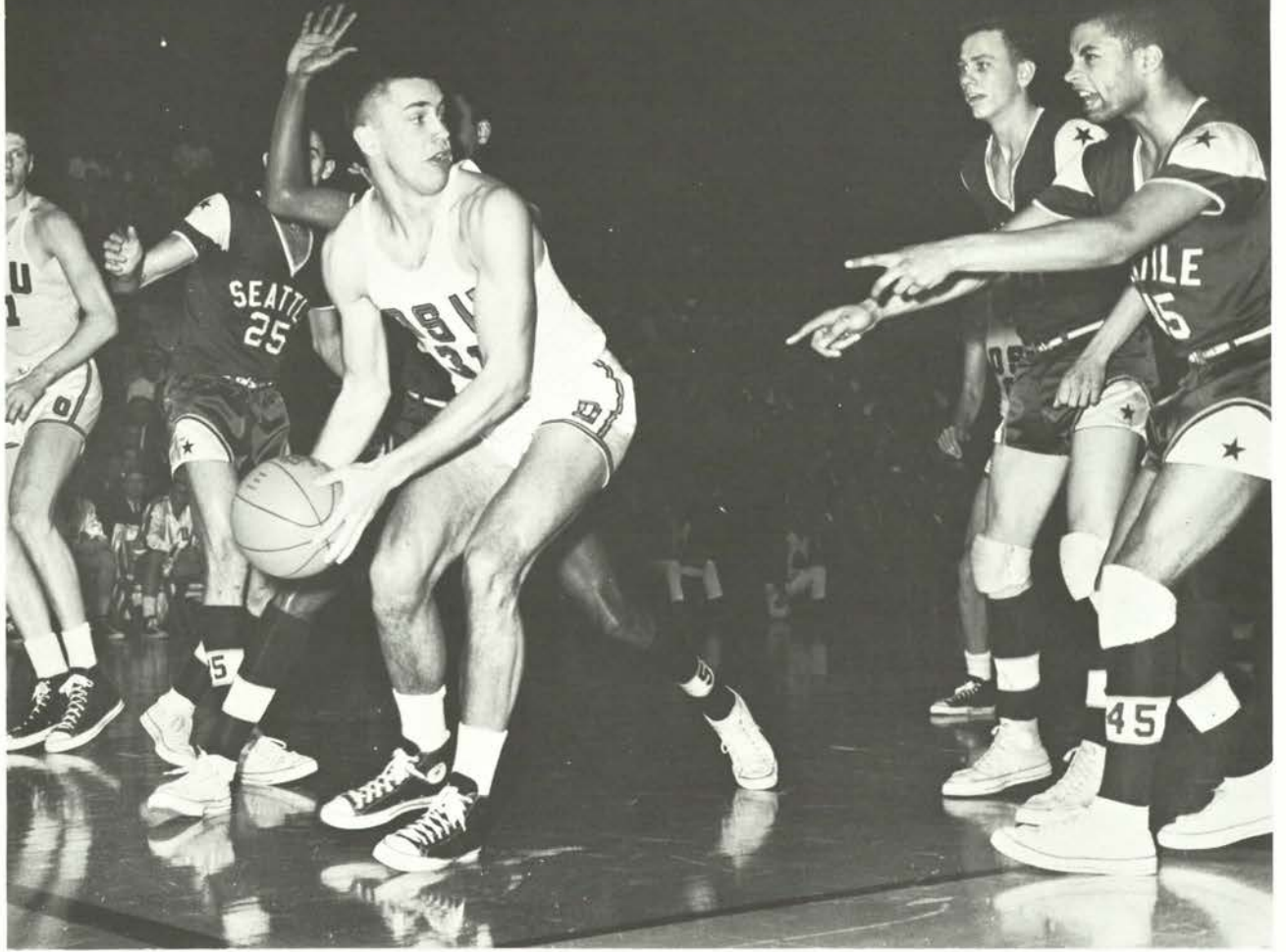
Any analysis of Oregon State basketball would have to start with seven-foot center Mel Counts. He led the Beavers in almost every department from scoring (661 pts. for a 21.3 average) and shooting percentage (.440) to rebounding (485 for a 15.6 average) and personal fouls (112). Both his scoring and rebounding marks were new OSU single season records and his two year total of 1,198 points leaves him only 271 shy of former All-American Dave Gambee's career record.

Combining size, agility and shooting accuracy, Counts was virtually impossible to stop offensively. His ability to score from the outside just as effectively as inside posed a problem to opposing teams that no one was able to solve. Ranking in the top ten nationally in rebounding, Counts controlled the defensive boards, often giving the opposition only one shot at the basket.

However, shooting and rebounding were merely fundamentals that Counts had mastered. The quality that made Mel such a great asset to the team and a great basketball player was his seemingly boundless "heart" for winning. When games hung in the balance and the team needed points, they called on Mel, and he seldom failed to come through for them. Oregon State's first NCAA playoff game against Seattle showed Counts at his best. A six-point half-time lead dwindled to nothing in the early moments of the second half. From about the fifteen-minute mark in the Beavers and Chieftons traded leads and points at almost every exchange of the ball. The team that could hold up the longest under the pressure would win. Counts, constantly fed by his teammates, responded to the pressure with 30 points as he poured in basket after basket, defeating Seattle and sending OSU on to Provo. After the game, Coach Gill commented that Counts' performance was the greatest example of clutch shooting and playing that he had ever seen.

Counts was named to the All-Coast team for the second consecutive year, was chosen the most valuable player in the Far West Classic and Western Regionals and, even though he was the leading scorer in the tournament, was named to the second NCAA finals all-star team.





Baker, Pauly Steady Team

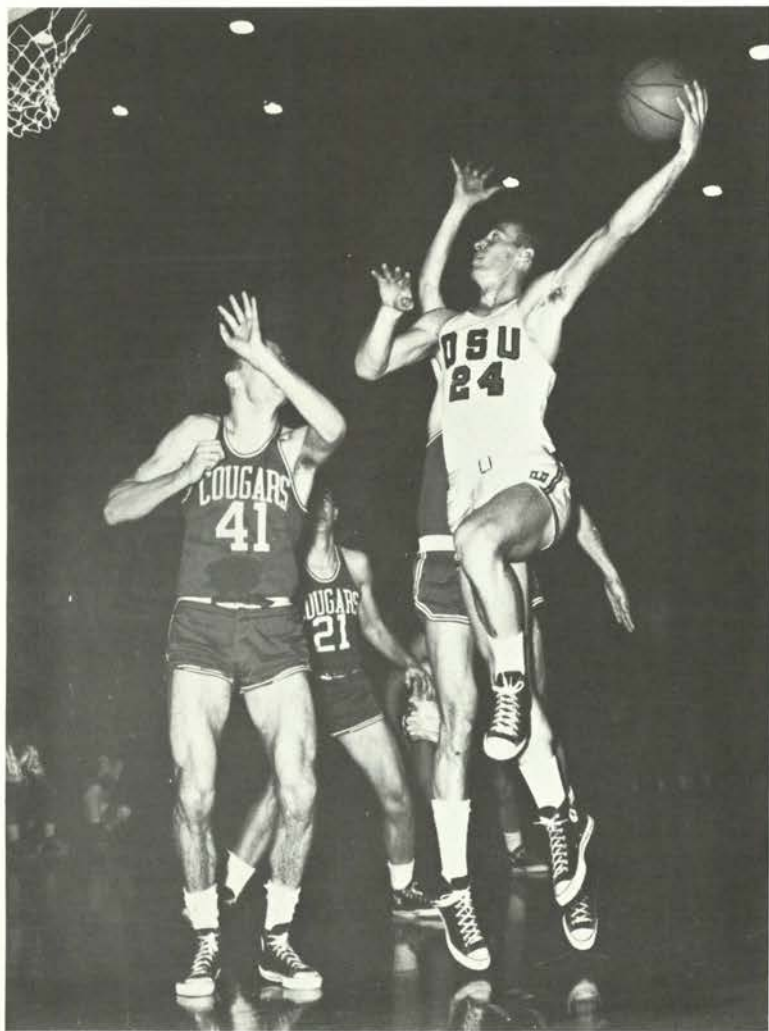
Throughout the season, team captain Terry Baker proved to be an essential part of the team. While leading the team on the floor, Terry's presence seemed to give the team that extra confidence which kept the Beavers' game running smoothly.

During the Cal game at the Far West Classic, OSU trailed by 11 points. Through sheer determination, Baker engineered a comeback by scoring eight consecutive points singlehandedly to beat the Bears.

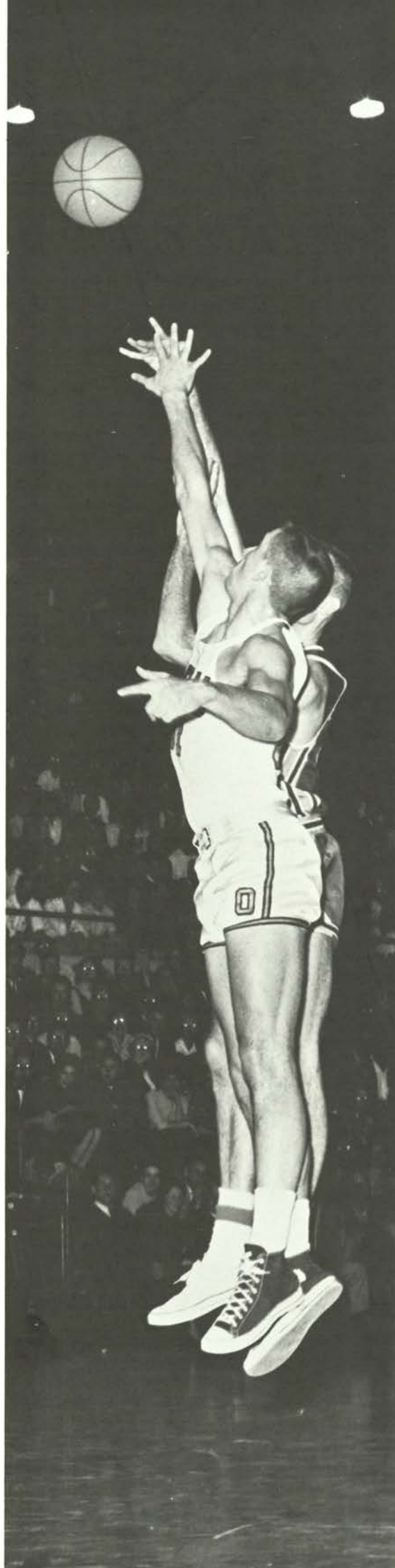
Baker was All-Coast and won all-star honors in the Kentucky Invitational, the Far West Classic and the Far West Regionals, a fine ending for his exceptional collegiate career.

Steve Pauly, perhaps the most under-publicized member of the team according to his basketball merits, ended his basketball career with some outstanding performances.

Steve's defensive proficiency proved valuable because he was often able to stymie the scoring punch of the opponent's top scorers, while scoring effectively himself. In one of the Oregon games, Pauly held the Ducks' top man, Steve Jones, to 3 points. Against Arizona State at the Regionals, he held flashy Joe Caldwell to a low 17 points, while contributing 22 markers himself to the Beavers' stunning upset of the nationally 3rd-ranked Sun Devils.



Pauly (No. 31—left above; right) ended the season as Oregon State's eleventh all-time scorer while finishing third for the season. Baker (No. 24, left; above) was second with a 13.4 average and ranked twelfth in all-time scoring.





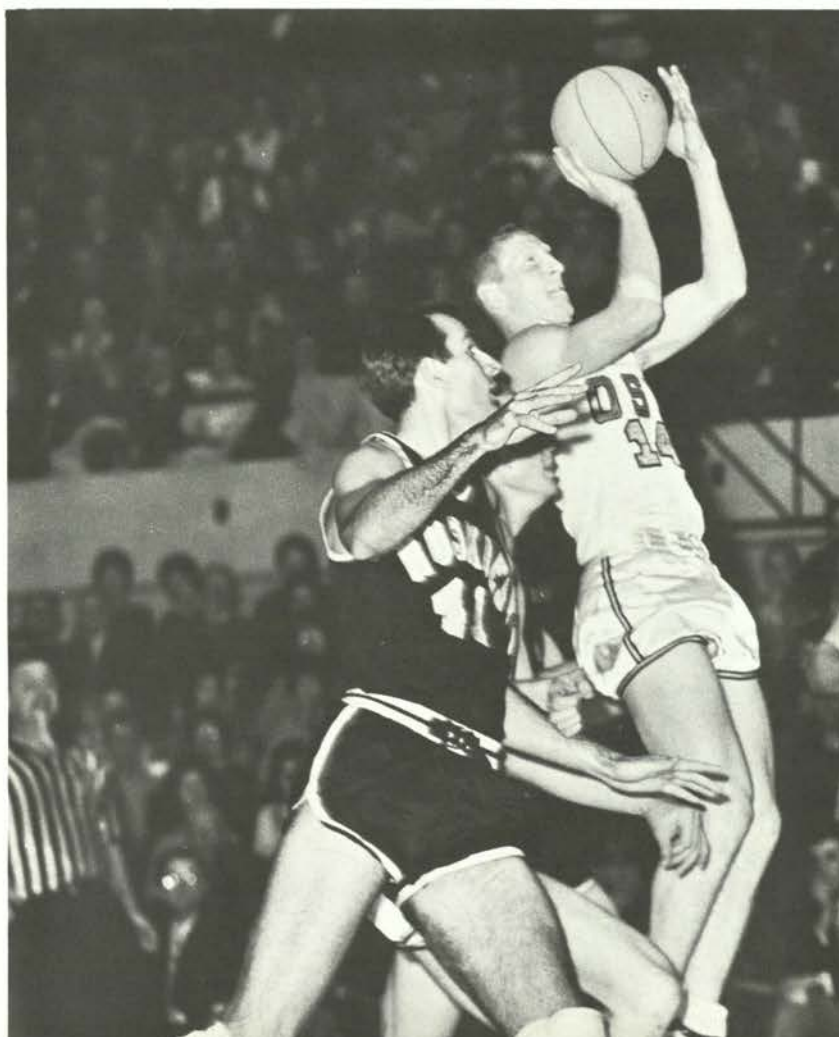
Sophomores Jarvis, Kraus, Peters Develop Fast

Inexperience didn't stop sophomores Jim Jarvis, Jim Kraus and Frank Peters from playing championship basketball. The excellence of these three is acknowledged by the fact that they were instrumental in OSU's fourth-place national finish.

Jarvis (*right*), the team's ball control expert, showed steady improvement this season. He thrilled crowds with displays of set-shot accuracy. This shot was the key to the Beavers' win over Gonzaga early in the season as Jim broke up the Bulldogs' zone defense by connecting for 18 points.

Coach Gill solved the team's need for height and rebounding with Jim Kraus (*left*). During one of the Washington State games, Jim got 12 rebounds. While not an aggressive shooter, he was often able to break away from his defender for easy lay-ins.

