The Grays

One hundred years is a long time to keep 'em down on the farm, but Aldon H. Gray, the third successive generation of Grays maintaining the family farm outside Cove says, 'well, it's a good place to bring up kids.' The Gray farm was one of 37 in Oregon and two in Union County to be distinguished this year as 'Century Farms' by the Oregon State Fair. To qualify, a farm must have been in continuous family ownership for a century or more. Since the classification began in 1958, 538 Oregon farms have rated this distinction. The Gray farm, of nearly 600 acres, contains 120 acres of the origional farm established in 1872 by Aldon Gray's grandfather, George Grant Gray. The original farmhouse built by Gray, although considerably altered, is still occupied by Aldon, his wife and three children. Drastic remodeling and additions have erased most traces of the past from the house but he says the interior of the walls are lined with mid-nineteenth century newspapers. One, he recalls seeing during a recent paneling project, splashed a lurid account of the latest exploits of the outlaw Jesse James. It is sealed over now, dormant, remaining to arouse the curiosity

of a succeeding generation's rennovations. A relic powder and ball rifle hangs on the wall.

Gleaming and polished, it boasts an elaborate hair trigger. And it is weighed by more than the yearsby at least 40 pounds.

Only one original outbuilding remains from the days of George Grant Gray. A small barn, shed really, of corrugated metal siding and roof sheaths an interiro skeleton of scarred handhewn timbers locked with wooden pegs.

Local historian W.R. Gekeler wrote an account of George Grant Gray, his travels and his descendents:

George Gray. was the father of the Grande Ronde Valley Grays and was born in Tennessee in 1840. George Gray moved to near Corvallis with his parents in 1853 and in 1862 brought a herd of cattle to the Walla Walla district. He started running a pack mule train to the Idaho and Montana mines and packed the first printing press into Helena, Montana. In 1868, he went to Idaho City where he bought and sold cattle. In 1871 he bought 320 acres of land on the Sandridge, but sold it in a year and moved to Lower Cove where he purchased 1,040 acres. In 1874 he married Sylvinna Jasper in Summerville. Theywere the parents of 10 children.'

Aldon Gray says that the Grays are related, after a fashion, to the other Century Farm family in Union County, the Billy Hindmans of Elgin. The interlock of relationship goes back three and four generations, and as Gray understated, 'it gets rather complicated after a while.'

## 5 of Linns 6 Century Farms Are in C-L Area

Central Linn -- and especial ly the Halsey area -- will be well-represented (percentagewise) tomorrow (Friday, Aug. 31) during the Century Farms Awards Day program at the Oregon State Fair.

During this program, on the Concert Stage, 37 families will be presented "Century Farm" certificates, signifying that the same family has resided on the same farm for 100-or-more years.

The program is co-sponsored by the Oregon Department of Agriculture and the Oregon Historical Society; and presented in cooperation with the State Fair.

Those scheduled to be honored, from the Central Linn area, with their "Century" connections, tions, are:

Everett E. and Rosa B. Carey of Route 1, Box 14, Halsey (purchased by Mr. Carey's grandfather, Edward A. Freeland, in 1871, from James M. Kennedy);

Lucille Cogswell-Foster and Lee W. Foster of Route 1, Box 90, Halsey (founded in 1871 by Mrs. Foster's grandfather, John Cogswell);

Mrs. Velda Kropf of Route I, Box 115, Halsey (farm actually on Route I, Harrisburg . . . founded in 1871 by great-grandfather Edwin Napper Tandy);

Mrs. (Myrtle) Lee McLagan of Route 1, Box 131, Tangent (founded in 1843 by her husband's grandfather, John T. Slate); and,

Orville L. Ohling of Route 3, Box 864, Albany -- Oakville area (founded in 1871 by Ohling's great-grandfather, Paul Ohling.)

A total of 17 Oregon counties are represented by new Century Farms, with Marion and Linn counties being tied for having the most being added to the list

this year -- each with 6 (of which 5 are from the Central Linn area).

Joining the ranks of counties with Century Farms, for the FIRST time this year is Klamath County, with one.

County, with one. The "Century Farm" program was started in 1958 -- preliminery to Oregon's Centennial of Statehood in 1959 -- by the Oregon Department of Agriculture and the Oregon Historical Soci-

Century Farm presentations were scheduled annually, through 1960; and then placed on a 5year basis. However, an exception is being made this year; as 1973 is the 100th Birthday -year of one of the sponsors, the Oregon Historical Society.
