# One hundred years on farm 5664 long time for one family

George Frederick Moulton was one lucky baby back in 1875.

His son Lewis is still enjoying that luck.

George's aunt bought 40 acres of school property from the state for \$50 in 1874. When George reached his first birthday, the aunt deeded the property near Lusted and Cottrell Roads to him.

As the farm celebrates its 101st birthday, Lewis and Audrey Moulton will be honored by the Oregon Historical Society and the Oregon Department of Agriculture at the State Fair Aug. 31. They will receive a parchment certificate in the name of the ancestor settling the farm.

"I guess we are one of the few century farms in Oregon that have only been owned by two generations," Moulton said. He plans to have a sign honoring the farm made.

Taxes in the 1800s were a mere 50 cents per acre, he said. He helped his father clear the land, which was used for potatoes, grain and hay. In 1920, raspberry fields were started.

"We have mostly nursery stock now," Moulton said. He took over the farm in 1935, the same year he married Audrey, who came from Powell Valley.

"We built our present home in 1936," Moulton said. The site of the old home is marked by a giant black walnut tree planted by Moulton's father when he was five.

"My dad went to school in a private home when he first started," Moulton said. When a new school was built, George and his brothers were the first pupils. George's future wife started school there when she was seven.

Lusted School replaced the original school building. Moulton, his sister and his children attended the school. In 1946 pupils started attending Orient Grade School.

Moulton runs 20 acres of the original 40.

"We have been here this long, we might as well sit back and putter around," Moulton

laughed. He is a young looking 71-years-old.

"I'm trying to sell most of the land now, and keep a few acres for myself.

"I think 100 years is enough for one family to keep up this farm. There are no more Moultons except me," he said. His two married daughters live back east. A son was killed in

the Korean War.

"I'm looking for a developer, one who will make nice homes." He has no use for "cracker-box" type houses.

Moulton has seen many changes in his 70-odd years. Building has increased steadily. The bumpy dirt roads are now paved highways.

A lot of agricultural change

has occurred in the area. Dairies, berry and truck farms have changed to nurseries.

"There is no better place than our back yard," both Lewis and Audrey claim.

"On the hottest of days we have a cool breeze. We watch people go by in their cars trying to escape the heat... and we just sit on our porch."