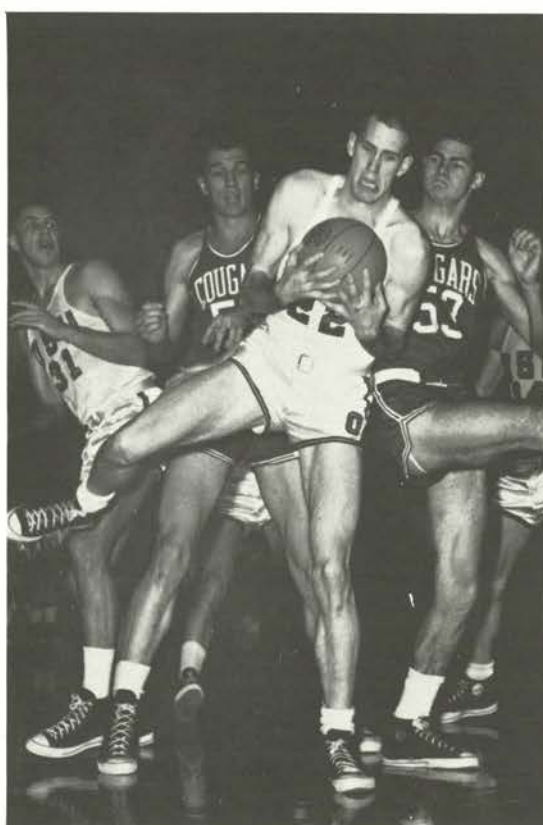
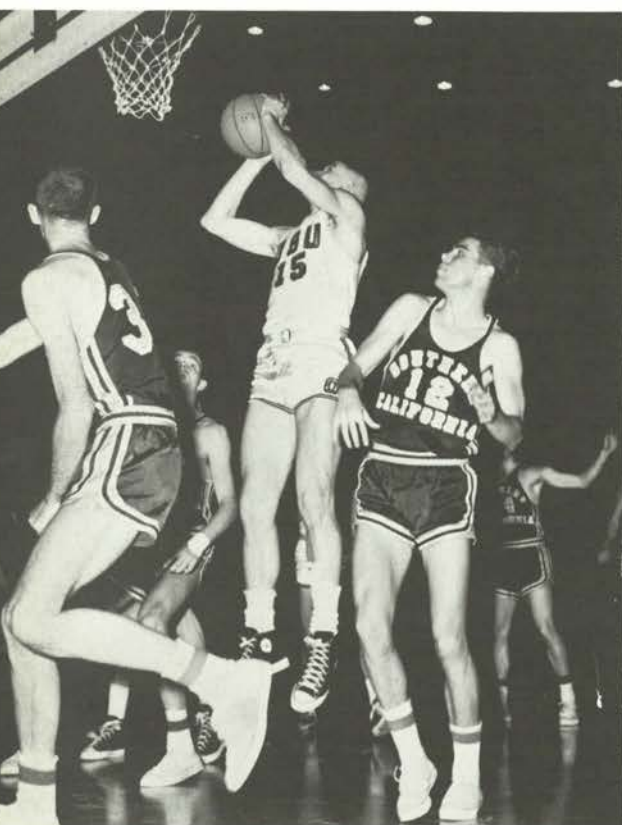
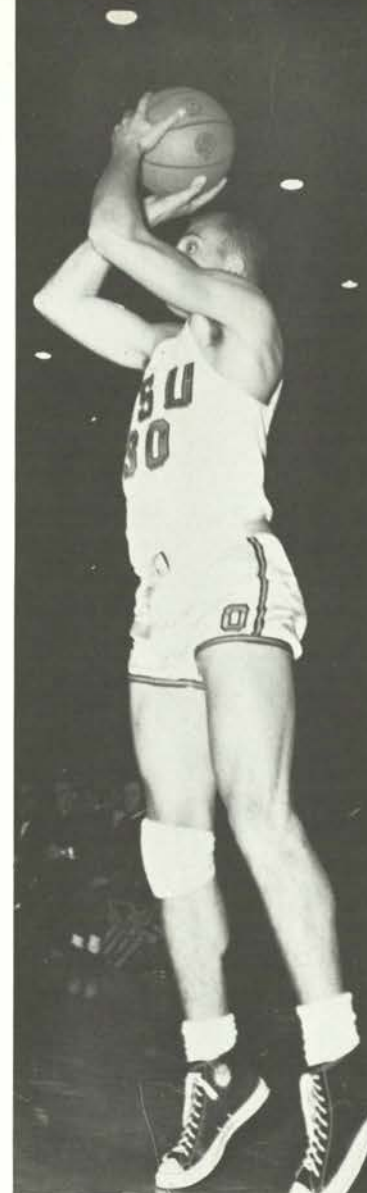
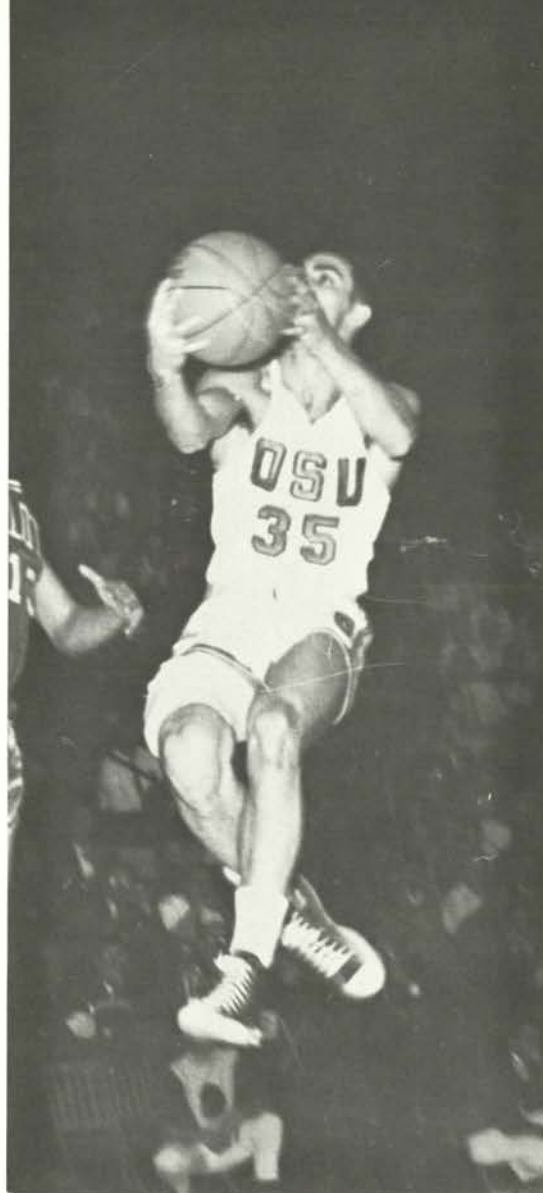

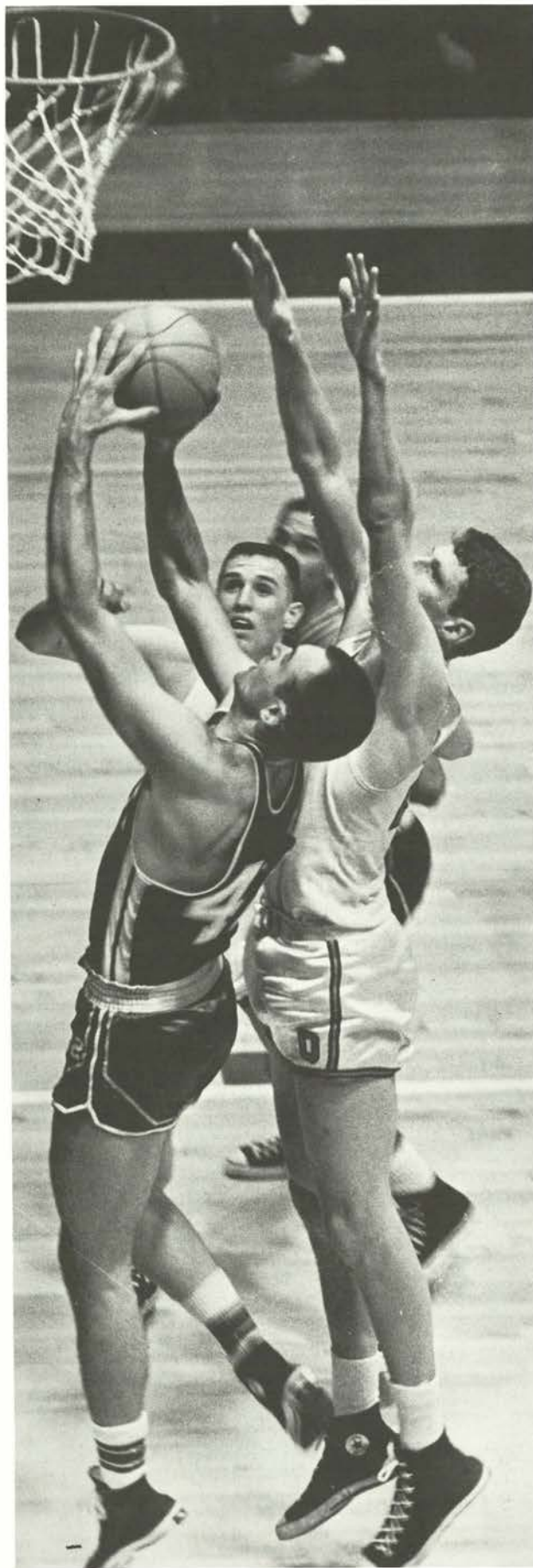
Reserves Help Beaver Cause

Oregon State's basketball team was mostly a six-man affair; however, the five so-called reserves all played important roles at one time or another during the season. Gary Rossi (*near right*) played in more games and scored more points than the other four. Gary's quickness gave him the extra step he needed to score on his typical driving lay-ins, while this same ability made him a valuable defensive player. Rex Benner (*far right*), hitting at a .444 clip, was the most accurate shooter on the team. Always playing a steady game, Ray Torgerson (*bottom left*) was the number one reserve at the season's end. Tim Campbell (*bottom center*) was an able fill-in for Mel Counts and was the leading rebounder of the reserves. Dave Hayward (*bottom right*) made a big contribution to the team in the NCAA playoff game against Seattle. Dave came off the bench in the second half to keep Eddie Miles in check for six straight minutes when it appeared that the Chieftain ace would ruin the Beavers.

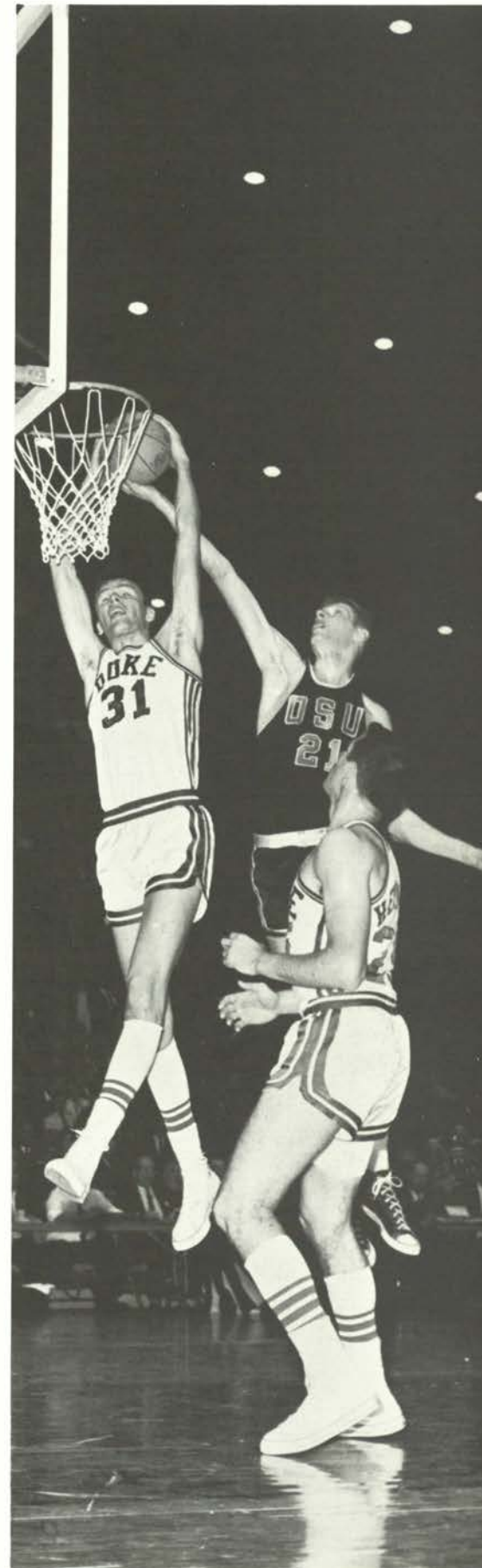
The opening round game against Seattle University at Eugene was typical of all Beaver-Chieftain meetings. The Beavers had a 35-29 halftime advantage only to have the lead melt in the early moments of the second half. As the half wore on, the game turned into a Mel Counts-Eddie Miles shootout. Counts (*far left*) poured in 30 points to Miles' 28. With Frank Peters' last-second free throw, the Beavers won the game, 70-66, and a trip to Provo.

At the Western Regionals at Provo, the Beavers were at their best. The opening game against San Francisco went down to the wire before OSU pulled out a 65-61 victory on the strength of Counts' 22 points (*shown blocking a USF shot, left*) and Terry Baker's 21. In the regional finals the Beavers pulled an upset over the nationally third-ranked Arizona State

