What were the early crops or livestock? Crops and Livestock were historically raised on the farm, dairy stock, fish, fruit, corn, potatoes, timber, horses and asses. Pioneer History of Coos and Curry Counties mentions several sheep and hogs were saved but the fruit orchard was swept away in the flood of 1890 consisted of cherries, peaches, pears, apples, plums, crab apples and quince

How did the crops / livestock / use of farm or ranch change over the years?

The bottom land was improved upon to lessen damage due to freshets by clearing out of the brush and ditching for quick drainage through tide gates. Some of the Timber was harvested, old downed timber was

recovered and acreage was replanted, a cleanup of old timber harvest habits. The quality of the beef was tested by raising different breeds or crossbreeds of cattle, settling for the current red angus cross. Because of the freshets, the bottom ground is constantly watched to produce a quality hay crop.

What are crops / livestock raised on the farm or ranch today?

A cow/calf beef cattle operation, timber and hay is harvested every summer and has evolved from loose to two string bales to round bales to haylage. Currently 100 plus tons of hay and haylage are produced to feed the cow/calf operation.

## **George W Smith Ranch**

1896 WDLF moved into town leaving the farming to his sons William (Bill) H Smith and George F Smith. WDLF passed away in 1906 and was buried at the Marshfield Pioneer Cemetery. After Williams (Bill) death in 1926 George took over the farm, his sons came together, but continued their own careers, to help him run the farm.

William (Bill) F Smith was also a Deputy Sheriff and collected the poll tax for the Coos River area and carried a license for Marine Navigation.

Upon George F Smith's death in 1940, his sons Max, Carl, Cecil and Donald (Jimmy) took over the farm. Finally tiring of milking cows they changed over to cow/calf operation in the early 1960's.

George F Smith served as Coos River School Director, Southwestern Oregon Dairy Herd Improvement Association and one of the founders of Coos River Creamery. The Creamery was built in 1939 and burned in the early 1950's. The co-op was started by local farmers who wanted more money for their milk. They started the co-op and made cheese into 25 to 50 # rounds. The Cheese maker was George's brother in law Angus J McDonald. The creamery was located on the farm near the forks of the river.

The County Road was built as far as the Coos River School, in 1924, at that time the milk cans were placed on a platform at the end of the driveway where they were taken by truck to the creamery in town.

Max Smith had worked on the water feeding logs to a lumber mill before he came back to the ranch

Carl Smith was a mechanic by trade and fabricated in the blacksmith shop and made repairs as needed and carried a license for Marine Navigation

Cecil Smith worked in a lumber mill and on several tugs and boats in the area and off the Oregon coast and carried a license for Marine Navigation

Donald (Jimmy) is a graduate of Oregon Agricultural School, now known as Oregon State University, in Agriculture. He was a buyer for McNeil Libby before returning to the farm to help his brothers.

In 1965 Cecil's son, George W Smith took over the Ranch along with his wife Alicia and their three children. The cow herd consisted of about 18 head at that time. Over the years the heard has increased and decreased, went from polled Herefords to Santa Gertudes to Red Angus due to their ease of handling. When George and Alicia took over the farm, another flood, in late December 1964, and had left about a foot of silt in the 80 acres of hay fields and a tremendous amount of flood debris. All the bottom land had to be cleaned of debris, ditched and replanted for hay and grazing, taking years to recover.

The bottom ground was also cleared of willow and myrtle trees and drain fields were laid along with ditching and tide gates increasing the size of usable acreage for hay harvest. The timber land was cleared of all the debris and replanted with 120 acres of two year old trees. At this time there is more timber on the land than there has ever been. There is a portable sawmill on the property and all the wood building materials are milled from trees on the ranch. Most of the repairs are made from this lumber. The logs coming from those recovered from logging years ago and downed trees from winter storms.

Hay is harvested every summer and has evolved from loose to two string bales to round bales to haylage. Currently 100 tons plus of hay and haylage are produced to feed the cow/calf operation.



### **George W Smith Ranch**

#### Established 1865

William De La Fletcher Smith was born 7 July 1828 in New Milford, Litchfield County, Connecticut. His father, Preserve Smith established a farm in Mount Vernon Ohio called the Five Corners Farm, a dairy farm, when William was 3. At the age of 21 William (WDLF), the third of 10 children, left the farm in 1849 to sell Fanning Mills in Indiana and Iowa. Somewhat a wanderlust he caught gold fever and crossed the plains with an ox-team train in 1852. The train did have Indian trouble near Shell Creek losing a few of their cows.

Arriving in California, WDLF began mining through Northern California and Southern Oregon where in 1855, on the Rogue River; he enlisted with Company K of the Oregon Volunteer Militia taking part in battles at Rogue River, Big Bend and Illinois River as well as other Indian skirmishes.

In early 1856 WDLF continued on to Port Orford where he helped to build and work in the Cedar mill. In 1857 WDLF moved on to Coos County where he worked in the coal mines in timber related issues then on to Empire and North Bend where he assisted with the building and worked in the mills of Simpson Lumber Company sawmill and HH Luse Mill. WDLF married Mary Luse in 1859. WDLF and Mary had 5 children, two boys, William and George and three daughters, Ada Florence and Edith.

In 1865 WDLF purchased 95.39 acres of land, a Land Grant, at the Forks of Coos River on the south side, 7 miles east of Marshfield. In 1884 an additional 80 acres were purchased by Land Grant.

Crops and Livestock were historically raised on the farm, dairy stock, fish, fruit, corn, potatoes, timber, horses and asses. Pioneer History of Coos and Curry Counties mentions several sheep and hogs were saved but the fruit orchard was swept away in the flood of 1890 consisted of cherries, peaches, pears, apples, plums, crab apples and quince. Each fruit harvest was taken to Alden Vegetable and Fruit Preserving Factory, established in 1876, until the flood, where the fruit was preserved and shipped to market in San Francisco.

WDLF was an engineer by trade and also piloted boats up and down the coast carrying a license for Marine Navigation he was known as Captain WDLF Smith; he was a justice of the peace, a school director as well as a school clerk. He was a founding member of the Coos County Pioneer Society.

The first house was built near the river, the lintel stone bears the year 1864. This home was replaced by the present home on higher ground in 1951 so that it would be safe from winter freshets.

The first barn was built at the same location the existing barn was built on in 1864. They milked around 28 cows for years and as the milking machines were added the herd size increased. The new barn (a Quonset design) built in 1950 could house 50 head of milk cows. The wood rot was repaired and a new roof was put on the barn in the early 1990's. Another roof was placed on the barn in early 2000's. The milking parlor, (a Quonset design) was built before the new barn in 1949 and had 3 stanchions. The milk parlor was repurposed as a shop around 1965 and the old shop and blacksmith sheds were razed. A feed barn was added in 1992 to accommodate the feeding of round bales. A Quonset machine shed still stands next to the milk parlor as well as two new equipment sheds built in 2000 and 2010.

Their first motorized tractor was a Fordson. A model T was used, at times, to pull the sickle bar to cut hay. In later years a Ford Ferguson tractor was used and still runs today.
