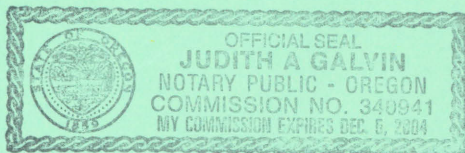

Bartlemay family celebrated for 100 years on the farm at Society's annual meeting

Norma Paulus, former state legislator, Secretary of State, state Superintendent of Education and member of the Northwest Regional Power Planning Council, and current executive director of the Oregon Historical Society, right, presents a Centennial Ranch certificate to the Bartlemay family of Arlington at the annual meeting of the Gilliam County Historical Society held at Hotel Condon Oct. 9. Receiving the award, from left, are members of the Bartlemay family -- Shawn, Laurie, Larry, Jerry, Caitlin and Casey. Executive Director Paulus was introduced by John Burns, Gilliam County District Attorney who served in the legislature with her. While in the legislature, Paulus was instrumental in creating two bills that have helped foster the preservation of historic buildings -- one that would allow less strict rules for renovation construction so that historic integrity of structures can be

maintained, and one that would freeze taxes on renovated buildings deemed historic. The Oregon History Center at Portland, Paulus said, features over 85,000 artifacts from Oregon's past, over two million photographs, over 30,000 maps and the most significant collection of Lewis and Clark artifacts. The Oregon Historical Society, she went on, is focusing on programs such as collecting oral histories;

reaching out to the local affiliates, such as the Gilliam County Historical Society; and promoting the educational programs, including one in which historians from Portland State University and history teachers from around

the state are invited to the History Center to create history lessons around historic Oregon artifacts. Paulus noted that the OHS board of directors has balanced its budget, but has had to lay-off a number of employees to do so.