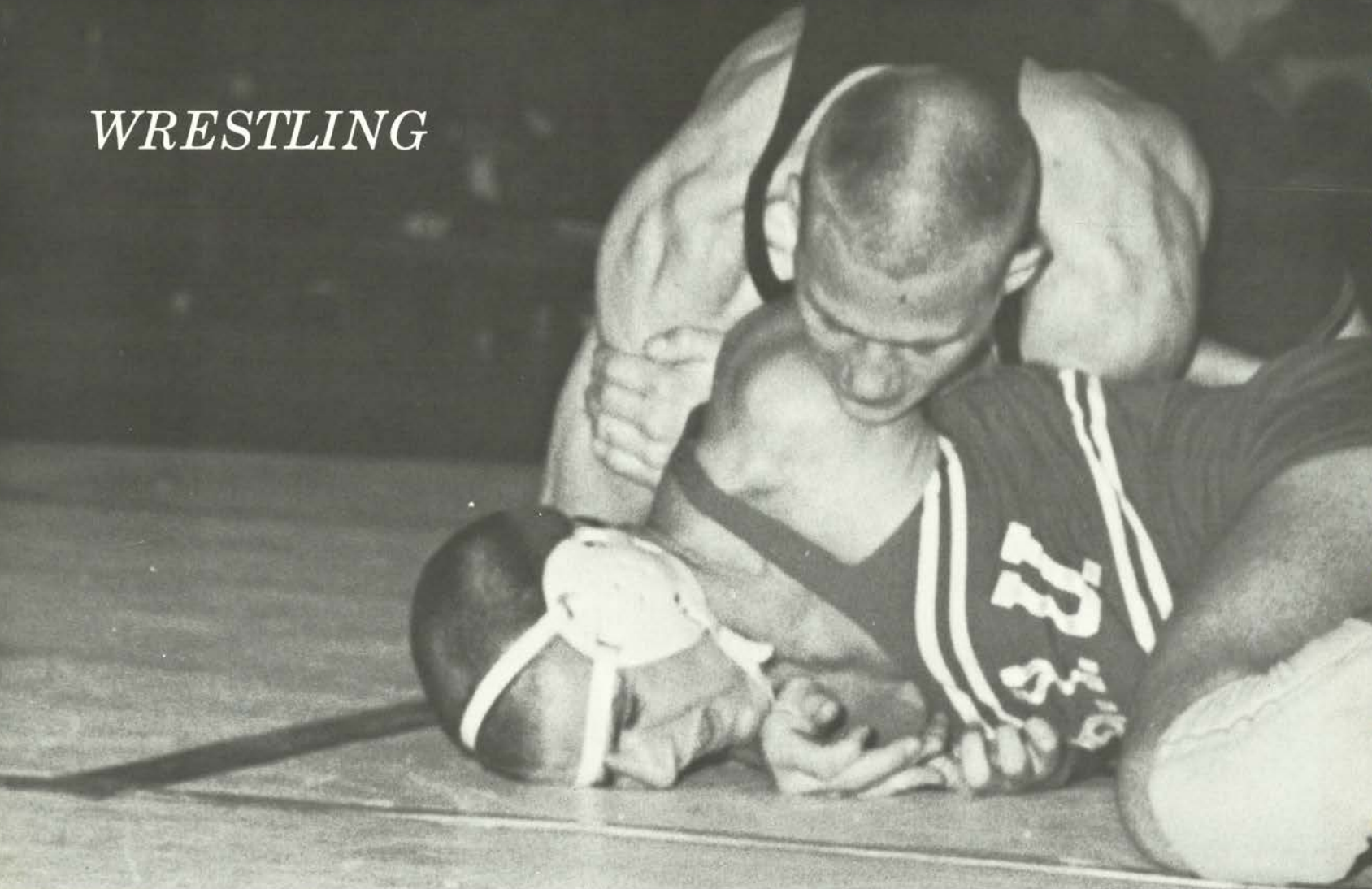


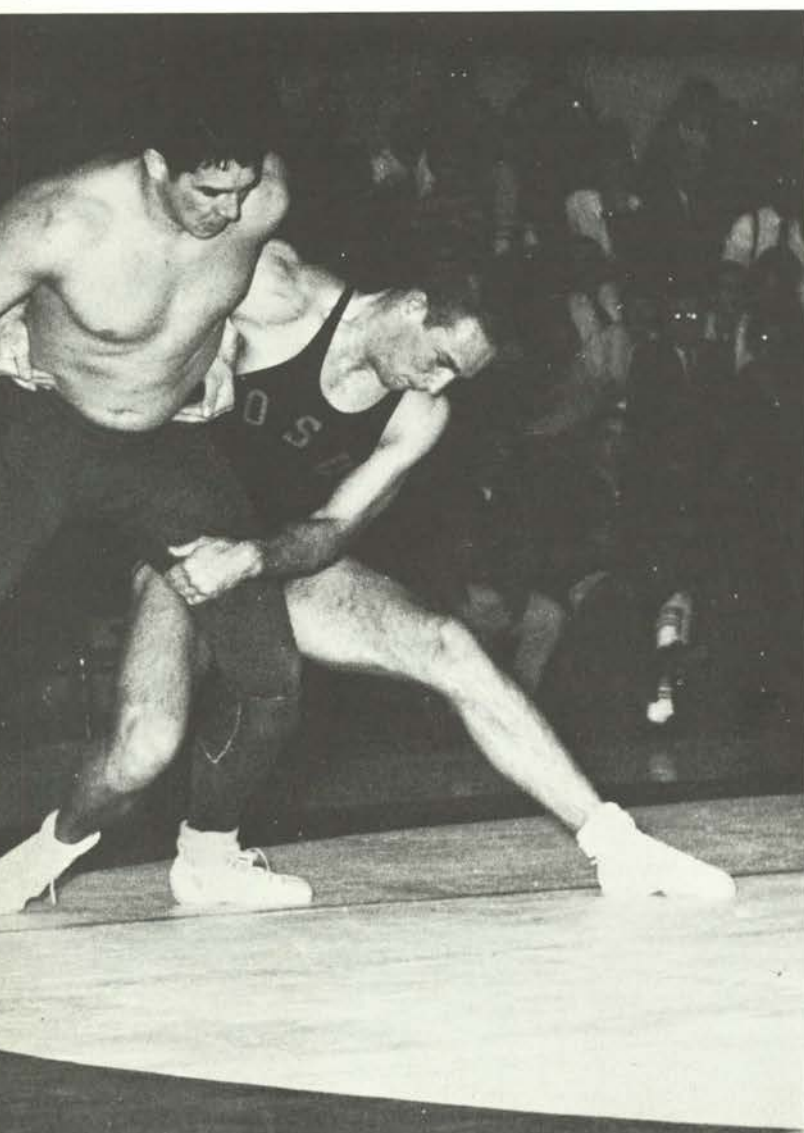
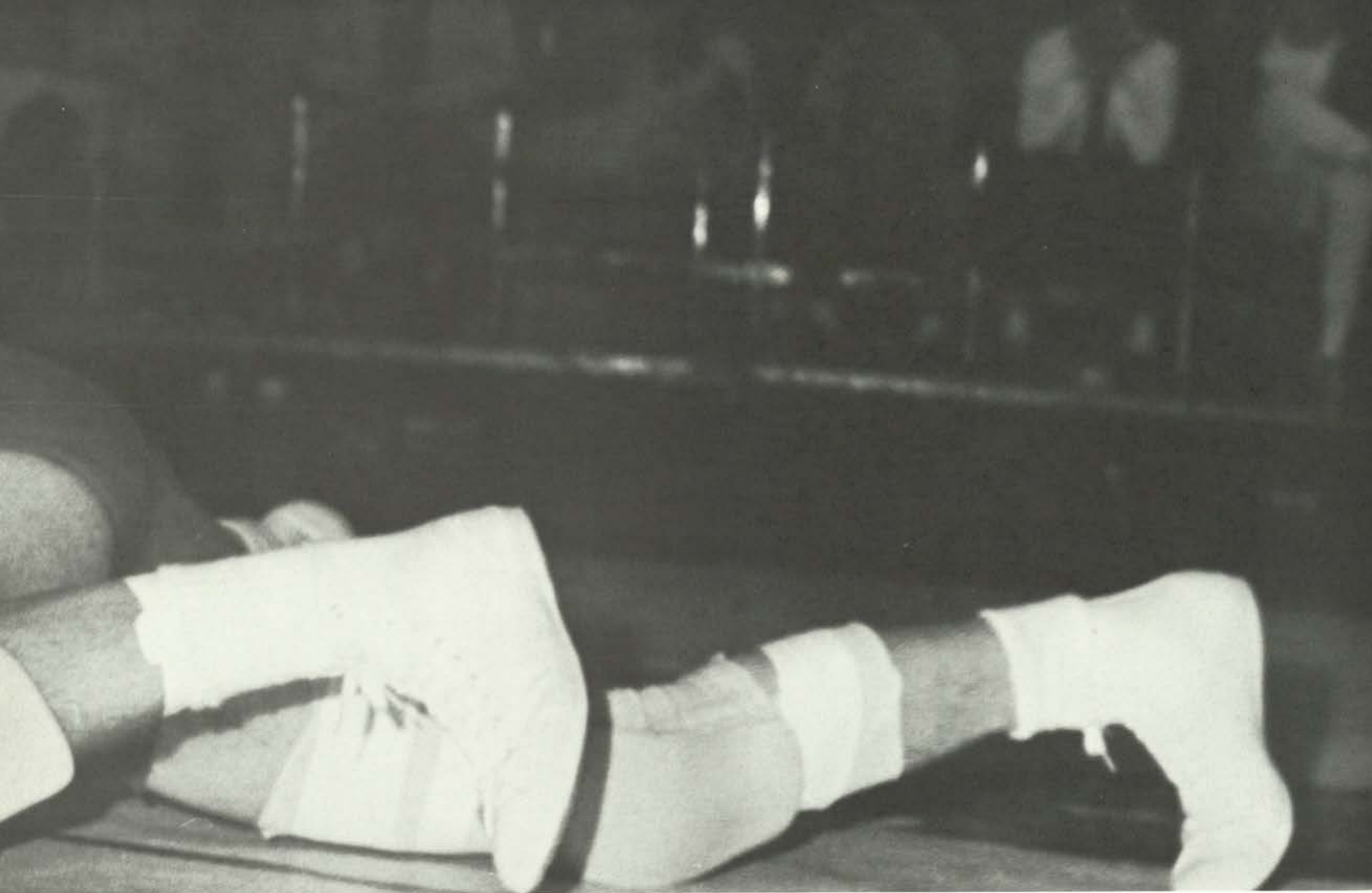
Sun Devils. Counts again led Beaver scoring with 26 points, but the key to Oregon State's victory was Steve Pauly. Steve (*in middle of excited victory huddle, above, number 31*) held the Sun Devil's main scoring threat, Joe Caldwell (*number 32, above*) to 17 points while scoring 21 himself. With Caldwell harnessed, the Beavers strolled off to Louisville with an almost unbelievable 83-65 victory and the Far West Championship. (*Provo game pictures courtesy Salt Lake DESERET NEWS*).

At Louisville the Beavers met disaster. After cutting a 15-point Cincinnati lead to 1 in the second half, the Beavers, stymied by the nationally first-ranked Bearcats' tight defense (*right*), hit a cold spot and fouled themselves out of the ball game, 80-46. In the second game of the tournament, nationally 2nd-ranked Duke took an early lead and despite Counts' 26 points (*far right*), the Blue Devils fast broke to a 85-63 victory.

Sophomores Help Team Win Fifth PCI Crown

At the beginning of the season if anyone had suggested Oregon State would have the best wrestling team on the coast, few people would have believed him. Yet, with only one senior on the squad, the Beavers finished the season with a 14-2 record and won their fifth consecutive Pacific Coast Intercollegiate Wrestling Championship at Ashland. After dropping an early match to Portland State, it looked as if the team's severe inexperience, with six sophomores, was going to kill any chances of defending its PCI crown. Improving with every match, the team hit its peak on a California trip in late January. Coach Dale Thomas said of his grapplers, "This is my seventh year at OSU and never have I had a squad that showed more desire and hustle than this group." It should also be added that it is a great tribute to Coach Thomas that his team developed so quickly.

Sophomores Len Kauffman (*above*) and Mason Fries (*left*) proved to be the most consistent wrestlers. Kauffman (167 lbs.) who took a PCI crown at 191 lbs., won six of seven matches, including five pins. Fries (191 lbs.) pinned four men in winning eleven of fifteen matches and gained the PCI runner-up heavyweight title. Lee Rosenberg (*far left*) started slow but improved rapidly to win the 157 lb. PCI championship and finish with an 11-3-1 record.

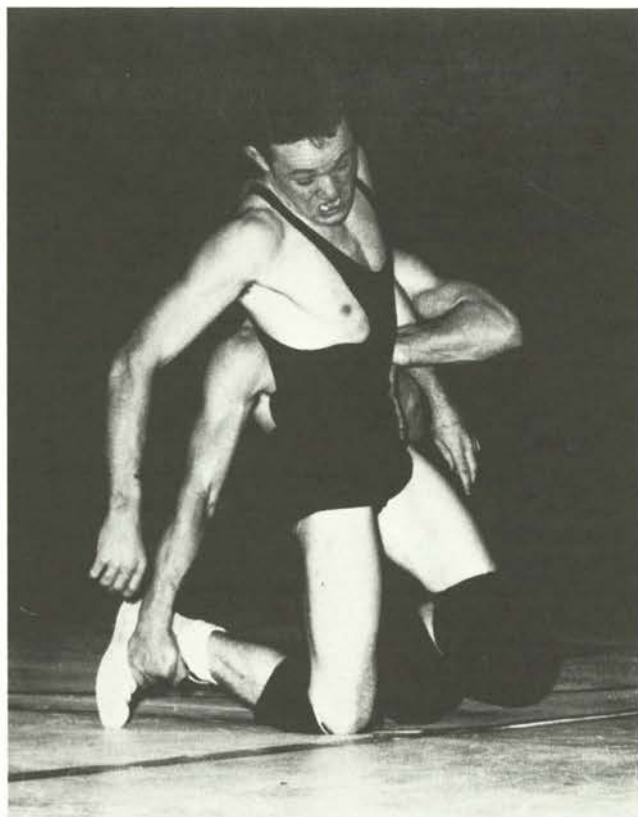


The improvement of lightweights Gayle Greenfield (*below*), Gary Head (*left*) and John Isenhardt (*below, right*) marked the team's progress. The three sophomores, wrestling at 123, 130 and 137 respectively, averaged six losses apiece; however, these were mostly accumulated in early matches. They finished so well that Greenfield and Head gained second places in the PCI tournament while Isenhardt finished third. Steve Strader (147 lbs.) lost only one regular season match and took a fourth in the PCI championship. Gary Scott lost three of fourteen matches and finished with a third in the PCI 177-lb. class.

Oregon State's rifle team is unfortunately relatively unknown — unfortunately because it is one of the best such teams in the nation. In 1962, three freshmen (*below, left to right*): Pat Kaufmann, Allen Bates and Alan Dapp, and one sophomore, Ed Hausafus (*left*), won the sectional championship from Washington, Idaho, Montana, Alaska and Oregon and went on to win the National Championship, defeating such teams as Annapolis and West Point. This year after some 20 postal matches, the same four again took the sectional championship and were awaiting the results of the Nationals.

Rifle match scores are the accumulative scores of the four members of the team. Each man shoots at 30 targets, 10 in a prone, 10 in a kneeling and 10 in a standing position. Ten points are awarded for hitting an eighth-inch bull's-eye, thereby making a possible 300 points per man and 1200 points per team. The OSU 1962 National Championship team scored 1170 points, while it shot 1157 at this year's regionals.

"Fastest Team" Breaks Records

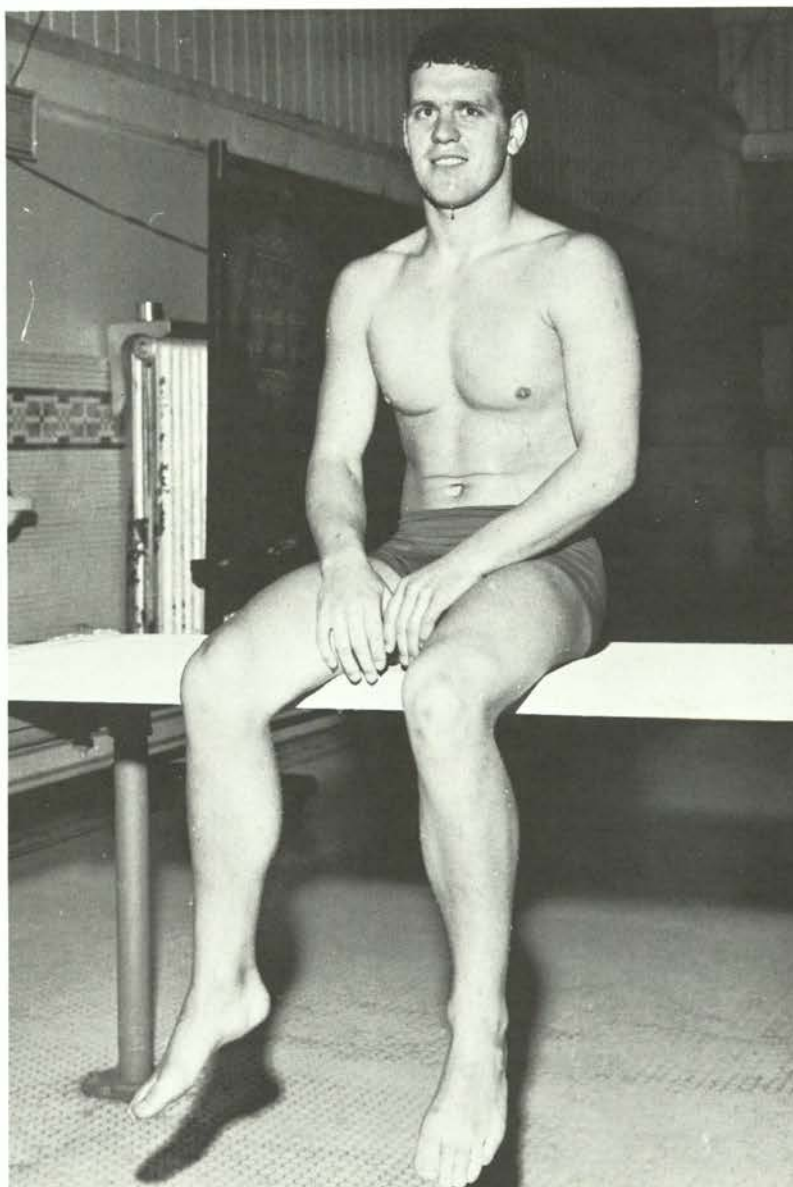
According to Coach Bill Winkler, the 1963 Beaver swimming team was definitely the fastest team in the school's history.

The team set 14 varsity records out of a possible 15 events. OSU won four dual meets compared to five losses against stiff competition and captured third place in the fastest Far West Conference championships ever held.

