Dear Mr. Wellman: [Regarding my inquiry about Century Farm Program]

After studying the Rules for 1990 Century Farm Program I am not sure our farm qualifies on two items; #2 "----farm ever been rented out." and #4 "----actively manage and direct ---". I will try to explain...

My grandfather bought over 400 A. here in 1886. My mother received 140 A. as her share of his estate. As an only child, it became mine and I am "the owner of record". I and my Dad farmed the land, then my son and I, and now my son and grandson farm it. We have a family corporation, KIZER & SON, INC. [I am no longer a stockholder, having sold my shares back to the Corp. when I retired 1, and the Corporation farms the land. There are no buildings on this place and no one has ever lived on this part of the farm.

Item #2: Since my retirement [I am 85] I have rented the entire farm to the family corporation, Kizer & Son, Inc.

Item #4: Also, since my retirement, I have <u>not</u> actively managed and directed the farming of the land. I can't take time off from playing on the desert in the winter and cutting grass in my yard in the summer!

If I ever die the land will go to one, (or both), of my daughters. My son gets other property.

I don't think any of the other requirements present a problem. What do you think Is it worth while to go ahead and fill out the application for a Century Farm ?

Gentlemen:

To verify and substantiate my application for Century Farm award I [Beryl Schick Kizer] submit the following statements to the requirements that must be met to qualify:

The farm has 138 A. and is located in section 27 of township 14 S range 3 W: approximately halfway between Harrisburg and Brownsville, Oregon: at the intersection of Bond Butte Drive and Center School Road. [Center School was on the corner of the property.]

It would probably have a Harrisburg address. It is sort of

between Harrisburg and Halsey postal areas.

The farm is not for sale.

- I [Beryl Schick Kizer] am the owner of this property.
- 2. The farm has been owned by, and operated by, members of the Schick/Kizer family for more than 100 years.
- The farm [the part I have inherited] has 137.82 A. and the gross income, from grass seeds, has been much more than \$500 for many years.
- No one lives, or has ever lived, on this part of John Schick's original 600 A. farm. There was a stock barn on it at one time, but there are no buildings at present.

John Schick's great grandson is now living at the original homestead. [I should think his part of the farm would also qualify for Century Farm].

- The line of ownership is: from James & Elizabeth Pearl, May 24, 1886, to John Schick: from John Schick to his daughter, Minnie Schick Kizer: from Minnie Schick Kizer to her only child, Beryl Schick Kizer [the applicant].
- If I am still living in 1990, I will be "the owner of 6. record".
