

It is written by family members that the original owner of the now existing Stubblefield Ranch, Francis Marion Stubblefield was born May 7th. 1833 in Randolph County, page (6). Later Francis purchased and additional 40 acres ner Arkansas. Edwin and Adella Reser on November 8, 1884 (See copy of Abstract of title page (

The Stubblefields came across the plains with a covered wagon train from Arkansas to the Oregon Territory in 1860. Joseph Loney Stubblefield, his brother their father, and mother Francis Marion and Nellie Rice, Stubblefield were on the wagon train also. Francis's father Francis Marion Stubblefield was born in Randolph County and Nellie Rice Stubblelfield was born in Oregon county, Missouri, dates unknown at this time. Francis future wife Adaline Huckaby was also on the wagon train. She was born in Oregon County, Missouri also. Francis passed away on August 7th, 1893 from injuries h

When they reached the Umatilla River in Oregon the wagon train split up and some of them went south into California and the others settled along the Oregon trail from Umatilla all the way west to the Portland, Oregon area.

Francis and his brother Joseph Loney Stubblefield and their mother and father went south with the wagon train. It is not known at this time where they settled. We have no information that their father and mother returned with them when they returned to Oregon and Washington territories. Letters written by family members mentioned Francis and Joseph returned to the Umatilla, Oregon area about two or three years later. They camped that winter at a place where the town of Umatilla, Oregon is now located. The next spring Francis and Joseph left there and went to Colfax, Washington in Washington Territory and homesteaded property in that area.

The following year they moved back to Walla Walla, Washington and purchased property about six miles south east of Walla Walla along Cottonwood Creek. Cottonwood Creek runs east to west originating in the Blue Mountains and parallels the Oregon Territory northern border about one half mile to the north.

Francis M. Stubblefield met up again with Adaline Huckaby in Walla Walla, Washington and married her in 1872. From this marriage eleven children were born. Only four of their children survived, Francis Joseph, Clara Maud, Ida Lulu, and Laura Myrtle. Daughters, Hatti, Sahara, Mary, and sons, Joseph, John, William, and Thomas all passed away in their early childhood from diphtheria or from scarlet fever. They were all buried in the Stubblefield Cemetery east of Walla Walla, Washington. Later Francis Joseph had

farm the farm was to go to his son Francis Marion Stubblefield but he passed away prior

the children's name put on a large headstone and set in the Mountain View Cemetery in Walla Walla, Washington.

Francis and Joseph Stubblefield stayed on the Cottonwood property until Francis purchased 160 acres from John Murphy on April 3rd. 1876. (see copy of Abstract of Title page (6). Later Francis purchased and additional 40 acres next to the above property from Edwin and Adella Reser on November 8, 1884 (See copy of Abstract of title page (18).

Joseph L. Stubblefield also purchased land some time later in Oregon. This brings Francis's acreage to a total of 200 acres. After Joseph Loney Stubblefield passed away in 1902 he willed to Francis M. Stubblefield forty eight (48) acres which adjoined Francis's property. Additional acreage was purchased as time went on and finally brought the total to 500 acres as it is to this day in 2017.

Francis passed away on August 7th. 1893 from injuries he received from one of his bulls on the farm. He passed away at the hospital in Walla Walla, Washington.

Francis had made out his will leaving the property to his wife Adaline. They had three living children at this time, a son Francis Marion, daughters Clara Maude and Ida Lula Stubblefield. His fourth daughter Laura Myrtle would be born just two months after his passing in October of 1893.

There is no other written information as to who helped in the operation of the farm after Francis's passing. It is assumed that his brother Joseph living just a half mile north of him in Washington on his ranch must have found some time to help out. Adaline's children were to young to help. Joseph Loney Stubblefield passed away November 16th, 1902 so his help was limited to just nine years. Prior to his passing Joseph owned farm property in Washington and Oregon. He also had Henry C. Morris, Francis's brother-in-law working for him. Henry is in one of the photographs submitted with this write-up.

It is mentioned in a few letters that wheat was their main crop for income and some pasture land for hay as they had farm horses and cattle to feed. They raised pigs, beef cattle also for income and had a few milk cows and obviously one mad bull. It has been said that they ceased raising livestock after World War II. They got rid of the horses purchased tractors, combines etc. and went straight to wheat and some barley to wheat, green peas, dry peas and garbanzo beans for farm income as it is to this day.