This success is a result of the team's great desire coupled with outstanding individual performances. The top swimmer, Klaas Schenk, broke both school and conference records in the 100 and 200-yard breaststroke. He was a conference all-star and qualified for all-American honors in the 100 breast. The team's leading scorer, Dave Maxwell, set varsity records in the 200-yard butterfly, the 200-yard individual medley and was a part of the record-breaking 400-yard medley relay. Both Schenk and Maxwell represented OSU at the National Collegiate Championships at the end of March. Robin Harrison is a varsity record holder in the 100 and 200-yard backstroke and won Far Western Conference all-star honors in the 100-yard back. Rick Hood, a free-style sprinter, set varsity records in the 66 and 100-yard races. Both he and Ken Ackles were part of the record breaking 400-yard relay.

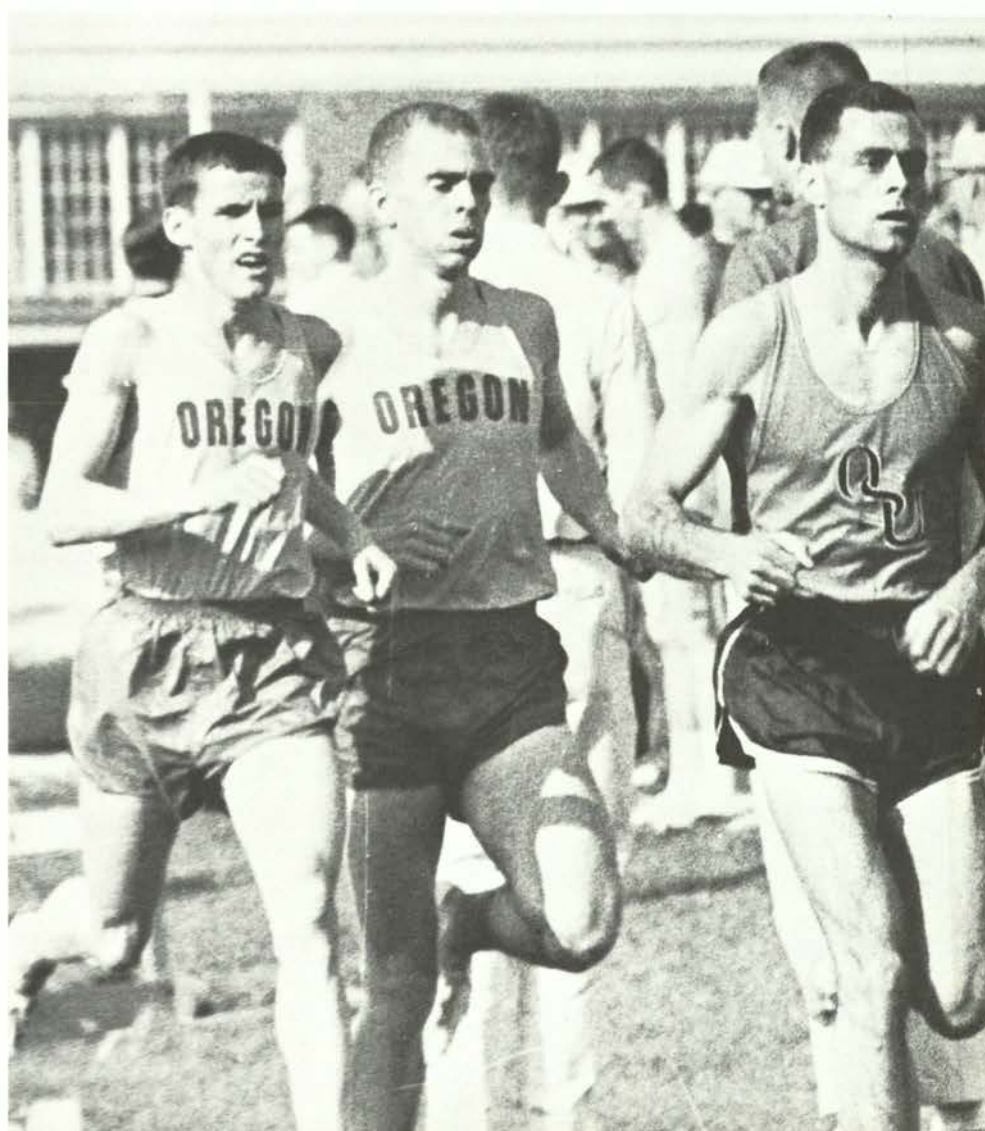
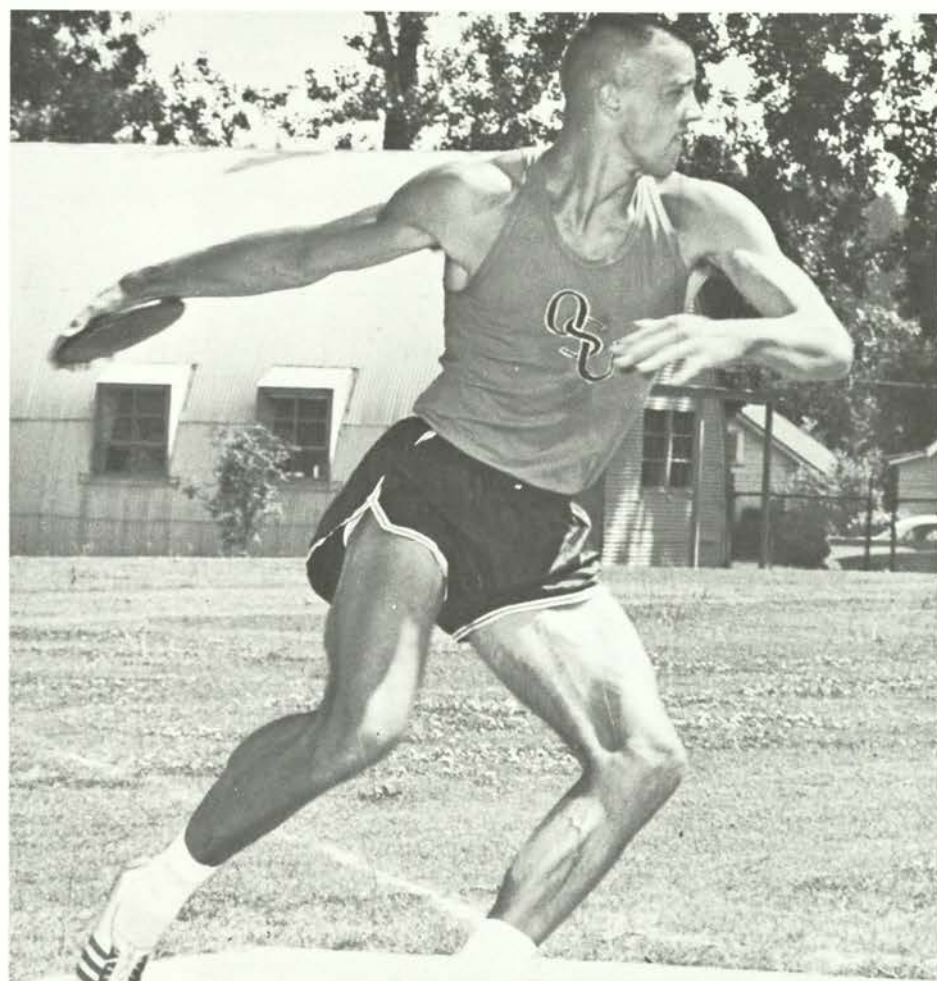
Quarter-milers Pace Runners

Spearheaded by an outstanding group of quarter-milers, the 1962 Beaver track machine relied heavily on their running event men. Lynn Eves (46.7), John Ball (48.3), Gary Comer (47.5), Bob Johnson (46.7) and Norm Monroe (47.1) formed the fastest quintet of 440 men on one team in America as they swept all places in a majority of the dual meets. In the NCAA meet, Monroe managed an 8th-place finish.

Eves also led the corps of sprinters at OSU. Posting times of 9.6 in the 100 and 21.0 in the 220, Lynn pulled other dash men Tom Boswell (9.7 and 21.5) and Comer (21.8) to good times. Frank Marsh set an OSU record in the 120-yard high hurdles with a 14.1 clocking and also ran 23.4 in

the lows and 52.6 in the 440-yard intermediates. Steve Pauly (pg. 254) backed Frank up with a 14.2 high hurdle time.

Beaver distance men paced by Dale Story (pg. 255), Jerry Brady and Bill Boyd proved to be a tough bunch to beat. Story set either meet, OSU or national records in almost every meet he entered. Jerry Brady, ranging from the half mile to the 3-mile, clocked excellent times throughout the season. His 1:52.2 half-mile time led the 880 men and his 4:10.5 mile and 14:08.5 3-mile were not far behind the leaders. Bill Boyd helped the Beaver cause with a 13:59 3-mile clocking while his twin brother Bob ran well enough to qualify in the NCAA Steeplechase.



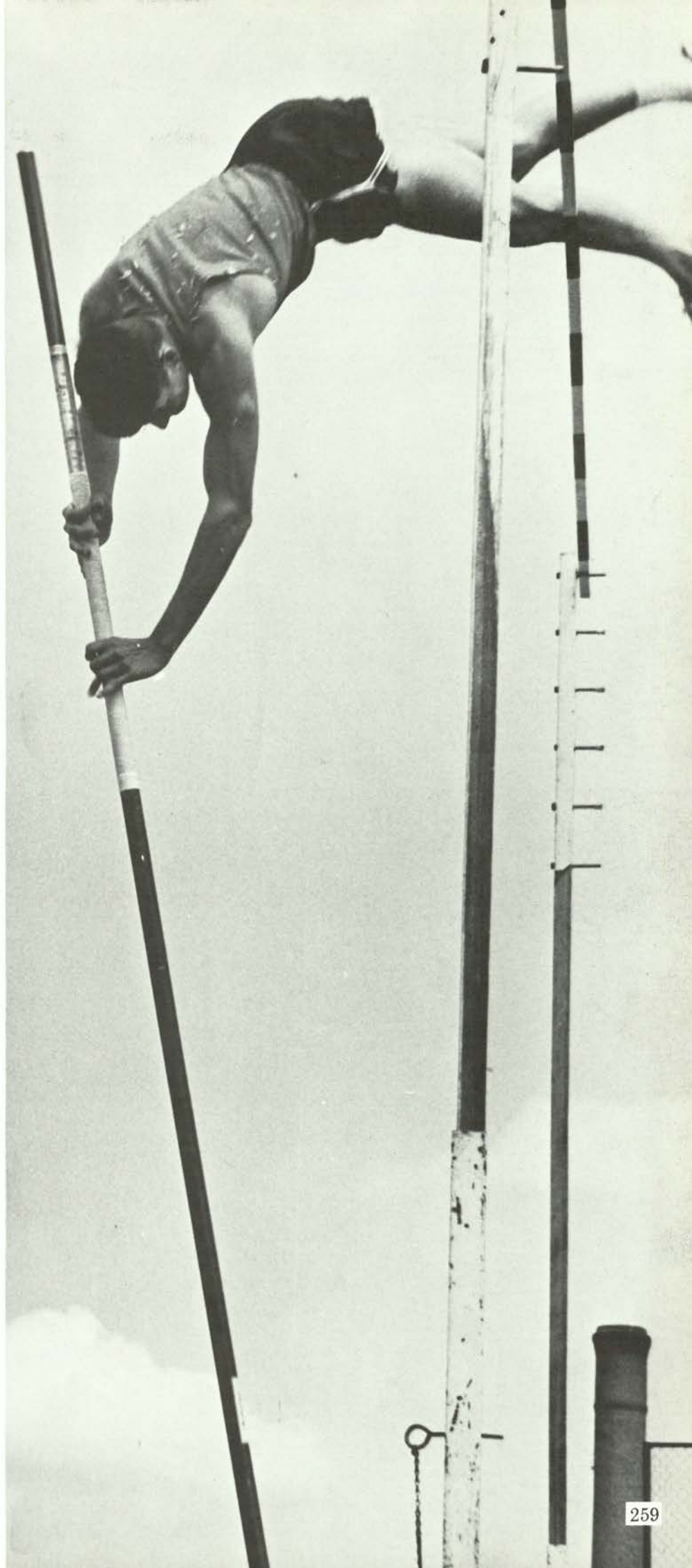
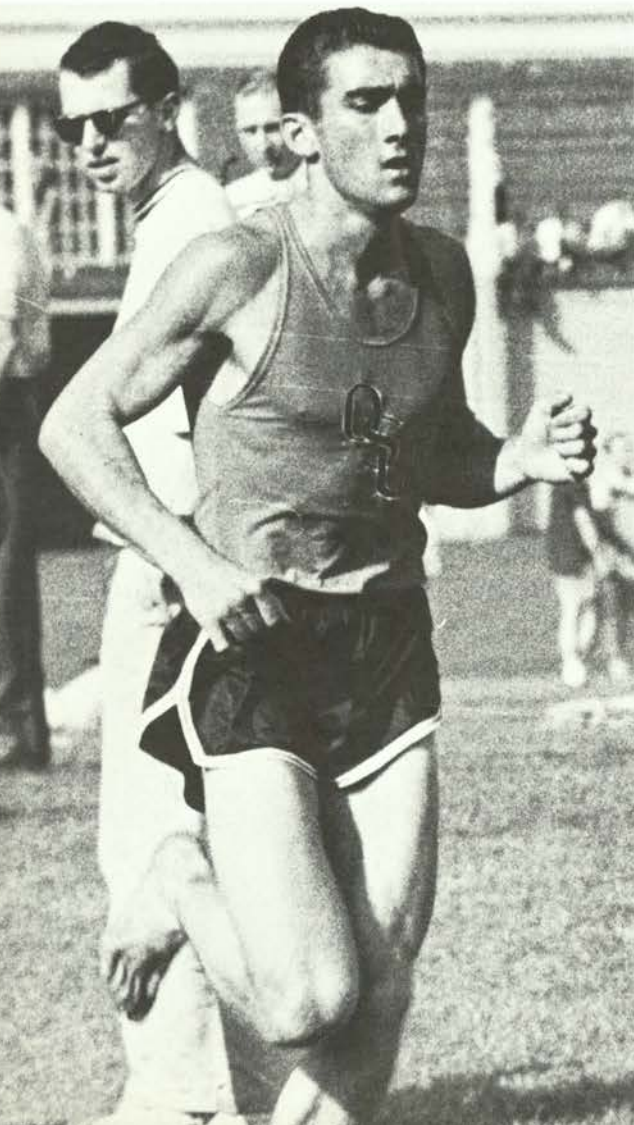
Pauly Gains Berth Against Russians

Versatile Steve Pauly (left) ran, threw, jumped and vaulted himself onto the US team which faced Russia last summer. Against the USSR, Steve combined the skills which helped the Beaver track team during the season (14.2—high hurdles, 154'11½"—discus and 232'11"—javelin) into a 7174 point effort and a 3rd place in the 10-event decathlon.

Gary Stenlund led the OSU javelin men with a 233'5" heave and pole vaulted 14'8". Jerry Betz, pressed by Stenlund's challenge, vaulted up to an OSU record of 14'10" (right).

Dale Story (below), the bare-footed NCAA Cross Country champion, ran his way into both OSU and national record books and was named to the All-American team. Dale posted an OSU mark of 4:03.4 in the mile and established a collegiate record in the 3-mile with a 13:37.5 time. He capped his season with a third-place finish in the NCAA 3-mile.

Sparked by quarter-milers Eves, Comer (far left, top) Johnson and Monroe (far left, bottom), the Beaver mile relay team sped to a new OSU mark of 3:07.6 and in a sprint medley at the California Relays, relayed the mile distance in a new collegiate time of 3:17.7.







BASEBALL

Sixth-Ranked Beavers Win Northern Division Title

As the nationally 6th-ranked 1962 Beaver baseball team headed south for its NCAA regional series, it could look back on what was one of the most successful years in OSU baseball history. With an awesome display of power, it swept undefeated through its 15 pre-season foes and compiled an 11-4 record in league play to capture its 7th Northern Division title. Although the Beavers lost two straight to eventual NCAA runner-up Santa Clara in the regionals, the Sportswriters and Coaches of America still voted the Beavers 12th in the nation.

