

Shearer History

John Shearer was born in 1710, died at Palmee Massachusetts. He came from Scotland with his son, (according to Clara Twibells history). He must have been a brother to Thomas Foster Shearer, who was born in 1715.

Robert Findley Shearer, son of Thomas, was born 8-5-1769 in Boone, North Carolina. He married Sarah Kendall, born in 1769. Robert Findley Shearer's son, Thomas Findley Shearer married Martha Rebecca Farthing, born in 1805.

Now we go back to Martha Farthing. Her grandmother Martha Umptries was a relative of King Bruce of Scotland. She married Thomas Hallyburton. One of their daughters Polly Hallyburton married Rev. Wm. Farthing. Of their large family five sons were ministers, and one a judge. Their daughter Martha Rebecca Farthing, born in 1805, married Thomas Findley Shearer. They were married Jan. 15, 1829, and she died Dec. 24, 1872.

The Shearers who came from Scotland had leased an estate at Belfast, Scotland for 99 years. A descendent of the Shearers went back to Scotland, and located the estate at Belfast. The early Shearers, probably John, had brought the family Coat of Arms with him, and it is registered in Washington D.C.. Some of them fought in the Revolutionary War.

Now we go to Martha Rebecca Farthing and Thomas Findley Shearer. When the Farthings arrived from Scotland, they made bricks, and worked on a college, that is still in existence, william and Mary's College'. As Thomas and Martha lived near the border during the Civil war, four of the boys fought for the North and one, Robert, fought for the South. Two of the boys died in the Way, Thomas and William.

These are the twelve children of Thomas and Martha. Elizabeth J. Shearer - born Dec. 9, 1829 - died Mar. 13, 1869.

Elizabeth Townsend was engaged to marry either Thomas, or William Shearer, who were killed in the Civil Way. She later married James N. Shearer, our ancestor.

After the slaves were freed, Thomas and Martha moved to Missouri from North Carolina, then on to Acheson County, Kansas.

Will Huckaby, a grandson of Thomas and Martha, told us of remembering when his grandmother, Martha Shearer died. He was four years old, and came into the room as the doctor was lancing her pulse, to see if she were dead. He ran crying from the room, saying that they were cutting up Grandma. She was a licensed mid-wife, mixed her own herbs, and did lots of nursing and doctoring in Kansas.

Two of Thomas and Martha's sons married Townsend girls. Elizabeth married James N. and Eliza married John. Their father "Grandpa Townsend", was an interesting person. He was born in 1813, and died in 1896. When he was a young man, cataracts blinded one eye. Later when chopping wood, a stick hit his good eye, and blinded it. He was blind when Eliza and John were married and never saw him. The family lived in Kansas, and Grandpa Townsend lived with John and Eliza and Josephine. They moved to California by train, but were dissatisfied so came to Oregon by team. It was a long, hard journey, and Eliza's sister, Josephine Townsend, developed pneumonia. The family settled in La Fayette, and Josephine died of T.B., and is buried in the old cemetery in Dundee.

John liked Oregon, so brother James and wife Elizabeth and three children, Josephine, Mattie and Will, left Kansas and came to Oregon and lived at La Fayette. They moved to Forest Grove, and lived on the old Curtis place, where Pete and Audrey Clapshaw live now, in the Hillside area. They were living there at the time President Garfield was assassinated.

James soon acquired part of present home place from J F. Shorb for four hundred dollars. It was mostly virgin timber, which they cut and burned. A house was on the present home site and clearing began. James was a Civil War Veteran, so started getting a pension and back pay. It was then that they built on to the house that was the home until 1)17, when the present house was built.

Their daughter, Mattie Shearer died of T.B.. She was in love with a young man, of whom her parents disapproved, and it was thought that didn't help her to improve. She is buried in Hillside Cemetery, and had attended Pacific University. We gave a program for a musical recital that she was in at the University to the museum there.

John and Eliza Shearer lived on Chehalem Mountain at Newberg.

Grandpa Townsend made him home with his two daughters. His wife died and is buried at Dundee. While living at James and Elizabeth's, he fell down the back steps, and never walked again. He was in bed there for several months, then went to John and Eliza's and passed away about a year later. He was at Jame's after Will and "Lizzie" were married, and always called "Lizzie", (Perry's mother), the "Little One" and would have her come so he could feel her face and size. This is a poem that Grandpa Townsend dictated while blind.

