My grandfather, Peter Poulson, was born May 5, 1943 in Denmark and came to America as a young man. He came west with a wagon train and worked in the freighting business. he freighted between the Umatilla Landing and Silver City, Idaho . He passed through Baker valley often making deliveries to the mining camps in eastern Oregon.

In 1868 he decided to make his home here in the valley and worked on some of the ranches and farms saving his money. In June of 1871 he purchased a homestead grant of 160 acres of state school lands and in 1876 added 80 acres adjoining his farm purchased frame a W. L. Jones who had homesteaded in 1872. My grandfather raised horses which he sold in Omaha and raised the wild hay on the meadow and also oats and rye to feed them.

His original dwelling had been box contruction and in later years it had been added on to with double wall construction. This house was torn down by me in 1963 after we built a new home on the farm. The old part of the house was built with dimension lumber part of which had been hewn by hand with an axe and put together with square nails. The original barn was of logs but was replaced by him with a very large barn which is still standing. It is constructed of heavy timbers without knots and put together with mortised joints and wooden pegs.

In the late 1970's he purchased another grant in the Muddy Creek area now known as the Cleve McCullough farm. He built the home that is in use there today. He moved up there to live and used the lower farm to pasture his horses and cattle and to raise the oats and wild hay to feed them.

Early in the 1880's he married Jennie Rainey. To the union were born seven childred of which three died in infancy or toddler age and were buried in the old Wingville cemetery. Of the remaining four my mother, Pearl Poulson, was the eldest followed by her brother Norris Poulson of Tustin, California, a sister, Ethyl Poulson, deceased, and a younger brother William Poulson, deceased. My mother passed away in 1970 after having spent the greater part of her life at Haines.

My grandfatherhad at varioustimes had hired help live on his farms after he moved to Baker in 1900 where he operated a grain, feed and produce store on Center street (now known as Broadway) where he sold the crops from the farms in excess of what he needed for his own livestock..

After my mother's marriage to my father, R. B. Hayhurst, in 1906 he turned this farm over to them to operate. When I was still a young man my parents separated and my mother and I operated the farm. We milked cows, had a farm flock of sheep and raised alfalfa hay, oats and barley.

After my grandfather's death in 1928 his estate was divided with the lower farm going to my mother and her sister Ethyl. My mother inherited 140 acres of the original 160 acre homestead. My aunt later sold her 100 acres to Mr. and Mrs. Olaf Olsen and in 1946 my wife and I purchased it back from them. In later years we purchased my mother's interest in the 140 acres to bring the the total acres back to the 240 acres. In 1950 we purchased

15 acres across the road from John Schmalenberg making a complete total of 255 acres in the farm today. All of the ranch is irrigated with water from Rock Creek and the original homestead has the **wkdexk** third oldest right on the creek, 1972, on a good part of it. and I

My wife/have four children we have raised here on the farm. Our eldest, a son, Edward V. Hayhurst Jr. is a Captain **O**f the Air Force, our next son, Michael Lewis Hayhurst, is a computer soft-ware analyst in Boise, Idaho. Our youngest son is with the Portland Chain Company of Tigard, Oregon. Our only daughter is Nancy Hayhurst Kingsford of Shoshone, Idaho.

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Poulson farm celebrates 100th birthday

On April 24, 1871, Peter Skovo Poulson, a Danish emigrant, purchased 160 acres of rich farm land one mile west of what is presently Haines.

This Friday, over 100 years since the land was bought, Vernon Hayhurst, the only grandson of Poulson, and his wife, Leona, will be at the State Fair in Salem to be honored in a special program for their Century Farm.

The Century Farm program, cosponsored by the Oregon Department of Agriculture and the Oregon Historical Society, will be honoring 36 other new century farm owners throughout the state, as well.

The Century Farm program was started in 1958. It was held yearly through 1960, then placed on a five year basis.

This year it is being held as a special feature of the Oregon Historical Society's one hundredth anniversary observance.

The Hayhurst farm is the only farm in Baker County this year to meet the qualifications set by the Department of Agriculture and the Society for a Century Farm.

To qualify, the land must be farmed continuously by the same family for 100 years or more. The family must also live on or actively manage the farm and cannot rent the land to an outside party.

Peter Skovo Poulson's story is an interesting one.

He was born May 5, 1843, in Denmark. As a young man he left his native land and came to the United States.

Upon reaching this country he went west with a wagon train and began work in a freighting operation. His route stretched from Umatilla Landing on the Columbia River to mining camps in eastern Oregon and in Silver City, Idaho.

As he passed through the Baker Valley, his eye was caught by its fine land, cottonwood trees, water, and pasture.

So in 1868, at the age of 25, he gave up his freighting business and turned to ranch work in the valley. After saving up his money, Poulson bought 160 acres of school grant land in 1871. In late 1872 he purchased 120 more

acres and in 1876, he bought 40 more, not all in the same location, bringing the total up to 240 acres.

On this land, Poulson raised wild hay, oats, barley, rye, cattle and horses, which he shipped to Omaha, Neb., by railway in the 1880's.

In the early 1880's he married, and had seven children, three of whom died in infancy or early in life.

Of the four surviving children, Pearl, (Vernon's mother), Norris, (destined to become a California congressman and mayor of Los Angeles), Ethyl and William, only Norris is alive today.

The father, Peter Poulson, died in Portland in 1928 and Vernon's mother died in Haines in 1970.

In 1952 Vernon bought an additional 15 acres, for a total of 255 acres. This is the size of the Hayhurst farm today.

After 100 years of farming, is the land still in good shape today?

"You betcha," Vernon replies. "It's getting better every year. I've raised as good a crop of hay as anyone," he notes.

Since the farm is so old, naturally there are a good many antiques lying around-like his split rails. "I imagine we have a mile and half of them now," Vernon says.

He adds that some fellows from Reno "wanted to haul them down to California," and sell them as antique items, but he wouldn't sell.

Even though the split rails are over 100 years old, (in 1871 it was necessary to have a fence and certain improvements before the land could be purchased) they are still very strong and solid. "They harden with age," notes Vernon.

Both he and his wife claim they feel strong ties to their land. "You just get this feeling about the

land," Leona states. "You just want to stay on the land. You worry about what it will be like in the future.

"It means more than just money. We could double our money and subdivide," she says, "but I wouldn't do it for a million dollars. I want to keep it in the family.'

One of their sons, Edward, a captain in the Air Force, is buying the land now (it is currently in escrow) and will take it over in 1985. "He's sentimental about it. too."

Leona says. "We don't know what his kids are going to do, but we do know what he

plans on doing," says Vernon. And that is to farm it, just like it has been farmed for over the past 100 years.
