N. R. Mulvany moved from Missouri to Wasco County, Oregon, in 1872. He then traded that property for this farm and moved here in the fall of 1872. When Nelson Mulvany died in 1926 his daughter, Rosa, who was a spinster, took over the farm. She raised her nephew, James L. Howard, and continued to operate the farm until 1957 when Jim and his wife, Freda, came to look after her. Rosa Mulvanv died in 1958 and Jim and Freda took over the management of the farm helped by his youngest son, Harold Nelson Howard. Area farm goes "way back"

Historically speaking, Harold and Nancy Howard go way back. Actually, it's their family that goes way back in Oregon history. The Howards own and live on a spread of over 100 acres along South Union Mills Road, just North of Molalla. That's not too significant but the fact that the land has been in the family since 1872 is

The property was recognized in the early 1970s as a "Century Farm," and received that distinction from the Oregon Historical Society which recognizes 100-year-old plus farms in Oregon A sign hangs outside the old farm house at 15522 S. Union Mills Rd declaring it a "Century Farm."

Howard said that his great-greatgrandfather. Nelson Mulvaney, acquired the property (240 acres at the time) in 1872.

"He came across the plains in 1852 and then traded land with someone who wanted to move to Wasco County," Howard said. "They just traded land and that's how we ended up here." Howard's father was raised in the old farm house which was built in 1914. However, the original farm house was built with lumber from the U nion Mill which at one time was just down the road on South Union Mills Road.

The Howards actually live on neighboring; property still farming at least 70 acres of the original property. They raise some cattle and sheep and grow hay.

The Howards have four children and at least one, they say, would like to continue farming the property. That means the property should remain in the Howard fainily for at least one more generiation.
