#### Polk County Farm First Seeker of Century Honors

A farm which is part of a donation land claim of 1851 is the oldest in the first three applications for 1960 Century Farm honors. The farm is owned by Mr. and Mrs. J. Davis Allen of Rickreall and was settled by his grandfather, John C. Allen.

Lumber for the barn, Mr. Allen cites in his application, was sawed and hewed by hand near Falls City, then hauled by oxen to Rickreall.

Other early applicants for Century Farm honors this year are Raymond S. Kirk, Route 1, Halsey, whose farm includes the original 160 acres of the Henry H. Kirk farm of 1860; and Cecil H. Wheeler, Route 2, Creswell, who farms about a fifth of the land settled in 1853 by Isaac William and Hetty Bond.

Any Oregon farm continuously operated or managed in the same family for 100 years or more is eligible for Century Farm honors. The program is now in its third year and is sponsored by the Oregon Historical Society and the State Department of Agriculture. Climaxing event, the awarding of Century Farm documents, will come at the state fair.

Application blanks are available from county judges or commissioners, and should be mailed to the State Department of Agriculture, Salem.