The property eventually was passed down through the family (See pages (19)-(20) in the family wills from Francis Marion to Adaline Stubblefield (Wife) then to her daughter Clara M. Stubblefield to Francis Joseph Stubblefield. After Francis Joseph owned the farm the farm was to go to his son Francis Marion Stubblefield but he passed away prior

to his father Francis Joseph Stubblefield's passing do to a car accident. Next in line was his daughter Margot S. Stubblefield, Leahy so she inherited the ranch in March of 1977 and has been in her ownership. (See Last will and testament of Marybelle Lyons, Stubblefield item No.4 dated Feb.-4th. -1987)

When Francis Joseph Stubblefield passed away in 1977 Margot's husband Charles J. Leahy retired from his job as a Superintendent at Birds Eye Corp. Food Processing plant in Walla, Washington and took over the farming operation. Charles farmed until his unexpected passing in April,1983. Then Charles and Margot's son Edward P. Leahy left college in his freshman year and came home to do the farming. He has had a steady job for the past 34 years.

Application Guidelines



Background

The Century Farm & Ranch Program is a nonprofit, volunteer-led program to honor farm and ranch families with century-long connections to the land and recognize Oregon's rich agricultural heritage. The program is administered through the Oregon Farm Bureau Foundation for Education and is partially funded through a partnership with the Oregon Farm Bureau, the State Historic Preservation Office, Oregon State University Libraries' Special Collections & Archives Research Center, and community members throughout Oregon.

All applications are added to the OSU Libraries' Special Collections & Archives Research Center. They provide valuable information about settlement patterns, livestock and crop choices, building design and family history. Successful applicants receive a distinctive certificate, with acknowledgement by the governor of Oregon and the director of the Oregon Department of Agriculture and metal roadside sign identifying the historical Century Farm or Century Ranch at a special awards ceremony at the Oregon State Fair.

Qualifications

- 1. Only the legal owner(s) of the property may apply for the Century Farm or Century Ranch status.
- 2. The farm or ranch must have been operated continuously in the same family for 100 years or more. A farm or ranch settled any time 100 years ago or earlier will be eligible if it meets other requirements.
- 3. The farm or ranch must have a gross income from farming or ranching activities of not less than \$1,000 per year for three out of the five years immediately preceding the application.
- 4. If living off the farm or ranch, or if the farm or ranch has ever been rented or leased, the owning family must actively manage and direct the farming or ranching activity on the land. Contact 503-400-7884 or cfr@oregonfb.org if you have any questions about eligibility.
- 5. The line of ownership from the original settler or buyer may be through children, siblings, or nephews and nieces. Adopted children will be recognized equally with other descendants.
- 6. Applications must be submitted on forms provided by the Century Farm and Ranch Program with all questions completed. Applicants must submit a narrative of family history, two to three pages in length that adds to the information included in the application. Copies of historical and current photographs of the farm or ranch and family are encouraged. All information, including photos, will be deposited in the OSU Libraries' Special Collections & Archives Research Center for future reference. Please do not send in original photos and/or documents, as all items sent with your application are *NOT* returned. Please send in quality copies of documents that support your application. Applications should include 4-5 digital photos from your application and sent to cfr@oregonfb.org by May 1.
- 7. All applications must include verification of continuous ownership for 100 years. Acceptable forms of proof include a document (high quality photocopy) showing date of earliest ownership. This may be provided through a Donation Land Claim, Deed of Sale, or Homestead Certificate. Other records, subject to review, include a family Bible, diary entry, or correspondence.
- 8. Applications must be signed and certified by a Notary Public.

9. Deadline for returning applications is May 1 of the current year and must be postmarked by midnight.

Researching Farm and Ranch History

The Oregon Century Farm & Ranch Program website has tips on gathering information about farm and ranch history. The website is located at www.oregonfb.org/centuryfarm.

Completing the Application

This application is a Word document. You can fill information in as you answer the questions. You may notice the page adjusting as you enter text. That is OK. You can also submit a completed photocopy of this form.

Fees

A \$250 fee is required with each application. This fee covers administrative costs and includes one certificate and one roadside sign. Additional certificates may be ordered at the time of application at \$20 each and roadside signs at \$200 each. Make checks payable to **OAEF dba Oregon Farm Bureau Foundation for Education.**

Where to Send Completed Application Packets

Send the completed application (including the family history narrative, map and digital photos), Statement of Affirmation, your documentation, and sign and certificate order form, with fee payment, to:

Do *not* send original documents, as they will not be returned. We recommend that you make a copy of your completed application before mailing. It makes a wonderful single source of farm information for years to come.

Review Process and Notification

All applications are checked for completeness by the program coordinator and reviewed by the Program Board. All applicants will be notified about their status by July 1.

Honoring Ceremony

Successful applicants, their families and neighbors are invited to a special ceremony at the Oregon State Fair to receive the certificate. The certificate has the name of the farm or ranch and is suitable for framing.




