She later was a professor at Willamette University, She was an amazing person.




The family came West in 1844 in the Clyman wagon train. This was the second train through, and is chronicled in the book, <u>Journal of a Mountain Man</u>, Hasselstrom, ed. 1984 [See Joel Chrisman and Benjamin Robinson in the text.]. The family followed the Oregon Trail and arrived in Oregon City.

The property was acquired under the Donation Land Grant in the year 1844. Upon his demise Ina Stilwell Taggart, the granddaughter of Benjamin and Elizabeth Robinson received 100 acres. Upon her passing in 1979, her son Max Stilwell Taggart and his wife Victoria received the land. They sold four acres of forest on the land to pay for tiling the farm in the early 1960's and made other improvement to it.

Max Taggart died in 1990 and Victoria in 2000. The property was passed on to their son John Christopher Taggart in a life estate in their will. The property upon the passing of John and Lois Taggart will then be equally divided among his two children John Christopher Taggart, Jr., Victoria Eleanor Taggart and John Taggart's nephew and the first cousin of Chris and Ellie Aaron Matthew Taggart. At the present all three are approximately forty years of age.

For the past several decades the farm has been farmed by Country Heritage Farms of the Sweeney family right there in Dayton, Oregon. This has proven to be a very successful arrangement, as the Sweeneys are good agribusiness persons, amicable and have a great sense of history and love for the farm and the whole of Yamhill County.

Hopefully the land will stay in the family of Benjamin and Elizabeth Robinson for decades to come.

Application Guidelines



Background

The Century Farm & Ranch Program is a nonprofit, volunteer-led program to honor farm and ranch families with century-long connections to the land and recognize Oregon's rich agricultural heritage. The program is administered through the Oregon Farm Bureau Foundation for Education and is partially funded through a partnership with the Oregon Farm Bureau, the State Historic Preservation Office, Oregon State University Libraries' Special Collections & Archives Research Center, and community members throughout Oregon.

In 2008, a Sesquicentennial Award recognizing families who have sustained their family-ownership of an Oregon farm or ranch for 150 years or more was introduced. This new award is an outgrowth of the Oregon Century Farm & Ranch Program that began in 1958 on the eve of the Oregon statehood centennial.

All applications are added to the OSU Libraries' Special Collections & Archives Research Center. They provide valuable information about settlement patterns, livestock and crop choices, building design and family history. Successful applicants receive a distinctive certificate, with acknowledgement by the governor of Oregon and the director of the Oregon Department of Agriculture and metal roadside sign with special Sesquicentennial nameplate identifying their Sesquicentennial Farm or Ranch at a special awards ceremony at the Oregon State Fair.

Qualifications

- 1. Only the legal owner(s) of the property may apply for the Sesquicentennial Farm or Ranch status.
- 2. The farm or ranch must have been operated continuously in the same family for 150 years or more. A farm or ranch settled any time 150 years ago or earlier will be eligible if it meets other requirements.
- 3. The farm or ranch must have a gross income from farming or ranching activities of not less than \$1,000 per year for three out of the five years immediately preceding the application.
- 4. If living off the farm or ranch, or if the farm or ranch has ever been rented or leased, the owning family must actively manage and direct the farming or ranching activity on the land. Contact 503-400-7884 or cfr@oregonfb.org if you have any questions about eligibility.
- 5. The line of ownership from the original settler or buyer may be through children, siblings, or nephews and nieces. Adopted children will be recognized equally with other descendants.
- 6. Applications must be submitted on forms provided by the Century Farm and Ranch Program with all questions completed. Applicants must submit a narrative of family history, two to three pages in

length that adds to the information included in the application. Copies of historical and current photographs of the farm or ranch and family are encouraged. All information, including photos, will be deposited in the OSU Libraries' – Special Collections & Archives Research Center for future reference. Please do not send in original photos and/or documents, as all items sent with your application are *NOT* returned. Please send in quality copies of documents that support your application. Applications should include 4-5 digital photos from your application and sent to cfr@oregonfb.org by May 1.

- 7. All applications must include verification of continuous ownership for 150 years. Acceptable forms of proof include a document (high quality photocopy) showing date of earliest ownership. This may be provided through a Donation Land Claim, Deed of Sale, or Homestead Certificate. Other records, subject to review, include a family Bible, diary entry, or correspondence.
- 8. Applications must be signed and certified by a Notary Public.
- 9. Deadline for returning applications is May 1 of the current year and must be postmarked by midnight.

