

can Farm at Walterville o Get Century Recognition

By WARREN HILL One of 11 Lane county farms slated for recognition as a cen-tury farm during a special pro-gram Aug. 31 at the Oregon State Fair is located east of Walterville

on the McKenzie highway. It is the farm owned by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Millican, grandson, and Mrs. Ada B. Millican, daugh-ter-in-law, of the original owner, also Robert Millican.

The original Robert Millican had an eventful-life before establishing the farm in the fall of 1864.

Born south of Utica, N.Y., on Jan. 17, 1837, of Scots parents he moved to Indiana with his family in 1844. His father had been killed before Robert was born.

After several years in the Midwest, including a period of train-ing in Cincinnati in the carpentry trade, the then 22-year-old man decided to settle in the Oregon country. He left for Oregon on Nov. 12, 1859, aboard the steamer Atlantic, which reached Colon in Panama six days later.

After crossing the isthmus of Panama he boarded the steamer, Panama he boarded the steamer, Golden Age, that took him to San Francisco. He had quite a long wait in "Frisco" waiting for a Portland boat that was kept from coming to sea until dangerous ice cleared from the Columbia river.

Millican finally arrived in Portland and took a river boat to Albany. The final stage of the trip to Eugene was covered by "legmobile," a common method of travel in those pioneer days. In an account of his life written

shortly before his death on Feb. 28, 1918, Millican gave a report of a May 1860 prospecting party to eastern Oregon that he joined. He said the 53 men with 107 head of horses and mules ventured into the country full of histile Indians,

On the headwaters of the Maled into the country full of hostile stampeded and took 67 head of the animals, while 40 were saved as they were hidden by willows

across the stream.

The group then started for home and were ambushed by the "redskins." "They put up a good fight, but their aim was not as good as ours; we got an Indian every time," Millican wrote. He noted that one of the men in the party was shot through the leg.

The young pioneer then embarked on a prospecting and mining career before settling down to the more prosaic business of farming. He "made some money" in the mines in Douglas county

near the Jackson county line and then worked mining claims in several parts of Idaho with varying success.

He then established the 160acre donation land claim, a part of the present farm, which now totals 320 acres. He took Mary A. Beale as his wife on Aug. 13, 1867, and she continued to live on the farm until her death in 1933.

Lester and Ada Millican had rented the farm after the senior Millican's death in 1918 until 1937 and then bought the place from the remainder of the heirs. He died in 1946.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Millican, present occupants and part own-ers, moved onto the place in 1933. The farm runs stock cattle and sheep. The house on the place, a sturdy and architectually balanced structure, with a porch on three sides, is 82-year-old. The senior Mrs. Millican says she is not sure but one of the barns on the place may have been built a hundred years ago.

There were eight children in the original owner's family, and two are still living in Eugene, Mrs. Ada Brubaker and Mrs. Ina Garrison,

Lane county, with 11 of 42, leads the state in the number of century farms to be honored this year by the Oregon Department of Agriculture and the Oregon Historical society. Certificates at the fair ceremony will be presented by Gov. Mark Hatfield. Another area farm to be hon-

ored is that of Manley A. Spores, Rt. 1, Box 93, which is part of the farm settled by his grandfather, James Madison Spores, in 1857, The original house and part of the barn still are standing.