"The Blindman's lament"

Dear friends whose eyes are open to the glorious light of day, See how the darkness falls upon the blind man's rugged way, For fifty years, and over too, I did enjoy the light This blessing none can fully know, as them thats lost their sight. For twenty months, and over that I've been "intirely" blind And theres no hope that I again my sight will ever find. The sadness of my present lot, none but the blind can know Others may sympathize with us, but cannot feel the woe. I oft to meeting used to go, my brethren for to see. The many seasons we have spent, are pleasant now to me. we'd tell our doubts and conflicts "ore", and talk of Jesus love, And speak of joys that wait the happy souls above. we'd in church to sing and pray, and hear the preached word, By those dear servants sent to us, by Jesus Christ the Lord. But now with me those joys are passed, they are fled and gone. when others do at meeting go, then I am left to mourn. If from my dwelling I do go, some one must me convey. Not often does a chance occur, so I at home must stay. My brethren whom I do love, don't often visit me. It greatly would relieve by mind, if I their face could see. I still would like to hear them talk, as we have done before, when around the fireside we met, As wont in days of yore.

Perhaps the brethrens will is good, to visit me and mine,
But they families to support, which occupies their time.
The greatest burden on my mind, which doth oppress me sore,
How will my family get support, for I can work no more.
Theres many sleepless hours I spend, to see if I can find
bome way my family to support, and ease my troubled mind.
Some friends and brethren have been kind, some needs for to supply.
I hope the Lord will them reward, when they are called to die.
I feel that I should not complain, nor be so under stood.
The Lord knows what is best for me, and what is for my good.
I hope the Lord will give me grace, to "bare" the chastening rod
Of him that doeth all things right, and that he is God.
What yet is left in store for me, time only can reveal
I hope the lord will me incline, submission to his will.

while James and Elizabeth were still in Kansas, their neighbors and close friends were the Paulis. Mrs. Pauli taught school when Will and Josephine were in the first grade. After James moved to Oregon, the Paulis came too, as times were hard in Kansas. They settled in Cornelius, and their daughter Lila, and Charles Crowther went to school together.

Lila spent most of her summers and vacations with her old friends, Josephine, Mattie and Will. Elizabeth Shearer was always "Aunt Lizzie" to her. She became engaged to Will Huckaby, who was a cousin of Will Shearer, as his mother, "Aunt Matt", was a sister of James and John. Her parents disapproved, so she later married Mr. Downing. For forty-seven years Will and Lila had lost track of each other. When Will came to Perry's mother's funeral, he inquired of Lila. She (Lila) was injured in an automobile accident on the way to the funeral, so Will was given her address.

Their old friendship was renewed, and they were married in August 1949. They spent their honey moon here at our home.

One of John Shearer's daughters, Josephine, married Perry Bradley. They moved to Hillside and lived where Will and Mother Shearer lived up on the corner by the old grape vine, in the house he built when Will and "Lizzie" were married. Will and Perry Bradley worked on the street car in Portland, from Fourth St. to Oregon City, before they were married. Josephine was called "Little Joe", and Josephine Shearer Case was called "Big Joe", as they were double cousins.

Perry Shearer was named after Perry Bradley. The Perry Bradleys had three daughters, Gladys, Narcissa and Josie. A son, Perry was born after they left here. Perry Bradley died of T.B. and his wife Josephine, taught school and raised her family.

James Shearer had a cousin Will Shearer, as their fathers were brothers. The family always called him Uncle Billy, as he was much older. He located on a farm in Goldendale, Washington.

David Anderson Shearer, Nancy Shearer Dirting and Jake Shearer were his children. The Anderson Shearer and Dirting children were school mates and neighbors of Mazie and Rena Napper when they lived in Goldendale. Jake Shearer owned the Seavey Hop Ranch near James Shearer at Forest Grove. He had two sons, Arthur, who had a jewelery store in Forest Grove. Genevieve Guyton was his daughter, and he had another daughter and son. Ottice Shearer and his wife had a confectionery store in Forest Grove, and Jake's daughter Carrie, married Raymond Wood. After selling the ranch to Jim Seavey, Jake moved to town and operated a brick yard south of town.

James and Elizabeth Shearer as we mentioned had three children when they moved here from Kansas, Josephine, Mattie and Will. Josephine was a school teacher. She married Melvin Case, who was

County School Superintendent. She taught at Hillside, and Cornelius, and at Hillsboro for many years. If you follow Lester Mooberry's articles in the paper when he is reminiscing of his early teaching days, he often speaks of the Cases. Their two daughters, Mattie Litch, and Clara Case are both retired teachers now.