Researching Farm and Ranch History

The Oregon Century Farm & Ranch Program website has tips on gathering information about farm and ranch history. The website is located at www.centuryfarm.oregonfb.org.

Completing the Application

This application is a Word document. You can fill information in as you answer the questions. You may notice the page adjusting as you enter text. That is OK. You can also submit a completed photocopy of this form.

Fees

A \$250 fee is required with each application. This fee covers administrative costs and includes one certificate and one roadside sign. Additional certificates may be ordered at the time of application at \$20 each and roadside signs at \$200 each. Make checks payable to **Oregon Farm Bureau Foundation for Education.**

Where to Send Completed Application Packets

Send the completed application (including the family history narrative, map and digital photos), Statement of Affirmation, your documentation, and sign and certificate order form, with fee payment, to:

Do **not** send original documents, as they will not be returned. We recommend that you make a copy of your completed application before mailing. It makes a wonderful single source of farm information for years to come.

Review Process and Notification

All applications are checked for completeness by the program coordinator and reviewed by the Program Board. All applicants will be notified about their status by July 1.

Honoring Ceremony

Successful applicants, their families and neighbors are invited to a special ceremony at the Oregon State Fair to receive the certificate. The certificate has the name of the farm or ranch and is suitable for framing.

Elizabeth Jane Chrisman was Joel and Polly Chrisman's oldest daughter. She was with the family on Ford's wagon train of 1844. A day by day account of that trip is described in Journal of a Mountain Man by James Clyman

A great deal of information about Elizabeth is included in her husband's, Benjamin Morgan Robinson, notes.

The following obituary was published in local paper in 1891

"At her home, near Webfoot church February 23, 1891, in the 72nd year of her age, in blessed hope of heavenly rest. She was born in Lee County, Virginia, in the year 1819. In her 12th year she came with her parents to Missouri; and in 1844 she removed to Oregon, where she was married to her now bereaved husband, Benjamin M Robinson. They selected for their home a choice tract of land three miles south of Dayton, Yamhill County, where they continued to live together happily till separated by death. Her two surviving daughters, Mrs. Mary A. Gilkey and Mrs. Eliza Stilwell, residing near the parental home, where as ministering angels around their mother's bedside during her protracted illness. Sister Robinson was an extraordinary woman in energy, nartual intelligence, devotion to her family, sympathy for everybody and abiding love for her Savior."

Notes

Benjamin Morgan Robinson was born in Cayuga County, New York. Conflicting date are given for his birth. His obituary states that he was born January 8, 1814 and this seems to be born out by census records.

He received his education in New York and about 1833 he moved to Chicago. Later he moved to Missouri where he joined the family of Joel Chrisman on the 1844 wagon train leaving for the Oregon Territory.

In James Clyman's, Journal of a Mountain Man, details of this trip from Missouri to Oregon are given on a day to day basis. Benjamin was one of 19 men that banded together in what was called a 'mess' for the protection and aide of all of that party. These were families that included many women and children. Our family consisted of eight Chrismans, Ben and one other future son-in-law.

The family spent the winter in Oregon City after arriving there November 30, 1844. (Oregon Donation Land Claim papers) In the spring of 1845 Ben took a canoe from the Willamette River to the Yamhill River near Dayton. He traded an Indian pony for squatter's rights to a parcel of land that is now located 2 miles south of Dayton, Oregon. (Lockley's Conversations With Pioneer Women). On April 14, 1845, he married Elizabeth Jane Chrisman. They moved into a log cabin on their land. Their first child, Mary Robinson, was born there on March 7, 1846.

Benjamin worked the land, early raising cattle and horses, later grain crops. Deer and bear were plentiful so fresh meat was no problem. Their second child, John W. Robinson was born in 1848 and Eliza R. Robinson was born in 1850. They lived in the log cabin until 1852 when Benjamin built a frame house. (Clark, History of the Willamette Valley)

About the time of the gold discovery in California (1849) Benjamin joined other men from the area and went to California. He worked in the placer mines on the Yuba River in California. He remained there about a year meeting with fair success before returning home. (Hines, History of Oregon)

In Lockley's Conversations With Pioneer Women, Mary Robinson Gilkey remembers her father, Benjamin, coming to the cabin and kissing her 'goodbye'. He was riding a horse and leading a pack horse. He was going to the gold fields of California. Mary, her mother, and the baby, John, went to live with Elizabeth's sister and husband. They were William and Izza Logan (one of Joel Chrisman's daughters). Izzy had come across the plains with the Chrisman family in 1844.(In 1866, Izzy and William went down with the Brother Jonathon stern wheeler just off the California coast near what is now Crescent City, California.

