Yergen Family Holds Reunion; 100-Year History of Farm Retold

DONALD—The annual picnic of the Yergen clan was held Sunday, June 15 in the Union Hill Community club house. Following the no-host dinner a short business meeting was conducted by the president, Norman Yergen. It was voted to have the picnic one week earlier next year, that is the second week in June. New officers elected were Bud Yergen, president; Ray Yergen, vice-president; and Mrs. Robert (Ruth) Yergen Maitland was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

Originally Augustus Yergen, his brother William and his sister, Mrs. John (Elizabeth Yergen) Scheurer came west together in 1852. It took six months to make

the trip.

Augustus Yergen and his bride of two weeks, Eizabeth Griffin, who was a descendant of pioneers in Illinois, left their Illinois home and came west. It is reported they had two yoke of oxen and one yoke of cows to pull one wagon. The first winter was spent in Washougal, Wash. In the spring Augustus took up a 320 acre donation land claim which is unique in that it lies in both Clackamas and Marion counties. The land was covered with timber and had to be cleared before any crops could be planted.

He erected a one room log cabin, and six children were born to the couple. The present house was erected in 1891 and is occupied by a great-grandson, Phil Yergen, Another part of the original farm is owned and operated by Ray Yergen, and the third part by Mr. and Mrs. John Kister. She was formerly Norman Yergen, a granddaughter of Augustus. Mrs. Kister reports that hops were grown continuously on the farm from 1890 up until 1952. Now general farming is carried on with no specialty crops.

William Yergen purchased a

farm on the Donald-Newberg Road in 1864. This place or part of it is occupied by Kenneth Yergen and his sister, Mrs. Leighton Whitsett, who was the former Evelyn Yergen. Mr. and Mrs. Thurston Yergen own 20 acres of the original farm. He is the som of William Yergen.

Prior to the purchase of his farm in 1864 William Yergen lived on another farm near Aurora. He also lived for a time in Salem, operating a brick plant, and some of the brick made by him are in some of the buildings on the Willamette university campus.

Mr. and Mrs. Scheurer (Elizabeth) purchased two 300 acre

farms in the Butteville area. However, later Scheurer became connected with a box manufacturing plant in Portland the farms passed into other hands.

The name originally was Yergens, but when the children started school, the "s" was dropped.

A great deal of the above information was obtained from the Biography, "Record of Willamette valley" published in 1903 and now in possession of the Ray Yergens, who are one of the three descendants still living on the 100 year-old farm.