Coach Ralph Coleman's Beavers went into the season with "one of the most inexperienced OSU teams in years" but soon showed they intended to play good baseball. Sparked by the hitting of Brian Bailey and Dave Long and the pitching of Cecil Ira, Jim Falk and Steve Clark, the Beavers set an OSU consecutive wins record of 18 straight. After an 8-4 loss to Idaho, the Beavers settled down to their quest of the Northern Division title. Doug Stahl, Al Lehrer and Dave Hayward supplied the firepower and Ira the pitching in this stretch drive.

Lehrer gained recognition on the Northern Division All Star team while Ira, compiling an 11-1 regular season record, was honored with positions on the Northern Division, Far West and 3rd All-American teams.

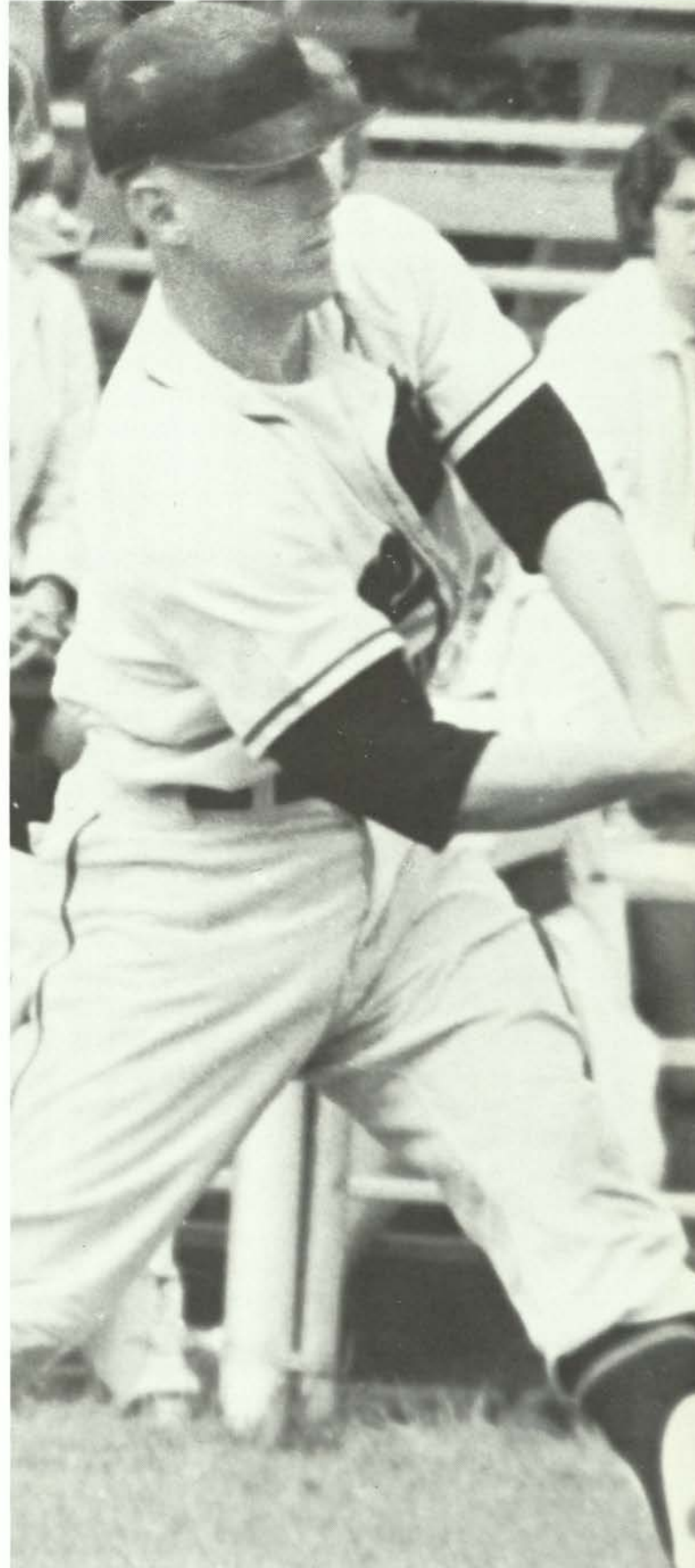

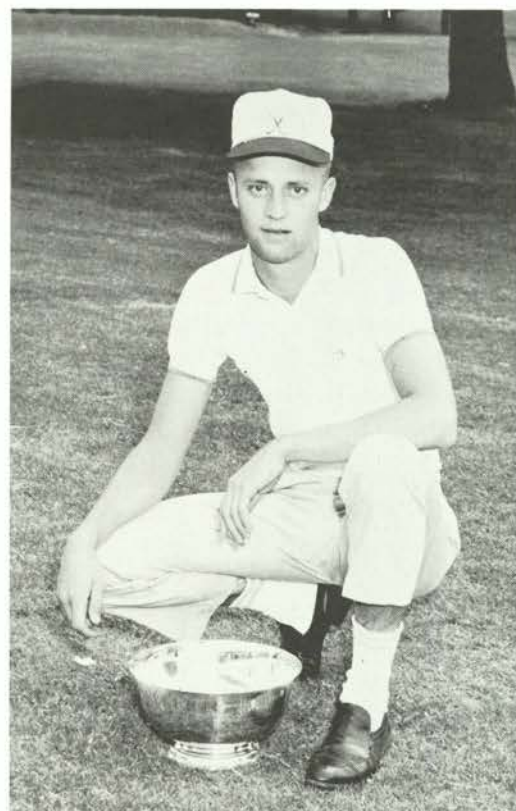
Beavers Place Fifth In Western Intercollegiate

