#### ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Clement Cood Blackwell was born near Centerville, Tenn. in 1826 and lived there until 1850 when moved with his parents to Franklin Co., Arkansas. He had married Miss Jane Morris Sept. 6. 1846 near Beardstown, Perry Co., Tenn. and they moved from Arkansas to Farrant Co., Texas where they lived two years, then returned to Arkansas, where they remained until April 5, 1875 when they started across the plains with teams.

By thisttime the Blackwells were the parents of sixteen children, fourteen living, twin boys having died in infancy. All the children started the journey westward and a son, Jesse and his family stopped in Oklahoma where they lived the remainder ofthheir lives. In Idaho, Samuel and his family decided to stop and the remainder of the family came to John Day in the autumn of 1875.

A daughter, Perniece was married to William Carter and that family lived in John Day for a few years. Clement and wife and re-mainder of sons and daughters spent the winter in Fox Valley. The next spring, 1876 they moved to Long Creek Valley where they homesteaded the land still owned by the family. Besides her own children Mrs. Blackwell raised two children belonging to her son following the death of their mother.

While the Indians were on the rampage in 1878 the Blackwells stayed in the fort at Long Creek with other settlers for protection and the Indians captured all but one of their horses. A son, Henry acted as a dispatcher riding from John Day to Long Creek.

Later that year Henry Blackwell and Steve Harer found an Indian woman whome the Whites had scalped and brought her in a wagon to the Blackwell home where she spent the winter. Although she ate with the Blackwells she refused to sleep in the house preferring a small shack by herself.

John Lyon Blackwell who was eight years old, being next to the youngest when he crossed the plains, spent most of his life on the original homestead to which he added more land. He married Miss Mattie Settle in 1903 and they were the parents of six children of whom five are living.

Their oldest son. Jack bought out the other heirs and also bought adjacent land. He and his wife are parents of two children and grandparents of four grandsons.
