Subject: 1959 Century Farm Applications

I have one application for Century Farm honors which shows that the farm is rented to a sone of the owner and this is the only time the farm has ever been rented. I don't know how you feel but, since the farm is rented in the family, I'm inclined to pass it.

In another case, the application of W. F. Ramp, at Brooks, shows the farm has been rented one time and, of course, gives no idea when. The founder of this farm was Harvey Smith, settled some time in 1850 - no exact date given. I think part of this same land received a Century Farm award last year as the original farm has been divided seven times. Of course, the thing that sticks me is the fact that this farm was rented one time, apparently not within the family. I'm inclined to stick to the rules on this but wonder what you think?

So far we have only three completed applications although several letters have come in asking for application blanks and we have referred them to the respective County Judges.

On second reading, I find that Arthur W. McKay, the man who made the application showing his land as rented to a son, sends a note that his son, Arthur M. McKay - besides renting Arthur W's land - owns in his own right 20 acres of land of the original James McKay land claim founded in 1856, so I suppose both of these people would be eligible. Arthur W. McKay has sent in the old deed to the place with the request that it come back to him, so we are making a copy for you.

Linn Tops Century List for, '59

SALEM-Linn county, runner up among Oregon counties last year, some of the original buildings. In now tops the field in 1959 Cen- Douglas county, Century Farmer tury Farm competition.

Linn county has ten of the 44 additional Century farms reported this year; Yamhill is a close second with nine. According to Thomas Vaughan, representing the Oregon Historical society, and Frank McKinnon, state director of agriculture, these farms re-ported in 1959 will be added to the 354 discovered in connection with this unique program last

Two of Linn county's 1959 Century farms are owned jointly by sisters. Benton county has added one such farm, that owned by Mrs. D. Ross Barclay, Rt. 3, Corvallis.

The new group of Century Farm owners - descendants who have staved continuously with the agricultural pursuits of the farm land claims. Even a hundred founder - will be honored in a grand finale at the Oregon State and selling their lands-but not at I Fair on Tuesday, September 8. At that time Governor Mark O. Hatfield will present the handsome parchment enrolling the farms in the archives of the Oregon Historical Society.

Besides Linn, Benton, Yamhill and Marion, the 1959 Centennial Farms are in: Clackamas, one; Douglas, 4; Jackson, 2; Lane, 2; Polk, 3; Washington, 5; and Tillamook, 1.

All continuous ownership verifications were made by the respective county judges, whose name along with the governor's, the sponsors and the state fair commission chairman will appear on the Century Farm parchment to be awarded at the fair.

The oldest farm this year (Lewis R. Alderman's at Dayton) is 113 years; 12 were founded in 1852, five in 1850 and one or more of the others each year between 1846 and 1859.

Nine of the 43 farms still have Raymond J. Nichols of Winston lives in the original house built in 1853 by his great grandfather.

Strangely enough, the women today outnumber men owners of these historic farm lands. Twenty women, most of them granddaughters but including one great grand niece, are on the list. Eight of the honors go to husband-wife

Most intricate of all claims to trace relationship is that of the Charles S. Mullen farm near Newberg, whose Century Farm was founded in ,1852 by the halfbrother of his great grandfather. At the other extreme is the Alderman farm on which the son of the founder lives today.

Not all the farms come down straight from original donation years ago farmers were buying t today's prices. Mrs. Jessie B. Sewell at Hillsboro has the original deed in which farmers, by their marks, in 1857 transferred 318.95 acres or half of their donation land claim for \$1600 or about \$5 an acre. A year earlier in three from Wasco county on last or \$6.25 per acre, for 160 acres of a donation land claim.