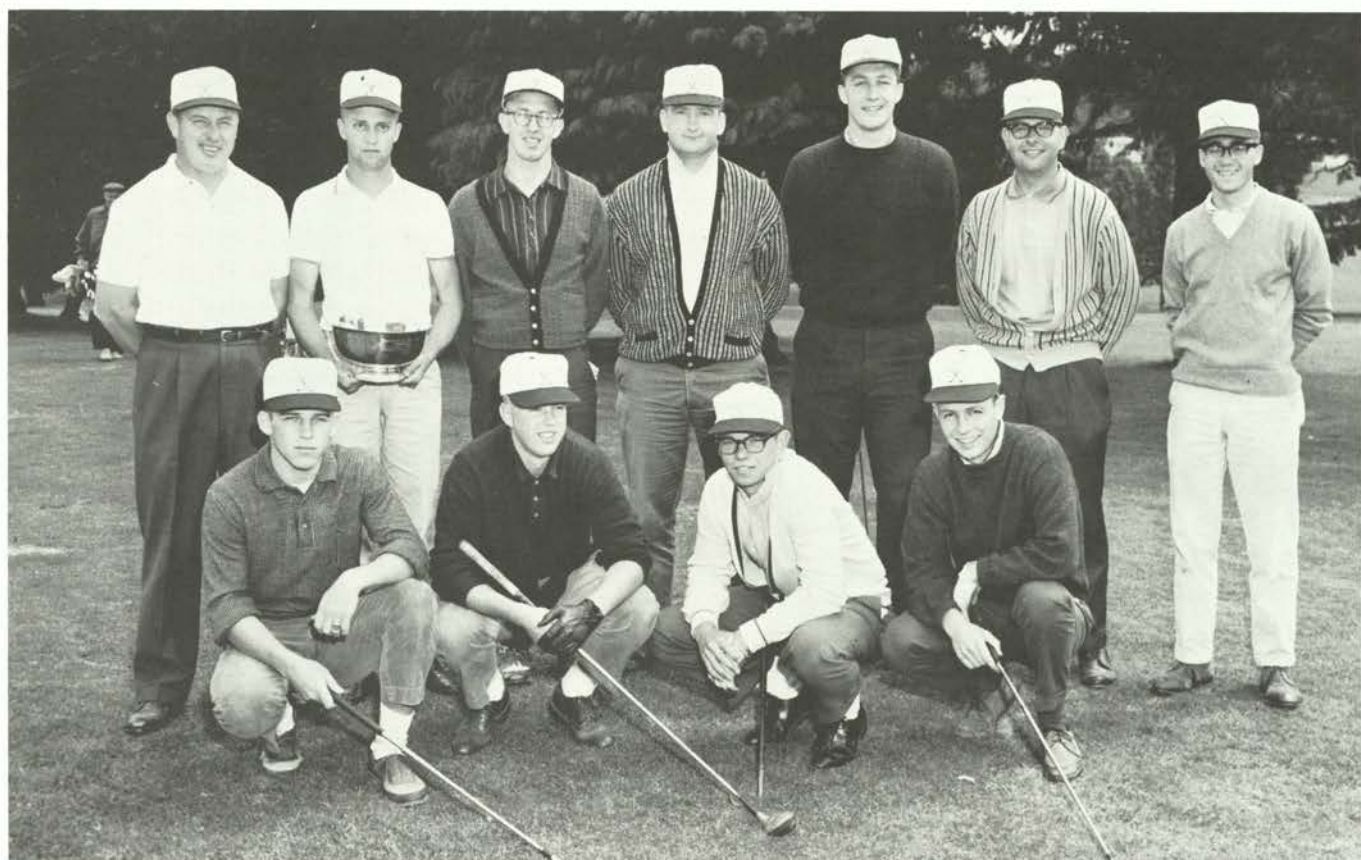

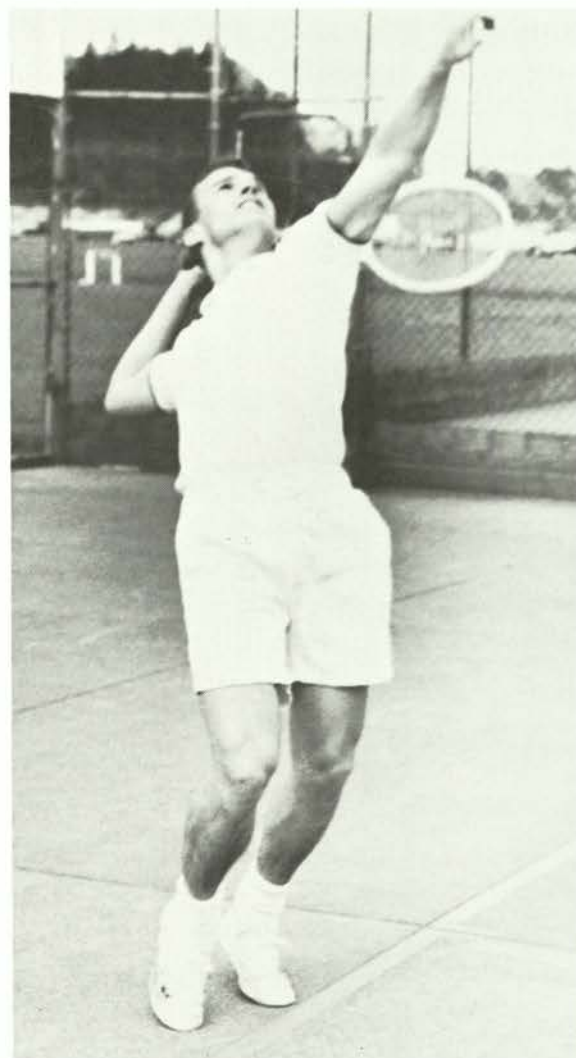
OSU Is Far West Champ

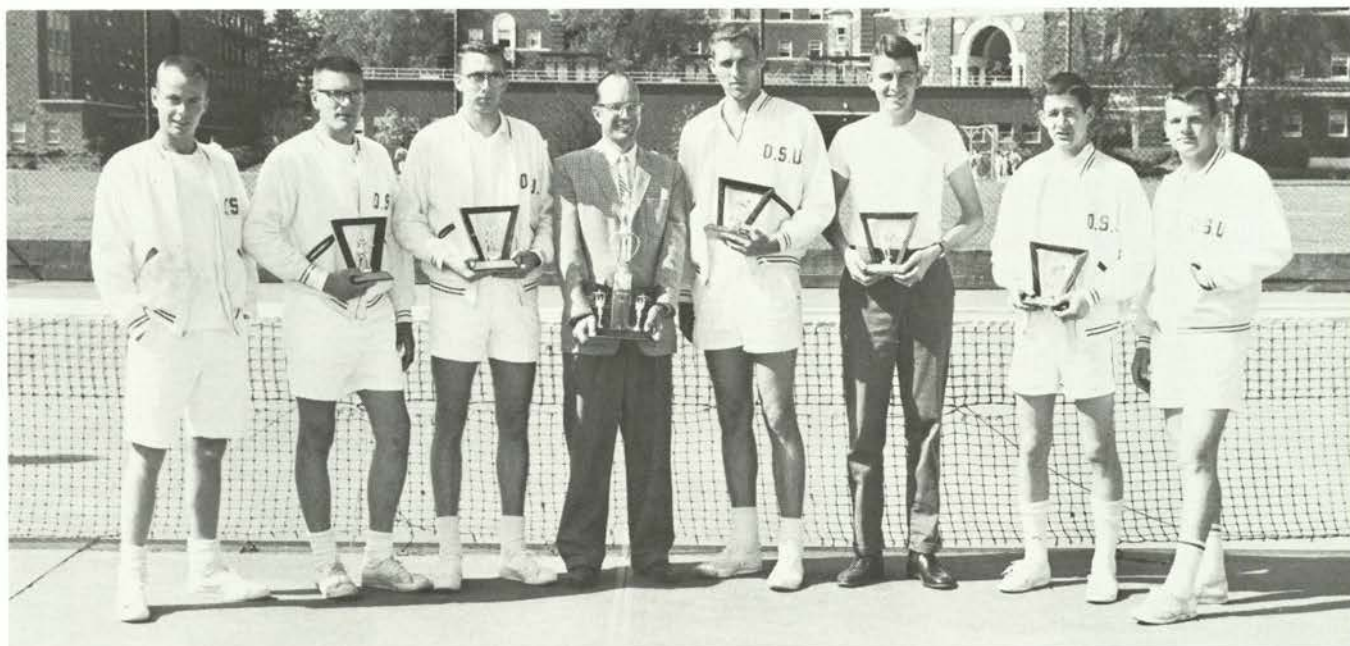

Track

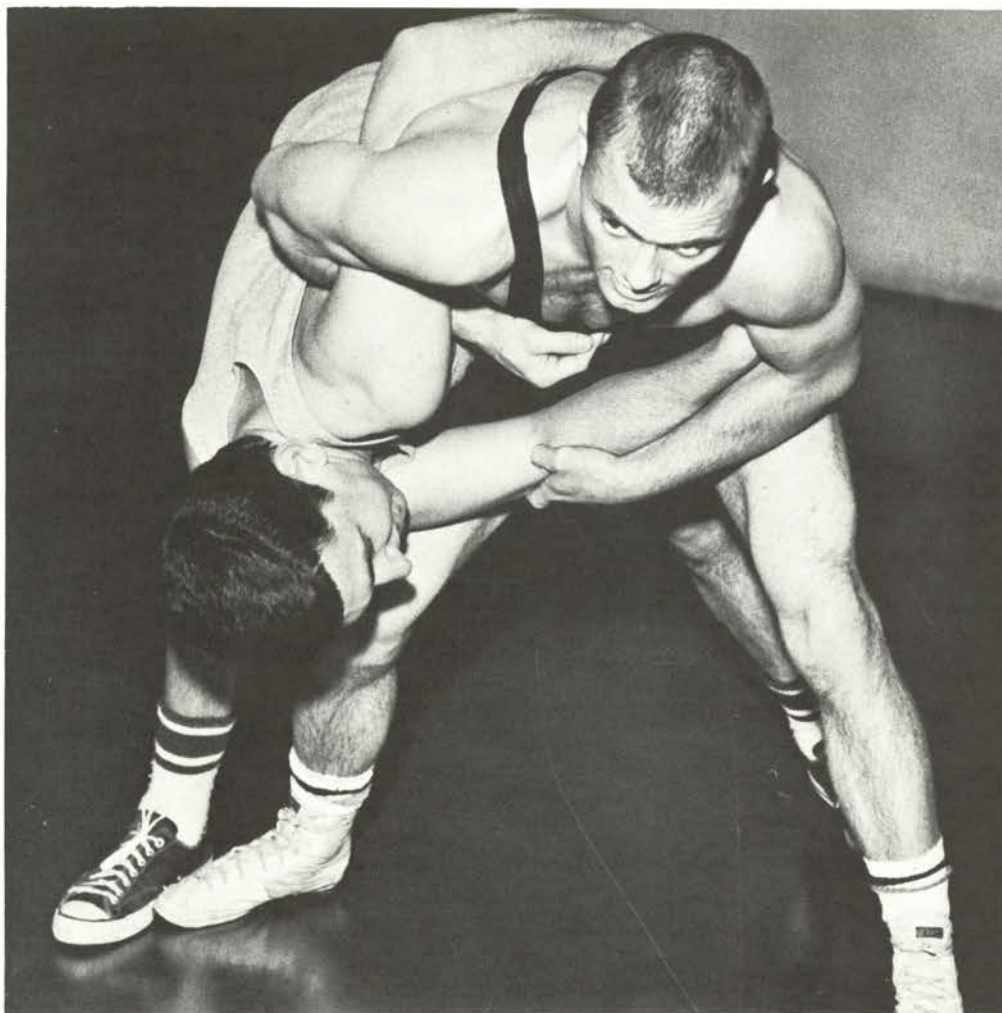

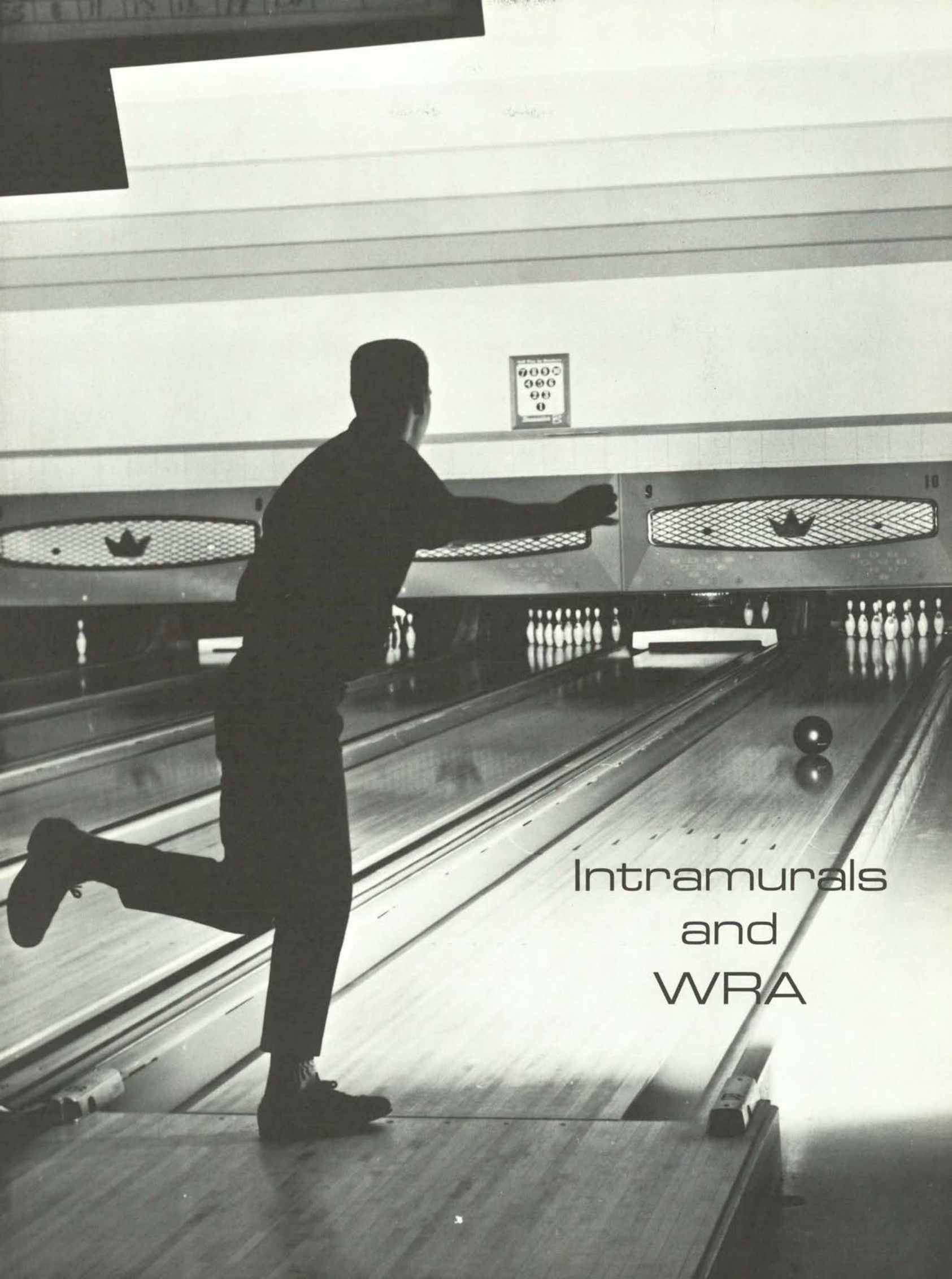
Cross-Country

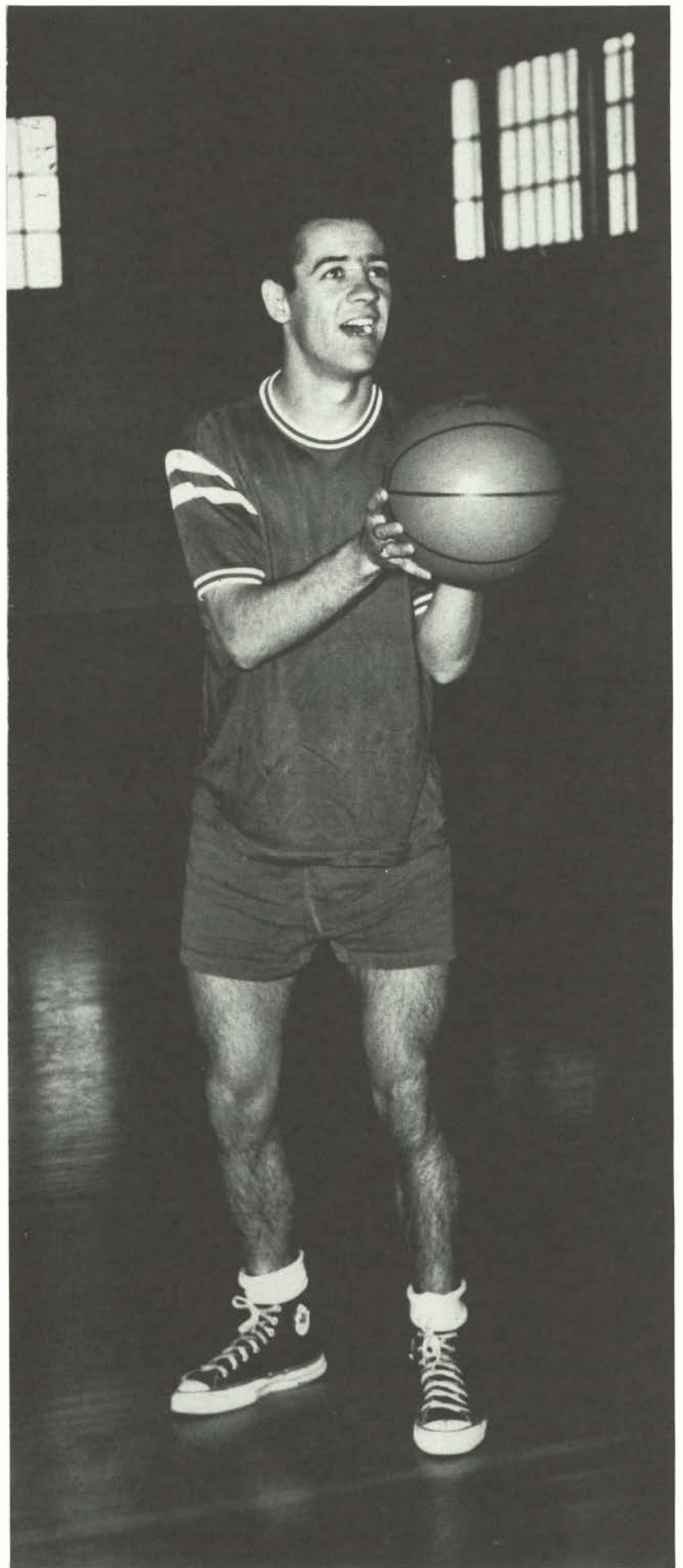
Football

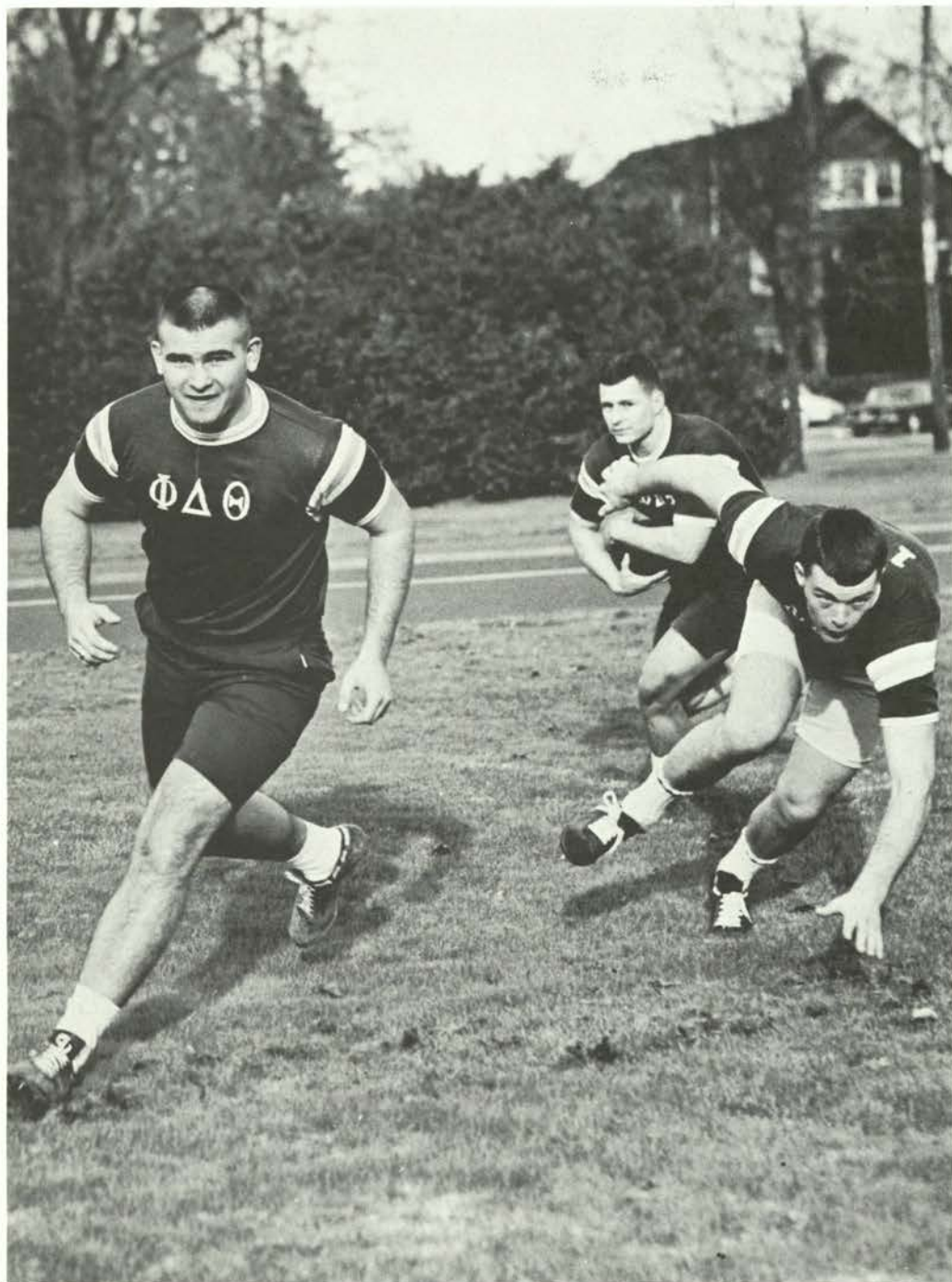

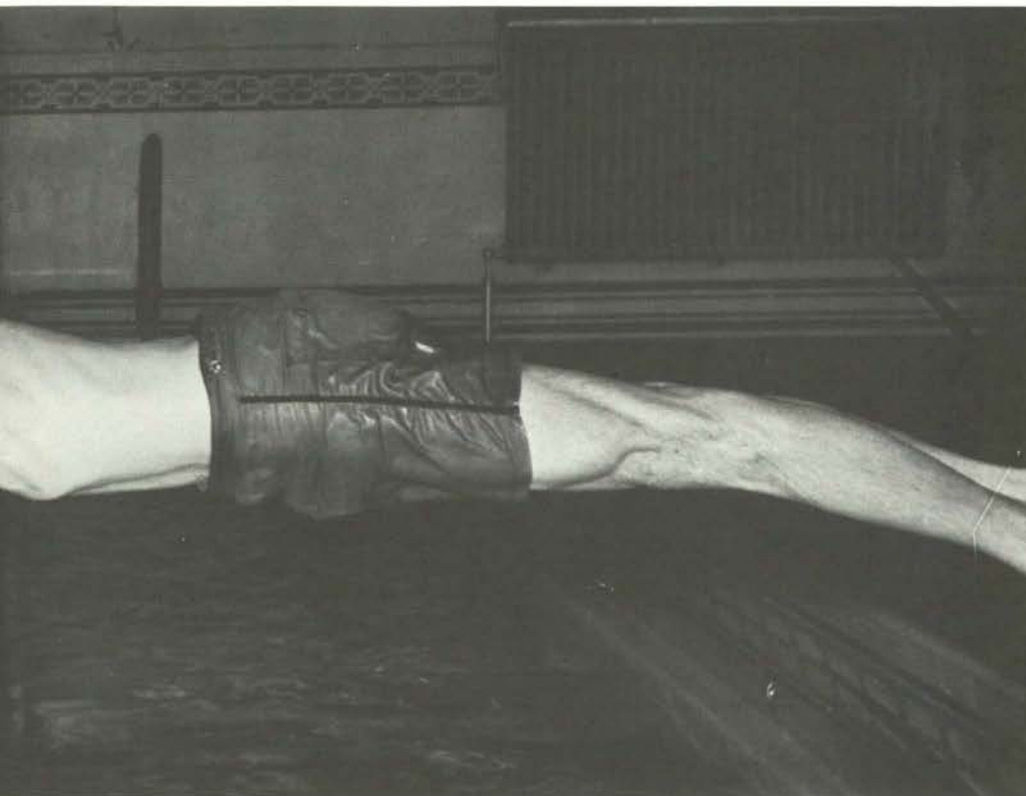

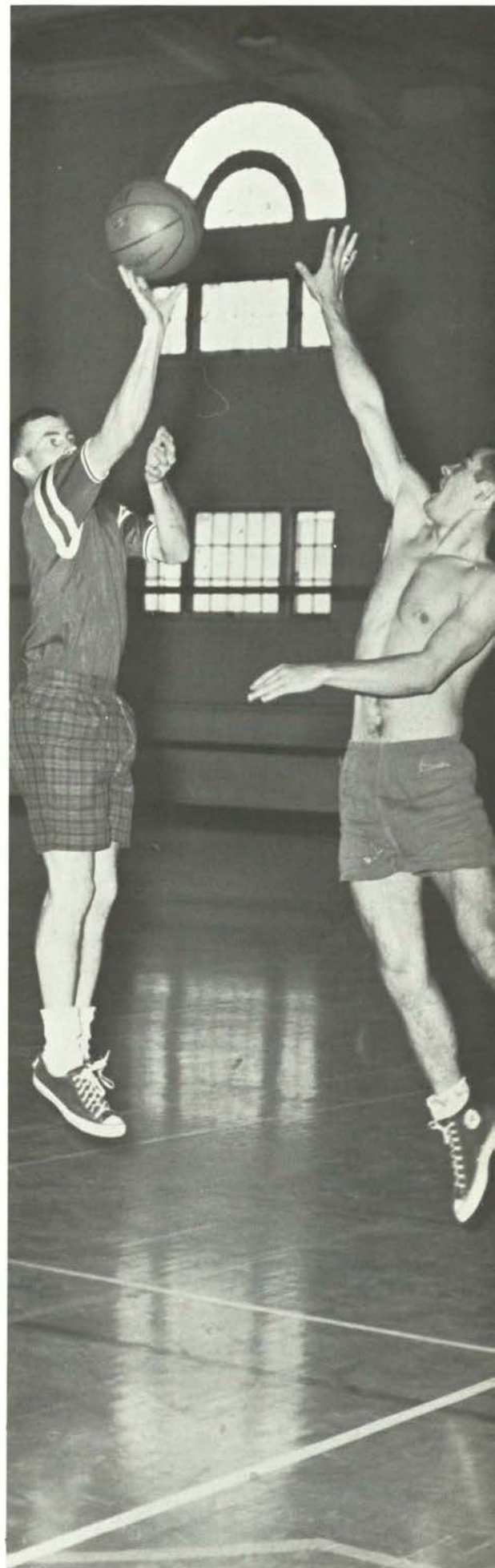

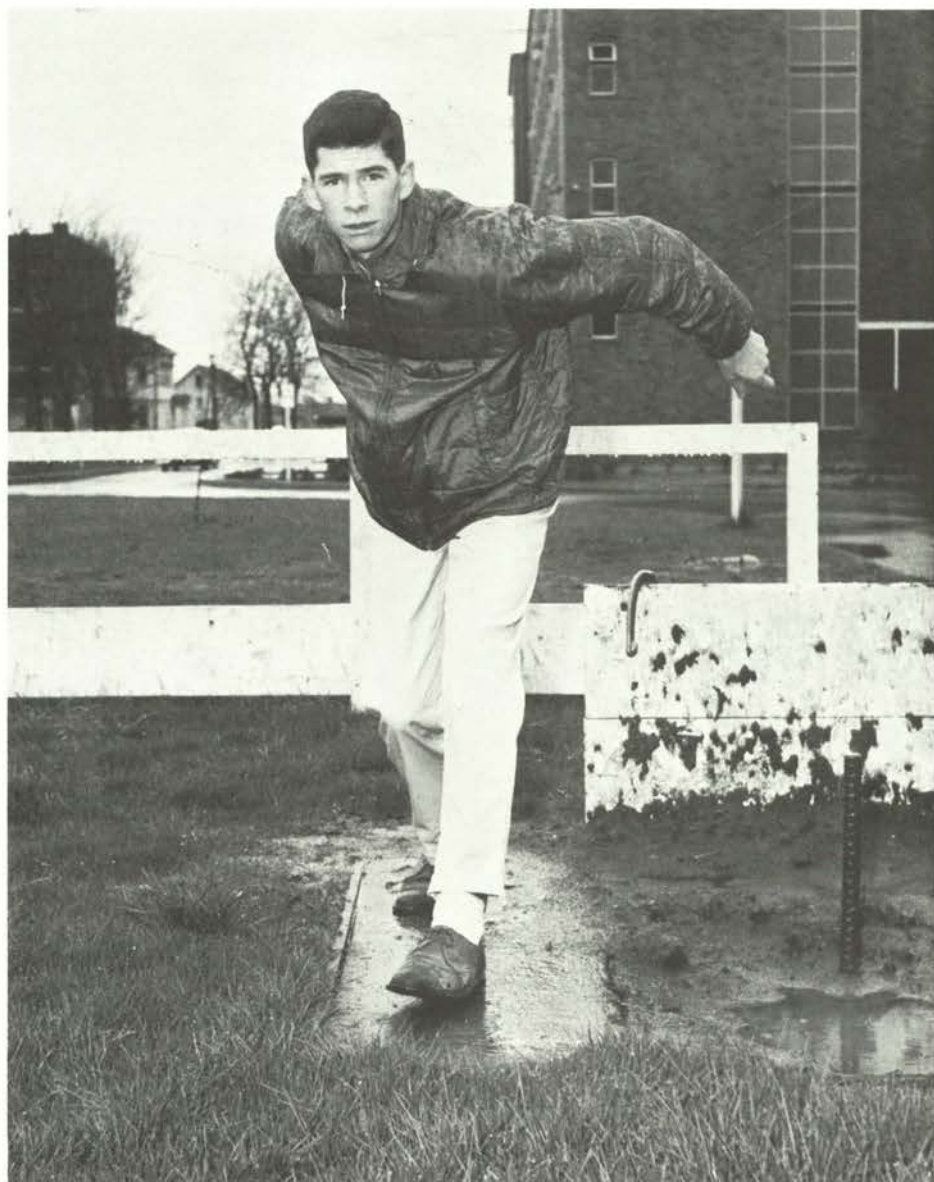

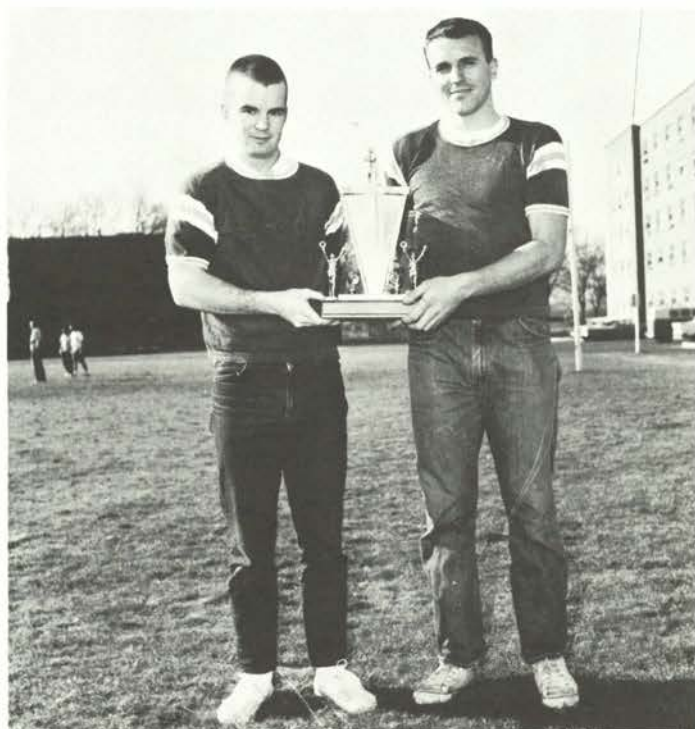

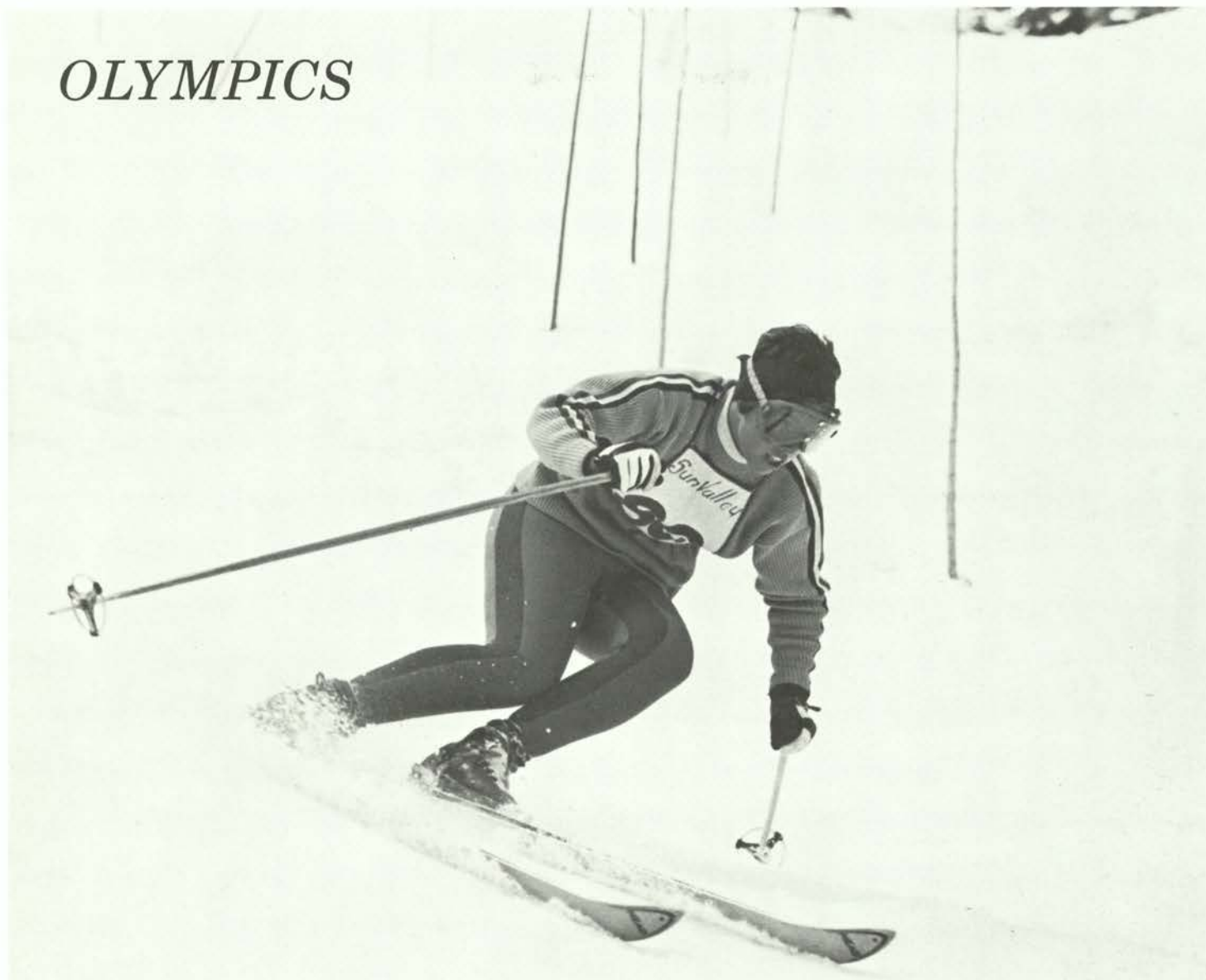

Jean rose to the challenge as she streaked through the slalom gates in 2:16 and defeated her conqueror of the week before, Miss Hanneberger. "It went pretty well," was Jean's statement after the race. It was quite an understatement from the United State's best woman skier and Oregon State's Olympic performer, Jean Saubert.

