The claim was listed in Oregon City Land Office Volume 1

Of note is that a young man, William T. Patton came out in the same wagon train and married one of Reuben and Nancy's daughters-Julia Ann. Their claim is also part of the current farm and is Oregon City/Vol 1/Claim # 269!

I found this presentation. Does a nice job of explaining the various ways to get land in Oregon, pre DLC and post DLC. To get 640 acres, you

- -had to be man and wife (320 each)
- -had to have arrived by Dec 1850.

If you arrived after Dec 1850 then you were only eligible for 160a each.

I found the Oregon City Land Office registry entry for Reuben Dickens and his wife Nancy. It would make sense that they were eligible for 640 acres (what I have always been told). I am still waiting for a reply from the archive people.

There are several other hoops to jump thru (including farming/improving the land for 4 years, survey, independent testament, Oregon Land Review and then to Wash DC. So it would not surprise me if the ownership document took 10 years to produce.

I am sure they arrived in 1848 but I would be very surprised if they had title to the land in 1848! I have found nothing so far that suggested ownership was retroactive to date of arrival.

Hmmm.

I have a copy of the Oregon Spectator from Sept 1848 saying they were in the Dalles and on their way-so I am pretty sure they arrived in 1848.

I have always said the farm was established in 1848 and we celebrated the Farm's 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 1998 when my father was still alive. I think he would have said something if they had done other work for the first else for 10 years.

#### According to the Donation Land Claim Act-

Under terms of an act of 1850, certain white settlers and Indians of mixed blood in Oregon Territory (which then included Washington), and certain settlers arriving there between 1 December 1850 and 1 December 1853, were entitled to land. The number of acres granted (varying between 160 to 640) depended upon the marital status of the settler and the date of settlement. Settlers were required to live on the land and cultivate it for four years.

We have (although I cannot find) the donation land claim document signed by Buchanan. He was president from 1857-1861-so the 1858 date makes sense from that perspective.

I am assuming they may have settled the land in 1848, farmed it, applied for the DLC, maybe had to wait 4 years and then had the land officially deeded to them in 1858. I just sent an email and request for the Oregon Donation Land Claim Files. I explained the issue and asked them to call me if possible.

Just a quick email to clarify the founding date of the Mader Farms. Our records indicate the farm was legally established in 1858 and not 1848. Do you have documents that support the 1848 date? I wanted to make sure we got the date correct on your signs and certificate. Can you please confirm this week? We usually use the date confirmed on the 100 designation unless the family has updated documents. Thanks.

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(Gen 1)-Rev Reuben Dickens b1797 in Carroll County VA was married to Nancy Phillips

They came out on the Oregon Trail/Barlow trail in 1848

Accompanying their wagon train as a helper was a young man, William Thomas Patton (b 1832).

(Gen 2) On arrival in Oregon, he married one of Reuben's daughters, Julia Ann Dickens and got a donation land claim next to that of his Father in law.

(Gen 3) One of William Thomas Patton and Julia Ann Dickens children was Thomas Benton Patton (b1855) and he married Alice Downing.

(Gen 4) One of their children was Genevieve Lucille Patton (b1898) and she married Albert Julius Mader in 1922. The day they got married, Thomas Benton Patton and Alice Downing moved to Salem and never returned to the farm. Albert farmed until his death in 1969.

(Gen 5) Albert's two boys were Howard and Don. They attended Silverton HS and Howard attended Willamette University. Howard married Jackie Johnson in 1952. Don married Charlotte Hain approximately the same time. Both boys farmed part time or full time the rest of their lives.

(Gen 6) Howard had two boys, Bob and Scott. Bob still runs the farm with cousin Doug and his wife Gwen Hendricks.

Don had one boy, Doug who works with Bob on the farm.

Howard died in July 2008 and Don died in 2003.

Charlotte and Jackie are still living. Charlotte lives on the farm and Jackie lives at Capital Manor.

Genevieve was born in the house where Bob Mader now lives. Many more details are on family tree maker. Scott has the only grandchildren (Gen 7). He hopes he can interest them in further developing the farm (?vineyard).

We had a sesquicentennial celebration in Sept 1998 which included a very nice letter from Senator Gordon Smith. We were able to find the copy of the Oregon Spectator (Sept 1948) that mentioned Reuben Dickens in the "Emigration column". We had custom made sesquicentennial signs that hang under the original Century Farm sign.



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