In 1850, the United States Congress passed the donation land claim act.

If a man had settled the land before 1850 he could claim 320 acres for himself and 320 acres for his wife. The land would be theirs, free and clear, if the claim was approved. Benjamin and Elizabeth's claim #1588 was granted. This claim was one of the six held by Joel Chrisman and his sons and sons-in-laws. It was located about 2 miles south of Dayton, Oregon and consisted of 6 square miles of land.

After returning from California, three more children were born to Benjamin and Elizabeth. They were Eliza (1850), Arminta (1853) and Ruth (1856). They lived in the little log cabin and Benjamin worked the land. At this time there was an epidemic of diptheria. Pioneers of that time did not know how contageous this disease was. Both Arminta and Ruth died of this so called "putrid throat."

Notes (Continued)

In 1862, Benjamin leased the land and moved his family to Lafayette. This was done so that his children could attend the Lafayette Academy there. He later moved to Portland so the children could attend Portland Academy. He engaged in the livery business while there. (Clark, History of Oregon).

It is unclear when Benjamin and the family moved back to the land he settled. When he did, he never left it again. He remained a farmer and took a great interest in education. He served on the school board for many years.

His daughter, Mary Robinson, graduated from Willamette University in 1866 and

Eliza Robinson, graduated in 1871. Both daughters were teachers. Eliza teaching only until her marriage to John Burchard Stilwell in 1873.

Mary taught many more years until her marriage to William Freeman Gilkey in 1880. She taught in many places including Willamette University. She climbed Mt. Hood in 1866 with a group. Her picture hangs at Timberline Lodge with an account of that climb.

Elizabeth and Benjamin were married a total of 46 years until her death on February 23, 1891. Benjamin died April 12, 1902. Their son John died in 1869. The family burial plot is in Brookside Cemetery (Pioneer Cemetery) Dayton, Oregon.

A Malheur Countian has finally qualified in Oregon's century farm program.

Mrs. Ina Stilwell Taggart, Ontario, is the owner of 100 acres of farm land in Yamhili County which came into the possession of her grandfather in According to October 1845.

According to Ontario attorney Max Taggart. Mrs. Taggart's son, Benjamin M. Robinson and Elizabeth Chrisman Robinson came to Oregon in 1844 and settled on the Yamhill County land the following year. There has been only one transfer of record, Taggart explained, and that was from Robinson to his granddaughter, Mrs. Taggart.

Further explanation: Following death of B. M. Robinson in 1902 this property was farmed by other members of the family until 1950. The most recent was J. E. Stilwell Jr, also a grandchild of B. M. Robinson. Upon he retirement of J. B. Stilwell Jr. in 1950 a neighbor was engaged to farm the property under a verbal year-to-year arrangement on share crop basis which arrangement continues to this time. It covers only the 70 acres of farm land. The planting, growing, harvesting and selling of the crops is subject at all times to the approval of Ina Stilwell Taggart and the man who does the farm work, jointly between them.

The remaining 30 acres of farm timber tract has at all times been in the possession and under immediate control of Ina Stilwell Taggart. In 1955 she sold \$1,160.80 in standing timber and in 1956 she sold \$3,199.76 in standing timber which she personally caused to be cut and delivered to the Yamhill Lumber Company, purchaser.

Also we worked together when the Northwest Pipeline was scheduled several years ago to go through this prime land!

Is that management of the land? Lois and I are inclined to think so.

We made \$21,000 off the farm last year.

Now as to the deed and DLC. Well, this goes back to midcentury—mid nineteenth century! I do not ever recall seeing the specific deed nor the land grant document. Please remember that my grandmother's brother and sisters sold their land in the depression; she just "hung on," and it survived in the family. Now, my father, Max Stilwell Taggart's first cousin, a realtor and developer in Bend had the document in the 1960's. Dad asked his cousin to have a copy made

for Dad—and his first cousin finally refused to do it, declaring something to the effect of "You have the farm, and I've got the paper and signature." We never saw the grant. 