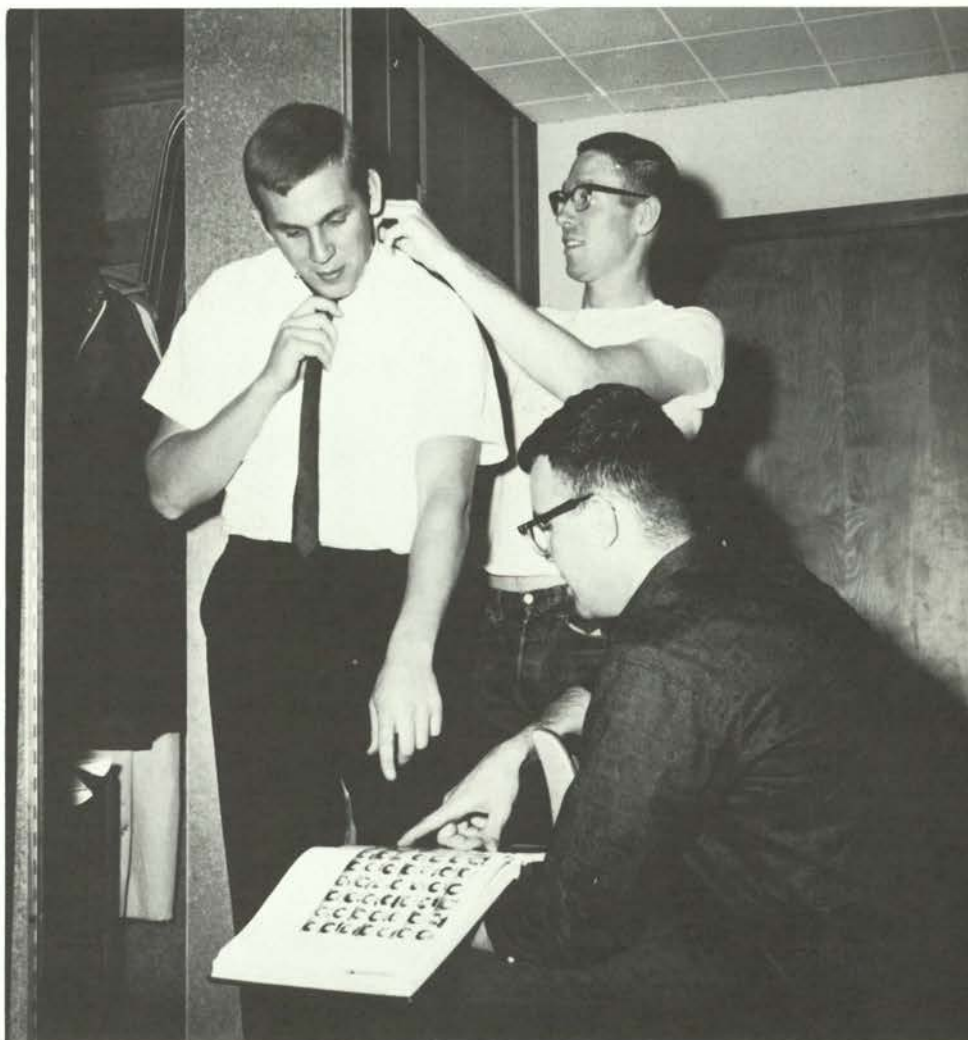
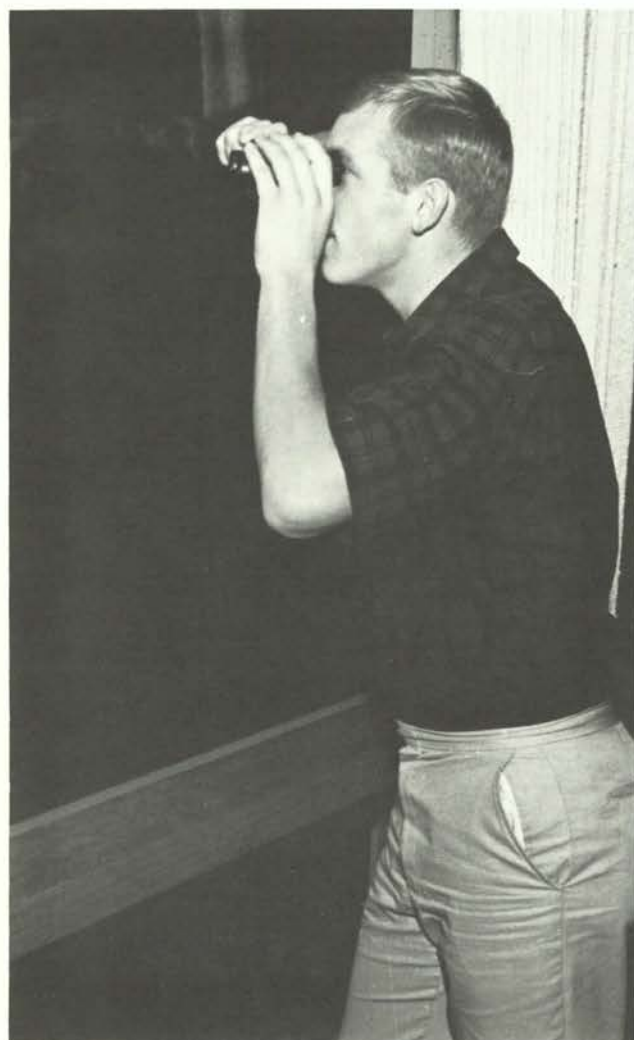
Entering college . . . piles of textbooks stiff and unopened, mazes of blank forms at registration, strange brick buildings with confusing names and desks and gray-haired professors . . . and new living quarters. Dorm and coop lounges lose their sterile appearance, fill with quiet talk on couches, frantic goodnights at 10:25. Roommates become old friends, visit each other during vacations. They make fudge or popcorn with girls on the same dorm floor or sing around the fire with others in the coop . . . and they can't remember when they were strangers, brushing elbows in the mass of new students . . .