Will Shearer married Mary Elizabeth Fry from Grays Harbor. She had come down here to help her brother Orren Fry, a widower, care for his four children. Her mother, Annette Fry and younger sister Ida, also came. Orren's three girls, Sarah, Lucy and Cynthia, and Ida attended Hillside School.

Will Shearer and Mary E. moved into the new home that he had built on the corner above Jame's home. They had a beautiful view. James suffered a stroke when Esther was a baby and they had to move down with his mother to help care for him. Will and Mary E. had eight children, one dieing in infancy. Will developed T.B. and died in 1910, leaving Mary E. with seven children. and an aging mother-in-law and a farm to manage. Fay and Perry were fourteen and fifteen years old to help. Much of the place was planted to prunes, with their own drier, which made lots of hard work. They burned cord wood in the drier, which required many cords. All of the work was done with horses. They dairied and sold milk to the Condenser in Forest Grove, and cream to the creamery in Forest Grove. Perry remembers when he was small, his father putting him on a horse, with a wooden sled with cans of milk on it. They pulled the sled to Clapshaws, where Lonzo Clapshaw came and took the cans off and put empty cans on, and Perry turned around and dragged them home.

Elizabeth Shearer died in 1912 after being a total invilad for several years. Soon after Mary E's mother Annette Fry, came down to live with them.

The family, girls and boys all helped with the work. Ruth and Esther went to High School in Hillsboro. Perry, Alma and Bertie went

to High School in Forest Grove. Fay was in partnership in a garage in Forest Grove, but went into the Service in World War I. Fay married Mae Northrup before the war.

Twin boys, Wilbur and Willis were born while he was in the service. He came back to the farm after the war, and Evelyn, Lois, Alvin and Herbert were born. Alvin was killed while helping Fay and Perry logging.

Perry and I were married in the park in 1922, and have lived in the present home, which was built in 1917, since. We have four children: Robert (Bob), Arline, Eleanor and Ronald.

Ruth married Charles Crowther, who was killed in an explosion in the ship yards during World War II. They had no children. Ruth passed away in 1974.

Esther married Lawrence Brabham. They have three children: Bill, Ed, and Mary Elizabeth (Beth) Tays.

Alma married Ed Gribner. Alma died in child birth with baby Naomi, and had an older son Walter.

Bertie married Russell (Brown) Davies. They have two children. Marian Allen, and Bill Davies.

Arthur developed T.B. of the hip and died at the age of sixteen in 1924.

Mary E. the mother passed away in 1947.

Fay passed away in 1967.

Perry passed away in Nov. 2-1982.

Jacob and William Shearer moved to Acheson County, Kansas in 1854.

The information in the Shearer Family Bible, from which the names and dates for the family of Thomas Findley Shearer and Martha were taken, was brought west by Thomas and Patsy Shearer.

The "Age Book", was used until it was copie: in the Bible, about

1829. Some of the earlier names and dates are evidently missing from the Bible.

Before Will Shearer died in 1910, he built the tall red barn in 1907. He built the reservoir, and put in the present water system. The engine was gasoline propelled as there was no electricity here then.

They hauled the timbers for the barn from a mill in Cedar Canyon, using a plank road to get out of the canyon. Sometimes those roads were called "Corduroy roads", as they were logs placed cross wise of the road. Very rough.

when the wells behind the house here began to dry up, Mother Shearer took the washing down where the over-flow from the spring was, built a fire to heat the water, and did her washing down there. There was a watering trough there, and they had to take the cows and horses down there to drink. In summer we took milk, cream and butter and hung it in the cool well.

Greenwoods, who owned the spring, said Shearers could use it. Before Will died he dug a well, bricked it up for the spring to run into. He put in a gasoline pump, built the reservoir and pumped the water up there, and they had a gravity flow down to house and barn.

Fay and Perry formed a partnership, after he came home from the War, known as Shearer Bros.. They purchased the property north of Nelson's and set out a prune orchard. This included the park and springs there. We later got a water right from State of Oregon for the water.

They purchased property east and north of park from Rosie Wank. Later they purchased the Davis place from Chet and Isa Davis.

Mother Shearer spent a lot of time improving the park. County Christian Endeavor helped us build the cabin. The Columbus Day Storm caused a lot of trees to blow down, with much damage to the

park. Several trees crushed the cabin. They logged the fallen timber, and Perry cleaned and enlarged the park. A new cabin was built, and different groups and individuals helped us.