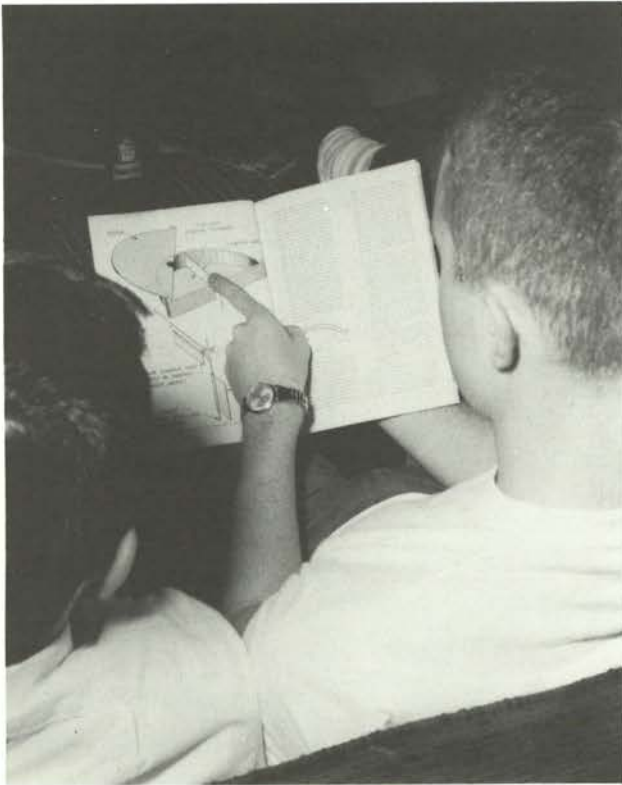




A day in the life of a fraternity man exemplifies Greek living, where students find their daily schedules mixing—at meals, over coffee in the Commons, at firesides . . . even morning wake-up becomes unalterably a part of this life. For Rooks, it means they must drag their eyes open at 5:30 and shake their brothers out of upper banks. For upperclassmen, it means the dubious luxury of waking to hands on their shoulders, rather than to alarm clocks. With the friendship, too, comes a certain lack of privacy—brushing one's teeth in a communal bathroom and talking through toothpaste foam about today's math assignment. But anyone can become used to sharing sinks when it means sharing other things—a roommate's new clothes, some gossip about dates, a new car, a midnight snack or a pack of cigarettes . . . The chaos of class walkouts fades into the comforting darkness of serenades, banter at the dinner table and the proximity of the sorority house across the way. Interminable house meetings and the scheduled melee of rush become the satisfaction of welcoming new members, new friends. And there are the little satisfactions, made memorable because friendship is unspoken—watching television, playing cards after dinner, hearing the rattle of billiard balls in the basement . . .

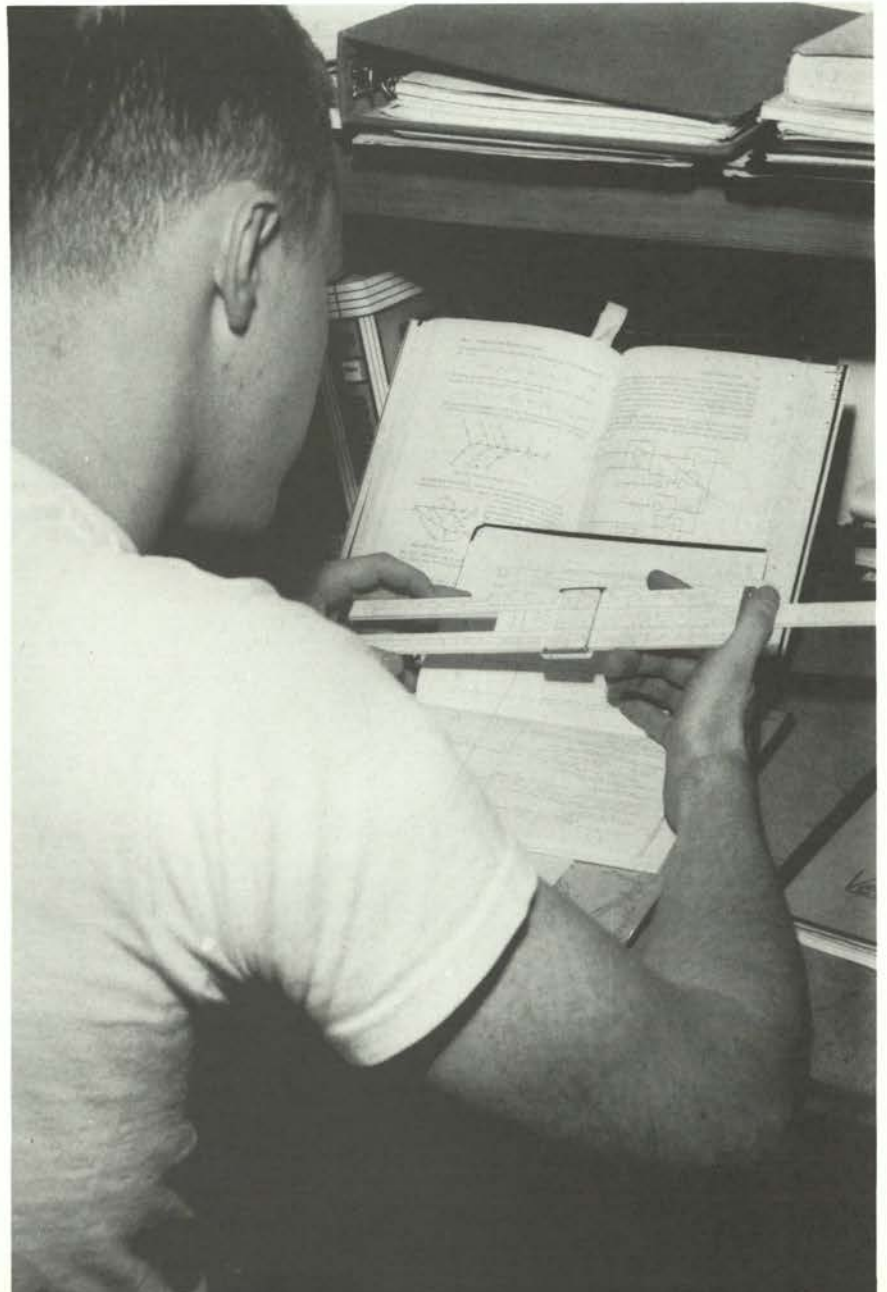






And there comes a time always when studying must take precedence even over babies who are fascinated by slide rules and pencils and who need three o'clock feedings. Students, married or single, have to read assignments, write papers, compile lab reports. Dorm students may take time out during fall term final week to decorate a Christmas tree, but colored lights shine along with study lamps throughout the night as examinations approach. Students seminar and compare notes, and they study alone, hunched over books and desks cluttered with candy bar wrappers and overflowing ash trays. They talk of vacation and think with a little nostalgia of the term which always passes so quickly—of Saturdays spent playing touch football, or lying on the sun deck or walking in the rain . . .

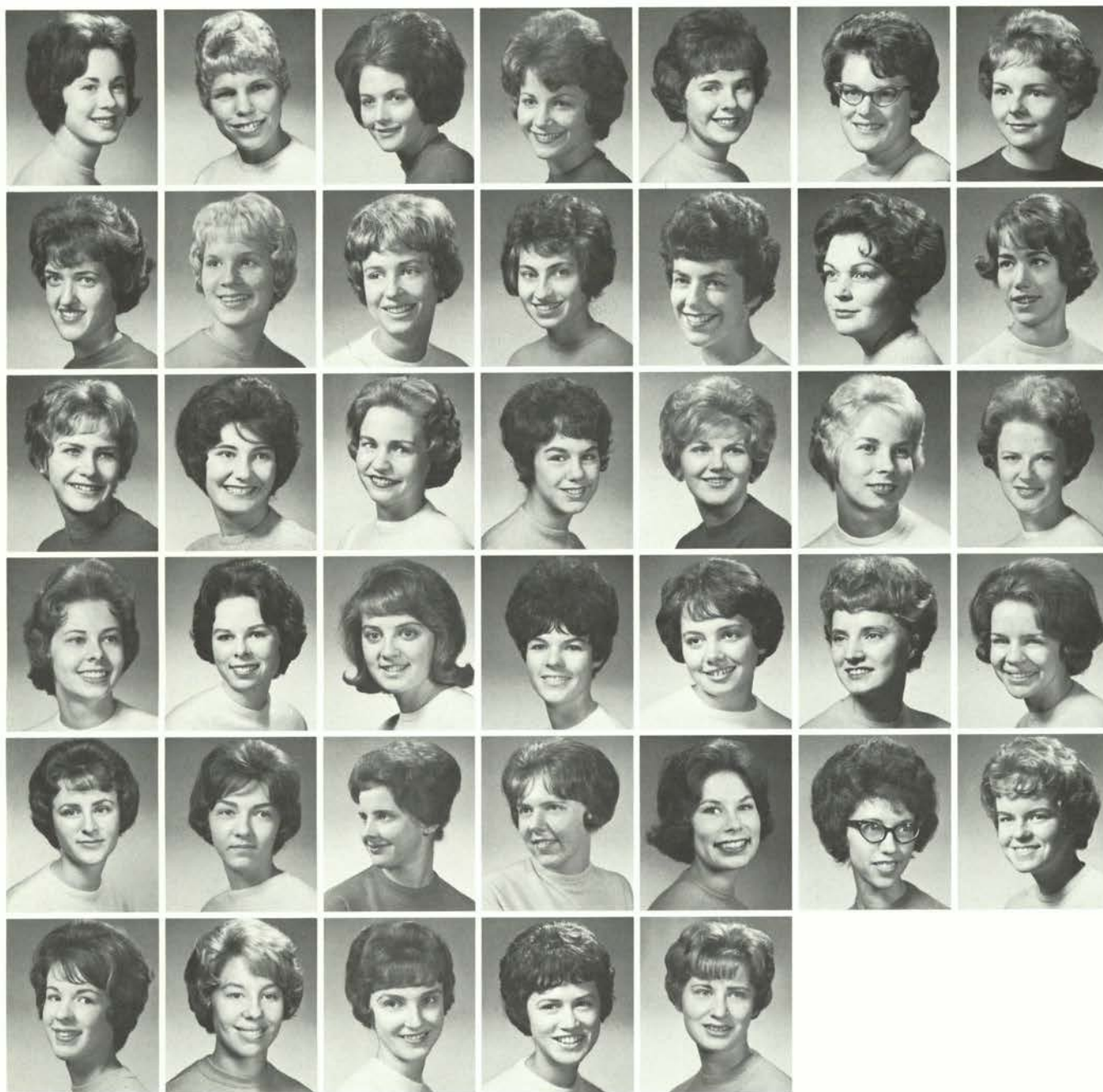


Dear Abbey Beaver:

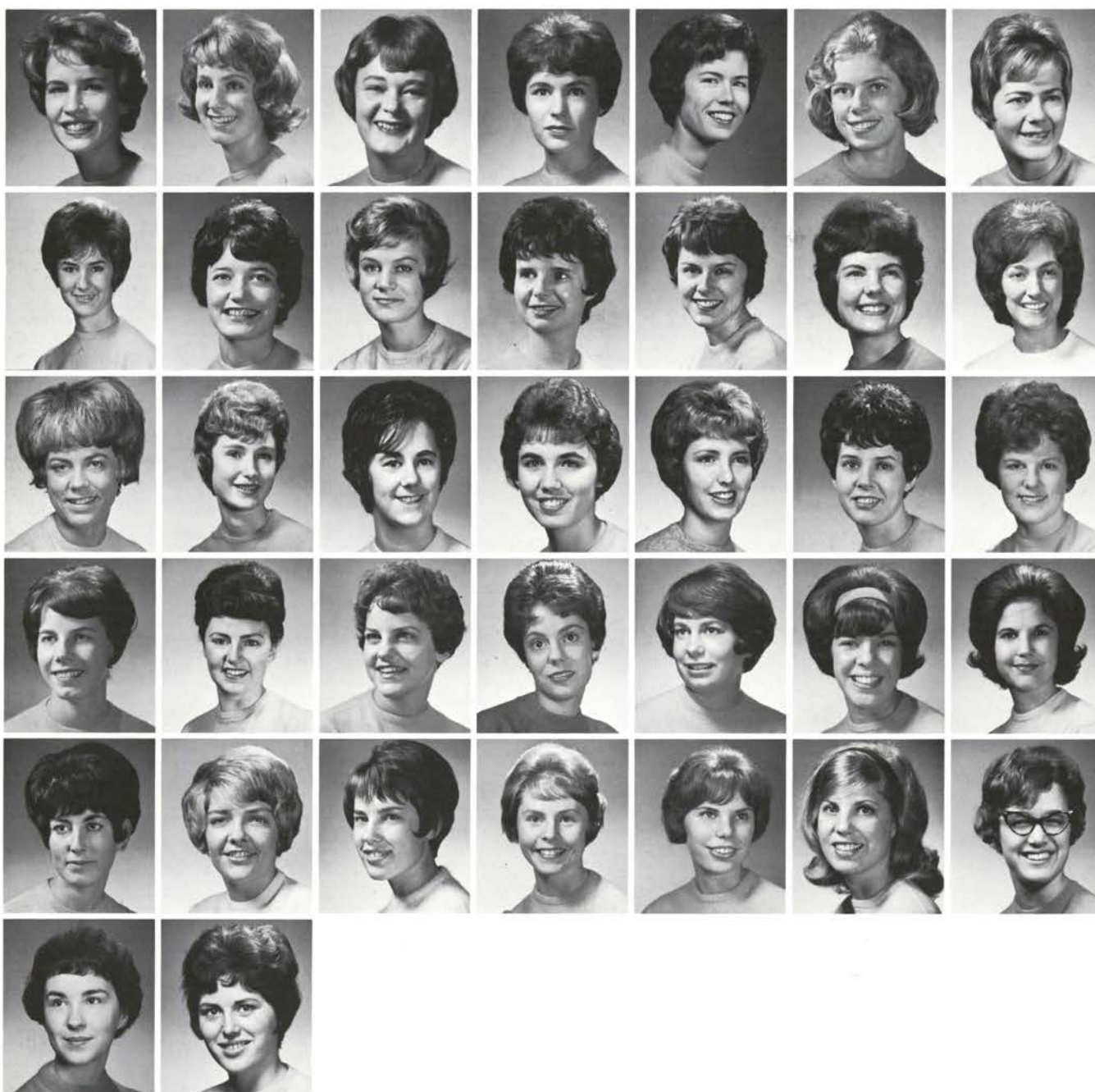




Attaining the highest grades on campus for three consecutive terms didn't slow down the Pi Beta Phi house as far as activities were concerned.
